Living the Gospel through the Two Feet of Love in Action

he inspiration for this article came while I was at a meeting of the Montgomery County Council of the St. Vincent de Paul Society (SVDP). We hold these meetings quarterly and they are attended by the presidents of each of the St. Vincent de Paul conferences in Montgomery County.

What brought to mind the Justice and Advocacy Council (J&A) while I was at the St. Vincent de Paul meeting was largely that two of us there were members of both SVDP and the J&A Council. Also at the meeting in the basement of St. Martin Church in Gaithersburg was Ann Barbagallo, co-chair of the J&A Council.

Two feet of love in action

The J&A Council and the SVDP

Society represent the "two feet" of the Church's social ministry. The two feet are "social justice" (the main focus of the J&A Council) and "charitable works" (the main focus of SVDP). People are often involved in both charitable activities and social justice.

The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) is a tireless and creative promoter of "The Two Feet of Love in Action." You will find a wealth of information on their website by searching "USCCB two feet." In the words of the USCCB: "This foundational tool describes two distinct, but complimentary, ways we can put the Gospel in action in response to God's love." (Editor: URL if you want it: http://www.usccb. org/beliefs-and-teachings/what-webelieve/catholic-social-teaching/

two-feet-of-love-in-action.cfm).

Social Justice. This is the primary focus of the J&A Council. The USCCB states: "We step with this foot when we work to address the root causes of problems facing our communities by advocating for just public policies and helping to change the social structures that contribute to suffering and injustice at home and around the world."

The J&A Council does this as we attend meetings called by County Executive Ike Leggett to discuss the county budget. The same is the case when we meet with County Council members and attend County Council sessions to discuss issues such as affordable housing and improved public transportation.

Charitable Works. This is the main work of the SVDP Society.

he Academy of the Holy Cross community gathered for its opening Mass celebration on Wednesday, August 30. In celebration of the Academy's 150th year, six priests joined the assembly for the liturgy: Msgr. John Enzler (principal celebrant), Msgr. Ray East, Msgr. Maury O'Connell, Father Stephen Planning, SJ, Father Martino Choi, and Father Mbonyumugenzi Deogratias. Four Sisters of the Holy Cross also attended the Mass: Sister John Anthony, Sister Vivian, Sister Katherine Kase, and Sister Sharon Mihm '63.

All in attendance received a special 150th pin during the Mass and were encouraged to wear it throughout the year. Following the Mass, Msgr. Enzler led a blessing and dedication ceremony of the new Heritage Hall display space. As he led the group through the hall others in the group were offered the chance to bless the display with holy water. At lunchtime following the celebration students were treated to cupcakes by the administration.

The Heritage Hall display is the culmination of year-long planning. Assisting with the preparation and providing a vision for the display, Gordon Anson, father of an alumna and the Deputy Chief of Design at the National Gallery of Art, oversaw every step of the project and spent countless hours working to bring the display to life. The Academy combed through its archives for memorabilia, asked alumnae to send their treasures, and worked with the archives at the Mother House of the Sisters of the Holy Cross in South Bend, Indiana.

The display is arranged along the main school entrance and hallway.

Included are cases dedicated to the history and accomplishments of the Sisters of the Holy Cross, student life at the Academy, and mementos through the decades. Along the main school hallway, there are

nine 5-foot panels depicting the Academy's history and highlighting four areas of focus: Academics, Spirituality, Arts, and Athletics.





Who knew that just a week after the dedication that Hurricane Harvey would hit east Texas? I'm happy to say that this van, which we at Catholic Charities DC would have used the first weeks of September and October, has been busy doing the work it was built for - providing much-needed aid following the devastation from the recent hurricanes. There is a disaster-relief expert and whole team of people with the van making sure that Catholic Charities USA provides the services that we've become known for in times of real struggle.

We were there after Katrina. We were there for Sandy. Now we're in Texas, Florida and elsewhere, working on your behalf to help our brothers and sisters in need. Thank you to all who have generously supported the effort through special collections and donations. I assure you that there are many grateful people benefitting from your support.

We don't know when the van will finish its hurricane relief mission, but when it does and we are able to use it one week each month, we look forward to expanding our outreach here in our own area. The real beauty of this van is that it will allow us to go meet those in need, overcoming the hardship of their having to come to us. You may not be aware of this, but there are places right here in our community where those without homes live in the woods. Others, of course, live on the streets or in any other place they can find. This van will help us serve them better.

I share this with you now because you may hear more about these efforts in the coming months as we ask for your help outfitting the van. We may be coming to your parish for assistance as we collect basic items like water bottles, toothpaste and toothbrushes, razors, shampoo, soap and laundry detergent, and more. In colder weather, we hope to provide blankets, gloves, hats and coats. In about six months, we expect to have a trailer added to the van that will have both showers and laundry facilities, allowing people to get themselves and their clothing clean right near where they live.

Jesus calls us to be his witnesses to the ends of the earth, and Pope Francis has urged us to go out and meet people where they are. This van will enable us to do just that, bringing much-needed items and Jesus' love to more people in our own community. I look forward to telling you more about the van and the good it will help us all do when it returns, and I know you will respond generously and lovingly to our brothers and sisters in need.

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

The Science of Teaching

hree Woods teachers had the opportunity to attend The Science of Teaching and School Leadership Academy at St. Andrew's Episcopal School this summer where they learned about the latest and most cutting-edge mind, brain, and education research. The Woods has partnered with St. Andrew's and their Center for Transformative Teaching & Learning (CTTL) to send a few teachers to this conference every year for the next three years. Fifth-grade teacher Mrs. Tanzi, Director of Extended Care Mrs. Papazian, and Sixth-grade teacher Ms. Firstenberg were lucky enough to be the first three teachers to attend!

The Woods Academy

The very first activity of the week was a sheep's brain dissection. The organizers wanted the attendees to get outside their comfort zones and break the ice as they learned about the fundamental structures of the brain. Next, they spent time debunking some of the "neuromyths" out there and learning about 15 power strategies for teachers and students that the researchers at the CTTL have developed. (Has anyone ever told you that we only use 10% of our brains? That's FALSE! Even when we "aren't doing anything," neurons are firing all over the brain!)

After getting a broad overview of

At the end of the week, they learned more about how faculty members at St. Andrew's are conducting their own research in their classrooms. They turned the table

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A Heartfelt Congratulations for an Incredible Achievement

ohn Schiller, Ph.D., and his colleague Doug Lowy, M.D., of the National Cancer Institute are the 2017 recipients of one of the Lasker Awards, a group of medical prizes often call the "American Nobels." Dr. Schiller, the father of two Holy Cross School alumni, and Dr. Lowy received the Lasker-DeBakey Clinical Medical Research Award for their foundational research on animal and human papillomaviruses - specifically HPV-16 type, a form of the virus that can cause more than a half-dozen types of cancer. Their research ultimately led them to conduct, in collaboration with scientists at Johns Hopkins University, the first clinical trial of the HPV-16 vaccine in humans. The clinical trial gave pharmaceutical

companies the evidence needed to develop a vaccine which is now administered around the world.

On its website, The Lasker Foundation notes that Drs. Schiller and Lowy "took a bold but calculated approach toward a major public-health problem whose solution required them to vault formidable hurdles. They devised a blueprint for several safe and effective vaccines that promise to slash the incidence of cervical cancer and mortal-

ity, the fourth most common cancer among women worldwide, as well as other malignancies and disorders that arise from human papillomaviruses."

The well-deserved accolades have not changed Dr. Schiller's humble and self-effacing personality that the Holy Cross family knows. In an interview which appeared in Scientific American magazine on September 6, he said, "To this day, we still do basic

mental truth, we can better discern what is worthy of our time and what is of truly lasting value."

Encouraging an attitude of healthy skepticism should include seeking out many sources of news, not simply that with which we agree, Mr. Lamb told students.

Mr. Lamb offered students some "life wisdom" as well:

- Appearance matters when you meet people in business - look your best and always shine your shoes!
- Listen, listen, listen.

- · You only have one chance to make a first impression....that first impression can influence someone's view of you for a lifetime.
- reward other than the fact that you had an opportunity to do a good thing.
- Monitor what society values and create your own value system. "Often times," Mr. Lamb said, "our values as a country appear seriously 'out of whack.' Why should a prominent talk show host, athlete, or actor make \$25 million a year while the

average teacher makes just \$36,000?"

Mr. Lamb founded C-SPAN in 1977 as the political network of record allowing Be humble - if you do viewers to observe sessions good things, expect no of Congress, presidential press conferences, and public policy events unedited and without commentary.

Food Pantry on Your Grocery List

hen we leave church we are sent out to "Serve the Lord and one another." Full of the spiritual strength of the Eucharist and this commission, we are handed a bulletin which not only tells us of the collection count and prayer intentions of the week but also directs us to needs in the community. On our way home,

to the Montgomery County Food Bank, 85,000 people are hungry in our neighborhood and 32,000 of those are children. That's one child of every four sitting at a school desk not having enough to eat day after day. Unemployment and poverty play a large factor but those above the poverty line can suffer as well. Almost half of

some of us stop at the local Giant to pick up items forgotten during the weekly shopping trip and there in the midst of the aisles and bins of food around us is an easy opportunity to serve our neighbor.

Like most parishes, Resurrection has a food pantry. By buying a few items for the pantry when shopping, the parishioners at Resurrection serve others nearby, impacting the lives of those lacking one of our basic needs, food. This is a shocking fact in a county that ranks #11 on most lists of wealthiest counties in the United States. According

these people fail to qualify for the government safety nets of WIC (a nutritional program that helps pregnant women, new mothers, and children under five years of age), SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program formerly known as Food Stamps), and free school meals.

At Resurrection, a person only needs to have an identification card to receive assistance. They come to the church office and their names and addresses are taken down for statistics. Come the winter holidays, they will be offered special bags to celebrate traditional Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners. The number of adults and children in the household are recorded. No one is turned away but a bag of food twice a month is the general rule. It's a very simple exchange in a world where the complexities of forms and filing often complicate and thwart assistance to basic needs. They are directed to other means of help offered by the county and other non-profit program such as the free Community Supper given at Liberty Grove United Methodist Church right down the road. There is an ebb and flow in the number of visitors in need but there is always food to share.

Resurrection relies on the donations of parishioners and those who volunteer to sort and pack the bags. Ray and Cathy Stevens volunteer weekly to shelve donated food staples such as peanut butter and jelly, macaroni and cheese, and canned fruit or applesauce. Parishioners drop items off after Masses or during the week. The Stevens pack grocery bags full of these food gifts preparing them a week in advance. The volunteers in the office like Mary Ellen Howarth and Sally DeSavage often help as needed and a 93-year-old parishioner crochets dish towels to be placed in each bag as a gift.

Sometimes grocery shopping can be a chore. But if we can be of

service to others by adding a few items to the cart, we will witness the Holy Spirit at work in our lives and in our com-OPT



African countries like Côte d'Ivoire or parts of Cameroon. She says about 20 people have joined the French Choir, which includes both adults and teenagers.

The main difference between this choir and the regular adult choir is that rehearsals are conducted entirely in French. "This is a French singing choir. We speak French through the whole rehearsal. I think it's something they like," says Kanter-St. Hubert. She says speaking only in French also helps choir members who took French in high school or college, or for anyone interested in learning the language.

The Music Director often hears parishioners speaking French to each other or talking to her in French, and she believes French is more common at Resurrection than in other parishes, where Spanish is spoken. "I think that's the second language in this parish. It is not Spanish, it is French."

Kanter St-Hubert says most members of the new French Choir have not sung with an organized group before but they are very enthusiastic. According to the Music Director, they use technology like their smart phones to record the music and practice with it once they leave rehearsal. "That's one thing that's cool: a number of them take their phones and record their parts. More so than our regular adult choir.'

Not all of the new French Choir know how to read music and Kanter-St. Hubert says they are very excited when they learn what the notes mean, especially one woman in the choir. "... I was showing her how the notes go up and down and it's like this revelation... She says other members of the new French choir go over their music even before they get to rehearsal, including one man who always arrives early and practices in his car. "...It's pretty neat."

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

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

The Finance Committee prepared a letter to all parishioners regarding the parish's finances for FY16-17 and budget for FY17-18, which included an appeal for increased weekly contributions. The letter will be included in the parish bulletin by mid-October. The Committee is also considering an open forum to answer any questions regarding the parish's finances after the 10:30am Mass on October 29, 2017 (NOTE: that date is still tentative). As the Archdiocese now requires the parish priest to serve as Chair of the Finance Committee and a lay person serves as Vice-Chair, Fr. Carter serves as Chair with Michael Furey as its Vice-Chair. The additional members are: David Belli, Phoebe Dixon, and John Willging. They consider themselves to be "a congenial group that likes numbers"! OPT



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Baltimore County Department of Aging Hosts Physician-Assisted Suicide Panel

or the last three years, the Maryland Catholic Conference has opposed the End of Life Options Act, which would have legalized physician-assisted suicide (PAS). The Conference is part of the Maryland Against Physician Assisted Suicide coalition, a diverse group of healthcare professionals, disability rights advocates, mental health professionals, advocates for seniors, and members of faith communities in opposition to the legisla-

The Baltimore County Department of Aging hosted a two-hour panel discussion on PAS Tuesday, Sept. 26 at the Senior Box Office in Parkville. The panel included several of the issue's most well-versed local oppo-

nents who have worked to defeat the bill that has been considered by the Maryland General Assembly, including Msgr. David Fulton from St. Mary's Seminary in Baltimore and Joseph Marine, M.D., a cardiologist at Johns Hopkins Hospital and a parishioner at the Catholic Community of St. Francis Xavier in Hunt Valley.

"PAS is discriminatory," Marine said. "It creates a new class of human beings who are denied protection of the law afforded to others, including people with severe illness, disabilities, advanced age who are told your life is less valuable and less worthy of the protection of the law."

Elder care attorney Elena Boisvert also talked about the bill's dangerous provisions and why is it wrong for Maryland citizens.

"Vulnerable seniors are very susceptible to being influenced," said Boisvert. "This legislation does not have safeguards to protect vulnerable seniors. What they do is put the ultimate tool in the hands of the people that would financially exploit their beloved parent."

The proponents of PAS are wellfunded, out-of-state activists looking to push their national agenda here in Maryland. For more information on the work the coalition is doing to fight this legislation, please visit https://stopassistedsuicidemd.org.

Maryland State Senators Bob Cassilly and Jim Brochin, who sit on the Judicial Proceedings Committee where the Senate bill has been assigned each year, agreed that the legislation is flawed.

"This is scary legislation. Normally in a medical procedure we hold doctors accountable. This bill avoids transparency," said State Senator Bob Cassilly, from District 34 in Harford County. "You can't fix the bill. It puts people in a conflict and that's scary. There are safeguards from the MVA when you get a parking ticket and when people are in jail. We go through incredible procedural safeguards to ensure the right thing is done, except in this bill." Cassilly sits on the Judicial Proceedings Committee where the Senate bill has been assigned.

Cost of lifetime Senior Pass to National Parks increases to \$80

On August 28, 2017, the price of the America the Beautiful The National Parks and Federal Recreational Lands Senior Pass increased for the first time since 1994 - from \$10 to \$80 – as result of the Centennial Legislation 114-289 passed by the US Congress on December 16, 2016. The additional revenue will be used to enhance the visitor experience in parks.

The legislation also establishes an annual Senior Pass for \$20. That pass is valid for

one year from the date of issuance. Four annual Senior Passes purchased in prior years can be traded in for a lifetime pass. Additionally, access to the majority of National Park Service sites remains freeonly 118 of 417 National Park Service sites have an entrance fee.

US citizens or permanent residents 62 years or older are eligible for the Senior Pass. The passes cover entrance and standard amenity (day-use) recreation fees and



provide discounts on some expanded amenity recreation fees. The Senior Passes admit pass owner/s and passengers in a noncommercial vehicle at per-vehicle fee areas and pass owner plus three adults, not to exceed four adults, where perperson fees are charged. (Children under 16 are always admitted free.)

Senior Passes can be purchased at any federal recreation site, including national parks, that charges an entrance or standard amenity (dayuse) fee. Proof of age and residency is required. See the complete list of sites where the pass is available

Passes can also be purchased online or through the mail from USGS; an additional \$10 processing fee will be added to the price. Visit the USGS store to buy the pass online or find instructions for purchasing by mail: https://store. usgs.gov/senior-pass.

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Caregiving Around the Clock

The theme for National Family Caregivers Month November 2017 is "Caregiving Around the Clock"

Caregiving can be a 24-hours a day/7-days a week job. Caring for a senior with Alzheimer's or a child with special needs can be non-stop. Providing care around the clock can crowd out other important areas of life. And you never know when you will need to rush to the hospital or leave work at the drop of a hat. What challenges do family caregivers face, and how do they manage them day and night?



Morning: Getting off to work. The average family caregiver is a working mother of school-aged children. Mornings become a tricky balancing act of getting the kids ready for school, making sure your loved one has what they need for the day before getting yourself out the door for work.



All Day Long: Managing medications. Up to 70% of the time, the family caregiver – not the patient –manages the medications. The more serious the condition, the more likely it is that the family caregiver manages the medications for the patient. This means ensuring your loved one is taking their medication correctly and maintaining an up-to-date **medication list**.



During the Workday: Juggling caregiving and work. Six out of 10 family caregivers work full- or part-time in addition to juggling their caregiving responsibilities at home. And most of them say they have to cut back on working hours, take a leave of absence, or quit their job entirely.



Evening: Family time and meal time. Ensuring that you get proper nutrition will help you maintain strength, energy, stamina, and a positive attitude. Nutrition is as important for you as the caregiver as it for your loved one. Caregiving affects the whole family.



Late at Night: Taking time for yourself. Late at night might be the only time you get a few minutes for yourself. Make sure you take time to rest and recharge. The chance to take a breather and re-energize is vital in order for you to be as good a caregiver tomorrow as you were today.



The Middle of the Night: Emergency room visits. Have you ever had to take your loved one to the emergency room in the middle of the night? Be prepared ahead of time with what you need to know and what you need to have with you.

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eople 65 years and older are at greater risk of serious complications from the flu compared with young, healthy adults because human immune defenses become weaker with age. While flu seasons can vary in severity, during most seasons, people 65 years and older bear the greatest burden of severe flu disease. In recent years, for example, it's estimated that between 71 percent and 85 percent of seasonal flu-related deaths have occurred in people 65 years and older and between 54 percent and 70 percent of seasonal flu-related hospitalizations have occurred among people in that age group. So, influenza is often quite serious for people 65 and older.

Get Your Flu Shot!

The best way to prevent the flu is with a flu shot. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends that everyone 6 months of age and older get a seasonal flu vaccine each year by the end of October if possible. However, vaccination should continue throughout flu season, even in January or later. Vaccination is especially important for people 65 years and older because they are at high risk for complications from flu. Flu vaccines are often updated each season to keep up with changing viruses and also immunity wanes over a year so annual vaccination is needed to ensure the best possible protection against influenza. A flu vaccine protects against the flu viruses that research indicates will be most common during the upcoming season.

Immunity from vaccination sets in about two weeks after inoculation. People 65 years and older can get any injectable vaccine (flu shot) that is approved for use in that age group. This includes cell-based, recombinant and flu shots made using traditional eggbased manufacturing processes. There are two vaccines designed specifically for people 65 and older:

The "high dose vaccine" is designed specifically for people 65 and older and contains 4 times the amount of antigen as the regular flu shot. It is associated with a stronger immune response following vaccination (higher antibody production). Results from a clinical trial of more than 30,000 participants showed that adults 65 years and older who received the high dose vaccine had 24% fewer influenza infections as compared to those who received the standard dose flu vaccine. The high dose vaccine has been approved for use in the United States since 2009.

The high dose and adjuvanted flu vaccines may result in more of the mild side effects that can occur with standard-dose seasonal shots. Mild side effects can include pain, redness or swelling at the

injection site, headache, muscle ache,

Note: People 65 years of age and older should not get the nasal spray flu vaccine, the intradermal flu shot, or jet injector flu vaccine.

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
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Tilma of Our Lady of Guadalupe Visits St. Rose

nce a month, St. Rose parents and children in grades K-5 are invited to the Woodlands Room, as part of the Family Faith Formation religious education curriculum.

At St. Rose, Family Faith Formation is a new model of religious education that recognizes parents as the primary educator in faith for their children. By providing lesson plans and guidance, Family Faith Formation equips parents to live and teach faith to their children. Family Faith Formation sessions are held one Sunday a month, 4 - 6 p.m.

n September 8, Mother Seton Parish welcomed Mr. Matthew Loboda who shared his amazing story of a miracle brought by faith. His story began on Dec. 28, in Phoenix, Arizona, when, in the blink of an eye, his 19-month-old daughter Joy, went missing from a family gathering. Matt Loboda, raced to the koi pond outside, where he found nothing. Then prompted by the Holy Spirit, he ran to the fenced pool. There, he saw Joy floating on the top of the water. He dove in, got her out of the water and immediately began CPR.

He said "As I breathed into Joy I prayed that my breath would be the breath of God into her. In between breaths I begged for the Ruha (Hebrew word for breath or life) of God to enter her. Her lips were blue and her beautiful blue eyes were wide open. Matt continued, I could see her pupils shrinking at an alarming rate. Then I started to pray in between breathes in the words of Jesus, Talitha Koum, which means 'Little girl, I say to you, arise'. I knew we needed a miracle because I could actually feel her slipping away."

Earlier this year, we sent funds to buy new livestock to replace the animals killed by the storm. Your donations also helped rebuild walls and foundations in the schools and the rectory of our sister parish, St. Pierre in Baradères, Haiti. Keep in mind -- several dozen people sheltered on the second floor of the rectory during Matthew because the water rose to the ceiling on the first floor. This structure is vital to the community! Because of your solidarity and generosity, our sister parish continues to provide children a firm educational foundation. Students benefit from nutritional lunches, trained teachers, and the necessary educational tools.

Your prayers and donations have yielded incredible progress in Baradères! Fr. Jean Philippe was ecstatic to inform us that 100% of our philo class students passed the national exam again this year! Also, they have been very busy rebuilding the walls outside the school and rectory, distributing goats to families, and completing other necessary repairs.

One of the great outcomes of our partnership with St. Pierre in Baradères, Haiti, is that our sister parish is now producing priests in the church. Fr. Charlotin Jhonson was ordained a priest in December 2016, and Chandeleur Belanston was ordained a deacon in May 2017. Both are graduates from the schools you fund in Baradères! paramedics arrived quickly but were not hopeful. The doctor at the ER, too, was not hopeful, but he informed Matt and his wife, Kristin, that Joy had a heartbeat. Doctors later estimated that she had gone up to 30 minutes without air.

Immediately, the Lobodas shared their story on social media, begging their loved ones to #PrayforJoy. Soon, their prayers were joined by those of thousands of people from around the world as they, together, prayed for a miracle.

Two weeks later, Joy was active and alert, eating and playing, smiling and laughing. She was moved out of intensive care and into rehab. A few days after that, Joy was visited by the first responder team of the Phoenix Fire Department

who had been at the scene of the accident. And a miracle, seemingly, is what they got. After being put in a medically induced coma, being put on a ventilator and undergoing surgery to remove two blood clots, Baby Joy not only has survived but she seems truly to have come back to life without signs of any permanent brain damage or effects. Six days after the accident, Joy was breathing on her own. Her eyes were open, and she was alert. In the midst of it all was continuous prayer.

In their darkest moments and suffering, the Lobodas are profound witnesses of faith and trust in God. Not only has Joy been healed, but Matt said that he has heard from many people who have had their own faith reignited by the miraculous recovery of little Joy. As the Lobodas have been ever quick to say: to God be the glory.

Joy, Awe at Seeing Pope Francis

wo years after Pope Francis thrilled area Catholics by celebrating his first Mass in the United States at Catholic University in Washington DC, parishioners from St. Francis of Assisi Church who attended still recall the joy and pride they felt at seeing the pontiff in person and believe his message of love and inclusion have filtered down in positive ways to local parishes.

As they left the grounds of the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception on September 23, 2015, many parishioners went home brimming with emotion. For many, witnessing Pope Francis celebrate the Canonization Mass of Blessed Junipero Serra gave them a personal experience with an outsized man who counseled his flock to proclaim the Word and protect the world – both, the disenfranchised and the environment

Ralph Chite, a St. Francis parishioner since 2008, said he wanted to attend the Mass since he first heard the Holy Father would be visiting the United States.

"I admire him so much – the way he preaches the Gospel in such a loving, non-judgmental way," Chite said in 2015. "He challenges us to treat everyone with dignity and respect – the way you would want to be treated."

Like many of the estimated 26,000 pilgrims who attended the Canonization Mass, the day started early for many St. Francis ticketholders. Several people, such as Fr. John Dillon, Deacon Jim and Patrice Datovech, Parish Secretary Donna Zezzo and parishioners Robin Werner and Perla Loh, were among those who took buses from St. Patrick's Catholic Church in Rockville. Once they arrived on the grounds, most St. Francis parishioners sat far from the National Shrine's east portico where Pope Francis celebrated the Mass. But several glimpsed the pontiff up close when he wound his way through the crowds on his popemobile, just before getting vested for the Mass.

Patrice Datovech described a

feeling of awe. "I thought, 'This man is connected to St. Peter," she said, referring to the Church's first pope. "Just to be there and to be that close to him, never in my wildest dreams did I think I would see him."

Fr. Dillon concelebrated the Mass along with 900 of his fellow priests, calling the event "a great experience." He attributed the pope's universal appeal to his ability to engender hope in people.

"People are looking for that in their lives," Fr. Dillon said in 2015. "He's trying to be a part of evangelizing the Gospel – it infuses such a great sense of hope."

The Mass proceeded, with its familiar rites and rituals, in Spanish and was accompanied by five choirs. Meghan Jones, a longtime altar server, usher, lector and FRED core team member at St. Francis, read the Second Reading from the Letter to the Philippians 4:4-9. The passage exhorts its readers to rejoice because "the Lord is near."

Jones, a 28-year-old woman with Down's syndrome, said she was honored to be chosen to read. "I felt

like I belonged, not because I had a disability, but because I was part of something," Jones said in 2015.

The pontiff's Homily, which invoked those listening to move forward in living the Gospel, left an imprint on the St. Francis pilgrims, who felt the pontiff's message will have a positive effect on parish life and ministries.

Chite, who retired earlier this

year, said the pope's visit challenged him to assess what his focus should be during the next phase of his life. "Giving back is what I want to do," he said. "It's the greatest challenge that [Pope Francis] has given us. I'm very grateful that I belong to a parish that takes to heart the Pope's Gospel message of love, service and the welcoming of strangers."

New Small Groups Make St. Francis Church a Smaller Faith Community

hen St. Francis parishioner Alice Welanetz helped care for her stepfather through heart surgery this year in South Carolina, she began attending St. Michael's Catholic Church in Murrells Inlet. The convert to Catholicism was struck by the number of older and younger people she saw at Masses. And she was surprised by the breadth of activities offered at the church, including a family game night and bi-monthly restaurant meet-ups for young adults.

"I told [husband] Miguel, 'I want this church at home,'" Welanetz said.

Her interest in helping make St. Francis of Assisi Church a more intimate community dovetailed with a goal of Fr. John Dillion's to support his parish's 1,500 registered families to get to know one another in small groups. This fall, St. Francis of Assisi Parish is encouraging parishioners to sign up for existing or new Small Groups, with the hope that people who only see each other at Sunday Mass will

explore their faith by organizing around a common interest – be it, books, the Bible, film or fettucine – once a week in people's homes.

The 32 people who have signed up for new Small Groups will begin meeting the second week of October. The Small Groups include a Sunday Mass Preparation group, where participants will discuss the upcoming Sunday's readings; a Pivotal Players group, which will discuss Bishop Robert Barron's Pivotal Players Series, an in-depth look on film at some of the church's most influential leaders; Psalmody, a group which will pray through ensemble singing and instrument playing; and Catholic Perspectives on the Vietnam War, which will base discussions on director Ken Burns' 10-part documentary series on the Vietnam War and its impact

on Catholic social teachings.

The new Small Groups are offered alongside existing discussion groups based on books, Scripture, and other spiritual writings. But Welanetz, the Small Groups coordinator, is hoping Small Groups will convene around just about any subject, since discussions will nearly always gravitate toward one's faith. She and Fr. Dillon also hope they will encourage members to develop friendships that will lead to people leaning on and supporting one another.

"There's plenty of people who are warm, caring, and friendly [at St. Francis] and don't feel like anyone cares about them," Welatnetz said. "If you're not connected to anyone, then you feel like you're not part of anything. And I think that's the only way we'll grow."

Helping Youth Form into Disciples of Christ

ased on an archdiocesan curriculum titled, "Forming Disciples for the New Evangelization," the St. Francis Religious Education Program for Pre-K, elementary and middle-school aged students successfully launched on Sunday, Sept. 17, with a robust work plan supplemented by art projects, retreat opportunities and seasonal religious celebrations.

Even though the 264 students enrolled in Pre-K through eighth grade is slightly down from this time last year, Director of Religious Education Susan Anderson feels confident that her team will receive additional registrations as the year progresses.

The program's goal, she said, remains to lead people to be one with Christ so they may follow him completely. In faith formation, this is done by supporting the parents, who are their children's primary models for the Christian way of life.

In preparing her catechists for the start of the program year, Anderson said she invited St. Francis Parochial Vicar Fr. Jack Berard to present at a breakfast for catechisms on Sept. 9. Fr. Jack — who serves as the church's youth minister for high school students and young adults minister — spoke on the topic of faith and imagination.

"Through his presentation, we considered the ways in which imagination serves not only the

This year's class for children with special needs currently has five children enrolled.

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Fallen Korean War Army Chaplain Fr. Emil Kapaun Honored

n Friday, Sept. 22, St. Jude parishioners as well as St. Jude Regional Catholic School (SJRCS) students, teachers, and faculty/staff attended a Mass to honor Fr. Emil Kapaun, a Catholic priest from Kansas who served in the U.S. Army Chaplain Corps during the Korean War. Fr. Kapaun was captured and taken prisoner on Nov. 1, 1950, while rescuing wounded soldiers and giving Last Rites to the dying. He died of his wounds and poor treatment on May 23, 1951. In his last moments before succumbing, Fr. Kapaun reached out his weakened arms and blessed his guards, asking God's forgiveness for them.

The Mass was celebrated outside on the parish's main parking lot, which serves as the school's main

playground on school days. St. Jude pastor, Rev. Paul D. Lee, S.T.D., celebrated the Mass on the hood of an Army jeep from the Korean War supplied by Mr. Tim Jones. Concelebrating the Mass was Father Robert Kosty, Senior Priest at St.

After opening remarks by SJRCS Principal Glenn Benjamin, the St. John's College High School Color Guard led the congregation in the Pledge of Allegiance. SJRCS students served in the various ministries of the Mass, prepared and guided by SJRCS religion teacher Mrs. Jeanne Donatelli. Music for the



He has provided over fifty Spiritual Resiliency events to support the Staff in the ICU and

Emergency Room wards during his four years as a recall.

Fr. O'Grady is a recipient of the Army Commendation medal for exemplary ministry after the 9/11 attack on the Pentagon, and the Legion of Merit on the occasion of his initial retirement in October 2013.

Ordained in 1969 at the Cathedral of the Assumption in Thurles, Ireland, Father O'Grady came in 1978 to the Diocese of Paterson, New Jersey, where he served two parishes. He joined the U.S. Army Reserve in 1987 and came on active duty in the U.S. Army in 1994.

When asked about his visiting priesthood at St. Mary's, Barnesville, Father O'Grady said he is grateful to have the good experience of parish ministry once again. "It's a different flavor than counseling young soldiers who are trying to regain their health; and their families as well, who bear the weight of the problem." About St. Mary's, he says he "appreciates the warm community, good sense of cooperation among volunteers, good relations with the church, and a lot very deep faith."

The USCCB says: "We step with the Charitable Works foot when we work to aid or assist others both locally and globally to meet their immediate, short-term needs."

In the past month at St. Francis SVDP alone, we helped two people facing eviction and a woman who had no food for her family. What we do is multiplied by the other SVDP Councils in the county and by Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of Washington (thank God for them!) and several independent charitable societies (and them too!).

Both. Together.

Generally, social justice and charitable works travel together by the two feet of love in action. It is hard to do one without the other. While Catholics generally are comfortable with doing charitable works, we are often less comfortable with social justice. That is the reason the J&A Councils were established here in

Montgomery County and in other places in the Archdiocese around 2005. There was a great need to advocate for justice so that Jesus' call to the Church could more faithfully be fulfilled. You can spend a lot of time applying a band aid when a wound needs deeper healing.

Consider attending a J&A Council meeting. You just missed the September meeting. Our next one is Wednesday, December 6 at 7:30 p.m. at Holy Redeemer, Kensington. For more information, call Ann Barbagallo at 301-482-1022.

A word about the St. Vincent de Paul Society

Only five of the 29 Catholic parishes in Montgomery County have SVDP conferences: St. John Neumann (Montgomery Village), St. Martin (Gaithersburg), St. Raphael (Rockville), St Francis of Assisi (Derwood) and Mother Seton (Germantown). A sixth conference is being established at St. Paul (Damascus).

Some parishes handle charitable

outreach through other means, such as a parish-based social ministry. Other parishes, unfortunately, are not organized for charitable outreach and cannot provide help (or only very limited help) to those who come to them in need.

St. Francis of Assisi parish organized a SVDP conference about two years ago. Our pastor, Fr. John Dillon, is fully committed to the Society, which makes it possible for the parish to respond more faithfully to those who come to us for help. At the same time, the SVDP Society greatly lightens his work and worry load as the Society is the first responder when people need help.

calls us to put our needs and status beneath the needs of those we serve. I am reminded of those who serve Victory Housing's elderly residents at St Bartholomew's, Our Lady of Mercy and St Raphael's assisted living homes. Regardless of their station in life, they humbly do whatever needs doing including the basics of driving, feeding and bathing the frail elderly.

Then there is the sincere smile on Sister Margaret's face. Offering service with **joy** is a double measure of Christian service adding an elevating dose of comfort to the good deed provided. The huge grin on the faces of Potomac Community Resources and Upper County Community Resources volunteers and staff as they dance and sing with their physically or intellectually challenged participants shows the great joy in their hearts.

Christian service requires personal sacrifice. Sister Margret Ann's comfort zone includes chalk, computers and the classroom, surely not a storm ravaged road and chainsaw. Sacrificing our comfort to serve others is a characteristic of Christian service. The volunteers of the Catholic Charities Welcome Home program have likely never set foot in prison before joining the pre-release mentoring program. They stretch the boundaries of their comfort and love when they pass through the locking doors of local

jails to tutor and counsel offenders who are transitioning back into community life.

Sister Margret is a visually impaired, elderly woman, living an unconventional lifestyle and strangely attired for the work she is doing in the photo. Some might question her ability to serve with a chainsaw. Christian service is **inclusive.** The parishioners of St Paul's in Damascus who travel to serve in Honduras and those from other parishes who serve in Haiti are men and women of all ages, skills, and backgrounds. Each are welcomed on the service trips and contribute their unique talents.

If you have seen someone using a chainsaw, you know it's hard work. Christian service often requires extraordinary effort. Parishioners from St Elizabeth's in Rockville travel weekly to the far southeastern portion of the county to serve in the Langley Park Food Pantry and to teach English as a second language. With traffic, it can be an arduous trek taking an hour or more. It would be much easier to serve closer to home. The suffering is great among the poor in Langley Park. The effort required to serve is significant, but none complain.

As Sr. Margaret was clearing the road, I doubt she was doing it for Catholic drivers only or those without sin. Christian service is **non-judgmental.** The late Cardinal Hickey used to say, "Catholics serve not because those we serve are Catholic, but because we are Catholic". The Spanish Catholic

Center serves thousands of needy immigrants in Montgomery County. Volunteers help with food, legal aid, education and employment. Never is religion, legal status, or any other qualifier a condition of their Christian service.

Cleary, Sr. Margaret is a person of action. One of the greatest injustices is not hostility to the poor and vulnerable but rather indifference to their suffering. Our local Justice and Advocacy Council, a regular contributor to this newspaper, is known for its efforts on behalf of the poor and vulnerable. Their persistent advocacy before public officials urging justice in laws and budgets is effective and demonstrates our Christian belief that when making difficult choices. we must place the needs of the vulnerable ahead of all others.

Finally, there is **love**. Not plainly visible but certainly present on Sister Margaret's habit is her Crucifix, the greatest symbol of love. The brown habit of the Carmelites is not required for Christian service, but the selfless habit of love for our neighbors is essential. Where is your passion to serve? It begins with praying about **IT**; then doing **ABIT**, until it becomes a **HABIT**. Your parishes are seeking habitual volunteers to engage in Christian service to build a beloved community.

St. Bartholomew's Father Tim Daniel on Mission to Nicaragua

t. Bart's Parochial Vicar, Fr. Tim Daniel, was sent to Nicaragua for three weeks this August for a "work-study" program to help with Spanish ministry. Fr. Daniel and two other priests lived in a town located two hours north of Managua called Estelí and attended classes for four hours each weekday to practice Spanish conversation and study grammar.

Fr. Daniel told OPT, "Each of us celebrated Mass and preached most days, making for a true

immersion experience. The typical Thursday Mass was attended like a Sunday Mass and followed by a Eucharistic procession, and most

parishes celebrated an extra Mass in the morning." Fr. Daniel commented: "On a spiritual level the experience was quite moving. Fr. Daniel reports that the Nicaraguan people were "very friendly and very joyful" although many had only a little more than the basic necessities --shelter, food, clothing, perhaps a car. He told OPT, "The lack of worldly luxuries, coupled with our Catholic Faith,

seemed to help the people appreciate family, friendship, and God all the more."

Mass was provided the SJRCS Choir, under the direction of Mrs. Amy White, SJ music teacher. In attendance at the Mass were honored guests, including veterans from various military branches and active duty Chief Petty Officer Daniel O'Connor, who is a school parent.

Fr. Lee's homily centered on Fr. Kapaun's service to his country which was borne through his absolute and courageous faith to the Church. Fr. Lee recounted that Fr. Kapaun's faith was so compelling that, along with Christians, he had Jews, Muslims, and atheists pray-

ing the rosary together. On April 11, 2013, President Barack Obama posthumously awarded Fr. Kapaun the Medal of Honor "for conspicuous gallantry and for his extraordinary heroism while serving with the 3d Battalion, 8th Cavalry Regiment, 1st Cavalry Division, during combat operations against an armed enemy at Unsan, Korea, and as a prisoner of war from November 1-2, 1950."

Fr. Kapaun has been named a Servant of God, as the Cause for Canonization process was officially approved on June 21, 2016. At the end of Mass and before the final prayer, Fr. Lee gave a special blessing to the U.S. veterans in attendance at the Mass.
