# **Two Montgomery County Catholic Schools Receive National Education Honor**

Schools among only 50 private schools nationwide to be recognized with Blue Ribbon award

oly Cross School in Garrett Park (see page 24) and St. John the Evangelist School in Silver Spring (see page 7) were recognized on September 24 by the U.S. Department of Education as National Blue Ribbon Schools in recognition of their academic achievement as America's most successful schools.

A third school in the Archdiocese of Washington, St. Peter's on Capitol Hill, was also honored as a Blue Ribbon School.

The National Blue Ribbon Schools program honors public

and private elementary, middle and high schools where students are performing at very high levels or where significant improvements are being made in students' levels of achievement. The awards are given annually by the Department of Education.

In 2013, 50 private and 236 public schools were chosen from across the nation. To be chosen, schools must go through a competitive application process and demonstrate a strong commitment to educational excellence for all students.

In the 30-year history of the program, 27 schools in the archdiocese have received this prestigious honor.

The three area Catholic schools honored as National Blue Ribbon Schools for 2013 can attribute their success to their high academic standards and close-knit community. The schools have strong test scores and comprehensive curriculum with varied instructional methods. Community service is also an integral part of the schools with students encouraged to get involved.



# Integrity of Creation Committee Views 'Re-Creation' of Island

Members of the Resurrection Integrity of Creation Committee and other parishioners witnessed the "re-creation" of an island in the middle of the Chesapeake Bay during a unique outdoor tour Sept. 6. The 22 parishioners picked a beautiful fall day to visit the "Poplar Island Environmental Restoration Project" in which dredged material is being used to reclaim an island that was on the verge of extinction 15 years ago.

During the early 1900's, the island about 35 miles south of Baltimore encompassed about 1,000 acres, supporting some 100 residents, several farms, a saw mill, a

school, a church and a post office. Later, presidents Franklin D. Roosevelt and Harry

Truman used the island as a vacation retreat.

However, severe erosion began to overcome the island. and by the early 1990's, all that remained was about four acres above water. The disappearance of the island seemed imminent. At that time, a project that has been called "a national model for beneficial use of dredged material" was launched in 1998 to preserve the island and create more than 1,100 acres of wetlands and uplands habitat to support many species of treasured wildfowl and crabs, shellfish and other small animals.

Wednesday October 2, 2013, 21 This Week with Casey Aiken , will be celebrating the talk show's 21st Anniversary and Aiken's 10 years of hosting the program at Bethesda Blues & Jazz Supper Club, 7719 Wisconsin Avenue, Bethesda. In addition to the anniversary celebration the lively and informative political talk show dedicated to the politics of Montgomery County will

be doing a live taping of the program.

21 This Week, is Montgomery County's' #1 weekly political news program. Seen on Montgomery Community Media channel 21, by nearly twenty thousand (20,000) Montgomery County viewers every weekend 21 This Week is the mostwatched and longest-running weekly political news program on community television. In a fast-paced format, it provides political news and commentary to help people stay on top of the news that affects them directly.

Created in 1992, by television reporter Bruce DePuyt and political columnist Blair Lee to provide the 970,000 residents of Montgomery County residents with the same lively informative political talk shows that were popular elsewhere like "The McLaughlin Group," 21 This Week featured DePuyt as its initial host, with Lee, future White House legal counsel Lanny Davis, former State Senator P.J. Hogan, and former State Delegate Howard Denis as regular panelists.



Less than a year into production, DePuyt, left to take an on air position with a television station in Charlottesville, and Lee assumed the hosting duties a position he held until the end of 2002. In March 2003, local attorney, Casey Aiken, who had been a panelist with the program, took over the hosting duties full time. Today, the program features a mixture of political experts who have been active in local and state democrat and republican parties. Current panelist include, Susan Heltemes, Cynthia Rubenstein, past President of the Montgomery County Branch of the NAACP Henry Hailstock, former Majority Leader of the House of Delegates John Hurson, Rich Parsons, President of Progressive Maryland Elbridge James, Sam Statland, former State Senator Ida Ruben, David Fraser Hidalgo, Eric Hensal, Jerry Cave, Steve Kreseski, Jim Shalleck, Mark Uncapher, Robin Uncapher, Eric Cary, former State Senator Jean Roesser, former State Secretary for General Services Boyd Rutherford and Maryland

National Republican Committeewoman Nicolee Ambrose.

Aiken said that because of its location next to the Nation's Capital, the important activities of Montgomery County are often ignored in the local media echo chamber. According to Aiken, Montgomery County is not only the largest county in the State of Maryland, it is has a larger population than the District of Columbia, and

seven states, Montana, Delaware, South Dakota, Alaska, North Dakota, Vermont and Wyoming, "anywhere else the nightly news would be covering every aspect of the politics of this county. It is important that a program like this continues to share heated informative political debate."

A typical 21 This Week cablecast includes three to four "focus segments," each exploring a single story in depth in the form of Discussions, Debates, Political Analysis and Commentary. Aiken the show's moderator presides over a distinguished panel of four, politically diverse panelists each week. This half-hour format combines fast-breaking political, business and economic news, extensive in-depth political analysis and commentaries by noted local political experts.

Montgomery Community Media ("MCM") is a not-for-profit community television station which serves the citizens and communities of Montgomery County Maryland through a variety of cablecast activities.

the same day as the Feast of the Transfiguration. Some Salvadorans refer to the festival as Fiestas Agostinos (August Feasts). Main events of the festival are a religious procession, a large fair, various sporting events, a beauty contest, and a riotous party featuring street floats and dancers. The religious ceremony takes place in front of the national cathedral with a spectacle known as, la bajada (the descent). This ritual features an old wooden image of Christ that is paraded through the streets and then lowered inside a wooden shell. There, the sculpture's purple garments are removed. Then, the sculpture emerges from the shell appareled in gleaming white robes, a symbolic representation of Christ's transfiguration.

The El Salvador del Mundo festival dates back to 1525, the year that the city of San Salvador was founded. San Salvador is the present-day capital of El Salvador. The biggest of the celebrations take place in San Salvador. Additionally, there are other observances throughout El Salvador and in Salvadoran communities settled abroad.

# Middle School Summer Reading Combines Ancient Greek Mythology with 21st Century Online Technology

s part of the Holy Redeemer middle school summer reading program, rising sixth, seventh, and eighth-grade students were assigned Greek myths from the D'Aulaires' Book of Greek Myths. After reading the myths, students logged on to Edmodo, a free online social learning platform for teachers, students, and parents. Middle school students at Holy Redeemer use Edmodo for their sixth, seventh, and eighth-grade science classes, so all but the rising sixth-graders were familiar with the program. Grade level assignments for the various myths were posted every other week throughout the summer, encouraging students to stay in touch with each other and with their language arts teachers.

Students checked in regularly for the new assignments and posted responses.

One assignment, build your own volcano, integrated science, while another assignment, create your own shield, allowed students to utilize their own artistic abilities and creativity. All assignments reinforced reading comprehension, analysis, reflection, and basic writing skills used through-

When students returned to school a week early for Holy Redeemer's annual "Sneak a Peek", where students find out their homeroom assignments and see their teachers and new classrooms, they brought in their shields and hung them in the middle school hallways. The shields were taken down on September 26 so that students could assemble outside on the school's field for a photograph.



# World Youth Day in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil

ver 3.5 million young people from around the world gathered for World Youth Day in Rio de Janeiro this July. Seven of our own parish teens joined by four from neighboring St. Raphael participated in this incredible pilgrimage of faith. Our group was joined with two other groups from New York, St. Mary Church in Poughkeepsie and Regis High School in Manhattan.

We landed in Sao Paulo and traveled from there to the famous Shrine of Our Lady of Aparaceida, to whom Pope Francis has a special devotion, and celebrated Mass there with the rest of our tour group. We were blessed to have three priests and a bishop from Nova Scotia among our group. From there, we traveled overnight to Rio de Janeiro and, upon arrival, toured the beautiful Christ the Redeemer statue looming high above the city and dominating its skyline. Some of our group even joined in celebrating Mass at the chapel inside the statue.

In the mornings, we attended catechesis presented at Vivo Rio, a center hosted by U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops, with Jesuit priests as organizers. We were thrilled to have great emcees, including Steve


Vivo Rio began with prayer and praise and ended with daily Mass. During the evenings, we enthusiastically joined hundreds of thousands celebrating in the streets. On July 22, we greeted the pope on his arrival, cheering "Papa Francisco" as he passed through the

adoring crowds. The next evening, we participated in the Stations of the Cross staged beautifully by hundreds of young Brazilian actors. Wherever our group traveled, our teens were celebrities. Brazilians and people from around the world loved America and wanted to get a picture with our group, which proudly carried many American flags.

When our group was unable to attend the larger daily masses, Fr. George held a special Mass for us at our Hotel overlooking the beach. The culminating event of the trip was the overnight vigil beginning on the evening of the 24th, in which millions of youths slept overnight on Copacabana Beach, and joined in Mass with Pope Francis the following day. One of the most powerful moments of the entire pilgrimage came when our Holy Father exposed the Blessed Sacrament, and millions of the young faithful knelt in prayer behind him for an hour in the sand adoring Christ in the sacramental presence.

This was a beautiful journey of faith and our youth felt so blessed to participate. A sincere thank you to all those who contributed to making this trip financially possible for our young people. We are looking forward to the next World Youth Day, in 2016 in Poland!



Reading and math standardized test scores rank in the top 10% of all Maryland schools

n a somewhat cryptic e-bulletin sent out to parents the night before, the St. John the Evangelist School (SJE) children were told to wear blue to school on Tuesday morning, September 24, 2013 for a special assembly in the school auditorium with former SJE pastor, Auxiliary Bishop Barry C. Knestout and current pastor, Monsignor John Pennington. Nothing more was explained but parents were encouraged to attend and dress in blue as well.

After a few brief remarks, SJE Principal Sister Kathleen Lannak, IHM had a red-carpet, rock-star moment to remember when she gathered in front of her students to announce that SJE had been selected as a National Blue Ribbon School. Within moments the auditorium erupted in noisy cheers and fist pumps amidst a sea of blue hair ribbons, balloons and pompoms. WOOHOO BLUE! The suspense was finally over.

Due to the hard work by the SJE faculty, the Congregation of the Sisters, Servants of the Immaculate Heart of Mary and the students, SJE was ranked as a "high performing" school, which means its reading and math scores are in the top 10 percent of students in the state.

Sister Kathleen explained the process which was actually begun last year: "In our application we highlighted what a great community spirit we have here at St. John's and the efforts we all make to create a Culture of

Virtue in our school. We explained how we try to encourage all of our students to achieve to their highest degree and how we teach to each student's strength. We highlighted our foreign language program, our fine arts and music programs as well our Physical Education program. We explained how we are making strides in all of the areas where technol-

ogy can enhance our instruction as well as the students' learning. We explained our after-school programs offered such as band, Art Horizons, Math and French clubs, as well as CYO sports and scouting pro-


# Baby Articles Collected for Catholic Charities

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t. John the Baptist (S JB) began a relationship with St. Pierre parish in Baraderes, Haiti, in 1994. The majority of the people in this isolated, rural village live in extremely primitive conditions. Most families exist with no running water or electricity. SJB is the main and, in most cases, the sole support of the parish, high school, and 17 elementary schools.

Baraderes is a large and poor parish in need of desperate help. The average annual family income is only \$100. Many children walk five or more miles to school, most without having eaten. Our project was able to obtain financial support from a grant of \$15,000

can undermine the strongest literacy and educational programs.

> We are working with "The Gift of Water" organization to bring clean water to Baraderes. Last year, we were able to purchase 300 household water purification systems thanks to generous donations from our SJB parishioners and a grant from the Raskob Foundation. The local Water Committee responsible for deciding who gets

the systems.

First on the list were households young children, the elderly, and pregnant or nursing mothers.

One of the biggest problems is pain and infection from bad teeth. Volunteer dentists treated one hundred patients; over 100 teeth needed to be pulled -- all in the most remote areas where electricity and clean, running water are nonexistent!

When we first visited Baraderas, the children were malnourished and educational prospects were negligible. Now, our visits show marked improvement in healthier children whose grades and national exams are exceeding expectations. Many go on to universities and some have advanced to medical school and return to Baraderes to provide health care in their own communities.

Fourth Annual White Mass to be celebrated at St Matthew's Cathedral on October 20th at 11:30 am. This beautiful Mass celebrates the contributions to the Church by people who have physical and intellectual challenges. The Mass will be celebrated by Cardinal Wuerl who established the tradition of the White Mass and has led the Archdiocese in many steps to assure that the liturgies and programs of our parishes are welcoming for people with disabilities. It's well worth the trip downtown for the inspiration!

Last month we reflected on the diverse faiths in Montgomery County. We traced the origins of the three largest faiths in the county, Christianity, Judaism and Islam, to a single biblical leader, Abraham. We wondered how, with the same "father", we have evolved into such different religions. Yet if we explore the core values of these three traditions, we will discover that there are more similarities than we thought. Let's reflect on the core value of Charity.

The Hebrew word for charity is Tzedakah. In the Jewish tradition, charity and justice are inseparably linked. For Jews, charity requires not only care of the poor and vulnerable through giving, but also connotes a social obligation to give to the poor the share of God's earthly blessings which is rightfully theirs. In Montgomery County, the Jewish community practices this command through its support for several nonprofit agencies which serve the poor and vulnerable regardless of religious affiliation. Jewish Social Services provides a wide range of family services and mental health counseling to vulnerable children and families; the Jewish

**Foundation for Group Homes** provides homes in which people with developmental disabilities live independently with appropriate levels of support; the Jewish Council for the Aging serves the elderly with transportation, recreation, employment and other services which promote vital living and independence; and the Jewish Coalition Against Domestic Abuse assists victims of domestic violence. These programs demonstrate the local Jewish commitment to the principle of Tzedakah.

Similarly in the Our'an, the Prophet Mohamed taught his followers of the fundamental importance of charity. When asked by a follower which actions were the most beloved in the eyes of Allah, he famously replied, "To gladden the heart of a human being, to feed the hungry, to help the afflicted,

to lighten the sorrow of the sorrowful, and to remove the wrongs of the injured... assist any person oppressed whether Muslin or on-Muslim". The Muslim word for charity is Zakat. Literally translated it means "repel not the beggar". While the Muslim community in Montgomery County is relatively new, it is growing and its members are working to practice Zakat as taught by The Prophet. **The Montgomery County Muslim** Foundation is committed to the Quran's teaching to share a portion of one's food with the poor and collects and distributes thousands of pounds of food to the needy each year, especially during the Ramadan observance. The Muslim Community Center of Montgomery County provides a

range of services including a medical clinic for the uninsured and poor and English language classes for immigrants. In our community and throughout the world, faithful Muslims are far more engaged in Zakat than other publicized activi-

And of course, the Christian word for charity is love. Throughout the New Testament, there is no stronger message from Jesus than the message of love for each other. He boiled down our faith to two clear commandments, to love God and love each other. The life of Christ demonstrated time and again His message in healing the physically and spiritually suffering and forgiving those who strayed. Love is practiced by the Catholic community through Catholic Charities, the Spanish Catholic Center, the Kennedy Institute, Anchor Mental Health, Victory Housing and St. Ann's Center for Children and Families. Each agency demonstrates the fundamental Christian obligation to love each other, in particular the most vulnerable.

Other Christian traditions are active in Montgomery County as well. For example, Lutheran **Social** Services assists the needy;

the Adventist community is committed to health care, Methodists are known for their services to the elderly.

While these larger faith based agencies are leaders in providing charity for the needy and vulnerable, the vast amount of charity is done in individual congregations and parishes, that is, by each of us. Hundreds of congregations live their faith, whichever it may be, through efforts originated and implemented by concerned people of God working locally to carry out the shared obligation to serve the poor in body and spirit. What a wonderful community this is!

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
# St. Peter's Families Enjoy Outdoor Movie Night

# Cardinal O'Malley, Archbishop Lori to Congress: Adopt Policy of Health Care Conscience Rights Act

reserving religious freedom and the right of conscience for all who take part in our health care system" is an increasingly grave concern as Congress considers "must-pass" legislation in the days ahead, said the chairmen of two committees of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB).

In a September 26 letter to the House and Senate, Cardinal Seán O'Malley of Boston and Archbishop William E. Lori of Baltimore said the policy of the Health Care Conscience Rights Act (H.R. 940/S. 1204) should be incorporated into must-pass legislation such as the Continuing Resolution and debt ceiling bill. Cardinal O'Malley and Archbishop Lori chair the USCCB Committee on Pro-Life Activities and Ad Hoc Committee for Religious Liberty, respectively.

"Protection for conscience rights

in health care is of especially great importance to the Catholic Church, which daily contributes to the welfare of U.S. society through schools, social services, hospitals and assisted living facilities," wrote Cardinal O'Malley and Archbishop Lori. "These institutions, which have been part of the Church's ministry since the earliest days of our country, arose from religious convictions. They should not be told by government to abandon or compromise those convictions in order to continue serving their own employees or the neediest Americans. Nor should individual Catholics or others be told they cannot legally purchase or provide health coverage unless they violate their conscience."

Cardinal O'Malley and Archbishop Lori identified the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) preventive services mandate, which requires virtually all employers to include female sterilization and all drugs and devices approved by the FDA as contraceptives in their employee health care plans, as a particular threat. "The mandate includes drugs and devices that can act against a human life after fertilization, implicating our moral teaching on abortion as well as contraception," they wrote.

"We make our plea as religious leaders who strongly support universal access to health care," they added. "Such access is threatened by Congress's continued failure to protect the right of conscience. Those who help provide health care, and those who need such care for themselves and their families, should not be forced to choose between preserving their religious and moral integrity and participating in our health care system."



Currently, Neil lives in a basement apartment in the house. He has one roommate named Zak Selbst, coincidentally a parishioner of Mother Seton Germantown. The Youngs hope to have other residents

join Neil and Zak in the house. A third friend from Special Olympics, Chris DiVita, may join them in the future. A fourth friend, Andy Eisenhower may move into the house in the Spring. The legal term for such a group house is Community Support Living Arrangement.

Self-sufficiency is something that Margie Young wants for Neil, Zak and other potential residents. "We really wanted the kids to be travel-trained," Young said. "So everyone knows how to ride a bus." Also, the residents should have either a volunteer job or a paid job. "They need to get out at least four hours per day," Margie Young said. "We want them to make their own plans."

Additionally, most group homes feature an adult who makes all the plans for the residents. In the Youngs' group home, Willy Young said, "The idea is to have a responsible adult as a safety valve, not a

# **New Teacher Profile – Deacon Timothy Tilghman**

t the St. Francis International School weekly Masses, all of the students have seen Deacon Timothy Tilghman on the altar. All of the middle school classes have listened to him teaching their religion class. Who is this newcomer?

Timothy Tilghman was born on March 2, 1953, in Washington,

D.C. He grew up in Northeast D.C., near the Shrimp Boat, an area landmark. Deacon Tilghman loved his community and enjoyed hanging out with people in his old neighborhood. He went on to serve in the Coast Guard for 23 years until 1998 when he retired as a captain. Deacon Tilghman was ordained in 2010 to serve the Archdiocese of Washington.

To really understand Deacon, however, one must understand how he grew up in the neighborhood. The desire to become a deacon




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

Deacon Tilghman's relationship with his neighborhood directly contributes to his goals at St. Francis.

He states, "Every good thing I have comes from that experience with church in the neighborhood." As a religion teacher and deacon in this school community he wants to give the students a similar experience. Deacon Tilghman is accustomed to community work, after being a community organizer for the Washington Interfaith Network for ten years and a member of the Cursio Movement in the Archdiocese of Washington for twenty-one years.

Deacon Tilghman is a well-traveled man, having spent forty days working at a Jesuit parish of thirty thousand families in Ilasamaga, Lagos state, in Nigeria. However, even on a different continent, he found the type of church community that he saw as a child in D.C. That experience growing up has made Deacon Tilghman the man and deacon that he is today. St. Francis reminds him of that church community to which he belonged. Now, Deacon Tilghman is here to make this community as enriching and valuable as the one from which he came.

# **Teachers Taking Advantage of Technology**

hile the students are away, International School do not play. On Friday, September 20th, the students celebrated an early dismissal day. However, the middle school teachers staved afterwards to receive training in the new online lesson-planning program, My Lesson Planner. Primary school teachers had received the training earlier in the day. The program should help the teachers more easily organize their lesson plans and track students' performance.

Mr. Tobias Harkleroad, co-principal of Saint Francis, described the importance of making the switch to My Lesson Planner: "Part of

everything in the twenty-first century is being able to easily and quickly access past data and share data. In a school where we want to plan for the long-term and work as a team, we need to give them the tools. You cannot do it easily with paper and pencil. Moving to My Lesson Planner allows us to have a whole new level of sharing and being able to study and analyze the curriculum."

This training for teachers is only the most recent event in Saint Francis's move towards more technology in education. To help students review mathematics learned in class, teachers have started using the computer program First in *Math.* It uses fun games to increase the students' interest in math.

"First in Math reinforces the facts," said Ms. Shern Hall, a second grade teacher. "It's engaging. Their eyes are glued to it." However, the kids are not the only ones liking the new program. "Parents seem to be enjoying their kids liking it," she concluded.

Parents at SFIS should already be aware of Edline, the program the teachers are using to organize grades and maintain constant contact with parents. They can send parents their children's grades and communicate electronically using its messaging forum. As Saint Francis moves further into the twenty-first century, such changes are crucial in keeping the school at the forefront of education.

# **Healthy Students are Productive Students**

chool has just started, but at Saint Francis "sick season" has also started earlier than usual. All school communities face the regular cycle of flu, colds, sore throats each year/ Sometimes, like a few

years ago with the H1N1 epidemic the sick season is heavy and other years it's hard to notice when the sick season has come and gone.

Annual illnesses like flu and the cold as well as typical childhood illnesses like strep throat can spread easily in a school environment where kids are changing classes, eating together in the cafeteria, and sharing restrooms and water fountains. When those illnesses spread students loose valuable instructional time as they suffer through and recover. Children also suffer when their regular classroom teachers get sick and need to take time off.

This fall at SFIS students have been coming to the health room in numbers normal for flu season, but, this early in the year, such high numbers are a little unusual. Even though they weren't expecting this uptick in sicknesses the administration at Saint Francis International School has chosen to use this unusual situation to roll out and start practicing newly designed health and wellness techniques throughout the school.

This year SFIS has a new school nurse, Connie Ramseth, RN, and a new health room technician, Amy Cossette - the team came to Saint Francis from St. Catherine Labouré School, which ceased operations last June. Nurse Connie Ramseth brings with her 45 years of school and army nursing experience. A part of the new approach to health and wellness at SFIS is being aggressively pro-active with the intention that if kids and teachers are healthier there will be more time for high level learning.

In order to fight the spread of the illness among the student and teacher population, the administration began using aggressive measures to ensure hygiene and safety in the school building. The Montgomery County



#### Years of Service to Mothers and Babies

ince 1908 the Christ card. Each medal and prayer Society's Layette Program has been providing material, educational and emotional support to at risk newborns and their mothers. Each year the Society distributes over 3700 layettes with blankets, clothing and diapers, blessed medals and prayer cards to babies in the metropolitan

In the fall of 2003, Mrs. Linda Merkel introduced the program to the students of Our Lady of Lourdes School. Her eighth-grade students began their service by tying blessed medals to a prayer

card is then tied to one layette, which is then distributed to a mother and child. For ten years the eighth-grade students have been involved in this project. It is one of their favorite service projects because they love to think about the tiny babies who will receive the layettes.

Each layette includes a hand-knitted item. Mrs. Merkel has been knitting those blankets for over 25 years. While she was teaching school, she knit 20 to 25 blankets each year. 



The St. Raphael Special Needs Ministry is excited to hold its first Special Needs Town Hall on Tuesday, Oct. 1. This is the chance for members of our community to talk about what our dreams are for this ministry and discuss what we hope to accomplish in the long term.

On Oct. 16, the St. Raphael Respect for Life committee welcomes Marguerite Duane, MD, who will come to our parish to speak about natural family planning. Duane is a board certified family physician and the co-founder

of FACTS: the Fertility Appreciation Collaborative to Teach the Systems. This discussion will examine the dignity of human sexuality within the vocation of Christian marriage. She will also discuss natural family planning methods and introduce Natural Procreative Technology and how it may be used to diagnose and treat infertility, consistent with the teachings of the Church.

One very vibrant part of our parish is the Society of St. Vincent de Paul, a lay organization that offers financial, spiritual and emotional support based on home visitation and assessment. Our SVdP chapter has 22 active members, and in fiscal year 2013 they had 77 cases with 85 adults and 75 children during the year. The organization provided



# **Stepping Outside Ourselves**

eeding Pope Francis's call to "become courageous Christians and seek out those who need help the most," Mary of Nazareth School has embarked on a multifaceted Social Concerns program for the 2013-2014 school year entitled "Stepping Outside Ourselves." The program derives its name from one of Pope Francis's recent speeches in which he implored Catholics to "step outside ourselves... [and] find poverty... to seek out those on the fringes of society who need help the most." The Mary of Nazareth faculty will be holding its October retreat at AWC, volunteering as a group in AWC's Center for Community Service. Following a visit by AWC's founder, Dr. Mark Bergel, the students will be holding a donated goods drive in October, collecting donations of household items that AWC offers free of charge to families in need. And in the winter and spring, Mary of Nazareth families will be offered the opportunity to volunteer in AWC's Center for Community Service.

The Social Concerns Committee, and their faculty chair Megan McGregor, have worked hard to integrate the theme of combating poverty into the classroom curriculum throughout the entire year. Mary of Nazareth School looks forward to working with A Wider Circle to help families start anew with dignity and hope.

# Krystyna Praszalowicz Kloss, RIP

Rev. Jan Fiedurek, S.Chr., celebrated a memorial Mass for the repose of the soul of Krystyna Praszalowicz Kloss on Saturday, September 21, 2013, at Our Lady Queen of Poland (OLQP) Parish in Silver Spring, MD. Mrs. Kloss died earlier this year at the age of 94. She was a founding member of OLQP Parish and was active in the cultural life of Washington, D.C. She also was the widow of the late Polish American Congress Washington Metro Division member, Stephen Praszalowicz Kloss, who was director of the National Capital Planning Commission, 1962-1980. Wanda gave the eulogy.

e are [gathered] here to celebrate the life of Krystyna Praszalowicz Kloss. Or, as my sister and I called her "Pani Krystyna."

It is fitting that I speak to you today. Pani Krystyna and my mother, Hanka [Szczepanska], were friends for nearly 50 years. It was exactly one year ago today that we

met here for my mother's funeral Mass.

In their later years, as their spouses aged and passed away and they themselves aged, my mother often said that the memories continue to live on.

Pani Krystyna was born in Krakow, Poland. Prior to the out-

break of World War II, she began her undergraduate studies in Warsaw, where she met her future husband, Szczepan Praszalowicz Kloss. They were married in Krakow, during the war. Pani Krystyna took part in the Polish underground in Krakow. She was arrested twice and bravely withstood harsh interrogations by the Germans. In 1985, she received the Polish Home Army Cross for her bravery.

She received her Masters degree in architecture from Krakow University of Technology in 1948 and joined her husband, also an architect, in the United States in 1957. They purchased a home in southwest D.C., near the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, her employer. She had two projects which were especially significant to her. The first, which many of you may have seen, were the innovative "skywalks" built between buildings in Rosslyn, Virginia. The other was the design for the Polish American Children's Hospital in her native Krakow.

I remember Pani Krystyna as kind and generous. She and her

husband built their retreat near Little Washington, Virginia. It was a microcosm of Polish culture and hospitality. They often entertained here, among the many "kilimy," carvings, and pottery from Poland. As a child, I remember "camping" on the hillside leading down to the stream, and watching as the sun set over the Blue Ridge mountains. This scene reminded everyone of Poland.

Pani Krystyna knew many songs and would sit at the piano and play. I was awed to learn that she had no formal training and played most of the pieces after hearing just the melody.

There were many impromptu gatherings at their home in southwest, particularly after we had spent many long hours crafting hand-made decorations and hanging them on the Polish Christmas Tree at the Smithsonian, or creating centerpieces for a Polish Ball, or assembling the Woodrow Wilson Exhibit, among many such events. They always provided food, drink, good conversation and laughter.

Pani Krystyna's love of Poland

will be long remembered as she donated monies for the upkeep of the Polish cemetery at Monte Cassino.

I would like to express the sentiments of Jagoda and Beata Wyszynskie, her nieces who reside in her native Krakow, and who are with us today in spirit. They would like to thank everyone for coming to celebrate and remember their Ciocia Krysia and for praying for her.

May she rest in peace.

# The Right to Life Challenges in Our Backyard

ust at the edges of Christ the King's parish boundaries is one of the more active abortuaries in the county, Planned Parenthood's facility on Spring Street near Georgia Avenue. And every Saturday morning quiet protest takes place on the sidewalk out front until about noon. If it is a big event going on, like 40 Days' activities, many are drawn to participate, from Thursday until Saturday. But recently it has been a lone young woman standing there saying the Rosary, moving up and down the sidewalk so as not to be arrested for whatever it is Maryland, and/or Montgomery County, now

calls an arrestable offense. A young man may occasionally join in, always under the watchful, and creepy, eyes of Planned Parenthood "escorts" with their orange vests. Quiet, alone and prayerful.

Catholics know of the intrinsic and obvious evil of abortion but the insidiousness of the whole Contraception movement in this generation seems lost on most. Visit a pharmaceutical web site and check the information on any contraceptive hormone pill. You will find a statement much like this one (for Ortho-Tricyclen), "This medication also causes changes in your cervical mucus and uterine lining, making it harder for a fertilized egg to attach to the uterus" - a fertilized egg,

that which all of us once was. In the quiet of the vanity, women daily take from their medicine cabinet a drug which early on does what the more obvious-to-us abortion does in a later stage of pregnancy.

And, as breast cancer survivors learn, the first thing before treatment you must do is report (to the doctor) and eliminate sources of hormones in your daily regimen. Of course never is it directly mentioned that this would include what we call birth control pills. It is mentioned, though, to stop estrogen patches (menopausal women apparently are not as sensitive as the younger may be). The increase in diagnosis of breast cancer among young women correlates in this generation

with the contraceptives which have become an unspoken given, even seen as a necessity. Survivors must also report (to the doctor) any instance of abortion and/or all births (live and not), as this is/has been an abrupt "shift" in a hormone cycle of a woman. Clearly the medical field needs to have more women-specific medical studies but an apparent relationship cannot be ignored or discounted. These products of the past forty years of contraception have led to an anti-life attitude.

Yet, it is for Life that every Saturday morning a young woman stands on Spring Street saying the Rosary. Quiet, alone and prayerful.

Resurrection group saw nesting ospreys, snowy egrets, terns, herons, eagles, double-breasted cormorants and various kinds of ducks. Not only that, but the group was able to see some of the diamond-back terrapins that are nesting in large numbers on the island's sandy beaches. (That elicited the most "Oooh's and "Aaaha's" during the tour.)

Using soil dredged from the Baltimore shipping channel, workers are creating a maze of smaller islands, ponds, channels and marshes on Poplar Island. Some 40 million cubic yards of dredged material will be protected by 35,000 feet of rock and sand containment dikes already in place.

The project is a joint effort of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, the Maryland Port Administration, and many other state and federal environmental agencies. When restoration is complete, Maryland will manage the island.

The free tour was conducted by Megan Garrett and Shannon

Bone, who work for the Maryland Environmental Service. Not only did they provide a wealth of fas-

> cinating stories about the island's past, present and future. The guides served as "captain" and "first mate" of the "Terrapin," a 25-foot power cruiser that took the group on the 20-minute ride from Tilghman Island on the Eastern Shore

to their destination.

A similar restoration project using dredged material is nearing completion at Hart-Miller Island about 14 miles east of Baltimore at the mouths of Back River and Middle River. The two former separate islands are now connected and include Hart-Miller Island State Park.

SAIGON-1975: Paul's father is captured by Vietnamese Communists and sent to a re-education camp. During his four years away, the Nguyen family home and possessions were confiscated, all religious freedom is abolished and the Catholic Nguyen family begins secret plans to leave Vietnam.

The first escape came in 1979 with Paul's Dad taking son, John and a daughter with him to the Philippines. Mother Nguyen and her other 6 children remained in Vietnam until finally making it out to Malaysia. Sadly, Paul's infant brother became very ill and passed away. During this troubling time for the family, young Paul became separated from the group and must escape on his own. A boat to Thailand was arranged and instead of being welcomed there by family, Paul spends the next two years in a .jungle refugee orphanage.

"I'm so happy here!" says Father Paul.



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
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# St. Andrew Apostle Community Draws Together During Forty Hours Devotion

Once a major part of Catholic life, Forty Hours originated in the 1530s and became widespread in the United States after the practice was introduced by St. John Neumann in 1853. Largely forgotten after the Second Vatican Council, it has seen a revival in recent years as people discover the benefits of praying before the Eucharist.

A specific intention was assigned to most of the forty hours, and each hour began with the recitation of the Divine Mercy Chaplet and prayer led by an "Hour Captain." Matt Eberly served as Hour Captain for the midnight hour dedicated to all those in the Armed Forces.

"When I agreed to lead the prayers for my hour of adoration, I expected only a couple of parishioners to be present," he said. "But when I walked into the church shortly before midnight, I was simply amazed to see 20 or more people in the pews. It was inspiring to see so many people spending the late hours of a Friday night with Jesus." The entire forty-hour

period was livestreamed through the parish website.

Theresa Trigiani watched many of the late hours of the Devotion from home. "Spending time as a parish and school community adoring Our Lord in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament and praying hour by hour with specific intentions not only brings healing to one's soul but to our entire faith community," she said. "It was an incredibly powerful experience for us at Saint Andrew's to pray together and grow in the love and mercy of Christ."

Each class in the school visited the Blessed Sacrament at some point during the forty hours. Our pastor, Father Dan Leary, spent time teaching the children in each class from kindergarten through eighth grade about the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist during their visits. The younger children gathered around him at the altar to sing and pray together during their visit.

## Citing World Migrant, Refugee Day Message from Pope Francis, USCCB Chairman Calls on House of Representatives to Begin Consideration of Immigration Reform Legislation

Pope Francis says people not to be part of throwaway culture

Archbishop Gomez urges House to move on path to citizenship for undocumented

Workplace exploitation violates human rights

nvoking Pope Francis' Message for the World Day of Migrants and Refugees, released September 24, Archbishop José H. Gomez of Los Angeles, chairman of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' Committee on Migration, called upon members of the U.S. House of Representatives to begin consideration of comprehensive immigration reform legislation.

In a message, released in advance of the January 19, 2014, World Day of Migrants and Refugees, Pope Francis called for a "change in attitude' toward migrants and refugees around the world, moving away from attitudes of "defensiveness and fear, indifference and fear," typical of a "throwaway culture." "Migrants and refugees are not pawns on the chessboard of humanity," the Holy Father wrote.

Archbishop Gomez echoed the Holy Father's remarks, stating that the current situation in the United States undermines the human rights and dignity of migrants.

"Migrants have few rights in our economic system," Archbishop Gomez said. "They are working for low wages in our restaurants and fields; our factories, gardens, homes and hotels. And these men and women have no security against sickness, disability or old age — and no protections against being exploited in the workplace."

Calling on the House of Representatives to correct this situation, Archbishop Gomez added, "I urge our leaders in the House of Representatives to debate and pass a bill that gives these undocumented men and women a path to citizenship and full membership in our society."


The U.S. Senate passed S. 744, comprehensive immigration reform legislation, June 27. The U.S. House of Representatives has yet to act on the Senate bill or its own version of immigration reform.

# **Envisioning Discipleship**

Inder the direction of Father Dan Leary and based on the book Forming Intentional Disciples by Sherry Weddell, a parish-wide evangelization effort has been launched at St. Andrew Apostle. This book has sparked world-wide discussion among lay and clerical church leaders and challenged the way the Church approaches evangelization efforts.

Sherry Weddell created the first charism discernment process specifically designed for Catholics in 1993. In 1997, she co-founded the *Catherine of Siena Institute*, an affiliated international ministry of the Western Dominican Province, and currently serves as Co-Director. Sherry has developed numerous unique formation resources that are used around the world and trained and helps lead an international team that has worked directly with over 85,000 ordained, religious, and lay Catholics in more than 100 dioceses on 5 continents.

Over the past few months, almost 200 copies of Sherry's book have been distributed to parishioners in an effort to create a forum for discussion and to eventually host a Called and Gifted Workshop and a Forming Intentional Disciples Retreat. These programs are meant to help lay Catholics discern the unique work of love to which God is calling them and to discover how God has empowered them to carry it out. They provide training that fosters an awakening of personal faith in Christ and intentional discipleship and an understanding of the crucial role every lay Catholic has in the mission of the Church to bring Christ's love to our neighbors and our culture. To date over 40.000 Catholics in over 100 dioceses have attended the workshops

in parishes across North America and internationally. According to Sherry, St. Andrew Apostle parish will be the first parish in the Archdiocese of Washington, D.C. to launch these programs. Another book, Rebuilt by Rev. Michael White, is being used as an additional reference tool from a parish that has attempted a revitalization of parish life through evangelization efforts.

As an initial step, there have been three "vision meetings" with a cross-section of parishioners and parish leaders to bring to light some of the challenges we face as Church and as a parish. Their purpose was to create a thirst or hunger to bring those on the fringes into our Church through the call of the New Evangelization.

The goal is to create a parish culture of evangelization through a personal encounter with Christ. In this way, the parishioners of St. Andrew Apostle can respond to the call of Blessed John Paul the Great, Emeritus Pope Benedict XVI and now Pope Francis "to encourage the entire ecclesial community to be an evangelizing community, and not be afraid to 'step out' of itself in order to proclaim, trusting above all in the merciful presence of God who guides us."

Department of Health provided several recommendations for fighting the germs, so the administration implemented these ideas quickly.

Students and parents entering the building each day receive hand sanitizer, and students receive some again before lunch, after recess, and throughout the day. Teachers review effective hand-washing methods and ways to minimize germs that spread while sneezing and coughing. Furthermore, students wipe down tables and desks with disinfectant on a daily basis.

These efforts were very effective in helping to make sure the unusual fall sick season was as short as possible and gave the teachers and students plenty of opportunity to rehearse good hygiene and illness prevention well before the regular

flu season comes around.

The changes in the health room and new health and wellness policies at SFIS are coupled with an expanding school meal program designed help students be better able to maximize their learning every day. Beginning this year, thanks to participation in the Maryland Meals for Achievement program, all students at Saint Francis are receiving a light breakfast at the beginning of each day during their morning meetings. The new breakfast program is designed to enhance the St. Francis Café that has been providing children with healthy lunches for many years.

Our parish will be hosting the Mid-Point Rally on Sun., Oct. 13, in the Parish Center. Doors open at 5 p.m., and pizza will be served. A powerful documentary will be shown called "Life Happens" that will share perspectives of children (and mothers) who narrowly escaped abortion and "almost weren't". To sign up for the 40 Days for Life prayer vigil and to view the schedule, please go to: www.40daysforlife.com/germantown/ or stop by anytime between 6 a.m. and Midnight. Signs and literature are available. Many area churches are participating, so there are always prayer warriors present to face this evil presence.

Across the parking lot from Carhart's office is Germantown Pregnancy Choices located at 13230 Executive Park Terrace, which offers alternatives to abortion for pregnant women. Volunteers are needed to work at the front desk so that they can keep their doors open, and donations are needed so that they can pay their bills. All their space and office equipment is donated. They can be contacted by calling 301-916-5433. Volunteers from their office provide sidewalk counselors. Recently, sidewalk counselors tried to talk to a couple as they went into Carhart's Germantown Reproductive Health Services late-term abortion office. The man came out several times after their arrival, and sidewalk counselors were able to talk with him each time. Two hours later, they both came out and said they had decided not to have an abortion! A Save! Three babies were saved during September! And more in early October. They work closely with Shady Grove Pregnancy



Currently, they are offering FREE sonograms to pregnant women on Fri./Sat., Oct. 18th/19th, and on Fri./Sat., Oct. 25th/26th. Pregnant women from 7 to 30 weeks pregnant are needed to help students complete their nurse sonographer's training. All sonograms will be performed under supervision of a licensed sonographer. 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# No longer a pipe dream

## De Chantal's long-awaited pipe organ finally nears its debut

hen St. Jane de Chantal's church was going through its redesign process more than a decade ago, there was one important piece of its completion that its planners knew the parish would have to wait years for. Now, as the church prepares to debut its new pipe organ on Nov. 17 with a Mass and blessing by Cardinal Wuerl, the picture is nearly complete.

The Lively-Fuelcher pipe organ that was installed this summer and is currently being adjusted for sound – "voiced" in music terminology – has been long-awaited and is eagerly anticipated by many, not least of whom is the the parish's new music director, Russell Weismann. Weismann has years of training with the instrument, having begun the process as an eighth-grad-

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er at his home parish in Pittsburgh and most recently having served as associate director of music for the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception. He said the sound can't begin to compare with its electric counterpart.

"We live in an age where synthetic sound is becoming more and more acceptable, and that's sad," he said. He likened the pipe organ's difference in sound to a hug: "The sound wraps around you. It's a whole different acoustic experience."

For those who grew up with a pipe organ in their church, the sound might indeed be like coming home, though Weismann says pipe organs aren't as unusual as they might seem. "There are a number of them in the D.C. area; really, D.C. is a town where there's a pipe organ on every block. We're very fortunate," he said.

The process of installing the organ is a meticulous one, due in part to the thousands of working parts it contains. While the organ was made by a specialized company in Virginia, the pipes themselves had to be shipped over from the Netherlands and assembled in Virginia, then installed and voiced

in the parish in a process that takes months. The voicing itself adjusts each of the organ's pipes to the church's unique acoustics to produce the correct tone. Weismann says pipe organs themselves produce very different sounds based on the country in which they are produced; he said the de Chantal organ has a very English sound, "very full with exceptional volume control." He said he finds the English sound the best for churches.

The pipe organ's debut on Nov. 17 will feature a blessing by Cardinal Wuerl, who will celebrate Mass at 10 a.m. Later that day, at 2 p.m., Weisman will give a recital, on the organ, with a reception following in the church's Caulfield Hall.

While the debut is on schedule, an important component of the instrument's sound – the clarinet pipes – is on hold since the organ pledges weren't enough to cover them. "The clarinet pipes are vital to the organ's sound," said Weismann, and donations are being sought to cover the cost of completing the instrument. # NIH funding boosts new Alzheimer's research on prevention, novel drug targets

\$45 million in awards to test early interventions, explore new approaches

esearchers will test promising drugs aimed at preventing Alzheimer's and identify and validate biological targets for novel therapies, with approximately \$45 million in new funding from the National Institutes of Health. The initiative will support innovative new studies as part of an intensified national effort to find effective interventions for this devastating degenerative brain disease.

The studies are among the first to be developed with direction from the 2012 NIH Alzheimer's Disease Research Summit: Path to Treatment and Prevention and reflect research goals in the National Plan to Address Alzheimer's Disease.

"As many as 5 million Americans face the challenge of Alzheimer's disease, which robs them of their memories, their independence, and ultimately, their lives," Dr. Collins said. "We are determined, even in a time of constrained fiscal resources, to capitalize on exciting scientific opportunities to advance understanding of Alzheimer's biology and find effective therapies as quickly as pos-

The clinical trials investigate possible ways to stop the progression of the disease. The translational research study awards are focused on identifying, characterizing and validating novel therapeutic targets.

"We know that Alzheimer's-related brain changes take place years, even decades, before symptoms appear. That really may be the optimal window for drugs that delay progression or prevent the disease altogether," said NIA Director Dr. Richard Hodes. "The clinical trials getting under way

with these funds will test treatments in symptom-free volunteers at risk for the disease, or those in the very earliest stages-where we hope we can make the biggest difference."

Basic and genetic studies of the disease – from the abnormal proteins involved, to genetic influences, to inflammation and other Alzheimer'srelated brain changes - have advanced our knowledge. This has given us new insights into the biological underpinnings of this extremely complex disorder, Dr. Hodes said.



# WAVE - Washington Area Village Exchange

AVE, the Washington Area Village Exchange, held it quarterly meeting on Monday, October 7. County representatives from Maryland, Virginia and DC discussed current village programs for seniors and held breakout sessions for volunteer organizations with paid staff and village executives.

The Washington Area Villages Exchange (WAVE) is a forum through which nonprofit villages in the Washington metropolitan area share experience and ideas. It works with senior serving and intergenerational organizations and agencies, and encourages the growth and improvement of the village movement within the Washington area.

WAVE has quarterly meetings hosted by member organizations on a rotating basis in



the three jurisdictions. The meeting include speaker covering a topic of interest to the member organizations with time for questions. After the main presentation, specific time is provided for a couple of concurrent discussion groups focusing on areas of interest to member villages.

There are 13 WAVE villages in suburban

Maryland. Most are up and running; some are in development. Of the 13, there are four in Bethesda, two in Potomac and one each in Chevy Chase and Garrett Park. The website has contact information for each.

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
