



Commemorating the Anniversary of the Warsaw Uprising

n September 2014, Our Lady Queen of Poland & St. Maximilian Kolbe longtime parishioner Mrs. Barbara Syska participated in the commemoration of the 70th Anniversary of the Warsaw Uprising along with historian Dr. Jadwiga Biskupska American University Washington, D.C.

The Warsaw Uprising began at 5 P.M. on August 1, 1944, and lasted for 63 days. It was a struggle waged by the Polish Home Army against the

Nazi German occupying forces to liberate the capital of Poland. It was to become the largest single military resistance effort in World War II.

Syska, Mrs. a veteran of the Warsaw Uprising, recounted her experiences and her active role in the Uprising while still a young teenager in 1944. The event was jointly sponsored by the Embassy of the Republic of Poland and the Polish Student Organization American University.

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



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

vealed to us, must be appreciated for its uniqueness and as a sacred masterpiece entrusted to humanity for protection.

The John H. Mulholland Family Foundation is an example of a group of people and parishes who respect God's masterpieces. The Foundation works with several Montgomery County parishes, including Resurrection, St Michael's, St John Evangelist, St Andrews and others to raise money and collect food to assist the poorest of the poor living in Catholic inner city parishes. Life is endangered when essential nutrition is unavailable. If you or your parish wish to know more about or get involved with the Mulholland Foundation's mission of life, check it out at www.jsmff.org.

Respect for life includes the obvious; ending abortion, euthanasia, and capital punishment. But also requires action to eliminate hunger and disease; enhance the quality of life for those with disabilities and comfort for those who are frail. It includes efforts to bring peace to the minds of those with mental illness and freedom from enslavement for those with drug addiction. It requires that innocent and vulnerable people be protected from physical and emotional harm. This month we are reminded that every month our faith requires us through prayer and action that we honor God's masterpieces in every form they assume.

Coincidentally, October has been designated as Domestic Violence Awareness Month in the United States. It was established in 1987 to increase public awareness of domestic violence, defined as violence against spouses, partners and children; to promote community dialogue to prevent domestic violence; and to inform victims and those who care about victims of local and national resources available to assist them. Domestic violence is a crime and a major assault against our fundamental commitment to respect life. Because we have witnessed several horrific crimes of domestic violence in the Washington metro area, and as part of our commitment to life, I suggest we reflect upon individual and parish actions which can be taken to prevent harm and assist victims of domestic violence in our com-

A recent study by Court Watch Montgomery estimates that 93,000 women in Montgomery County are likely to be victims of domestic violence at some point in their lives. Montgomery County Child Welfare Services reports that it investigated 2,665 suspected child abuse cases in 2013. Priests will tell you that domestic violence is often the subject of confession and pastoral counseling. They will also tell you that this tragic family cancer is among the most difficult to treat

and cure because of its complexity. There are legal, mental health, substance abuse, housing, medical as well as spiritual issues involved often entangling victims in a web from which they cannot escape. As committed as a priest may be to assist a victim or perpetrator of domestic violence, the interventions are beyond his best efforts and skills. Often women and children, the usual victims of domestic violence, turn to the clergy for help. Victims are embarrassed or afraid to seek help from a friend or relative. Without specific awareness and training, clergy cannot help beyond spiritual counseling. This is where others in the community, especially those who share the same spiritual home with victims may be able to assist.

The Maryland Interfaith Domestic Violence Coalition knows this from experience. On October 1, they held a Day of Dialogue during which hundreds of clergy were invited to learn about resources and issues associated with domestic violence. In addition on the weekend of October 24-26, they are calling upon local faith communities to provide information about domestic violence and bring messages of hope to victims. I urge your parish to participate and consider an ongoing ministry to aid victims of domestic violence.



Knights of Columbus Welcomes Archbishop Broglio





Closing thoughts, Father Joe? "We had our multi-generational, multi-cultural choirs, children cantered, the Knights of Columbus were there. 




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Stop In For Prayers One Day!

Parents head to the lobby where they see each class off for the day, and Mr. Long and Mrs. McGann wish each student a "Good Morning" or "Have a good day!" as they leave. Parents, students, and teachers leave the gym with full hearts, clear minds, and smiles to last us through the day.

Eric Sillers – Linking Present to Past

ne of the first things a parishioner at Silver Spring's St. John the Evangelist might have noticed, when Eric Sillers became Director of Liturgical Music in April of this year, was more Latin hymns.

"The new translation brings us closer to the Latin rite," he explains, "and we have more knowledge of the past available to us than any people who ever lived. I'm grateful that my parish role allows me to share our musical heritage and the way contemporary work builds on it."

Sillers grew up in a home full of all kinds of music. He attended St. Joseph's parochial school in Beltsville, DeMatha Catholic High School, and then Shenandoah Conservatory in Winchester, VA. From grade school on he sang in choirs, performed in community theatre groups, and even made several European choir tours.

He loves old music, his young family, his friends, acting, home improvement, opera conducting, the occasional video game□and yes, new music too. Before coming to St. John's he directed choirs in three parishes and worked with many other groups and congregations. In 2012 he was a founding member of Third Practice, a professional chamber vocal ensemble that seeks to bring the beauty of the human voice to new and broader audiences.

His plans for St. John's? "We can start with doubling the choir. This parish has lots of talented musicians, and they've had good pedagogy from my predecessors. I hope that more will come out of the woodwork and some who have been part of the choir in the past will come back. Instrumental talent is also welcome. We have some cool things coming up!"

Short-term plans include two requiems November 2 and 4 and First Vespers on December 7, the eve of the Feast of the Immaculate Conception. Through the holiday season, as on any given Sunday, parishioners will experience a welcoming mix of familiar tunes from the hymnal and others that are not yet familiar.

"I'm still a little scared," Sillers

admits. "There's so much I don't know. I'll listen to suggestions, base programs on the talent available, and try not to get too ambitious too fast. But maybe, definitely, a children's choir for the feasts. A praise band. A flute ensemble ... I look forward to working with an active liturgy committee and being guided by the liturgy. To see parishioners come together to make music in the service of the Lord, and do it well, is always one my greatest joys."

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
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

St. John the Baptist's New Principal Reflects on his First Month at SJB

ith the first month of the school year complete, new Principal Brian Blomquist shared his impressions on his new and exciting role. Here are some highlights from the interview:

"The first month of school has been a little different than I expect-

I remind myself that I am still learning about how things are done at St. John's. Sometimes, when the pace picks up, I may get a bit ahead of myself. We had a meeting for new parents, and when I tried to answer one parent's question, one of the teachers very politely corrected me.

"The teachers have been extremely supportive."

The more I see them, the more I am impressed with our teachers. They are unusually collaborative and motivated. I listen and support them in small ways. We streamlined our dismissal procedures so teachers are finished watching students 10 minutes earlier. We did that because the teachers' school day starts 20 minutes earlier this year!

"School days rarely go the way you expect them to."

There is always a chance something unexpected will happen - a surprise visit by the health inspector, a student sent to see me, or a concerned parent needing attention.

"The students are always the best part of the job."

As they learn, they may make mistakes. When one student was sent to see me, I found out he had been to the dentist that morning and he'd scraped his knee at lunch. I told him with confidence that his day would improve. They get so excited when they see me arriving or leaving on my motorcycle! I'm the only male teacher at the school, so that alone changes the environment a little.

"The families at St. John the Baptist have been great."

I wanted everyone, especially the students, to feel comfortable from the very first day. I brought the students to the gym to pray together on the first morning. Usually, prayer is read over the loudspeaker, but I wanted the kids to see who I was on that very first day.

On Back to School night we had a fair for parents and volunteers. Parents were free to walk around, talk with each other, and learn about assorted school organizations. The fair was held outside on a beautiful night. It was well attended and a big success."

We're so very grateful to Mr. Blomquist for his strong dedication to our students and to our school.



their home countries. The screening was followed by a discussion about the thousands of immigrant children now in the Washington area seeking family or asylum and the services available to help them and their families. The screening was a joint undertaking of both St. Bartholomew Parish and Catholic Charities. The film was produced by Ginger Wolf, a long-time St. Bart's parishioner with over 25 years of film-making experience. It had its origins in 2007 when Mrs. Wolf took a Catholic Relief Services trip through Central America, which made her aware of the terrible poverty in that region and especially the dire straits of migrants. She wanted to make the film "to try to make people aware of the circumstances of these people." She did not intend a political statement, "just connecting people face-to-face." The idea to show the film at St. Bart's began with a conversation between Ginger Wolf and fellow St. Bart's parishioner Mary Yerrick, who agreed to help and took a lead role in organizing the screening.

Father Mark Knestout, Pastor of St. Bartholomew Parish, told OPT, "We were very excited to host this film, in conjunction with Catholic Charities." He noted that Pope Francis has warned against the "globalization of indifference." Father Knestout observed, "It's a trap Christians must try not to fall into and this film makes us aware of this issue. The children coming here, fleeing violence, are right here, not somewhere else. Our hearts have to be open to them. At St. Bart's, our question was, 'What can we do to raise awareness of the problems facing these children and their families?"

Msgr. John Enzler, President of Catholic Charities and resident at St. Bart's, commented, "The film is really a poignant, beautiful depiction of the struggle of these young people and their families." Msgr. Enzler told OPT, "The film brings to focus just how harrowing it must be to flee violence and poverty and head to a foreign land on a very dangerous journey. Catholic Charities has long served young people seeking safety from other countries through our Immigration Legal Services program, as well as through some of our medical and dental clinics and other general help. Now, we are excited to be part of an expanding response from the local Catholic community to simply say, 'What do you need child?""



Archdiocese of Washington's 75th Anniversary Celebration

ardinal Donald Wuerl, archbishop of Washington, celebrated a special Mass for the 75th anniversary of the Archdiocese of Washington at the Cathedral of St. Matthew the Apostle - the Mother Church of the archdiocese - on September 21. In his homily, the Cardinal talked about the Masses he celebrated earlier this year on St. Clement's Island where the first Catholic Mass in the English speaking colonies was celebrated in 1634 and at the reconstructed Brick Chapel in St. Mary's City. The two Masses at the historic sites in Southern Maryland serve as powerful reminders of the area's legacy as the birthplace of religious freedom in the United States.

The Cardinal also referenced another significant milestone on our archdiocesan pilgrimage of faith. "In 1789 the first bishop for the Catholics in the English speaking colonies was selected. The designation of Bishop John Carroll as first Bishop of Baltimore took place in Sacred Heart Chapel – now a part of Sacred Heart Parish in Bowie, Maryland – a part of this archdiocese," he said. "Earlier in the spring we commemorated that event that took place 225 years ago because it became a cornerstone of the hierarchy for the United States. In a sense, the Catholic Church in the United States had come of age."

While only 75 years since the establishment of the archdiocese, "it is equally and fully a part of this grand march of faith that manifests God's kingdom now and someday will glory in its fullness in the eternal realm of heaven," said the Cardinal. But he also acknowledged that the 75th anniversary cel-


ebration was not confined to looking back on history.

"This anniversary year gives us opportunity to look forward as we renew our mission and ministry. We are committed to being the heralds of the New Evangelization and the agents of a new Pentecost," he said.

Celebration of the Archdiocese of Washington's 75th anniversary began in January when Cardinal Wuerl presented the Manifesting the Kingdom award to 204 individuals who exemplify the New Evangelization from parishes and Catholic organizations across the archdiocese. Additionally the Archdiocese of Washington published *Catholic Impact 2014*, which chronicles the local church's rich history of serving those in need in the Washington area, in celebration of the archdiocese's 75th anniversary.

'No touch' rules in Africa after Ebola


ver the years, I have been blessed with the privilege to visit and accompany Caritas and other Catholic Church-inspired organizations in Africa as they responded to the epidemic of HIV and AIDS. I always received warm greetings of welcome and warm handshakes even when people were traumatized by the massive loss of life that resulted from AIDS.

On my present visit to Liberia, however, I found a "different Africa." From the moment that our plane touched down at the Monrovia airport, we were confronted with buckets of bleach water with which

to wash our hands and with people armed with "gun thermometers" to take our temperatures before we could even step into the terminal building.

Perhaps the most striking difference from my other visits to Africa was found in the "no touch" policy. Africans usually are warm and physical in expressing welcome - they usually offer hearty handshakes. Now, in the Ebolaaffected countries, everyone seems uncomfortable as a result of the need to avoid physical contact in



California Bishops File Federal **Complaint against State**

Agency Accused of Serious Civil Rights Violations

he California Catholic Conference has filed a complaint with the Office of Civil Rights at the US Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) citing federal civil rights violations by the California Department of Managed Health Care (DMHC) resulting in Catholic institutions and others being forced required to purchase health insurance covering all forms of voluntary direct abortion, including lateterm and gender selection.

The HHS Office of Civil Rights has jurisdiction in this matter because of a federal law known as the "Weldon Amendment" that was enacted to protect the conscience rights of individuals and institutions. In this case, the Office of Civil Rights can cut-off California's access to federal funds unless or until it stops its discriminatory practices.

The complaint was filed because of an administrative directive issued on August 22, 2014 by DMHC to the heads of eight different health insurance plans (Aetna, Anthem/Blue Cross, Blue Shield of California, GEM Care, Health Net, Kaiser Permanente and United Health Care) ordering them to amend their current health plans and remove any coverage or exclusions regarding voluntary abortions on the basis that abortion for any reason was 'basic health care" and could not be excluded.

"This is a coercive and discriminatory action by the State of California," said Bishop Robert McElroy, auxiliary bishop of the Archdiocese of San Francisco and chair of the Institutional Concerns Committee of the California Catholic Conference. "This demand by the State was directly targeted at Catholic institutions like Santa Clara University, Loyola Marymount University, along with other California employers and citizens. It is a flagrant violation of their civil rights and deepest moral convictions, and is government coercion of the worst kind.

"Catholic beliefs about life and human dignity animate and shape our Catholic ministries," said McElroy. "It's why we oppose abortion, but it is also why Catholic schools provide education, Catholic hospitals care for the poor and vulnerable and why Catholic social services provide assistance to people and families in need. It goes to the core of our moral beliefs. "





Mary of Nazareth Gets Soaked to Support the Schaefer Family

hree and a half years ago, my sister asked my opinion about changing schools, in particular, whether to attend Mary of Nazareth School. I remember saying, "...the community - that's the real reason we've have been at Mary of Nazareth for over ten years - you will never experience anything like it."

My words were personified in spectacular fashion last month, when our entire school community came out in support of my sister, her husband and their beautiful family, to take the ALS Ice Bucket Challenge.

Just three months after the Schaefers joined their cousins and arrived at Mary of Nazareth School, Tom Schaefer, my brother-in-law, received a devastating medical diagnosis - Amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS). ALS is a progressive disease that affects the neurons in the brain and spinal cord which control muscle movement. It affects mobility, eating, speaking and breathing. ALS strikes randomly with no regard to race, gender or economic condition. With no treatment or cure, Tom, Ursula and their three young children face an overwhelming challenge to Tom's health and the normal life of their family.

When the ALS Ice Bucket Challenge steadily gained momentum this summer, our family was particularly delighted and took part whole-heartedly. This was the first time in the history of ALS that so much awareness and money was being raised at one time. It could become a real game changer in the fight to strike out ALS.

Over the summer, as the unique

fundraiser took over social media, many more participated. Mary of Nazareth School's principal, Mike Friel, was challenged by his friends and my son, Nicholas (6th grade), challenged our gym teacher, Adrian McDonald, to the icy bucket. Soon a creative plan was hatched by Mr. Friel to put the love and respect we felt for the Schaefer's into action right at school.

With the help of many parent volunteers, we would support the Schaefer's both in spirit and in practice - to bring awareness to the disease and funding for ALS research, but most importantly to show our solidarity to one of our own Mary of Nazareth family members.

With Tom and Ursula's agreement, Mr. Friel set out to make it happen. On Friday, August 29, when Ursula brought Tom to school in his motorized wheelchair, they saw a sea of red on the side soccer field. There, over 500 of our students were standing en masse, holding a red or black cup of ice water and getting set for some fun and a great cause.

At Mr. Friel's direction and after a brief rendition of "Ice Ice Baby" by the Schaefer kids (Carson, 7th; Andrew, 5th; and Kate, 2nd), we were ready to go. What followed was a class-by-class ice water dumping accompanied by screams and squeals that filled the air.

Tom, with Ursula by his side, watched from atop the field, and smiled and laughed with parents and staff who stood by cheering and clapping. The *grand finale* was performed by Carson, Andrew and Kate, as they happily dumped a huge cooler of icy water over their principal and gym teacher - to the uproarious applause of all the students!

Finally, our wet students made their way back to their classrooms for dismissal, stopping on their way to visit Tom and Ursula – to share a hug, a flower, a good wish, a touch, a prayer - the simple and genuine gifts from children learning to give of themselves in support of another. "We are fighting with you" are words from a student that keep replaying in my ears. Needless to say, there weren't many dry eyes left among parents, faculty and staff that morning.

Each school day, our children learn about their Catholic identity and share their faith. On this day, they were able to embrace that knowledge to step outside themselves to help another; to stand in friendship with a classmate; and, ultimately to offer hope and love to a family in our community. This is why we send our children to Mary of Nazareth school - "you will never experience anything like it!"

The Mary of Nazareth Ice Bucket Challenge raised over \$1100 for ALS research at the Pope John Paul II Institute. Well done, everyone!

he worldwide 40 Days for Life campaign began Wednesday, September 24, on the public sidewalk on Wisteria Drive in front of late-term abortionist LeRoy Carhart's offices in Germantown. The Germantown Vigil is being held in front of Germantown Reproductive Health Services located at 13233 Executive Park Terrace from 6 a.m. until 12 a.m. every day until Sunday, November 2.

40 Days for Life is a peaceful pro-life effort that has been embraced by more than 625,000 volunteers in 539 cities across 24 nations. People in hundreds of cities are participating in this lifesaving campaign which is based on the three components of prayer and fasting, community outreach, and a peaceful prayer-filled vigil. Along with God's help, these campaigns have achieved proven results of 8,973 babies saved from abortion, 101 abortion worker conversions, and 56 closed abortion centers. Mother Seton's designated prayer days are Sat. and Sun., Oct. 11 and Oct. 12. A midpoint rally will be held on Sun., Oct. 12, at 3 p.m. in Mother Seton's Parish Center. A talk will be presented entitled, "How to Defend the Pro-Life Position" by a speaker from the Life Training Institute.

LeRoy Carhart is one of four abortionists in the United States who conduct abortions throughout the 9th month of pregnancy. The others are: California abortionists Shelley Sella and Susan Robinson, who work at Southwestern Women's options in Albuquerque, N.M., and Boulder, Colorado's Warren Hern, who runs the Boulder Abortion Clinic. Carhart usually arrives in Germantown on Sunday and performs 4-day, 3-day, 2-day, and oneday abortions. He usually flies out on Wednesday to Nebraska where he has another office. An ambulance has been called to his office in Germantown eight times for a medical emergency for which Carhart has been responsible since March 2012. The patients were transported to a nearby hospital where Carhart doesn't have any privileges. About two years ago, Jennifer Morbelli died at Shady Grove Hospital from complications stemming from Carhart's botched late-term abortion. or email: mbpmail@rcn.com. Or go to their website, find the time of their next meeting, and afterward, try to speak with one of the physicians on their way out. Try to explain the situation with Carhart in Germantown.

Across the parking lot from Carhart's office are the offices of Germantown Pregnancy Choices. Volunteers there monitor the activity of abortion patients who are interviewed by sidewalk pro-life counselors. GPC keeps track statistically each week of how many

women come for abortions, what state they're from, what kind of abortion they're having, and the outcome. Recently Janet Kotowski, GPC volunteer, reported that a woman arrived for an abortion last May, talked with GPC volunteers and was taken to a nearby pregnancy center. This woman talked with her family and was told to come home so they could take care of her and help raise the baby. She flew home in June. Her son, Jimmy Alexander, was born in mid-September. GPC works with local pregnancy centers in helping the mother find the resources she needs to give birth to her child, and to make sure she is on her feet spiritually, physically and financially. GPC offers their services through the work of dedicated volunteers. They are in need of volunteer office staff as well as other areas of support including prayer warriors. In addition, a confidential small group Bible study is being offered for post-abortion women for nine weeks on Tuesday evenings from 7:30 to 9 p.m. in a private home in Gaithersburg. On Fri., Sept. 19, Mother Seton Parish hosted Eric Scheilder, Director of Pro-Life Action league Revert, sponsored by DEFEND LIFE. He presented a talk entitled, "Kicking Out Carhart", in which he said over 3,000 abortions are performed per day in the United States. He told a story about the ongoing battle his town of Aurora, Il., has had with Planned Parenthood, the largest abortion chain in our country, and their efforts to shut them down. He said the best thing people can do is "offer the gift of our prayers for these children who are dying before being born. Prayer and mourning for these babies is action that we all can take." Cathy Roth, one of the organizers of the event, said, "This is our Calvary, and we should join ourselves to the Cross." 

Synod of Bishops on the Family Now Meeting in Rome

ope Francis presided at the celebration of Holy Mass in the Vatican Basilica on the occasion of the opening of the Third Extraordinary General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops on the theme: The pastoral challenges to the family in the context of evangelization.

After the proclamation of the Gospel, the Pope delivered the following homily:

Today the prophet Isaiah and the Gospel employ the image of the Lord's vineyard. The Lord's vine-

yard is his "dream", the plan which he nurtures with all his love, like a farmer who cares for his vineyard. Vines are plants which need much care!

God's "dream" is his people. He planted it and nurtured it with patient and faithful love, so that it can become a holy people, a people which brings forth abundant fruits of justice.

But in both the ancient prophecy and in Jesus' parable, God's dream is thwarted. Isaiah says that the vine

which he so loved and nurtured has yielded "wild grapes" (5:2,4); God "expected justice but saw bloodshed, righteousness, but only a cry of distress" (v. 7). In the Gospel, it is the farmers themselves who ruin the Lord's plan: they fail to do their job but think only of their own

In Jesus' parable, he is addressing the chief priests and the elders of the people, in other words the "experts", the managers. To them in a particular way God entrusted his "dream", his people, for them to nurture, tend and protect from the animals of the field. This is the job of leaders: to nuture the vineyard with freedom, creativity and hard

But Jesus tells us that those farmers took over the vineyard. Out of greed and pride they want to do with it as they will, and so they prevent God from realizing his dream for the people he has chosen.

The temptation to greed is ever

present. We encounter it also in the great prophecy of Ezekiel on the shepherds (cf. ch. 34), which Saint Augustine commented upon in one his celebrated sermons which we have just reread in the Liturgy of the Hours. Greed for money and power. And to satisfy this greed, evil pastors lay intolerable burdens on the shoulders of others, which they themselves do not lift a finger to move (cf. Mt 23:4)

We too, in the Synod of Bishops, are called to work for the Lord's vineyard. Synod Assemblies are not meant to discuss beautiful and clever ideas, or to see who is more intelligent... They are meant to better nurture and tend the Lord's vineyard, to help realize his dream, his loving plan for his people. In this case the Lord is asking us to care for the family, which has been from the beginning an integral part of his loving plan for humanity.

We too can be tempted to "take over" the vineyard, because of that greed which is always present in us human beings. God's dream always clashes with the hypocrisy of some of his servants. We can "thwart" God's dream if we fail to let ourselves be guided by the Holy Spirit. The Spirit gives us that wisdom which surpasses knowledge, and enables us to work generously with authentic freedom and humble cre-

My brothers, to do a good job of nurturing and tending the vineyard, our hearts and our minds must be kept in Jesus Christ, as Saint Paul says, by "the peace of God which passes all understanding" (Phil 4:7). In this way our thoughts and plans will correspond to God's dream: to form a holy people who are his own and produce the fruits of the kingdom of God (cf. Mt21:43).

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Archdiocese of Washington Challenges HHS Mandate

Supplemental Brief Filed in Case

he Archdiocese of Washington filed a supplemental brief with the United States Court of Appeals for the D.C. Circuit on September 16 addressing the revised HHS mandate regulations issued by the government last month. This brief is the latest step in the ongoing case filed by the archdiocese and its co-appellants challenging the HHS mandate.

The new regulations continue to artificially divide the Church into two separate spheres and deny a full religious exemption to those parts of the Church that extend their ministries into the charitable and educational realms. Rather than extending to religious schools, health care institutions and social service ministries the kind of timehonored religious exemption they have historically received, the regulations would only modify the "accommodation," which continues to require the archdiocese and its affiliates to act in violation of their religious beliefs.

In addition, the Archdiocese of Washington echoes the concern of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops that the proposed extension of the "accommodation" to the closely held forprofit employers that were wholly exempted by the Supreme Court's

decision earlier this year in the case of Burwell v. Hobby Lobby Stores, Inc. would effectively reduce, rather than expand, the scope of religious freedom.

At this time, the injunction issued by the U.S. District Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia in the ongoing case, Roman Catholic Archbishop of Washington, et al. v. Burwell, remains in place and prohibits the government from enforcing the HHS mandate's objectionable requirements against the archdiocese and its co-appellants pending further order from the court.

Throughout the year Ms. Bentley also works with the school choir, comprised of students in Grades Three through Eight, to lead the singing at school masses,

and to prepare for two concerts in the winter and spring.

Band Director, Doug Harvey has been working with Holy Cross students for 11 years. His talent and guidance introduces new musicians to band and hones the skills of our more seasoned players. The Holy Cross Prep Band is for students new to playing their instruments, with the Concert Band geared to our more seasoned players. Students practice in small groups with Mr. Harvey, as well as in full group rehearsals to learn the dynamics of group performance. The Holy Cross Band is consistently awarded a trophy for "Excellence" in the annual Archdiocesan Band completion hosted by St. John's College High

School. Many Holy Cross students are invited to play in the Honors Band, and also go on to play in high school and college bands. Mr. Harvey said that it is a "rewarding experience to work with such an enthusiastic and talented group of students" each year.

Last year, Ms. Bentley, Mr. Harvey and art teacher Ms. Marcus organized the first annual spring Arts Night featuring performances by the choirs and the bands, as well as a wonderful display of artwork by the students. "It was great to show off all of the talent we have here at Holy Cross School," Ms. Bentley noted. It was a memorable evening, and one that is much anticipated this spring.

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order to prevent further spread of this virus. On our way into the city, Sr. Barbara Brillant, a Franciscan Missionary of Mary, who is serving as my host, rolled down the window of the car to reprimand a young man and a young woman who were holding hands while walking on the street and she reminded this couple that they should not be "touching"!

International aid needed

The Ebola situation in the country is very grave. Many hospitals and clinics are closed, so it is very difficult to get medical treatment for other diseases. Some people die in the streets looking for medical treatment for infection or for a whole host of other diseases. Schools and many government offices are closed. This means that families do not have enough income to provide food and other necessities. Health workers — doctors, nurses, and others —are afraid to go back to work.

But also the socio-economic impact is very dire. This is a country that just emerged from years of conflict and war and now must deal with the "war" on Ebola. In the communities in which quarantine has been imposed in order to eliminate the risk of further spread of infection, people do not have access to food, clean water, and other necessities.

There is a general sense of psychological trauma and anger among the people; several people shared with me their fear that social unrest and conflicts will soon begin again.

How can the international community be of help? There still is much fear and denial among the general population, so funding is needed in order to organize community-based education in order to encourage people to seek treatment if they are showing the signs of fever or other symptoms. Better understanding of the need for quarantine of suspected patients must be provided in the communities. Financial and technical support for such activities already has been requested by Caritas Liberia and by the diocesan Caritas structures.

The health care infrastructure in the country has been weak for many years and the present epidemic has brought it to the breaking point. Additional units to diagnose and treat Ebola patients are desperately needed in several parts of the country and especially in Monrovia. I heard stories of patients who go in taxis in order to seek treatment – all without success.

An oath to serve the sick

The Catholic Hospital of Saint Joseph, in Monrovia, was considered the best health facility in the country, but it was closed after the director and eight other staff members died of Ebola. Today I walked

the halls of the closed hospital together with one of the surgeons there that became infected with the virus but now has recovered from the illness. He sadly showed me the rooms where his colleagues, including Brother Patrick Nshamdze, director of the hospital, had died.

Community

Not only these the medical missionaries, but also the local staff with whom they worked, gave their lives because they were committed to the medical oath of serving all sick people and of upholding the dignity of the human person from conception to natural death. For them the practice of medicine was not a "business"; it was a vocation. They come from a long line of holy persons, literally a "communion of saints", who express their belief in Jesus' gospel by serving others and even giving their lives out of love for their most needy neighbors.


The Brothers of St. John of God want to re-open the hospital but they need financial help to do so - they also will need to organize an Ebola screening unit in order to prevent any repeat of spread of infection within the hospital. They want to walk in the footsteps of their brothers and sisters in religious life who walked before them in service to the sick in Liberia, but they need the help of the international community, and especially of the Caritas confederation and of the entire Universal Catholic Church, in order to do so.

Father Benedict Groeschel Dies at 81

Well known author and speaker Father Benedict Groeschel, a Franciscan Friar of the Renewal, died Friday evening, the vigil of St. Francis.


amed author, speaker, psychologist, and spiritual director, Father Benedict Joseph (Robert Peter) Groeschel, CFR, 81, died at St. Joseph's Home in Totowa, New Jersey on October

His first priestly assignment, that of interim Catholic Chaplain at Children's Village in Dobbs Ferry, New York, a residential facility for troubled children, was a post he expected to occupy only for a few months. However, he stayed at Children's Village for 14 years, working with hundreds of troubled youths, quite a few of whom remained his friends

for decades. He often described his years at Children's Village as "the happiest time of my life," and in many ways that period set the tone for the rest of his life, prompting him to begin graduate study in

psychology to better serve the children in his care. After earning a master's degree from Iona College in 1964 and a doctorate from Teacher's College, Columbia University in 1970, he began lifelong work as a counselor who always endeavored to unite effective psychological methods with true Christian compassion and a vibrant spirituality.

In 1973 at the request of Terence Cardinal Cooke, Father Groeschel left Children's Village to become the founding director of Trinity Retreat in Larchmont, New York, a retreat house primarily for Catholic clergy and religious. During his forty years there, he became known throughout the Catholic world for the depth of the spiritual and psychological direction he offered, as well as for the extent of his caring for all who came to him for help. During this period he was urged by colleagues and friends to try his hand as a writer, and so he began work on a manuscript that he called Spiritual Passages. Published by Crossroads in 1983, Spiritual Passages is still in print and has been read by people the world over. Known for his inexhaustible energy, Father Groeschel continued writing throughout the rest of his life, becoming popular among Catholic and non-Catholic readers alike. OPT

The Maryland Senior Olympics is a 501(c)3 non-profit organization for proactive residents aged 50 and above. Since 1980, the Maryland games have provided great competition and camaraderie for mature

Camaraderie is just as important as competition at the Maryland Senior Olympics. Each year, MSO offers around 100 events through two dozen sports in age groups of 50-54, 55-59, 60-64 and so forth. But you don't have to be a world-class athlete to compete in the Maryland Senior Olympics – far from it. MSO's motto is, "To Participate Is to Win!" Many MSO athletes compete just for the fellowship and friendships. Others compete because of the personal challenge. And yes, some athletes compete because they are still competitive even in their advancing years.

The Senior Connection

he Senior Connection, a small non-profit, is celebrating 20 years of providing free and reliable services to older residents of Montgomery County, Maryland.

Escorted transportation to medical appointments is the most requested Senior Connection activity. In December 2010, The Senior Connection added The Montgomery County Shoppers Program to its list of offerings. Volunteers either escort the senior to the store or go for them and help with putting the groceries away upon returning. This program serves low income seniors, ages 60 and older, using the same volunteer model as our original program. To qualify, seniors must prove they are below 250% the poverty line (\$28,725 individual or \$38,775 for a couple) and have no other means of getting groceries.

The newest Senior Connection service is the Bill Payer Program, which coordinates volunteers willing to provide individual hands-on help to seniors who are no longer able to navigate their monthly bill paying obligations. The services are provided free of charge and operate in the same manner that professional Daily Money Managers help seniors. This program is offered in partnership with the AARP Foundation's Money Manager Program, and in cooperation with the American Association of Daily Money Managers (AADMM). To qualify, seniors must prove that their income does not exceed \$45,100 per year individually, or \$51,500 per year as a couple. The asset limits are equal to the yearly income limit. Assets include: cash, deposit accounts (savings, checking, CDs), stocks and bonds. Assets do NOT include: retirement accounts, life insurance policies, automobiles and primary residence. With this program, seniors stay in control of their own finances, yet enjoy the help of a volunteer to help with writing monthly checks, managing paperwork and filing, and ensuring safeguards against fraud and identity theft.

New NIH research awards to address multiple chronic conditions

hree new research awards

totaling up to \$19.4 million over 5 years – will address the growing proportion of the U.S. population that has multiple chronic medical conditions. The grants are funded through the National Institutes of Health's (NIH) Health Care Systems (HCS) Research Collaboratory, which engages health care systems as research partners in conducting large-scale clinical studies.

It is estimated that 3 in 4 adults over age 65 and 1 in 15 children suffer from two or more chronic medical conditions—such as diabetes mellitus, chronic kidney disease, hypertension, and chronic pain. As patients develop more chronic conditions, they are likely to use more health care services and suffer negative outcomes such as unnecessary hospitalizations, adverse drug reactions, declining functional status, and mortality. These growing problems emphasize the need for more research to improve health outcomes of patients with multiple chronic conditions.

The projects are:

■ PROVEN: This trial will evaluate video education as a tool for decision-making for the patient, family, and health care team about advanced care planning in nursing homes, where residents typically have multiple chronic conditions. The videos will be tested to see how they help patients and staff address difficult decisions about resuscitation, use of ventilators in the last stages of



illness, and similar important care issues. This project will be primarily overseen by the National Institute on Aging.


- Improving Chronic Disease Management with PIECES: This trial will implement a collaborative model between primary and subspecialty care, enhanced with a medical information tool called PIECES, in patients with multiple chronic conditions (diabetes mellitus, chronic kidney disease, and hypertension). This project will be primarily overseen by the National Institute of Diabetes and Digestive and Kidney Diseases.
- U.S. Trauma Care System Pragmatic Trial for PTSD and



Comorbidity: This trial focuses on patients who are being treated for acute physical injuries and who also have conditions such post-traumatic stress disorder, alcohol and drug use problems, depression, chronic pain, and other medical conditions. This project will be primarily overseen by the National Institute of Mental

The overall goal of the HCS Research Collaboratory is to strengthen the national capacity to implement cost-effective, largescale research studies that engage health care delivery organizations as research partners. The aim of the program is to provide a framework of implementation methods and best practices that will enable the participation of many health care systems in clinical research, not to support a defined health care research network. Research conducted in partnership with health care systems is essential to strengthen the relevance of research results to health practice.
