n December 3, the thirty-nine girls of Brookewood's lower school boarded three vans for an early Christmas treat - a docentled visit to the West Wing of the National Gallery of Art to explore the magic and mystery of "The Christmas Story" in art.

Divided into three separate tour groups by grades, the students primarily studied nativity-themed paintings of the Medieval and Renaissance collections located on the first floor of the gallery, just off the Rotunda (itself festive with massed poinsettias). The annunciation also proved to be a popular subject for the great masters.

Catherine Seibert, lead docent, noted that her office tailors tours for specific age groups and frequently prepares drawing materials, handouts, etc. in advance. "Tours are student-centered and inquiry-based rather than lecture-based...which is to say that we won't be giving art history lectures!", she explained. The students visited four galleries and engaged in activities such as careful-looking exercises. Students also were encouraged to ask questions.

While the Brookewoodtonians absorbed the many artistic interpretations of the birth and early life of the Christ Child, they themselves were leaving quite an impression on their learned docents.

In a follow-up email to the visit's coordinator, Margaret Killackey, Ms. Seibert said that during the docent debriefing after the tour the three guides "looked at each other and said, 'Wow!'" The docent of the first and second grade tour said it best with her summary: "I almost didn't need to be there!" Ms. Seibert went on to write that "it may not sound like a compliment - but it's actually the ultimate compliment because it underscores how engaged and well-prepared" even the youngest of the Brookewood students were.

She concluded by expressing her wish to see more Brookewood students in the months ahead. A wish with which the young women of Brookewood hardily concur. **OPT**

he Justice and Advocacy Council (J&A Council) is taking some time to develop personal contacts with the new Montgomery County Council members and with the new County Executive. The 2018 general election resulted in the election of three new at-large Council members and a new executive. In the next months, we will meet with them

and introduce ourselves and our work to the ones we don't know.

#### **Subsidiarity at work.**

The work of the J&A Council is an example of subsidiarity, one of the principles of Catholic social teaching. Subsidiarity reflects the Catholic understanding that many functions of the body politic are better understood and solved by those people and agencies closer to

the concern at hand than by those higher up and further from them.


Subsidiarity comes from the Latin word *subsidium*, which means "aid' or "assistance." It is based on the belief that the greater or higher powers should defer to the lower powers so that people and society are not overwhelmed by big government, big companies, or big banks. It reflects the belief that the

## **Three Simple Things Novena Prayer**

n early November, St. Elizabeth sent 595 letters to the Papal Nuncio, Archbishop Christoph Pierre, asking for three simple things: truth, accountability, and transparency in response to the Catholic abuse scandals of 2018. On December 12, St. Elizabeth received a response to the letters from Archbishop Pierre. The Papal Nuncio's letter was marked "personal and confidential," so it is appropriate to summarize its main points. The letter was respectful, gracious, and explicitly asked the Pastor to convey to you Archbishop Pierre's acknowledgment and thanks for our letters. He went on to make two primary points:

- 1. Pope Francis shares our concern for the principles of truth, accountability, and transparency.
  - 2. These principles must be



applied not only in the United States but also in the universal Church, and to this end, Pope Francis has called the February 2019 meeting.

This second point reflects the Holy See's consistent message about the scandals since the November USCCB meeting: wait until February.

And so, we wait. However, as recommended by our Parish Pastoral Council at its December 3rd meeting, while we wait we will also pray as a parish in a very particular way.

#### **A Novena of Sundays**

Starting on the Feast of the Holy Family, Sunday, December 30, and continuing through Sunday, February 24, the last day of the worldwide meeting in Rome to address the abuse scandals, we will conclude our petitions at Masses with a prayer for three simple things at this meeting: truth, accountability, and transparency.

#### St. Martin Parish's New Administrator

hen the phone call came from the Archdiocese, little did Father Dave Wells know that he would be moving to his fifth parish in eight years.

"I thought 'Wow,' not expecting this," said Father Wells, the new parish administrator at St. Martin of Tours. "St. Martin's is a big parish with so many ministries and it's a big responsibility."

Father Wells was called after Father Richard Gancayco needed to take medical leave in December. St. Martin's is Father Well's first parish serving as a Parish Administer where he has all the same responsibilities and duties as a pastor.

Although jumping into a new parish midyear and learning all the administrative duties of a large parish is challenging, Father is very excited to serve the Spanish, English and French communities and facilitate the unity of the parish. He is also looking forward to working with the school and meeting the students.

"I love being around the school that I hope to be involved and engaged in," said Father Wells. "The school adds a whole dimension of life and vitality."

As a young priest he has a heart for the youth and young adults of the parish. He hopes he can reach out to them and show them Christ primarily through the sacraments and preaching the Gospel. St. Martin's has already given him opportunities with the school and the youth. In the first month alone Father was busy not only with the Advent and Christmas liturgies but he also had three days of hearing First Confessions, preaching at the Posadas, and visiting with families who come to the pantry.

Father Wells, who is the 6th of 8 children, first felt the call to the vocation of priesthood when he was in his Junior Year of high school at DeMatha. This was around the same time his uncle, Monsignor Wells, was tragically killed. In his senior year at University of Maryland, he knew God was calling him to be a priest. With the guidance of Father Bill Byrne and Bishop Dorsenville, Father Wells entered the seminary at Mount St. Mary's in Emmitsburg, Maryland in 2004. He was ordained on June 19, 2010, on the same day he was baptized.

Previously, Father Wells served at Immaculate Heart of Mary in Lexington Park, MD; Immaculate Conception in Mechanicsville, MD; St. John Neumann in Gaithersburg; and St. Raphael's, in Rockville.







## **The Woods Academy Receives** another Ten-Year Accreditation

n December, Head of School Joe Powers received notice that the Association of Independent Maryland and DC Schools (AIMS) Board of Trustees voted unanimously to accredit The Woods Academy for another ten-year period. This was the final piece of a nearly twoyear long process. The accreditation process includes three parts: a comprehensive and inclusive written self-study by the school; a threeday in-depth visit by a team of outside peer educators who provide a written report to the school; and a school Action Plan that replies to the recommendations made by the visiting team.

According to the Association, "Accreditation by AIMS signifies a school's compliance with association standards and its commitment to continuously strengthen educational programs and teaching - all for the



benefit of students, who are not only at the heart of each school's mission and community, but also central to AIMS accreditation."

The Woods Academy Montessori Preschool is also a fully accredited member of American Montessori Society (AMS). AMS accreditation is a designation that a program meets a well-defined standard of excellence. The Woods is one of only eight schools in the state of Maryland with this designation.

## **The Woods Sister School**

Since 2012, The Woods family - students, teachers, administrators, and parents - has joined hands with the Nyumbani Village community in Kitui, Kenya. This bond between the communities has included three Woods teachers and two Woods students visiting Kenya, several visitors from Kenya coming to The Woods, and an on-going Sister School Exchange Program between The Woods Academy and Hotcourses Primary located at Nyumbani Village as well as many gifts and donations flowing back and forth.

Justus Mwaka Musia from Hotcourses Primary visited all classes at The Woods in early December. He joined the Montessori Preschool students for PE, greeted students in the hallways, and taught lessons in some of the classes he visited. He focused on teaching about Kenyan Culture and the lives of our Sister School students at Hotcourses Primary in Nyumbani Village. This was his fourth visit to The Woods and students of all ages adore him!

In early November, the fourthgrade teachers Mrs. Megan Mullally and Ms. Nancy Talbot, both of whom have visited Nyumbani, issued a challenge to their students! Their goal was to collect enough backpacks for an entire grade of students at our sister school so that the students would have new bags for the new school year that begins in January. They started by collecting money to buy backpacks. Then,

In this case, that means 60 backpacks!

To continue in the spirit of giving, the fourth grade had a present wrapping party at the beginning of December. They dedicated the efforts of the party to help others who are less fortunate. The children were engaged in a clothing collection for the kids at Nyumbani. Each student brought t-shirts and underwear. The students wrapped the items with great care and Justus

delivered each present to an orphan at Nyumbani Children's Home.

Our Montessori preschool students as well as the students in grades one, two, and three participated in the season of giving for our friends in Nyumbani as well. They prepared even more backpacks and collected various school supplies for the students at Hotcourses Primary.

Head of School Joe Powers remarks, "...our two communities benefit from this partnership. Thank you to all. Woods teachers and our friends at Nyumbani and Hotcourses, for making this work so well for all the kids."





us to access email, Peapod, dog walkers, personal trainers, house cleaners and decorators all provide us with more time to do the important things in life, right? Wrong. The preoccupation with the "easier" and "more convenient" life robs parents and children of those experiences, those moments and hours that are spent together working on something - those experiences that teach children skills and help them develop qualities that will allow them to become productive, capable adults.

If we never wait in line - ordering ahead, printing out boarding passes, game tickets and reserving parking spaces we will find that our children are incapable of standing in the line for the water fountain or patiently waiting their turn for anything. When we are willing to cook together and clean the house together, we are teaching our children important skills and giving them the opportunity to accomplish something - to begin to become an expert cookie baker or leaf raker. The exchanges you and I have when we go to the library or the dry cleaners, and those quick conversations with checkers at the grocery store - they all serve as lessons for our kids. Children learn by watching and listening to us. They learn how to treat people with whom they do not have a personal relationship. They see that we are cordial and respectful, but we are not best friends. Is there anything that teaches patience and gives children the excruciating and exciting feeling of anticipation like a trip to the toy department in the months before Christmas? Amazon steals those moments from all of

I understand that busy parents can argue they've done all that and they deserve an easier life. One could argue that it's silly to waste a whole day cleaning the house and cooking with our kids when we could be doing other things. What other things playing video games, sending emails, perusing Pinterest?

Deciding to get carryout on Friday night

is a great decision, especially if it means that everyone sits around the table eating pizza and catching up. It's a choice to make use of a convenience that will allow us to do something important. I wonder though, does our culture of convenience distort our thinking when we have to make the really important choices? Do we give up a Catholic education for our kids because it's so much more convenient to have them walk three blocks to the public school? Do we decide that spending our money on a home office makes more sense than paying Catholic school tuition? How about those pesky Sunday Masses? If there's a great spin class on Sunday mornings, and my kids go to Mass with their classmates and teachers on Fridays, do they really need to go again on Sunday? Have we moved from simplifying our lives to something else?

There is no doubt - parenting is hard stuff. Parents can choose to embrace the daily challenges of parenting - knowing that it's not always fun to take three kids to the grocery store, that Johnny won't get the floor as clean as a cleaning lady might, or that it can be crazy trying to get everybody up and out a little earlier in the morning. Parents can communicate to their children that doing the small, sometimes hard, sometimes mundane things is important preparation for the time when real challenges come along. Learning how to sweep the floor, how to fix a bowl of cereal, how to move a little more quickly so no one will be late to school - these are the small victories we steal from our children when our focus is on making our lives and their lives easier.

Struggle is still good for us. It is still a great feeling to work hard at something, complete the task, and learn the skill. If we mow down every obstacle, everything that doesn't earn money, things that takes "too much" time, or things that don't provide us with instantaneous reward, we shortchange ourselves and our children. Letting the search for convenience become a priority, letting it direct our decisions now will ultimately result in lost life lessons for our

n early November Fr. Rafael Barbieri enlisted the help of friends, Fr. Alberto Biondi of St. Catherine Laboure parish and Fr. The three builders/artists left no detail to the imagination and even included poinsettias and lights.

#### Navigating Your Finances God's Way

### **Bringing Financial Acumen to Small Group Participants**

ith the average American household carrying \$8,284 in debt, learning how to better manage one's finances seems to be a positive investment for anyone willing to do the work. At St. Francis of Assisi Church, parish leaders are trying out a financial curriculum with Catholic underpinnings that it hopes will assist participants in getting their financial lives in order and help them find a small group community that will provide friendship and support.

Coming off the heels of a 90-minute Food and Finance seminar that introduced participants to financial concepts and best practices, the four small groups -- three for English speakers and one for Spanish speakers - with over 50 participants got underway the first week of January. The curriculum they are using, *Navigating Your Finances God's Way* by Compass Catholic Ministries,

aims to inspire participants with developing a new attitude toward money –one focused on God, instead of acquisition of material goods.

Deacon Dan Finn, who spearheaded the offering of the financial curriculum at St. Francis, said the parish had been hoping to offer a financial course to parishioners - and particularly, young adults - for some time. The vision for the program is three-fold: through participation in the small group, parishioners will make new friends; through the bible study, participants will learn God's way for managing finances including dealing with credit card debt and retirement planning; and a byproduct of the bible study will be to improve stewardship to the church.

"If [people] understand that everything we have in this world is God's, then they'll be more effective in managing their finances God's way including giving to the church," Deacon Finn said.

Of the 58 people who attended one of the Food and Finance seminars, about a third signed up for one of the four *Navigating Your Finances God's Way* small groups. After the Dec. 6 Food and Finance seminar, St. Francis parishioner Fe DeCastro, a retired nurse, said she attended because she wanted to know what to do with her current assets. "It is good [to offer], especially for the young people," she said.

Deacon Finn expressed surprise that so many retirees did attend the Food and Finance seminars. He said people of retirement age have asked him specifically for ways to minimize expenses, including how to determine the best credit cards for consumers and the best cell phone plans. Efforts are underway to address this issue.

As the initial round of small groups continues to meet, Fr. John Dillon said he hopes people find ways to help address the debt levels many carry. "I hope that those who participated in one of the Food and Finance seminars and then moved on to *Navigating Your Finances God's Way* will find the assistance they need with their financial situation," he said.





He was a spirit meant to be," said Jeni Stepanek, Mattie's mother.

Jeni recalls that doctors and many she knew expected her to have an abortion since her first three children all had been born with medical challenges and two children already had died. But Jeni felt that Mattie was a gift from God.

She remembers repeating to herself while pregnant and afterwards, "I will do whatever I can to let this child know you matter; you have purpose. I will create the celebration of your life. I will make sure any moment you can be happy, you are

happy. And whatever purpose you are here for, I will help amplify that purpose."

We give thanks for Mattie and for Jeni's decision to carry her child to term.

In 2001, when Mattie was 11, he spoke to young teens in Southern Maryland at a prolife rally, explaining that the building blocks of life were hope, peace, courage, forgiveness and kindness. These building blocks, he explained, lead to the understanding that life is a gift, not a choice.

Mattie's brief life had many challenges, yet he accomplished a great deal in 13 years. He wrote six bestselling books of poetry, and one bestselling book on peacemaking, speaking sincerely about how peace was possible on television talk shows,

inspiring everyone with his message that hope is real, and that life is worthy. At an early age, Mattie developed a profound relationship with God, and these spiritual conversations shaped his poems which he called his Heartsongs, which would later be published in his books.

Mattie J.T. Stepanek (1990-2004) was a poet and peacemaker who invited us all to "Remember to play after every storm!" A cause for sainthood has been established to show how Mattie, prenatally diagnosed but also welcomed and valued by family, friends and his hometown priest, is a role model for living a life of faith, hope and charity. ## **Completing an Online Transaction Safely**

ate last month, police arrested a suspect for armed robbery at the intersection of Georgia Avenue and East West Highway in Silver Spring after agreeing online to a sales transaction. The seller-victim and buyer-suspect met for the sale/exchange and there was a disagreement over the transaction. To help reduce and deter such crimes, the Montgomery County Police Department has designated safe Exchange Zones for residents to complete online transactions. These Exchange Zones are located at each of the six police district station's lobbies and parking lots (with the exception of the Second District parking lot); see addresses below.

When selling or purchasing items from an unknown person, the Montgomery County Police Department offers the following safety tips:

- Always meet the buyer or seller at an exchange zone that is well populated, well lit, and preferably at a designated police Exchange Zone.
- Tell a friend or family member where you're going to meet someone and when possible, take a friend with you.
- Inform the buyer/seller that you will not be alone.
- Do not invite strangers into your home.
- Never give out any personal or financial information.
- When dealing with large sums of cash, don't be afraid to tell the buyer that you will want to check the bills for authenticity.
- It is OK to show a buyer that you have an item, but do not surrender it until you have checked the validity of the currency.
- Look for the denomination specific security features. Each bill has a specific watermark and security thread.

Sometimes an advertised sale is a scam...trust your instincts – if it sounds like a scam or too good to be true, it probably is.

## NIH offers tips to keep older adults safe in winter weather

s the winter months approach, it is important to understand risks that cold exposure can pose for older adults and those with chronic medical conditions. Older adults can lose body heat quickly, and changes in the body as we age can make it harder to recognize a decrease in body temperature. The result can be a serious condition called hypothermia.

Hypothermia—a dangerous drop in core body temperature—can occur when it is cold inside or outside and the body is unable to produce the heat it needs to function. Even a relatively short exposure to cold conditions can result in hypothermia. Older adults are especially vulnerable to hypothermia because their bodies' response to cold can be diminished by chronic medical conditions and by use of some medicines, including over-the-counter cold remedies. For an older person, a body temperature of 95°F or lower can cause many health problems, such as heart rhythm disturbances, kidney problems, liver damage, or worse.

Warning signs of hypothermia include slowed or slurred speech; sleepiness or confusion; shivering or stiffness in the arms and legs; poor control over body movements; slow reactions, a weak pulse, or a core body temperature of 95 degrees F or lower. If you think someone has the warning signs for hypothermia, call 9-1-1 right away and try to move the person to a warmer place.

To help older adults understand the risks, the National Institute on Aging (NIA) at the National Institutes of Health (NIH) has some tips to avoid some of the dangers and prevent hypothermia:

- When going outside in the cold, wear a
  hat, scarf, and gloves or mittens to prevent loss of body heat through your head
  and hands. Wear several layers of loose
  clothing to help trap warm air between
  the layers.
- If possible, let others know when you're planning to spend time outdoors and carry a fully charged cellphone.
- Make sure your home is warm enough. Set your thermostat to at least 68 to 70 degrees Fahrenheit (F). Even mildly cool homes with temperatures from 60 to 65 degrees F can lead to hypothermia in older adults.
- To stay warm at home, wear long underwear under your clothes, along with socks and slippers. Use a blanket or afghan to keep your legs and shoulders warm and wear a hat or cap indoors.

The NIA has free information about hypothermia in a brochure "Stay Safe in Cold Weather," and a fact sheet in Spanish "La hipotermia: un peligro del clima frío." 



waiting for prospective customers.

"The first year, we made \$4,000 because we were new to the business," said Wayne Burnside, ministry coordinator of the St. Francis Christmas Tree Sale from 1994 to 2015. "We got started late. They didn't sell out. But, in the second year, we got to \$7,000."

In 2018, the St. Francis Christmas Tree Sale garnered record sales of \$14,000 for the church's general coffers - a tidy sum that Fr. John Dillon attributes to both the quality of the trees and wreaths sold and that people simply look forward to it every year. "It provides good companionship," Fr. Dillon said. "It is a great opportunity for those among us who enjoy being outdoors in sometimes bracing weather. People enjoy helping the parish."

Yet, this is not to say that selling Christmas trees a quarter of a century has always gone smoothly. The ministry coordinators have found that 400 trees are the parish's "sweet spot"; the year they tried to raise inventory to 500 trees, sales weren't as brisk. Coordinators also say that 80 percent of their tree sales come from parishioners. "A lot of people who don't contribute may see buying a tree as their contribution to the church," Burnside

The tree sale activities normally start in August of each year, when the ministry coordinators place an order with a tree broker, Hortu Sales LLC in Wisconsin. However, according to Ministry Coordinator Brian Pettit, an ongoing shortage with Douglas fir trees over the past few years has pushed up the start date for sale activities to April of each year.

What is vital to the smooth operation of the Christmas Tree Sale is the dedicated support of volunteers, said Burnside and Pettit. Several people come back year after year, with two volunteers taking the same shift every day of the sale. In fact, Pettit, 29, originally took over the ministry three years ago from Burnside, 65, after having volunteered as a high school student seeking Student Service Learning (SSL) hours. "I learned from the best," Pettit said. "We've been partners in crime."

Even as their year-over-year net profit increased 3 percent in 2018, there was an 8 percent increase in tree sales to the Christmas Tree Sale, which has caused some price increases for customers. In 2018, the sales team also collected \$1,291 in tips, which either goes to a specific family in need or is given to the Parish Outreach Fund for distribution to parishioners in need.

"We make money, and that's great, but it's not a prime motivator," Burnside said. "It's fellowship of the church."

The main thing is to focus on the children's participation. ## The Eucharist's Secret Helpers

he Linen Ladies. That's how Church of the Resurrection parishioner Roberta "Bobbie" Newell refers to herself and four other women who care for the linens used on the altar during Mass. Newell, who is retired, has taught CCD at Resurrection and she was asked to take over as coordinator of the small linens ministry.

According to Newell, members of the group rotate the job of laundering the altar linens. "We wash and iron the small linens used for all Masses," she said. "These include corporals, purificators, finger towels and other small towels for drying some vessels."

There is a very specific method used to clean the altar linens. "To launder the linens," Newell explained, "the ones stained with the Precious Blood are soaked in a solution of white vinegar and water. The purificators with lipstick on them are treated with a commercial stain remover. Then, they're soaked in the vinegar solution."

There is also a special way to dispose of the vinegar and water solution used in cleaning the altar linens. "The vinegar and water solution used cannot be poured down a normal drain but must be emptied into the ground. The linens must have the vinegar solution rinsed from them. All linens are then washed in hot water, detergent and bleach. No fabric softener is used in the drying process."

Next, a specific procedure is used when ironing the altar linens. "Heavy duty spray starch is used to iron the corporals. The purificators are dampened with water and ironed," said Newell. When the altar linens have been cleaned and ironed, they are returned to the church and kept in a special place.

The other volunteers in the altar linens are Elaine Auld, Mary Bombo, Margorie Moise and Ann Munson. They communicate by email or telephone to decide on when and who will do the laundry. "Each week, one of us will pick up the dirty laundry sometime after the last Mass on Sunday. After wash-

ing and ironing it, she returns it the following Saturday," explained Newell. So, when the Bread of Life and the Precious Blood are cleanly given, thank the Linen Ladies!

people closer to an issue know better what is needed than a large and far-off organization.

The principle was articulated in the 1931 encyclical Quadragesimo Anno by Pope Pius XI. That encyclical concerned issues of the social and economic order in light of the growing power of fascist and communist states. Subsidiarity is still important to us today considering the growth of our institutions.

It is always helpful for us to know what we are doing and why we are acting. Below are some examples of the work of the J&A Council and how they reflect subsidiarity.

#### **Meeting with new Council** member Gabe Albornoz

The J&A Council will host Councilmember Gave Albornoz at our Wednesday, February 27 meeting at Holy Redeemer Church, Kensington. This is a way we practice subsidiarity. We will discuss with him how he plans to respond to the needs of poor and vulnerable people in the County. These gatherings in the past have typically been quite engaging, stimulating, and yes, even fun! You are invited. Consider coming. The meeting is from 7:30 to 9:30. Light refreshments will be served.

We hope to invite other new members to meetings in the future.

#### **Upcoming county budget** forums

The new County Executive Marc Elrich is holding five budget forums across the county as part of process of preparing the county budget. County residents are invited to present their priorities.

J&A members will be attending several of them. We will focus on the needs of people living at the margins of society. We have attended budget forums in the past and are often the only people there who express concern for the safety net for vulnerable and needy residents. Others tend to focus on schools, libraries, roads and public services.

Our concern reflects the call of Catholic social teaching to care

for the poor and vulnerable. As the U.S. bishops state, "The test of a just society is how the poor and vulnerable are treated." We are typically thanked profusely by County officials for bringing up this issue. The remaining forum is February 4 at 7:00 p.m. at Bethesda-Chevy Chase High School.

#### **County Council briefings,** hearings and discussions

J&A Council members are also keeping an eye on upcoming activities of the County Council, such as their briefings, hearing and discussions, especially when they reflect our priorities and concerns. This is another way we promote subsidiar-

Each year, we look at our priorities. We will have done that at our January meeting, which was held after the deadline for OPT copy. We will report on them in a future issue. In the past, our priorities have typically focused on the need for more affordable housing in the County, needs of the safety net for the poor and vulnerable, and often on public transportation.

In December, the J&A Council elected new officers. New co-chairs are Brian Dorsey of St. Paul's in Damascus and Larry Couch of St. Elizabeth's in Rockville. We don't have a secretary yet. If you are interested in serving as secretary, please let us know!

his mother-in-law. They found a faith home at St. Rose of Lima Parish in Gaithersburg, where Stamper served as a catechist teaching eighth graders preparing for the Sacrament of Confirmation, helped with youth ministry and joined the Knights of Columbus, an organization that has grounded Stamper's adult faith formation along the various stops in his life.

"The natural next step seemed to be working with young adults," Stamper said. "I could create and help create something firmer for people transitioning into young adulthood."

Currently, six Catholic churches in Montgomery County – St. Francis of Assisi; St. Rose of Lima; St. Mary's, St. Patrick's and Shrine of St. Jude in Rockville; and Mother Seton in Germantown work with 270Catholic in helping cultivate their young adults into disciples of Christ. Each month, those churches convene 40-100 young adults at group events. Stamper believes he can help continue building the faith of young adults through developing more small groups, small communities and larger community outreach.

Given the myriad distractions competing for young people's attention, Stamper recognizes that reaching young adults will be an ongoing challenge. "You have to find something that pierces through the busyness," he said.

Stamper said he will continue relying on existing 270Catholic volunteers -- both administrative and small group leaders -- to help the group realize its goals. He also places faith in the individual, who he feels can be inspired by others living their faith openly and authentically.

"The only way to reach someone is to show them that the faith of a practicing Catholic is different than what society sees," Stamper said. "If life is a river, then being Catholic is the rock that stops the flow of water in the river."

While he continues getting acclimated to his new job, Stamper is also completing his final semester at the Montgomery College-Germantown campus, where he is studying secondary education.

Fr. Berard points to the "great joy" Stamper brings to his new role at 270Catholic. "He wants to make sure the job is done well and completely, and I think that will end up being his greatest attribute," Fr. Berard said.

and many things petty invoking shameful levels of incivility. Many Catholics turned to their faith for spiritual relief and comfort from these and other distractions. Yet, recent revelations regarding clergy abuse, institutional deceit and intrigue in the Church have shaken trust and distracted many from the refuge of their beloved faith. What in the world is a faithful Catholic to do to resist distraction and focus on Christ?

Managing overwhelming distractions and recommitting ourselves to a devout focus on the true meaning of Christ's teachings are good resolutions for the New Year. It may help with our resolutions to focus on three early events in Christ's life. Remember the story in Luke, Chapter 2, in which the boy Jesus wanders off to teach in the Temple. Found by his terrified parents after several days of being lost, he responds to their question of why he wandered by telling them He had to be about His Father's business. Seems a bit insensitive. Jesus's likely intention was to remind us that God had a plan for His Son from which Jesus must not be distracted by anything worldly, not even by His parents.

To prepare for His public ministry, the young man Jesus went on a retreat into the desert. Luke writes about this in Chapter 4. As He prayed, Jesus was visited several times by Satan who offered three tempting distractions. Jesus rejected each distraction by focusing on values inspired by the Holy Spirit; humanity does not live by bread alone; humanity must love and serve God; humanity must trust

Finally, continuing in Chapter 4 of Luke, the focused Jesus begins His public ministry by clearly and confidently introducing a new and reformed mission for the followers of God, succinctly spelling out its objectives from which He will not be distracted, even unto death. He boldly announced that He has been anointed by God to bring God's Word to all people and to serve the poor and marginalized.

Reflecting on these vignettes from Christ's early life and other Gospel readings may be an effective antidote to distractions we are certain to face in 2019, especially those which will challenge our spiritual life. The clarity of Christ's Gospel messages, especially the precision of the two great commandments to love God and others, can guide us through the fog of distractions humankind has created. Today more than ever, our parishes can be centers of God's love in which we find the fellowship, support and worship space essential for undistracted Christian focus. Rather than flee from our spiritual home, come help strengthen them for ourselves and each other.


During the month of January there are three important opportunities to set distraction aside and focus intently on Catholic values. The first, act to honor the sanctity of all human life. If you missed the March for Life and associated rallies, you can still advocate for life by writing letters to elected officials; establish or join a pro-life ministry in your parish; learn and reflect more upon the moral and ethical issues of life; volunteer with the frail elderly or disabled people. Another January opportunity for undistracted Catholic living is

action to support Catholic schools during Catholic Schools Week, the final week of the month. Visit a Catholic school. Attend the school Mass. Thank the staff and students for their commitment to Catholic education. Reaffirm your support for the parish school. Celebrate the spiritual and academic education of children in CCD and those being home-schooled. It is painfully obvious today that our Church will be sustained much less by Church leadership and much more by the commitment of those who teach our children and the parishes that support their work.

Lastly, each January we have the opportunity to refocus our attention upon Christ's great call to social and racial justice when we celebrate the life and work of Martin Luther King, Jr. Throughout the Gospels, Jesus models a commitment to social justice by caring for the sick, forgiving sinners and encouraging the poor. His dangerously unpopular message included welcoming the non-Jew, Gentiles often despised by the Jewish governing authority as sinners and unworthy of God. In the end, Jesus died because of His uncompromising commitment to these principles. If you wish to sharpen your focus on these values, consider reading the entire letter written by Dr. King while he was being held in the Birmingham, Alabama jail (www. africa.upenn.edu/Articles\_Gen/ Letter\_Birmingham.html). It's lengthy, so you will have to find a time and place without distraction to fully absorb its grace and content.

Avoiding today's many distractions and focusing on Gospel values and lessons is difficult. After all, we are human and a weak match for the temptations of the evil one. Yet, with the help of our Lord, and support of our Catholic communities in local parishes, we will prevail and our faith will be sustained. Call to mind the difficult road Jesus chose for our salvation. Where would humanity be today had He allowed Himself to be distracted at any point from his mission?



construction of igloos by watching videos of Alaskans building igloos and they read and discussed important parts of an igloo.

The structural requirements for their igloo were as follows: 6-inch diameter bottom, a dome top, an opening and strong enough to withstand a fan on high which represented a strong snowstorm. The building materials included different sized marshmallows, toilet and paper towel rolls, coffee filters, cotton balls, glue, tape, Styrofoam plates, paper and toothpicks. Each student prepared an individual design then, with an assigned partner, they completed the final design for their igloo. Students worked strategically building their igloo, but some groups had to do a full redesign while other groups only had to modify their original plans with slight modifications while they

The best part of the project was to see the different types of igloos that were made and how the students overcame obstacles while building their igloo. Proudly, all igloos were able to withstand the forces of wind from the fan!

The fifth-grade challenge was to

Catholic Schools Week, we settle back down into a more normal routine. The cold weather, including snow, throws us off our normal schedules. It is dark in the morning and starting to get a little lighter in the early evening. But, all that makes for a sometimes cold, wet, and dreary winter.

If that is true for us, who are so blessed with family and friends and lots of material blessings as well, what do you think it's like for the homeless who live on our streets all throughout the year? For the past 10 years there has been a "point of time" survey taken the last week of February. Non-profit groups, guided by the city, go out into the streets and the known gathering places for those without homes. Each year of the past 10 they arrive at a number of over 10,000 in the Washington area who are homeless on that particular weekend. There is some good news - about ½ of those people have found a place to sleep at night, with family or friends. The other ½ actually live

on the streets with some in shelters. Catholic Charities has 1700 beds every night and an additional 200-300 during the hypothermia season (under 32 degrees). It is shocking to realize that a couple thousand of these counted individuals are children. I don't know what is going to happen this year if the government shut-down doesn't end soon. The numbers will grow for sure. People don't deserve the inability of our Congress and President to find a solution that lets them keep their jobs and just as importantly, their

When I was younger, I used to love the snow, the days off, and the enjoyment of staying home. Now, a snow storm that closes down schools and government, reminds me of the many people who are able to get out of the elements by staying in one of our shelters. I think of more than 100 of our staff members who continue to work making sure the shelters stay open and viable during those difficult

All of the above just speaks to how lucky I am, and I suspect you as well. If you have a warm home to live in and a roof over

your head and three meals a day, with clothes on your back, you are blessed. Hopefully we all can do something this winter that allows us to be more conscious of those who are affected by the shut down or because of circumstances sometimes beyond their control, have no place to live. Coat drives, gathering of hats and gloves, and serving warm meals are one-way Catholic Charities makes a difference all throughout these winter months.
