

The Archdiocese of Washington and the Filipino Ministries from various parishes celebrated San Pedro Calungsod on March 31, 2019 at the Holy Redeemer Church in Kensington, Maryland. The second of two saints of the Philippines, Calungsod was canonized October 21, 2012 by then Pope Benedict XVI at Saint Peter's Basilica in the Vatican City. He was a teenaged Roman Catholic Filipino migrant, sacristan, and missionary catechist who suffered religious persecution and martyrdom in Guam for his missionary work in 1672.

Archbishop Gregory's Installation Mass to Take Place May 21 at National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception

Location change will allow more laity to attend the installation of the seventh Archbishop of Washington

n Thursday, April 4, Pope Francis named Archbishop Wilton D. Gregory as the seventh Archbishop of Washington. As the planning for the Mass of Installation began, both Cardinal Wuerl and Archbishop Gregory desired that the faithful of the Archdiocese of Washington be able to attend the Mass on May 21. At the time of the Vatican announce-

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ment, the installation was planned for the Cathedral of Saint Matthew the Apostle, the Mother Church of the Archdiocese of Washington.

Seating, however, is limited in Saint Matthew's and in order to accommodate the large number of laity who expressed interest in attending, the decision was made to move the Mass to the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception, the largest Roman Catholic Church in North America. The Mass will be broadcast on Eternal Word Television Network (EWTN) and will be live-streamed on social media.

Affordable housing crisis challenges Montgomery County

ontgomery County is in the midst of an affordable housing crisis. In 2018, the fair market price for a two-bedroom rental unit in Montgomery County was \$1,793 a month. This cost is out of reach for many low-income residents.

A renter making minimum wage, \$12.25 per hour, would need to work full time to get close to covering only these housing costs. Other expenses such as food, clothing, and healthcare would not be covered. It should not be a surprise to learn that in a recent study over half of all renter households in the county are cost-burdened, meaning those households pay more than 30 percent of their income toward rent.

This issue is worsened by a lack of housing options for low income residents. In 2014, for residents

making less than 30 percent of the Area Median Income (approximately \$30,000 a year), the housing unit gap was approximately 20,000 units. Additionally, over 55 percent of rental units were built before 1980.

All of this put together means that for many low-income residents are working hard but struggling to barely afford rent. If they can afford rent, they are often living in units that are likely at least 40 years old.

Catholic Response

As Catholics, how do we respond to this challenge? The solution is rooted in "solidarity," one of the principles of Catholic social teaching. Simply stated, solidarity states that "We are our brothers' and sisters' keepers, wherever they live." (Search: USCCB, "Sharing Catholic Social Teaching:

Challenges and Directions)

More specifically, the Church teaches: "The family has the right to decent housing, fitting for family life and commensurate to the number of the members, in a physical environment that provides the basic services for the life of the family and the community." (Search: Vatican, "Charter of the Rights of the Family." See Chapter 11.)

The J&A Council embraces this calling as we seek to support efforts in Montgomery County to find solutions to the housing crisis. One possible solution is the accessory dwelling unit (ADU).

Opportunity – Accessory Dwelling Units

ADUs are separate dwelling units that are on the same lot as an existing unit. These ADUs have their own entrance, full kitchen, and bathroom. Think of a garage, base-

ment apartment, or a "tiny house" in a side lot. While the Montgomery County zoning code does not ban ADUs, there are high restrictions on building these types of units. Recently, Councilmember Hans Reimer, At Large, has proposed zoning amendments (ZTA 19-01) to make ADUs available in the zoning code, mostly for multigenerational families.

Proponents of accessory dwelling units argue that such changes would help to increase the availability of housing units on existing lots. They also note that demographic trends indicate that by 2030, 19 percent of Montgomery County's residents will be 65 years of age and older. This could provide an opportunity for older adults to age in place in their homes while also providing residents with additional housing options, desperately needed for residents.

Others, however, remain concerned that ADUs may not provide

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Unplanned changes everything

ashington Post columnist Mark Thiessen describes *Unplanned* as the movie "abortion supporters don't want you to see." Because if you are an abortion rights supporter and you do see it, you may begin to rethink your commitment. If you are young and want to be considered "woke," *Unplanned* will wake you up, big time. Truth is stronger than fiction.

Unplanned is a conversion story based on the memoir of Abby Johnson. Abby was an abortion rights activist – a Planned Parenthood clinic director and employee of the year – until she witnessed an ultrasound-guided abortion on a fetal monitor. Her consciousness raised by the vivid reality of the "procedure" she had witnessed, Abby became a prolife activist. She has since personally shepherded more than 500 other abortion industry insiders to freedom.

Harriet Beecher Stowe's Uncle



Tom's Cabin, published in 1952, was the nineteenth century's best-selling novel. Based on a true story, it exposed the full horrors of slavery and had a profound effect on the public's understanding and tolerance of "the peculiar institution."

In his National Catholic Register review of *Unplanned*, Nicholas Healy, president of Newman College Ireland, suggests the film may be the *Uncle Tom's Cabin* of our era: "For those willing to watch it, the idea

that abortion can be safely discussed in terms of 'women's rights,' with no need to consider the details of what is actually done, is no longer tenable. No more than could slavery be thought of only in the abstract, or in its economic effects, after *Uncle Tom's Cabin* related what was actually being done on slave plantations."

Do a few internet searches. Read a few reviews. Then watch the film.





Evangelization at St. John Neumann

ope Paul VI stated in his 1975 encyclical Evangelii Nuntiandi (Evangelization in the Modern World): "Modern man listens more willingly to witnesses than to teachers, and if he does listen to teachers, it is because they are witnesses."

Inspired by the truth of such a statement, the Evangelization Team of St. John Neumann parish has been collecting the personal conversion and faith journey stories of parishioners for the last several years and presenting them in books that are given out free to those in their parish and beyond. The stories run the gamut from the convert from Islam whose family completely shunned her after an attempted honor killing of her failed, to the revert who decided to return to the Church after realizing that the fulfillment he had been seeking over many years in the materialism of the world was illusory.

It is impossible to read these stories and not be moved by them. What would make a person go from being a disinterested, rather bored Catholic who was simply "going through the motions" to one who, after a supernatural and completely unsolicited religious experience

while driving one day, suddenly exhibit such a relentless thirst for God that even her family had difficulty recognizing her? In the face of such irrefutable evidence of God's actions in our daily lives, it is difficult to remain impassive.

We handed these books out free at Easter with the hope that, in addition to encouraging and strengthening the faith of practicing Catholics, other visitors and "cultural" Catholics who attend Mass only rarely would be caught in that wider net. There are perhaps those who regard the biblical stories as somewhat on a par with fairy tales. To read about the lives and experiences of their contemporaries whose stories are in many ways every bit as amazing as those in the biblical narratives is hopefully to give them pause. Or perhaps they will find cause to question how accurate their view of God as a fault-finding, vindictive rule maker really is.

On the contrary, it is the hope of the Evangelization Team that they may discover through the lens of others His awesome mercy and love, realizing that their lives are the pages upon which He desires to continue to write His love story. St. Faustina, pray for us!

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The Lifestyle of Evangelization

n Tuesday, May 1st, 2018, walked into Maureen Joseph's office seeking to do anything that I could to testify to the good news of Jesus Christ. Her cordial offer for me to join the RCIT team lit a fire in my soul, as it was a window for me to further discern what I wanted to do with my life. I was the last of the 4 to join the team, the others being Juancarlos Ramirez, Cristian Galvez, and Michaela Hiles, and the presence of the aforementioned trio on a weekly basis made my first year of being a catechist go that much more smoothly.

If I had to choose one out of the many lessons that I have learned this year, it would be this: evangelization is a lifestyle choice. I have found that the most memorable days that stick out to me are the days that we did not teach so they would know of God, but rather that they may understand who God is, and that God cares deeply for their souls. Whether it was through personal testimonies of encounters with Him, abstract

references that are the catechist and student version of inside jokes, or through stirring conversations about the trials of a Christian lifestyle, the days we allowed God to speak through us as messengers rather than as mere vaults of knowledge shine brightest to me.

God granted the four of us the incredible opportunity to testify to 16 wonderful teens from different walks of life and with different life stories, and I pray that they got as much out of this year as I did. As they prepare to be Baptized and Confirmed on Sunday, May 12th, I pray that they remember that this faith is about who they are when they take off the jacket, and that this is only the beginning.

but they also learned to admire the patriots who shaped our country. They studied the lives of the Saints and learned that each of us must make sacrifices for the good of others. The Catholic education my children received at Saint Jane DeChantal, The Academy of the Holy Cross, DeMatha Catholic, and Georgetown Prep supported and reinforced the lessons we taught our children, and I am grateful for the life lessons that they learned in Catholic schools and in those school communities.

It can be tough today for children to find heroes. Thanks to unfettered access, our children are exposed to the worst sins of people - a Governor discussing murder as a reasonable option for pregnant mothers, priests violating a sacred trust, actors and actresses having children with their latest boyfriend or girlfriend, athletes feeling free to abuse their wives and disrespect their country, and unstable isolated people expressing their anger with guns in the halls of elementary schools.

Do the lessons taught in our Catholic schools hold their own against the lessons taught on the internet and the television? Are parents able to stand steady against the obstacles that exist as they work to raise young people of character and faith? We are in the midst of a battle for the souls of our children, and no parent can do this alone. Catholic education remains Catholic – Catholic school communities allow families to make positive connections and to support

one another.

At the Spanish Catholic Center doctors and dentists provide care to children and adults; at the Jeanne Jugan House the Little Sisters welcome the ill and the elderly. Volunteers serve Christmas dinner at the Shrine, and parishioners across the Archdiocese serve meals to homeless people daily. Parish priests open their doors at all hours to those in need and rush off to the hospital in the middle of the night to share someone's final moments on earth. Catholic school teachers spend hours creating lessons that will reach all their students, not just the ones who learn easily.

It's important to show our children these quiet heroes who live out the social values of our church. Martin Luther King said that home is not only the place you can return to. He said that home is the place where we go from - with the lessons learned, with the knowledge of who we are. As parents and grandparents, we need to communicate to our children that this is where we come from - that as Catholics this is how we live. We, each of us and all of us, are the Catholic Church and we are in the business of looking for the Face of God in others. It's our mission to share our faith not just by our words, or by attending Mass, but by the way we treat others.

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


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Holy Cross Finds Neverland!


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St. Francis Youth Join Three Other **Parishes in Experiencing Jesus Christ**

Beatitudes Serve as Guide and Inspiration for Participants in Lenten Day of Reflection

n April 13, about 50 St. Francis of Assisi parishioners and other Catholics meditated upon the Beatitudes in considering their own holiness and happiness during the Lenten Day of Reflection held at St. Francis of Assisi Church.

With a theme of "Rejoice and Be Glad: Our Call to Holiness and Happiness," the event marked the second year the parish's Adult Faith Formation Team organized a Lenten Day of Reflection to help prepare St. Francis of Assisi parishioners for Holy Week. However, once the initial framework was created, members of Singles for Christ – a family ministry in Couples for Christ made up of young

Christian adults – took the reins to plan and execute the actual program.

St. Francis parishioner and Singles for Christ member Christian Flores coordinated the program around the eight Beatitudes, giving participants a framework to reflect

upon the Lenten season in the context of these statements that tell Christians how we ought to live. "Nowadays, with so many distractions in our world, it's so easy to lose focus on holiness, especially when we are seeking worldly happiness," he said.

The day began with the exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, with some opening remarks by Fr. John Dillon and a program introduction by Adult Faith Formation Team Member Medy DeAusen. The Music Ministry made up of Singles for Christ members then set the tone for the program's focus: a reflection on the Beatitudes called the Beatitude Examen. For each Beatitude, participants experienced a recorded mini talk by Bishop Robert Barron, either a sharing or song by a Singles for Christ member and silence to reflect on the Beatitude. "We thought it would be a good idea to align each Beatitude with either a sharing or a song to expand further on how these teachings apply to

our daily lives as young adults and as Christians," Flores said.

Both Fr. Dillon and Parochial Vicar Fr. Jack Berard spoke at the Lenten Day of Reflection, respectively, addressing the sev-

In partnership with Rebuilding Together Montgomery County, 15 parishioners worked at a home in Rockville, as part of a program that addresses the needs of low-income homeowners, primarily the elderly, people with disabilities and families with children. Recipients of the services have worked hard to own their homes but are unable to cover the costs of home repair, often because of failing health or fixed income.

Although fewer volunteers came forward to work than in years past, House Captain Mike Rogewitz said the hard-working, veteran volunteers were excellent workers. They accomplished all of their goals, including repairing and repainting the exterior foundation of the

house; installing a water drainage system from the gutters; repairing a fence around the yard; repairing and rehanging sagging kitchen cabinets; repairing bathroom walls and ceiling; caulking and painting bathroom fixtures; cutting and trimming tree limbs; and cleaning the deck, out-

Maggie says that classroom discussions, especially, have helped her connect her reason and faith life. Her Christian faith has been stretched and strengthened during

her stay at Brookewood. Maggie remarked on her religion courses, in particular, which challenged her deeply:

[I found myself] asking big challenging, sometimes painful, questions and wrestling with their answers. And though it is painful and difficult, the discussions I have in the classroom shape how I live my life.

Graduating this May, Maggie will be attending Washington and Lee University in Lexington, Virginia, as a journalism major. This summer she will be shadowing with ABC News before she leaves for college.

additional housing units for those who must need them – low income residents, such as individuals and families making \$30,000 or less annually. Creating these housing units could exacerbate the issue of other limited housing options for low-income residents.

There is significant additional opposition to ADUs. Space limits our ability to consider them here, but you can search the Web for more information.

Justice & Advocacy Council of Montgomery County

Since 2006, the Justice & Advocacy Council of Montgomery County, a voice of the Archdiocese of Washington, has advocated for the poor and vulnerable, especially around issues of affordable housing. The opportunity to build ADUs is attractive, especially to housing advocates, who seek to expand the availability of housing options. But as with all things, it is just part of the solution.

It may be easy to think, "This would create more housing units, wouldn't that be enough?" While this could provide some options for those who desperately need them, we must also seek and consider other options. Out of charity, the biblical challenge remains: "Amen, I say to you, whatever you did for one of these least brothers of mine, you did for me" (Matthew 25: 40).

Catholic social teaching, based on natural law and scripture, continues to stretch us!





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part) not particularly difficult."

Ellie Langley excelled as the lacking-in-confidence title character, conveying his essential sweetness as well as his unfortunate propensity to quit too easily. Maddie Desrocher portrayed Charlie's frenemy, Lucy, with verve. Other members of the cast ranged from fourth through eighth grade and all brought a special sparkle to their various characters in the Peanuts gang. Rene Cathelineaud brought the house down with his jazzy rendition of "Suppertime," which aptly describes the love of a dog for his dinner.

Rehearsals began in January. The students learned all the choreography and musical numbers in the show while also learning stage management, how to publicize their play, and technical aspects of drama production such as lighting and sound. Ms. St. Clair said, "I had been thinking for the last several years that I would love to put together a Drama Club for the school because I had grown up doing theater and wanted the kids at SJE to have the opportunity to learn drama. This year was the first time I felt like I was in a place in my life where I could give the time that I knew it would talk to put on a full production." She continues that she wanted the club to be "a place where the kids really learn how to 'do' drama. I didn't want to do anything for them - I wanted them to do everything themselves. I was just the scaffold as they 'built' the show."

One challenge for this extra-curricular club was securing a large enough budget to pay for performance royalties, sets, and costumes. The club members themselves decided on a creative and fun way to raise funds: they held a schoolwide karaoke night in the month before the production, raising almost \$600 profit. This enabled the club to charge a minimal \$5 admission fee for the performances and ensured that the club would have a nest-egg for future productions. Another significant, and good, challenge was the fact that the original play was written for six characters, while there were sixteen cast members in the SJE production. Ms. St. Clair significantly altered the script so that every character had a speaking role with a monologue or dialogue scene, as well as a solo singing part. Only the dual role of Woodstock, played to adorable perfection by Mark Johnson and Clara Desrocher, was silent. They amazingly conveyed Woodstock's loyalty and sassiness through pantomime and dance.

A highlight of the final Sunday afternoon performance was the "doghouse raffle," in which one lucky family won the right to take home Snoopy's doghouse, which

was custom-built by club members under the supervision of SJE dad, Paul Kopplin. This playhouse-sized structure was won by the Klein family of SJE. Their daughter, eighth-grader Anna, played Rerun. Production weekend was capped off by a rollicking cast party in the SJE gym.

to form a vision because I feel this school has so much to offer. I see it in layers, including the areas of academics, Catholic faith and the plant facility." Principal Whelan accomplished exactly what she has envisioned.

Principal Whelan immediately began working on creating and educational system in Saint Peter's that embraced the STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) curriculum. Although this was a great accomplishment, it was not enough for Principal Whelan. She knew that Arts needed to be an integral part of the curriculum which moved us into the STEAM educational program. Some of the art programs that began since Principal Whelan's arrival are the fifth-grade playwriting class and fourth-grade monologue class with the Olney Theater and the fourth-grade puppetry class. Officially, Saint Peter's full academic program is known as STREAM because of our strong religious (Catholic) Identity standing for the "R".

Using this STREAM curriculum, Principal Whelan felt confident that Saint Peter's was providing a first-class educational program so she applied for the National Blue Ribbon of Excellence Award. The National Blue Ribbon Award is only given to a few hundred schools per

year that meet stringent academic results as determined by the US Department of Education. In 2012, Principal Whelan was successful in obtaining the coveted Blue Ribbon Award. In all 6 years since being awarded the Blue Ribbon, Saint Peter's has continued to achieve the necessary testing results to apply for the designation.

Even with her retirement at the end of this year, Principal Whelan continues to persevere in her efforts to improve Saint Peter's. Recent changes include air conditioning throughout the school, new playground equipment, enhanced security features to the buildings, technology improvements and a brandnew STREAM or "makerspace" lab will open in September 2019 which will enhance the STREAM curriculum.

When Principal Whelan announced her retirement, many people in the school community were surprised and sadden by the news. Home and School Executive Board President, Kathleen Songer, said "Mrs. Whelan has laid a strong foundation and put in place a strategic plan to ensure the success of Saint Peter's for years to come. The wonderful programs and strong staff she has developed makes me feel good about the future."

Although Principal Whelan will be missed and her shoes will be extremely hard to fill, we wish her the best with her retirement plans which include seeing more of her grandchildren!

Mrs. Ryan understands and respects the hard work and dedication of her own faculty, as she spent many years in the classroom herself, teaching at both St. Michael's and later at Blessed Sacrament. She also encourages teachers to further their education and to pursue higher degrees. Holy Redeemer is very proud of their outstanding faculty. Parenting and teaching while earning not one, but two Master's degrees certainly kept Mrs. Ryan busy. After earning her Masters in Curriculum Instruction and Supervision of Reading in 2006, Mrs. Ryan left Second Grade at Blessed Sacrament to become a resource teacher at Blessed Sacrament in 2007.

It was as a resource teacher that Colleen's call to leadership began. She discovered a new appreciation for the principal's role. Her resource work brought home the importance of aligning the curriculum vertically-from grade to grade, and the critical role school leadership plays in curricular alignment. 



The archdiocese purchased 15

The archdiocese purchased 15 acres for the parish a mile or so up New Hampshire Ave. and on February 20, 1954, the ground was broken for a new parochial school, auditorium (to hold masses on Sundays), and a convent. On September 23 of that year, the Sisters of Notre Dame de Namur started commuting from Trinity College, because the convent wasn't complete, to welcome 456 students to grades K through 4 at the new St. Camillus School. But, the need for a school was so great, that St. Camillus Parish had already opened 1st grade a year earlier with a borrowed room at Our Lady of Sorrows School where Mrs. Winifred Canavan taught 60 students starting in September of

On March 13, 2019, Sisters of Notre Dame de Namur returned to

St. Camillus Church to celebrate a special mass with the students of Saint Francis International School in honor of National Catholic Sisters Week. Over a dozen SND Sisters traveled to join the students. The group included Sr. Janet Cahill, who was the 2nd grade teacher at St. Camillus School in 1954, and Sr. Marie Romejko, who was the last SND Sister to teach full time at St. Camillus School. Not only were the Sisters honored at mass, but afterwards the members of the SFIS Student Council and the No Place for Hate Committee joined them for a reception in their former convent.

While they were together the Sisters told the students about Sr. Dorothy Stang, an SND Sister who was martyred in the Brazil for social justice work in the Amazon, and then the Sisters talked with the students at roundtables about their own experiences working for social justice throughout their ministries as Sisters. The day concluded in a space that was recently renovated from what had been Sisters' bed-

rooms in the former convent where tutoring and social work activities take place now being named the "Notre Dame Sisters Room."

Remembering and reflecting on the past, however, is a key part of renewing the mission today. On Wednesday, May 1, eight SFIS students were baptized at the weekly school mass. Over 50 students have been baptized at SFIS since 2012. According to the record books, St. Camillus Parish's very first baptism took place in an old wash basin on November 25, 1951, after the first Sunday mass was celebrated. The work of evangelizing this corner of the Washington Metro Area and building up the Kingdom of God began with the passion of Fr. Grace, the Sisters of Notre Dame de Namur, and so many parishioners and Saint Francis International School is proud to still minister with that same passion today as part of the vibrant and complex community that is St. Camillus Parish!





2019 Haiti Festival a Huge Success

t. Mary's 11th annual Haiti Festival raised more than \$26,000 to benefit St. Joseph's Catholic Church in Carcasse, Haiti.

The two parishes entered into a twinning relationship more than eleven years ago resulting in a new school, teacher salaries, medical mission, health clinic, new rectory, solar power, water wells, and the most ambitious project to date, a new church. St. Mary's is taking the lead in constructing a new church to replace the one destroyed by Hurricane Matthew in October of 2016. The new church will use all metal framing anchored into the concrete slab and finished with a high strength stucco shell inside and out. The interior and exterior will resemble the concrete construction common throughout the country, but will not have the hazard of falling concrete in the event of an earthquake. The building is engineered to withstand winds of 200 mph in comparison to the highest sustained winds from Hurricane Matthew of 150 mph.

This church will be a beautiful house of worship and a safe place of refuge in the event of future storms.



"Blessed" a verified miracle has to be attributed to prayers made to the person after his/her dead. The final step of canonization as a Saint required an additional miracle, although in the case of a martyr of faith only a miracle is required.

This year all the presentations were about North American Saints or soon to be Saints, and in several cases, experts in each subject were invited. During one of the first talks we learned about Servant of God, Mary Virginia Merrick - a native of Washington, D.C. who founded the Christ Child Society. enth and eighth Beatitudes. Fr. Dillon spoke of St. Mother Teresa as a peacemaker, describing her work in August 1982 to save 60 orphaned children with special needs in wartorn west Beirut, Lebanon. Fr. Berard addressed those persecuted for righteousness' sake, illuminating the lives of Blessed Stanley Rother and St. Maximilian Kolbe. The Lenten Day of Reflection then ended with an invitation to receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation and stay for the 5 pm Vigil Mass.

Fr. Dillon said the Beatitudes were a wonderful topic on which the Singles for Christ build the Lenten Day of Reflection, since The Catechism of the Catholic Church tells us, "the Beatitudes confront us with decisive choices concerning earthly goods; they purify our hearts in order to teach us to love God above all things."

"I might also add that I was very pleased that the Singles for Christ volunteered to prepare the Lenten Day of Reflection," Fr. Dillon said. "It showed a desire to serve all their brothers and sisters in the parish."

In addition to the house project, an additional nine parishioners performed general maintenance work on the St. Francis of Assisi parish grounds. 

Christians Responding to Climate Change

pril is internationally recognized as Earth Month, with April 22nd specifically designated "Earth Day," but have we remembered, celebrated, and been a steward of Mother Nature?

Where We Are

Despite the Paris Climate Agreement of 2015, which was adopted by 196 countries, global emissions continue to increase. Our youth around the world are striking in the name of climate change, questioning the good faith of our leaders and efforts to preserve a decent planet for future generations. Despite some progress being made in many countries, not enough is being done, and change is happening too slowly.

Forests and oceans absorb half of the greenhouse gasses produced by human activities. Without them, our planet would not be livable. And yet, since 2014 tropical deforestation has consumed an area five times the size of England. The Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) report gives us fewer than 12 years to reverse this destructive trend and offers suggestions on how to transform our society by changing our consumption patterns, adopting more sustainable economic models,

creating healthier and more competitive jobs, and making the most of renewable technologies.

Our Christian Duty

Pope Francis' encyclical on the environment and human ecology, "Laudato Si", recognizes that climate change is real and the "result of human activity." It calls on the 1.2 billion Catholics worldwide to lead a more sustainable daily life, which ultimately requires "honesty, courage, and responsibility."

The Pope's call for a moral and spiritual transformation in our relationship to Earth's ecosystems is aligned with God's command to care for his creation. "Laudato Si" calls us to focus on protection of our environment and recognize that climate change is the greatest challenge of our time. It also highlights the relationship between climate change, global poverty, and growing inequality. This relationship is driven by our consumption patterns and invasive human footprint on the environment.

Parish Impact

The responsibility to make changes does not land solely on our governments. The faith-based community, like businesses, civic associations, and private citizens, also has a role to play. We must start by reducing our own carbon footprint. By doing this, we can save money, improve our environment, and safeguard the health of our parishioners. A few ideas are emerging from St. Michael the Archangel Parish's Green Team:

- Undertake an energy audit to establish an energy consumption baseline, identify opportunities to reduce consumption, and track the progress of our reduction efforts
- Install rainwater harvesting equipment on church buildings to capture and store rainwater, which can be used both indoors (e.g., for flushing toilets) and outdoors to irrigate gardens, and reduce storm water runoff
- Produce educational materials for parishioners and the local community

Broad implementation of such projects would enable the Catholic Church and other private and public institutions to fulfill their roles as stewards of the environment. Embracing such efforts would demonstrate that the Church is thinking and acting in a progressive way and in line with its core principles. The transformative power of the church and its ability to raise awareness of climate change and stimulate effective stewardship would be leveraged by its access to all communities, regardless of demographics.

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
St. Mary's has raised more than \$180,000 toward the \$480,000 cost of the church.

Pope Francis Orders Worldwide Response to the Evil of Sexual Abuse

n May 9, via a *motu proprio* titled *Vos Estis Lux Mundi* (You Are the Light of the World),

Pope Francis established new procedures for reporting sexual abuse and violence and ensured that Bishops and Religious Superiors are held accountable for their actions. The rule includes the obligation for clerics and religious to report abuse and it requires every Diocese to have a system that allows the public to submit reports easily. The new law comes after a meeting in Rome that brought together all episcopal conference presidents from across the globe to discuss the Church sex abuse crisis.

Cardinal Daniel N. DiNardo, Archbishop of Galveston-Houston and President of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, issued the following response:

"Today, Pope Francis ordered a worldwide response to the evil of sexual abuse. It calls for the establishment of easily accessible reporting systems, clear standards for the pastoral support of victims and their families, timeliness and thoroughness of investigations, whistleblower protection for those making allegations, and active involvement of the laity. It also leaves latitude for national bishops' conferences, such as the USCCB, to specify still more to account for their local circumstances. We receive the Motu Proprio ... as a blessing that will empower the Church everywhere to bring predators to justice, no



matter what rank they hold in the Church. It also permits the Church the time and opportunity to bring spiritual healing.

The Holy Father said a 'continuous and profound conversion of hearts is needed, attested by concrete and effective actions that involve everyone in the Church.' Pope Francis was clear that this responsibility 'falls, above all, on the successors of the Apostles.' As part of this responsibility, bishops also will be held accountable under the authority of this Motu Proprio, which covers sexual abuse of minors

or vulnerable persons, sexual acts compelled through the abuse of authority, and any coverup of such crimes.

In publishing this new law, which is applicable to the Church throughout the world, Pope Francis has made clear that protection and healing must reach all of God's children. Following on the meeting just two months ago of all episcopal conference presidents, the Motu Proprio shows Pope Francis expects swift and comprehensive progress."

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Volunteering Helps Keep Seniors Healthy, New Study Suggests

Older adults show reduced depression and loneliness, increased life satisfaction after serving as Foster Grandparent or Senior Companion

new independent report that provides evidence that consistent volunteering can improve the health and well-being of people age 55 and older was released in February by the Corporation for National and Community Service (CNCS), the federal agency responsible for volunteer and service efforts.

The study examined how participation in national service contributes to changes in health and well-being of Senior Corps volunteers in the Senior Companion and Foster Grandparent programs—who help homebound seniors maintain independence and tutor and mentor at-risk youth, respectively. A companion study explored the health benefits to caregivers who receive support from Senior Corps Senior Companion volun-

According to the research, Senior Corps volunteers report much higher self-rated health scores, which is considered a valid marker of actual health, compared to older adults in similar circumstances who do not volunteer. They also reported feeling significantly less depressed and isolated compared to non-volunteers.

Senior Corps volunteers found their community service satisfying and meaningful, and they reported having opportunities for personal growth, a sense of accomplishment, and friendmaking, all factors associated with improved health, psychological, and emotional well-being and connection to the community. The national study, launched in 2014, collected data from 1,200 first-time Senior Corps volunteers throughout their service with the Foster Grandparent and Senior Companion programs to determine the effect of national service on older adults' overall health and well-being.

Each year, Senior Corps approximateengages ly 220,000 Americans 55 and older through its Foster Grandparent, Senior Companion, and RSVP programs – all addressing some of the nation's most pressing challenges – everything from fighting the opioid epidemic, reducing crime and reviving cities, connecting veterans to jobs and benefits, preparing today's students for tomorrow's jobs, ensuring seniors age independently and with dignity, and helping Americans rebuild their lives following a disas-

These studies are part of a larger body of research that highlights the positive impact of national service, particularly for senior volunteers and the communities in which they serve. he National Rehabilitation Hospital Center for Health and Disability Research has prepared a free consumer guide to help you find the right rehab program for you or your family member.

Selecting a highquality medical rehabilitation program after you experience an injury or illness can be hard to do. You want a rehabilitation program

that will give you the best possible care and that takes into account your own circumstances. For instance, you will want a program that considers how well you get around, the type of transportation you use, where you live, your level of family support, and your insurance coverage. You also want a program that will help you to become as independent as you can be in your daily living.

When it comes time to choose a rehabilitation program, where do you start? How can you tell which rehabilitation programs offer high-quality services that will meet your needs, and which programs will not? Unfortunately, people often must decide where to go for rehabilitation when they do not have the time to gather details about all available programs. Typically, decisions about which rehabilitation program to use are made when a person is already in an acute care hospital. If someone has not talked with you or a family member within the first few days after being admitted to a hospital, ask to see a

re hospital social worker. The social worker can help you begin the process of choosing

a rehabilitation program.

The goal of this 56-page guidebook is to help you to choose a high-quality rehabilitation program. It includes four major parts. Part 1 describes medical rehabilitation—what it is, how it can help you, and the different rehabilitation professionals who will work with you. Part 2 discusses health insurance plans so that you can understand what your plan will and will not cover. Part 3 talks about the different types of rehabilitation programs available

How God Completed a Jewish Man

n April 9, 2019 Richard Meyer spoke with the women of St. Raphael's Sodality and other parishioners about his conversion from Judaism to Catholicism in a talk entitled How God Completed a Jewish Man. Richard used his personal conversion story to explain the four steps involved in conversion: religious, intellectual, affective and moral. His story shows God's patience as He took a man who refused to be

married in the Catholic Church into RCIA, the Church, and now into Diaconate formation.

Richard attended several years of Hebrew School and attained his Bar Mitzvah at 13 years old, but never attended synagogue regularly through his years of higher educa-

his family, mostly at Christmas and Easter, his conversion began at age 40 when he decided to figure out for himself whether Jesus was the Son of God. He began to read about Christianity, and he attended meetings of the Christian Legal Society. He began his intellectual search by reading the New Testament and books such as "From Skeptic to Christian" by Gordon Pearce, and "Mere Christianity" and "The Great Divorce" by C.S. Lewis. Lewis' books challenged Richard to make an intellectually honest decision: is Christ a Liar, a Lunatic, or the Lord? Richard decided Jesus is the long awaited Messiah, the Son of God and our Savior. In the fall of 2003, he entered the RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults) program at St. Raphael's.

In Easter 2004 he became a Catholic and his faith and love for the Eucharist has grown. He stayed involved in RCIA, but his

desire to learn even more about his faith led him into discernment and eventual acceptance into the ADW Diaconate Formation program. He

is currently about half way done and hopes to be ordained with the rest of his class in June 2021.

Standing 6 feet 9 inches tall, Nash's own Catholic upbringing and schooling helped to form the deeply rooted faith within his towering frame, which brightens and lifts up our SRS community through his lightheartedness, gentleness, and genuine compassion for students. Nash's inspiration to become a teacher is credited to his faith-filled parents, Patricia and James (who have passed away in the last six years), influential teach-

ers, and Catholic education from preschool through college. God's call to teaching appears to run in the family because his father, after having worked as a lawyer, taught ancient history and religion at The Heights, Nash's high school alma

This is Nash's first year teaching fifth grade. He previously taught seventh-grade homeroom and middle-school language arts for six years, as well as third- and fourth-grade math and language arts and sixth- and seventh-grade social studies. After the previous fifth-grade teacher, Patty Quinn (win-

ner of the Golden Apple Award in 2014), died of cancer last June, Nash stepped up to fill the gap. In the classroom, he left in its place Quinn's poster with the message: "When faced with two choices, always choose the kinder." He continues to encourage his students to live out the "choose kind" challenge that is part of Quinn's legacy and has spread throughout the SRS community. Congratulations, Mr. Nash, on winning the Golden Apple Award! Above all the qualifications this award recognizes, it truly distinguishes the golden hearts!

Development Office pores through parish directories and the internet in search of Janet Brewer. She uses other online tools to narrow down the possibilities by age and location, eventually zeroing in on a woman in Potomac whose profile seems to check all the boxes. Zafis-Garcia mails a letter and waits. Janet Brewer calls. *The* Janet Brewer. And her information is gold.

No, it wasn't her child who drew Raffi but she remembers who it was. It was a student named Elizabeth O'Connell. It was probably 1976, she estimates, back when St. Raphael Nursery School was a co-op run by parents. The school had the four-year-olds draw pictures and the parents chose the winning drawing. "We put it on T-shirts and tote bags," Brewer says. "It's still on T-shirts and tote bags!" Zafis-Garcia replies. Brewer even

remembers the name of Elizabeth's parents, Maureen and Dan.

The mission to find Raffi's artist gets overtaken by more pressing needs and the project is put on hold. When 2019 arrives—the year of SRNS's 50th anniversary—Zafis-Garcia resumes her search. She finds three people who seem to be a match for Elizabeth, Maureen, and Dan O'Connell, and she mails more letters. Jackpot. Elizabeth O'Connell (now Elizabeth Stanislav). "I actually did draw that," she says giddily on a voicemail. "My mother will be so excited."

Stanislav still lives in the area and turned 47 last month. She is a physical therapist for the Montgomery County Infants and Toddlers Program. The Stanislavs are parishioners at St. Patrick's. Zafis-Garcia invites her to stop by SRNS to see the school. On her visit, she is surrounded by students of all ages—rounded up by SRNS Board President Ashley Mendez with help

from teacher Camila Samper—all wearing SRNS T-shirts and sweat-shirts in her honor. Stanislav is beaming as she comes upon the sea of kids wearing her masterpiece. She talks about the contest to draw the school logo. "I remember them making a big fuss of it and telling me how awesome it was," she says. She mentions she has a hazy recollection of the picture being of her mother. So maybe Raffi is really...

It is a happy visit, with hugs and smiles, backdropped by the ambient sounds of children playing—multiple generations woven together by a drawing made by a little girl 43 years ago.

ticipants from the English-language RCIA program to attend as well in order to experience and to reflect on the significance of this part of our Christian history. This group sat together at a large table with the others, and with the help of a couple of translators, participated fully throughout the evening. Once the women lit the candles at the tables, Father Steve led the readings and rites which the community followed enthusiastically, most, for the first time.

The retelling of the Passover in this celebration brought to light the yoke that ties some ancient Jewish traditions to present day Catholic rituals. It was an important reminder to all, that Jesus Christ, our Lord, was a Jew. He celebrated the Passover much like this. He ate bitter herbs, retold along with his parents, Mary and Joseph, and his friends and family, the historical escape across the Red Sea during the narrative of the Exodus. Perhaps Jesus more than once was one of the children asking the traditional questions! Also, importantly, some of us also recalled that a young Jesus remained at the Temple after the Passover - at His Father's House. (See Luke 2:41-52.) This event was surely a precursor to a more significant transformation related to Pesach: The Blood of the Lamb. Lifesaving markings in Old Testament homes changed their texture, fiber, content. As Catholics we see a new, glorious, lifesaving, life giving essence. Jesus is our Sacrificial Lamb.

Along with the Haggadah text that was recited at the Seder, the celebration included a plethora of music and singing - with a Latin twist. There was also a lovely traditional Jewish dance performance by a group of our youths. Of course, when the easily recognized Jewish folk song "Hava Nagila" was played, most of the full house broke out onto the dance floor. What began as a small circle of dancers became a seemingly endless spiral of dancing feet and waving arms that transformed into a very long conga line! As usual, a delicious dinner was cooked by some of the parishioners and was served in very generous portions to the hungry attendees.

Overall, the evening was educational, it inspired reflection in some, and it was also very much fun for both adults and the many children in attendance. (Get kids to dip their finger in salted water or wine – grape juice, in this case – and sprinkle it on anything, and that's an automatic fun thing for them!) This attendee hopes the Seder will continue as an annual tradition at Christ the King. Shalom!

the students create a business that will solve a problem or meet a need. After they brainstorm ideas, research and collect data, and finally develop a polished business plan, the students pitch their ideas to a room full of investors – Mr. Powers and their parents. This Shark Tanklike presentation requires the students to hone their public speaking skills and practice resilience and flexibility. The young entrepreneurs must remain poised and confident as the investors contemplate a deal.

In a recent presentation, a group of seven students scored a deal for their Water 4 Whales startup. The startup offered customizable water bottles for sale to encourage conservation and decrease the use of plastic. In just one week of operation, the students turned a profit of \$151.33 which they donated entirely to 4Ocean (www.4Ocean. com), an organization committed to removing trash from the ocean and coastlines.

At The Woods, students learn to use complex technology to express themselves, solve problems, and create opportunities as innovators, leaders, and entrepreneurs. Students participate in authentic projects and gain applicable skills that include collaboration, critical thinking, communication, character, and creativity, growing in the context of the world they will one day lead.


