mid a sea of blue confetti and "No. 1" blue foam fingers – and against a backdrop of a giant blue banner proclaiming, "We did it!" – St. Raphael School in Rockville celebrated its first National Blue Ribbon on Sept. 26. The youngest school in the Archdiocese of Washington, SRS opened in 2006 and earned the prestigious honor the first year it was eligible.

Operated by the U.S. Department of Education, the Blue Ribbon program honors public and private schools that have graduated at least five classes. Non-public schools are recognized as "exemplary high performing" if student achievement in English and math is in the top 15 percent in the country. With scores well above the national average



## Addiction: A Social Justice Issue

ddiction to alcohol and drugs is a critical public health issue affecting individuals, families, communities, and the nation in deeply disturbing ways. There is a consensus among most Americans about this. That fact supports our concern and justifies the clinical and law enforcement resources marshaled to address the problem for many years now. The recent surge in opioid addiction is the latest devastating development

in a long history of lives destroyed or greatly damaged due to untreated substance use disorders.


Many pastors in the Archdiocese can tell of the funerals they have celebrated for those lost to drugs. Catholic Charities and parishes have responded with gatherings about addiction.

Less accepted or understood, however, are the structural and societal factors that seemingly predestine larger proportions of our poor and marginalized populations to suffer with drug and alcohol dependence. These factors have a silent but deadly impact on communities across the country—including here in Montgomery County.

#### **Seeking root causes of addiction**

Researchers are beginning to look beyond addiction to the structural factors that bring substance use disorders to the doorsteps of the disadvantaged. Our nation's preeminent drug research body, the National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA) of the National Institutes of Health recently urged politicians and practioners to confront the socioeconomic disparities that lay at the root of the drug crisis.

According to NIDA, "Blame for the opioid crisis now claiming 91 lives every day is often placed on the supply side: over-prescription of opioid pain relievers and the influx of cheap, high-quality heroin and powerful synthetics like fentanyl, which undoubtedly have played a major role. But we cannot hope to abate the evolving crisis without also addressing the lost hope



and opportunities that have intensified the demand for drugs among those who have faced loss of jobs and homes due to economic downturns."

The NIDA report continues, "Reversing the opioid crisis and preventing future drug crises of this scope will require addressing the economic disparities, housing instability, poor education quality, and lack of access to quality health care (including evidence-based treatment) that currently plague many of America's disadvan-

taged individuals, families, and communities" (NIDA, "Addressing the Opioid Crisis Means Confronting Socioeconomic Disparities," 10/25/17).

#### A new form of slavery

Pope Francis on several occasions has called drug addiction "a new form of slavery" (Pontifical Academy of Sciences, 11/24/16). This echoes the long-standing social teaching of the Church, such as that of Vatican II and St. Pope John Paul II, gathered together in the *Compendium of the Social Doctrine of the Church* (paras 5, 158). Pope Francis also said, "Bombs destroy bodies. Addictions destroy the mind, soul and body too" (Address at Roma Tre University, 2/17/17).

In this same address, Pope Francis guides the J&A Council as we seek to influence public policy, reminding us that we are rooted in faith. "I profess myself Christian, and the transcendence which I open myself and look to has a name: Jesus. I am convinced that his Gospel is a force of true personal and social renewal."

## Toward more meaningful legislation in Montgomery County

The Justice and Advocacy (J&A) Council of Montgomery County recently adopted addiction as one of our core issues in light of these emerging and pernicious trends. J&A Council co-chair Brian Dorsey


# Is there an Unplanned showing in your future?





## **A Call to Virtue**

he Holy Spirit is alive and active in the Holy Redeemer School community. At the end of the 2017-2018 academic year the teachers at Holy Redeemer read a professional development book about "Social-Emotional-Learning" (SEL). Learning about the new trend in education was very exciting. Our new school counselor, Mary Ellen Bombara, provided many opportunities for the teachers to learn how to implement SEL in the classroom. This approach helps the students to become aware of and check their behaviors. Simultaneously, the HR religion department noticed a growing need among their students who seemed to be facing, on a daily basis, adult situations in the media and their own community. The department desired to find a way to help children draw on their Catholic faith to cope with the ups and downs of everyday life. They introduced the Virtues in Practice program. SEL, fit well with the new virtue program they added to the curriculum. It was a great way to blend this new learning trend with our Catholic identity.

The Virtues in Practice program was developed by the Dominican Sisters of St. Cecilia Congregation in Nashville, Tennessee, and is offered at no cost to Catholic schools. It runs on a three -year cycle beginning with the Year of Faith, followed by the Year of Hope and ending with the Year of Charity. We are currently in our second year, the Year of Hope. Each month will focus on one virtue beginning with Hope in September, followed by Studiousness, Humility, Patience, Fidelity, Cheerfulness, Temperance, Obedience, and

Through the Virtues in Practice program the students learn to grow in Christian virtue

and see this practice as concrete expressions of their Catholic faith. They learn that virtue is not just something to know, but something to be lived. Students learn about a saint who exemplifies the month's virtue and practice it through role-playing in the classroom. Each virtue is reinforced both in school and at home. Parents, as the primary educators of their children in the faith, are encouraged through Home Projects to talk about and model the virtue of the month with their children.

According to Mary Harper and Pam Hurley from the school's religious education department, "We have begun to see some of the fruits of the Virtues in Practice program. We see older students bonding on a different level with their siblings, helping out in the classroom and at home without being asked, and a greater desire among the students to visit Jesus in the adoration chapel. We have also witnessed an increased enthusiasm and involvement in the Faith in Action Team, a student-led after school club."

Combining Social Emotional Learning and the Virtues in Practice program has greatly enriched our school community and helped our students gain confidence and perspective in facing the ups and downs of their day to day life through the strength of their faith.


## **Making Money in the Classroom**

said, "We are making efforts to engage county council members in conversation toward meaningful legislation and programs to address the special addiction treatment and prevention needs of Montgomery County residents." "Our hope," he said, "is to approach the issue as a systemic problem and advocate for change across the spectrum of socioeconomic factors that contribute to our county's addiction prob-

The J&A Council is committed building relationships with elected officials. We advocate for a variety of issues in accord with the principles of Catholic social teaching, such as increased job training, supporting individuals with developmental disabilities, and prison reform/recidivism. In 2019, we also focused on five priorities: affordable housing, economic security, immigration, addiction recovery, and

food security. The J&A Council has been advocating for change since 2006 and looks forward to 2020 as an important year for change among our leaders and legislators.

pel. Over the years several dozen Sisters of Notre Dame de Namur lived in our parish convent; most working as teachers and administrators in St. Camillus School, some serving as pastoral associates in the parish in English and Spanish, and some going out to minister in other ways. The Sisters, especially through St. Camillus School, were builders of St. Camillus parish.

From 1951 to 1984, priests of the Archdiocese of Washington labored building St. Camillus. In the earliest days the parish rectory was a large house on Carroll Avenue in Takoma Park and mass was celebrated in the parlor. The community grew and in 1952 the pioneering St. Camillus parish began celebrating Sunday masses in the newly constructed Langley Park Movie Theater, in the plaza where the transit center is today. But, on November 21, 1954, Sunday masses began in what is now called the Camillia Room. Until the permanent church was built in 1970, the Parish Life and Education Center hosted all aspects of the community's life ... children were educated there, masses were celebrated there, the Sisters lived there, celebrations and weddings and funerals were held there, and the space grew to meet the needs of a vibrant church. In 1955, 1957, and 1960 the priests' residence was built, the school was expanded twice, and the convent was doubled in size.

Since the arrival of the Franciscans in 1984, the parish has continued to grow and evolve. Starting in the early 1970s, St. Camillus became the host to the growing Spanish-speaking community in Montgomery County. In the 1980s and 90s, the parish hosted the Vietnamese community until their church was built on New Hampshire Ave. The parish returned to Langley Park with the establishment of a mission located within the apartment complexes. And, over the years the parish also welcomed Haitians, Frenchspeaking Africans, a Gospel mass community, Bangla-speaking South Asians, and native Guatemalans as a few of the unique groups that make up this community.

St. Camillus parish has always been more than Sunday worship, and even though the church is one of the most attended in the arch-

diocese each weekend, so much more happens seven days a week in the Parish Life and Education Center. After the Notre Dame Sisters moved out of the convent, spaces were converted to be used as offices, meeting rooms, and the Knights of Columbus Hall. In 1996, St. Camillus School was recognized with a Blue Ribbon from the US Department of Education, and the daily mass chapel was constructed adjacent to the Fr. Grace Room. In the late 1990s the school was renovated and over the last two years the parish has begun a process of modernizing the facilities on the 15-acre campus including new roofs, lighting, plumbing upgrades, upgraded kitchen, and planning for the eventual replacement of the heating and air conditioning.

Throughout the 2000s, St. Camillus continued to adapt to the needs of the community and continued to find ways to make the Parish Life and Education Center the heart of the parish. Today, while about 440 students go the school on weekdays, St. Camillus still educates and forms over 1,200 students in all of our programs in the Parish Life and Education Center and at Langley Park. In addition to the students who are educated at Saint Francis International School, St. Camillus has upwards of 800 children in the Faith Formation Programs on Sundays which are held in English, Spanish, and French at two locations. Parish volunteers also educate adults in ESL classes in the Parish Life and Education Center and at Langley Park during the week, and there are multiple vibrant youth ministry groups and adult groups that use the facilities every day of the week for prayer and spiritual development.

On August 27, 2019, the parish school - known as Saint Francis International School since 2010 began the 65th year of Catholic education in the St. Camillus Parish Life and Education Center. The parish will gather in the Camillia Room, where so many masses have been celebrated over the last six decades, on October 19, the anniversary of the very first mass, to kick off two days of remembrance and renewal as the community works to constantly rebuild the Parish Life and Education Center and all of the parish resources to meet the needs of many people and ministries today and for generations

# **Lessons About Gardening and Life from Monsignor Filardi**



t has been recognized for many years that people 65 years and older are at greater risk of serious complications from the flu compared with young, healthy adults because human immune defenses become weaker with age. While flu seasons can vary in severity, during most seasons, people 65 years and older bear the greatest burden of severe flu disease. In recent years, for example, it's estimated that between 71 percent and 85 percent of seasonal flu-related deaths have occurred in people 65 years and older and between 54 percent and 70 percent of seasonal flu-related hospitalizations have occurred among people in that age group. So, influenza is often quite serious for people 65 and older.

#### **Actions to Take This Flu Season**

#### 1. Get Your Flu Shot

The best way to prevent the flu is with a flu shot. CDC recommends that everyone 6 months of age and older get a seasonal flu vaccine each year by the end of October if possible. However, as long as flu viruses are circulating, vacci-

nation should continue throughout flu season, even in January or later. Vaccination is especially important for people 65 years and older because they are at high risk for complications from flu. Flu vaccines are often updated each season to keep up with changing viruses and also immunity wanes over a year so annual vaccination is needed to ensure the best possible protection against influenza. A flu vaccine protects against the flu viruses that research indicates will be most common during the upcoming season.

#### 2. Practice Good Health Habits.

Practicing good health habits Includes covering coughs, washing hands often, and avoiding people who are sick.

#### 3. Seek Medical Advice **Quickly if You Develop Flu** Symptoms.

Seek advice to see whether you might need medical evaluation or treatment with antiviral drugs. CDC recommends that antiviral drugs be used as early as possible to treat flu

in people who are very sick with flu (for example, people who are in the hospital), and people who are sick with flu and have a greater chance of getting serious flu complications, like people 65 and older. The benefit is greatest if treatment is started within the first 2 days of illness. A full list of high-risk factors is available at "People at High Risk of Developing Flu-Related Complications".

#### 4. Get Pneumococcal Vaccines.

People who 65 years and older should also be up to date with pneumococcal vaccination to protect against pneumococcal disease, such as pneumonia, meningitis, and bloodstream infections. Talk to your doctor to find out which pneumococcal vaccines are recommended for you. Pneumococcal pneumonia is an example of a serious flurelated complication that can cause death. You can get the pneumococcal vaccine your provider recommends when you get the flu vaccine

# Federal Law Enforcement Action Involving Fraudulent Genetic Testing Results in Charges Against 35 Individuals Responsible for Over \$2.1 Billion in Losses in One of the Largest Health Care Fraud Schemes Ever Charged

Elderly Patients Nationwide Lured into Criminal Scheme; Centers for Program Integrity & Medicare Services Takes Administrative Action against Providers that Submitted Over \$1.7 Billion in Claims

federal law enforcement action involving fraudulent genetic cancer testing has resulted in charges in five federal districts against 35 defendants associated with dozens of telemedicine companies and cancer genetic testing laboratories (CGx) for their alleged participation in one of the largest health care fraud schemes ever charged. According to the charges, these defendants fraudulently billed Medicare more than \$2.1 billion for these CGx tests. Among those charged today are 10 medical professionals, including nine doctors.

The Department of Justice, Criminal Division, together with the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Office of the Inspector General (HHS-OIG) and FBI spearheaded today's landmark investigation and prosecution that resulted in charges against CEOs, CFOs and others.

In addition, the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services, Center for Program Integrity (CMS/CPI), announced today that it took adverse administrative action against cancer genetic testing companies and medical professionals who submitted more than \$1.7 billion in claims to the Medicare program.

Today's announcement is a culmination of coordinated law enforcement activities over the past month that were led by the Criminal Division's Health Care Fraud Unit, resulting in charges against over 380 individuals who allegedly billed federal health care programs for more than \$3 billion and allegedly

prescribed/dispensed approximately 50 million controlled substance pills in Houston, across Texas, the West Coast, the Gulf Coast, the Northeast, Florida and Georgia, and the Midwest. These include charges against 105 defendants for opioid-related offenses, and charges against 178 medical professionals.

The coordinated federal investigation targeted an alleged scheme involving the payment of illegal kickbacks and bribes by CGx laboratories in exchange for the referral of Medicare beneficiaries by medical professionals working with fraudulent telemedicine companies for expensive cancer genetic tests that were medically unnecessary.

Often, the test results were not provided to the beneficiaries or were worthless to their actual doctors. Some of the defendants allegedly controlled a telemarketing network that lured hundreds of thousands of elderly and/or disabled patients into a criminal scheme that affected victims nationwide. The defendants allegedly paid doctors to prescribe CGx testing, either without any patient interaction or with only a brief telephonic conversation with patients they had never met or seen.

"These defendants allegedly duped Medicare beneficiaries into signing up for unnecessary genetic tests, costing Medicare billions of dollars," Assistant Attorney General Brian A. Benczkowski of the Justice Department's Criminal Division. "Together with our law enforcement partners, the Department will continue to protect the public fisc and prosecute those who steal our taxpayer dollars."

"The scope and sophistication of the health care fraud detected in Operation Double Helix and the related Operation Brace Yourself is nearly unprecedented. But the citizens of the Southern District of Georgia should know that we put together an unprecedented response," said U.S. Attorney Bobby L. Christine of the Southern District of Georgia. "Our office charged more defendants, responsible for more health care fraud losses, than ever before in this office's history. While these charges might be some of the first, they won't be the last."

"The defendants allegedly targeted elderly, disabled and other vulnerable consumers, luring them into this fraudulent scheme that affected victims nationwide and generated losses in excess of one billion dollars which spanned multiple jurisdictions," said U.S. Attorney Peter G. Strasser for the Eastern District of Louisiana. "Schemes such as these have a profound effect on our nation, not only by the monies lost in the scheme, but also by stoking public distrust in some medical institutions. It is imperative to preserve taxpayer confidence whenever and wherever possible. Our office, along with our investigative partners, reminds seniors and their caregivers to be vigilant for fraudulent schemes. If you are aware of or believe you are the victim of a health care fraud scheme, please contact law enforcement."

"The defendants are alleged to have capitalized on the fears of elderly Americans in order to induce them to sign up for unnecessary or non-existent cancer screening tests," said U.S. Attorney Ariana Fajardo Orshan of the Southern District of Florida. "The genetic testing fraud schemes put personal

greed above the preservation of the American health care system. The U.S. Attorney's Office in South Florida, alongside our law enforcement and USAO partners, remains committed to protecting taxpayer dollars and the Medicare program from abuse."

"Healthcare fraud and related illegal kick-backs and bribes impact the entire nation," said Assistant Director Terry Wade of the FBI's Criminal Investigative Division. "Fraudulently using genetic testing laboratories for unnecessary tests erodes the confidence of patients and costs taxpayers millions of dollars. These investigations revealed some medical professionals placing their greed before the needs of the patients and communities they serve. Today's law enforcement actions reinforce that the FBI, along with its partners, will continue to pursue and stop this type of illegal activity."

"Unfortunately, audacious schemes such as those alleged in the indictments are pervasive and exploit the promise of new medical technologies such as genetic testing and telemedicine for financial gain, not patient care," said Deputy Inspector General for Investigations Gary L. Cantrell of HHS-OIG. "Instead of receiving quality care, Medicare beneficiaries may be victimized in the form of scare tactics, identity theft, and in some cases, left to pay out of pocket. We will continue working with our law enforcement partners to investigate those who steal from federal healthcare programs and protect the millions of Americans who rely on them."

## Senior Call Check Program

aryland is the first state in the country to start a free, opt-in, telephonic service to check on Maryland's older residents, all across the state.

#### **How Does It Work?**

Every day a telephone call will be placed to a participant at a regularly scheduled time. These calls will take place

between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. as close as possible to the one-hour time block pre-selected by the participant. If the participant does not answer their first call, they will be tried two more times. If those calls go unanswered, additional calls will be made to notify an alternative person who is selected by the participant during program enrollment. This could be an adult child, a neighbor, or another loved one. The alternate will then be encouraged to check on the older adult program participant. The failure of the participant and alternate to answer may result in a Welfare Check by local law enforcement.

#### Who Can Participate?

Any Maryland resident who is 65 years of age or older who has a landline phone or cell phone (TTY is available). The participant and alternates should not have automated call blocking technology (or they should disable that phone feature for this program).

#### When Do Calls Begin?

Daily calls will not begin until the applicant / participant receives a call to verify all of their information. Verification will include a successful test automated call to both the participant and alternate where applicable. After all information is validated, a Welcome Packet will be mailed to your home address. The welcome letter will include your start date.

spirit" said Pak. to combat this scourge on our society – namely, the late-term abortion facility of LeRoy Carhart that had opened in the suburbs of Maryland in December 2010 due to the state's lax abortion laws.

In one of those earlier community rallies, Deacon James specifically recalls these powerful words proclaimed by one pastor, "Imagine a sign at the abortionist's door: 'This abortion clinic is made possible by the good Christians and Catholics of Montgomery County.' If we don't do anything, this place stays open." They decided shortly thereafter that one hour of prayer each week was not too much they could offer for these children who were perishing. (According to statistics, about 50 million children are aborted every year throughout the world, and about 125,000 per day.) Every Monday morning, as many of these pro-life-minded people that could go, did go, to rally for

these babies' innocent lives. They held up signs and walked up and down Wisteria Drive saying prayers and countless Rosaries, endured the natural elements and the cruel scorn of passersby and the abortionist's office workers. Monday was the decided-upon day because that was when Carhart began the abominable practice - it takes three days to end a late-term pregnancy because the baby is so developed. Carhart would fly into town on the weekend from Nebraska - which is where he actually resides – to perform the gruesome procedures. Ironically, once or twice the inclement weather worked for life - the snow would cause his flight to get canceled and he could not travel to his office.

The fact is that abortion is so horrible, the world itself has turned a blind eye to it. Our world pretends it is not happening. Deacon James said, "You have to learn to distrust the peace that the world will project over this industry. It's hard to live in the reality of abortion, knowing how many thousands of children are killed every minute." Despair

can set it in. "It was discouraging to watch," Deacon James said. "What was our prayer really doing? Monday after Monday we would pray." The almost eight years the Germantown facility was open felt like an interminable amount of time to the pro-life prayer warriors who would gather along Wisteria Drive.

But it was that stalwart trust in God through prayer that ultimately led to its closing in August 2017. Thanks to the prayers of the faithful, the work of the sidewalk counselors and the pro-life pregnancy center directly across from Carhart's facility, 428 women ultimately chose life for their children. Like each one of us, these children have inimitable souls. There never was - and never will be – another person that is the same as just one of those saved babies. The victory in Germantown gives us hope that this extreme evil can end – but it starts with us. We have to change our lives to fight abortion. As Deacon James says, "The pro-life movement demands us to live differently, to change our schedules to make time - and to sacrifice. A lot of fidelity and prayer bears real fruit in the end."

Unfortunately, Carhart's office has moved to North Bethesda (in the Wildwood Shopping Center near the corner of Old Georgetown Road and Democracy Boulevard). Hopefully, those in that neighborhood will also take action to stand up for life to get Carhart's operation closed for good. Deacon James said, "Proximity is a consideration. If you live next door to a burning house, you will have a responsibility that the others in the next town over will not. Whether we like it or not, this is our task and we have to respond." God will give us the fortitude, trust and humility to pray faithfully to Him. We have only to ask. The power of prayer works miracles big and small - and it will continue to give protesters inspiration and courage to move forward. We must not give up, brothers and sisters in Christ. We may have won one battle, but there is still a monumental war to fight.

it treats those who are in the dawn of life, the children, those who are in the twilight of life, the elderly, and those who are in the shadows of life, the sick, the needy and the handicapped". This moral test is applicable not only to governments, but to all social, economic and religious organizations and especially to each and every one of us.

This month is an appropriate time to honestly apply this test to ourselves and all aspects of our lives and commit to strengthening areas in which we fall short. Are we doing as much as we are able to assure that children are loved and cared for in a respectful manner? Abortion and immigrant children come to mind. Are we assuring that the elderly among us age with dignity and respect? Isolation and loneliness come to mind. Perhaps the most difficult of all, are we searching the shadows of our communities to assure that those often invisible and forgotten receive the respect that Christ demanded? The homeless and severely disabled come to mind. Many Catholic service organizations score high on this moral test. Here are some which may help you in your efforts to respect life this month. St Ann's Center for Children and Families has been caring for those in the dawn of life for more than 150 years, www.stanns. org. Victory Housing is celebrating its 40th year serving those in the twilight of their lives by providing affordable assisted and independent living, www.victoryhousing.org. The Joseph P. Kennedy Institute, a part of Catholic Charities serves those living in the shadows of life by providing services to children

and adults with disabilities, www. catholiccharitiesdc.org/kennedyschool. We are grateful and proud of these truly Christian service groups and others who serve as well.

Last time we reflected on the important and urgent need for kindness today. We identified disciplines necessary to be kinder people. We acknowledged that growing in kindness begins within each of us and requires effort and intention. Some of you emailed me in agreement and offered other ideas.

The road to kindness may be likened to a spiritual pilgrimage. Whether Muslims trekking to Mecca, Jews flocking to Israel, or the more modest pilgrimage of Catholics enduring traffic along Rt. 270 to Thurmont to visit the Grotto of Lourdes, the faithful are changed for the better having made the pilgrimage. Might we consider a pilgrimage to a special place in our hearts called kindness? To make a meaningful pilgrimage, we should prepare ourselves spiritually. So let's reflect upon the preparations and supplies needed to make a pilgrimage that will enable us to live a kinder life.

We will need sustenance for the long journey. Faith will fuel our spirit and satisfy our hunger for affection. Trusting in God's inexhaustible love for each of us will enable us to recognize and welcome God as a reliable and supportive travel partner.

To reach the goal of our pilgrimage, we need a map. Be sure to pack the Gospel. The divine Cartographer, Jesus Christ, has charted the way to a kinder life in His teaching and example in the New Testament. We will be wise to read and reflect on these each morning before we begin the day's

leg of our journey. Isn't it amazing how much easier it is to get where we want to go when we know how to get there!

No doubt there will be bumps along our journey to kindness, perhaps even a breakdown. To plan for these, bring along some selfforgiveness. A priest friend of mine tells me that some of the kindest people he knows confess their deep disappointment in themselves for few and minor unkindnesses. For penance, he assigns them "forgive yourself". If we are unkind to ourselves, it will be more difficult to be kind to others.

The long journey to kindness will pass more quickly and be more joyful if we add entertainment. Most popular entertainment media these days contribute more to unkindness than to kindness so we will need to bring along our own joyful sources. Turn on your heart and tune into thanksgiving. Everyone has much for which to be grateful. In our busy lives, we often forget to take the time to stop and reflect upon the gifts of kindness we have given to others. Be thankful to your Traveling Partner for the joy we have brought to others and the trip will pass in a most satisfying way.

Before we know it, Advent will be here. Those four weeks of preparation for the birth of Jesus are a good time to take the pilgrimage to kindness. Having completed it, the Christmas season will be an ideal time to test out newly acquired insights into kindness and bring joy to the world. Have a blessed and joyful trip!

How would the world receive the message that God makes no mistakes?

Do you wonder why God creates the weak and the fragile, those with broken bodies and broken minds? Don't we all wonder why He wouldn't make everyone "normal"? Of course we do. We can't begin to understand why some people struggle through life, and others seem to coast along easily. But there are lots of things we don't understand – the Virgin Birth, the Resurrection, the Holy Trinity – we're not supposed to understand, that's why we need

faith.

Jesus did not place greater value on strong bodies and minds. If we follow His lead, we won't evaluate those who appear weaker and less than normal with pity and a sense of relief, whispering, "There but for the grace of God go I." Instead, we are meant to stand shoulder-to-shoulder with one another, affording everyone the same respect and regard. As in any family, we are called to prop one another up, to hold one another accountable, and to love unconditionally.

Because we believe that all life has intrinsic dignity, that no one should be afforded more respect than anyone else. Because we respect and honor all life, we know that none of us is worthless and none of us is more worthy than the other. Each of us contributes, and each contribution is valued. This is not a political position. It's a truth – not up for debate.

So if we believe that every life has dignity, that everyone matters, and no one matters more than anyone else, do we have the courage to act on our beliefs? What would our Sunday Masses look like? What would our Catholic schools look like? How would we treat one another? How much richer would our lives and the lives of our children be if we saw the Hand and the Face of God in everyone we encountered?

to end abortion. There were tons of information, flyers, signs, t-shirts, and bumper stickers available for pick up. Right to Life of Montgomery County had a table with pencils, pens, wristbands, and literature that people could take for their own information and also for handing out to others in the community.

Fr. Giese, Pastor of St. Jane Frances de Chantal Parish, opened the event with a talk about the first civil right as the right to life and then proceeded to bless the event with an inspirational prayer. Matt Britton, General Counsel and Chairman of the Board of 40 Days for Life, gave shocking statistics and amazing stories about the horror of the situation but gave hope that there are also stories of lives saved and conversions. George Weigel, a Parishioner of St. Jane Frances de Chantal Parish and Saint Pope John Paul II Historian, praised the 40 Days for Life campaign and encouraged full participation. Pastor David Sayne, Wildwood Baptist Church, closed the evening with a dynamic prayer reminding the audience to follow the Gospel. Jill Gadwood, local coordinator, gave all the practical details for the 40 Days campaign and highlighted the October 6 Witness for Life Noon Mass

at St. Jane's church followed by a rosary procession to Carhart's facility. St. Jane's Pro-Life Committee invited attendees to join them in their rosary campaign during the month of October pledging rosaries for the unborn. Attendees committed themselves to 140 rosaries.

The 40 Days for Life is a worldwide mobilization effort that seeks to protect mothers and children. In its 12-year history, 40 Days for Life has saved 16,000 unborn babies, closed 100 abortion facilities, and inspired 1,000,000 volunteers at over 800 locations in 60 countries. The tools used by 40 Days for Life are prayer, fasting, peaceful vigils and community outreach.

From September 25 through November 3, a 40 Days for Life vigil will take place daily, from 7:00 am to 7:00 pm, outside LeRoy Carhart's late-term abortion clinic at the Wildwood Medical Center (10401 Old Georgetown Road, Bethesda). Several local parishes have committed to join the campaign and organize groups of parishioners to come pray in front of the abortion clinic during the 40-day vigil. Vigil participants will stand on the public sidewalk between Old Georgetown Road and the white fence. To sign up go to www.40daysforlife.com/Bethesda.



## St. Martin's Parish Approaches Its **100th Anniversary**

inety-nine years ago, in the fall of 1920, Republican Warren G. Harding had just been elected President. The Cleveland Indians had defeated the Brooklyn Dodgers, 5 games to 2, to win the World Series. In the Archdiocese of Baltimore, in the town known as Gaithersburg, population about 760, a small group of devoted Catholics was about to see the culmination of years of prayers, work, and savings.

As early as the 1880s, Catholics in the Gaithersburg area attended Mass in a special chapel in home of Thomas and Adeline Gloyd. The brother and sister lived at 5 North Frederick Ave (the "Great Road West"), near where the new rail-

road line had been established. As the community grew, they began to hope and plan for a more permanent place of worship. A committee of local ladies began a "Chapel Fund" to collect one dollar each month from local Catholics. They also approached the landowners of the vacant property they had selected, at the corner of Frederick and Summit Avenues.

In 1914, Mr. John Diamond, a Catholic, donated his share of the land. Mr. Ignatius Fulks sold his land at half-value to Father George B. Harrington of St. Mary's in Barnesville, MD, who promptly transferred ownership to the Archbishop of Baltimore. Further plans were halted by the onset of World War I, and then Fr.

Harrington was transferred away from St. Mary's. Father John S. Cuddy, his replacement, was eager to continue the work and soon enough it was December 1920 and St. Martin's was canonically estab-

On December 12, 1920, Fr. Cuddy said the first Mass in the church of St. Martin of Tours. The building was made from re-purposed army mess halls moved to the property by Fr. Cuddy, a former army chaplain.

Today St. Martin's hosts ten weekend Masses in three languages. The parish has a church, a school, and a wide variety of ministries and activities.

We invite all those who have a special place in their hearts for St. Martin's to join us as we kickoff the Centennial Year. We open with our annual Tri-lingual Mass on Sunday, November 10 at 12:00 pm in honor of St. Martin of Tours. Bishop Brennan, the newly appointed bishop of the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston, West Virginia will serve as the celebrant. Following the Mass, Bishop Brennan will dedicate and bless the newly renovated Church Hall.

The parish will hold a year-long celebration of its founding, leading up to a Centennial Celebration weekend in November 2020.

## Sarah Seyed-Ali Returns Home to Lead Youth Ministry

arah Seyed-Ali has accumulated a life's worth of experiences living as a young Catholic adult, having graduated from one of the top Franciscan universities in the U.S., traveled to Rome and the Holy Land and discerned a religious calling to the Missionaries of Charity. Her calling as a Catholic has now brought her full circle to lead the Youth Ministry at St. Francis of Assisi Catholic Church – a group to which she belonged as a high school student while at Magruder High School in Derwood.

On Sept. 3, Seyed-Ali joined the parish staff, working with clergy, her new colleagues and the Youth Group's adult volunteers to build upon the solid foundation of the Youth Ministry. She succeeds Fr. Jack Berard in her new role after he

was called to serve in Annunciation Parish in Washington DC.

Seyed-Ali spent much of the

past three years discerning how she wanted to pursue a life of holiness. While working toward a bachelor's degree in business administration from the Franciscan University in Steubenville, OH, she chose to serve with the Missionaries of Charity, the religious order founded by St. Mother Teresa of Calcutta. During a year with the order's corporal branch, Seyed-Ali served the poor living on the South Side of Chicago, bringing food to people, serving pregnant women living in a home adjacent to the sisters' residence and working in a soup kitchen. After returning to school and graduating, she resumed discernment in the order's contemplative branch, where she spent most waking hours praying before the Blessed Sacrament and in silence.

"Living in the communal life with other women was very enriching," Seyed-Ali said. "The life was organized in that we were always together – I didn't know the impact of working together every waking moment. I didn't realize how important a solid, communal Catholic life was to serving the Church."

As St. Francis' new Youth Minister, Sarah said she wants to encourage young people to receive the love of God through their families and the St. Francis faith community and help facilitate the building of a rich, spiritual life for the youth. She wants to help them see what the Christian life is by deepening their baptismal consecration, nurturing their faith formation and offering them opportunities to serve the Church. She'd also like to help cultivate in young people a rich life of prayer.

Seyed-Ali, 23, credits her former youth minister, Sue Lea, for the example she set as someone who cared for young people and

the world around them. "She took us to the March for Life – that's something that formed my decision to be pro-life in my life. She took the teens to World Youth Day and to archdiocesan events. I'd like to continue attending diocesan events and really being one with the Church," Seyed-Ali said.

Fr. John Dillon said Seyed-Ali approached him about the Youth Minister position right after he had prayed to God for guidance. "I hope that Sarah will be able to foster the personal and spiritual growth of the young people of our parish in such a way that they will be able to confront the real challenges and sorrows of human life and develop their tales in service of their family, parish and neighborhood," he said.

## For More than 20 Years, Catholics at St. Francis Came on Board with the D-Group

n 1997, former St. Francis pastor Donald Worch approached parishioner Don Dean in the Rectory with a disconcerting statistic: Did he know that that the Council of Bishops says 50 percent of people who go through the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) aren't involved in church a year after they come into the church? Fr. Don invited Don and his wife, Sara, to a potluck dinner in which he wanted to get their input on the RCIA program.

"I went with him that night, not realizing I'd be involved with RCIA for the next 20 years," said Sara, in a recent interview.

More than two decades after they were first approached, Don and Sara Dean are stepping down from the ministry that brings people from all walks of life into the Catholic Church. Along with the longtime ministry coordinator, Terry Davis – who had already been at the helm of St. Francis' RCIA ministry nearly a decade before the Deans said yes – the Deans and Davis are retiring to make room for new blood, different ways to form the faithful and some much deserved time away.

In the 22 years since they've been involved with RCIA, the outreach, offering and work of the ministry have not changed much. After people were recruited, the RCIA Team – whose core consisted of Davis, the Deans, Deacon Jim Datovech and his wife, Patrice – began meeting with the candidates and catechumens in the Rite of Inquiry, a period in which participants could ask about the Catholic faith and discern whether joining the church was for them. In the Rite

## Haitian Students Earn Diplomas with 95 Percent Success Rate at Private School Financed by SFA Parishioners

wo years after St. Francis of Assisi Parish first made it possible for students in its sister parish in Haiti to complete their high school education, 70 young Haitians have now earned their diplomas, allowing them to imagine their own futures.

Over the past two years, the 95 percent success rate of Haitian students at the Bon Pasteur School having passed their final year of high school – called the 'Philo' year – and the

national exam at the end of that year is accomplishment enough. Yet, the nearly 20-year partnership to operate a school that educates Haitian children from the elementary to secondary levels is the true gift that St. Francis parishioners have given residents of Leon, Haiti, a rural, agricultural community that has about 20,000 residents in its outlying areas.

"There is no word to express gratitude," said Ketlard Boursiquot, a native of Haiti and St. Francis of Assisi parishioner since 1997. "Without St. Francis, the success of those kids would not happen."

The education system in Haiti is comprised of preschool, "Fundamental" Education, secondary education and higher education, all governed by Haiti's Ministry of National Education and Professional Training. Fundamental Education – which equates to U.S. elementary and middle school education – is required for children between six and 11 years of age and consists of three cycles of three years each, ending in the

ninth grade. Ninety-two percent of Haitian schools are privately owned and financed, including the Bon Pasteur School. According to statistics from the nonprofit organization HaitiScholarships, 60 percent of students will leave school before the sixth grade.

For those who complete their Fundamental Education, students must pass a national exam to earn a certificate of completion and advance to the secondary level. In the final two years of the secondary level, — the Rheto and Philo years — students complete their general education classes and choose a curriculum based on their own interests and objectives.

St. Francis began the Bon Pasteur School at its sister parish of Conversion of St. Paul's Parish in Leon in the early 2000's, said Haiti Ministry Coordinator Dan Cardile. After adding grades each year, St. Paul's Pastor Pere Jeanot asked St. Francis of Assisi Parish in 2016 if it could add the Philo year. In Leon, it would be the only Philo program,

because of its remote location an hour's motor-cycle ride from the nearest large city.

The first Philo year kicked off in the 2017-18 year, with 49 students. Of these, 45 completed the year and passed the national exam that allows them to apply for universities, go to some trade schools, or get jobs with more opportunity. In the 2018-19 year that ended last spring, all 25 students who sat for their national exam passed it, demonstrating their command of the French lan-

guage and exhibiting proficiency in subjects, such as French, English, literature, upper level mathematics and the sciences.

The Bon Pasteur School receives about \$22,000 annually, a combination of parishioners' direct contributions, fundraisers and some grant money. But the real investment comes in the opportunity that's being created, Boursiquot said.

"Having the kids finish high school, that's opening doors to them," Boursiquot said.

bout a year ago, inspired by 16-year old Greta Thunberg, young people around the world began an unprecedented movement by taking off school on Fridays to demand that their leaders take more serious actions against global warming. In May 2019, about 2 million kids took the street and urged adults, citizens, trade unions, faith-based community to join them on September 20, 2019 for the biggest climate mobilization ever in history.

Young people are angry that our leaders have done so little to slow

the deadly heating. It is disturbing to hear college students wonder whether they should have kids since they would be condemned to a doomed short future. Many argued it was morally wrong to make such family plans. Can we turn the tide around? The scientific answer is YES, WE CAN, BUT ONLY IF WE ACT URGENTLY AND ACT TOGETHER.

We have the technological means to do this. Reports published over the past two years have confirmed the trillions of benefits that would emerge if we took action to reduce greenhouse gases. A global commission report on adaptation demonstrated that about 2 trillion investments to strengthen our adaptive capacity would yield about seven trillion worth of benefit. We should not wait for more hurricanes, more fires, more droughts, more floods, and more species extinctions for us to take action.

We have the technological means to turn the tide. However, we need political will and we need to put equity and people at the center of our choice. While we are all threatened, the most vulnerable communities are the most exposed and are likely to be less resilient. The radical shifts and transformation must be accompanied by measures designed to facilitate a just transition of the society to a greener, cleaner and safer future.

The UN Climate Action Summit culminates on September 23 with events throughout the week, starting with the climate strike as an important springboard for action. Governments all over the world, with many other non-state actors, are expected to confirm their serious effort to ramp up climate actions and flow of investments to decarbonize the economy and to highlight initiatives that can help them cooperate better, act faster and at higher scale. Next year, 5 years after the Paris Agreement, will be the moment of truth, when national leaders come forward with stronger national climate plans, which they are expected to do so every five

Today, I would like to continue reflecting on the journey that awaits these priests and the parishes they will serve.

When you talk to people about what makes a parish special, the priests are almost always mentioned. You hear how much the pastor and parochial vicars are loved. Thriving parishes that feed and energize all who attend are usually led by a pastor and priests who care deeply about their people and the Lord.

Priests are no different than anybody else in that they all have different talents. Some are great organizers, others not so much. Some are prayerful with spirituality seemingly oozing out of their being, while others may not show it as clearly. Some are great preachers, and some are not as good. I used to say of one priest that he gave the most powerful sermons every day of his life. They weren't his words but his actions.

The key always seems to be that the priests in those thriving parishes are kind, loving and compassionate. They go over the top in their care and concern for others, particularly their parishioners, who are part of their family.

But then there's the reality priests do not stay forever. That's true of parishioners as well. Many of you in the next five years will move or find a different community in which to get involved, often because of job changes. The same is true for priests. Generally speaking, after three years as a parochial vicar or six years as a pastor, they are asked to move on to other service.

That separation can be painful for the parishioners, and it's painful for the priest as well because they have built strong relationships and established deep friendships. Those relationships are good for the parish and for the priest's own emotional and spiritual health.

If you happen to be in a parish with a new parochial vicar or pastor, please do all you can to make sure that your new priest is welcomed by you and the whole parish family. I'll give you a little tip: don't be afraid to introduce yourself multiple times in his first year. The number of people a priest meets as he gets settled can be overwhelming and way beyond most of our memories. Reminding them of your name helps them feel welcome. It is not an irritant but rather a blessing.

Pastors tend to stay longer in a parish. As people sometimes say, they are like the mayor of the village. The pastor guides and leads the entire community. Almost all the important decisions flow through him. He's involved in everything from everyday activities to crisis situations.

I love my new assignment at Catholic Charities, and one reason is that I still think of myself as a pastor, just not in a specific parish. Others have said I am now the pastor to the poor, an assignment I enthusiastically embrace. There are also many things I miss about not being in a parish. I think I most miss leading a community and

helping the whole community grow together. I particularly miss being a pastor during the holidays when our parishes are filled with such a wonderful spirit.

Our parochial vicars stay for what feels like a short period of time. Within a few years after ordination, they are often asked to leave their first assignment in a parish and take on new responsibilities, sometimes even as a pastor.

After I was ordained 46 years ago, I did not become a pastor for 14 years. I served as associate pastor at Little Flower for six years and then led the archdiocese's youth ministry before my first assignment as pastor in Mt. Calvary, which was followed by Our Lady of Mercy and Blessed Sacrament. It was more common then to be ordained for 13 or 14 years before you became a pastor. Now, it can happen just a few years after ordination.

I know times change, but I wish we could still give priests a little more time before asking them to lead a parish. It can take a while to get your feet grounded in the priesthood itself as well as what it means to serve a parish.

I write all of this to remind you to love your priests, watch out for them, support them, and help them when they ask. There is nothing like the relationships we form with our people, our families in Christ. We receive as much as we give because of the generosity and service of our parishioners like you.

A good priest serving a great community is hard to beat.

## New Altar and Sanctuary Dedicated at the Shrine of St. Jude

uxiliary Bishop Michael Fisher was welcomed to the Shrine of St. Jude on Sunday, Sept 22, 2019, to bless the new altar and sanctuary at the 10:30 a.m. Mass. The Knights of Columbus Honor Guard and the combined music ministries at St. Jude (Filipino Choir, Spanish Choir, and St. Jude Regional Catholic School Choir) also participated in the Mass and dedication.

A few items of note regarding the new altar and sanctuary:

- · New carved oak altar and ambo were acquired from the Belford Chapel in England through the generosity of a family in the parish. The altar has three basreliefs in front: the birth of Jesus, Jesus the Good Shepherd, and Jesus being taken down from the cross. The ambo bas-relief is about Jesus restoring sight to a blind person, which conveys the message that the word of God opens the eyes of the soul.
- The main cross was cleaned and The tabernacle was moved from

refinished, including the body of Jesus.

the side altar to the center, and a matching new altar of reservation was created. The Code of Canon Law prescribes that the tabernacle "should be placed in a part of the Church that is

prominent, conspicuous, beautifully decorated, and suitable for prayer" (938).

- The newly created baptistery is now on a platform that formerly held the altar of reservation for the tabernacle.
- For better collaboration, the organ was relocated to a position where the organist, the choir, and the people can see and communicate with each other much
- The huge organ speakers, which used to be located behind the sanctuary wall, were moved to the rear of the church, which will afford better sound throughout the church.
- The entire ceiling was painted, making the whole ceiling consistent and bright.
- Future plans include having two sets of statues—the Holy Family and Saints Peter and Paul-so as to recognize our connection to the Holy Family and catholicity and unity of our faith.

## Outdoor Mass Honors Emil Kapaun, **Army Captain and Chaplain**

With a glorious and sunny day as the backdrop, the student body of St. Jude Regional Catholic School (SJRCS) celebrated its weekly school Mass outdoors on Friday, Sept. 20, in honor of Fr. Emil Kapaun, Army captain and chaplain. Joined by school parents, parishioners, and honored guests from the military - both active duty and retired - the students served in the various ministries of the Mass.

In homage to Fr. Emil Kapaun, who served as an Army chaplain during the Korean War, Pastor of the Shrine of St. Jude Rev. Paul D. Lee, STD, celebrated the Mass wearing a gold chasuble in the style of the time period, loaned by an area priest. Covering the hood of the 1940s-era jeep as an altar cloth, in the same manner as Fr. Kapaun, was the Army blanket of the late Sgt. Otis A. Sangster, Sr., a Korean War veteran and father of St. Jude parishioner/former SJRCS parent Otis A. Sangster, Jr. Flying high on the school's flagpole was the American flag that had covered the casket of the senior Mr. Sangster. Concelebrating the Mass was

The Mass was preceded by the Pledge of Allegiance, led by the St. John's Catholic High School Color Guard, and a welcome by SJRCS student Sally Gitau, who also served as one of the cantors for the Mass. Students Isabella Grijalba and Lina Garcia were the lectors. and students Benjamin Lopez, Tim Sanders, Naomi Barish, and Santi Tellez-Leon were altar servers. The gifts were brought to the altar by students Ethan Mendes, Mary Breece, and Caleb Garcia. School parent Jeffrey Prather assisted with sound to make the outdoor Mass audible to the congregation.

Fr. Lee, whose brother was only 11 years old on June 25, 1950, when the Korean War broke out,

gave an eloquent and moving homily on the short life of Fr. Kapaun, a priest from the Diocese of Wichita, Kansas. Known as the "shepherd in combat boots" and the "soldier who never fired a gun," Fr. Kapaun was named a Servant of God in 1993, and he was posthumously awarded the Medal of Honor in 2013. Noting the coincidence that the Mass was taking place on the feast day of Saints Andrew Kim Taegon, (Korea's first priest and pastor), the lay apostle Paul Chong Hasang, and Companions, Fr. Lee said, "Today is the celebration of a hero, a hero in many ways, the celebration of his valor, his faith, and his Christian charity." Painting a vivid picture of the striking resemblance to Christ the King on the Cross, Fr. Lee detailed Fr. Kapaun's 40-mile

of the Catechumenate, participants make a commitment to prepare for the Sacraments of Initiation. During Lent, they enter the period of Purification and Enlightenment, after which many of them enter the Catholic Church during the Easter Vigil. The year after the newly initiated join the Church is known as the period of Mystogogy, during which they learn how to engage with their Catholic faith.

Don Dean, who served as a senior catechist for much of his

service, said his biggest challenge in helping form the candidates and catechumens was helping them reconcile questions of the heart and the mind. Once the RCIA Team answered the questions in people's heads, they then had to respond to the inquiries in their heart.




