To be eligible, students had to be residents of Montgomery County who will be entering a Washington Metropolitan Area Catholic High School as a freshman in the fall of 2014. Contestants wrote essays of no more than 500 words citing concrete examples of where they saw holiness and sanctity in their lives based on the following statement by Pope Francis:

"I see the sanctity of God's people, this daily sanctity . . . I see the holiness in the patience of the people of God: a woman who is raising children, a man who works to bring home the bread, the sick, the elderly priests who have so many wounds but have a smile on their faces because they served the Lord, the sisters who work hard and live a hidden sanctity. This is for me the common sanctity."

Increase in Vocations Drives Seminary Expansion

lessed John Paul II Seminary just opened in the fall of 2011 and now a new wing, D'Aniello Hall, has already been added. With the seminary already at capacity after only three years, D'Aniello Hall will allow more young men to discern a vocation to the priesthood. The new wing, which contains 20 new student rooms, enlarged classroom space, a new common room, an exercise facility, quarters for two faculty members and a large library and reading room, was made possible by a generous donation from Daniel and Gayle D'Aniello.

"We are blessed to have seen a great increase in younger vocations, and we are grateful that this new space allows us to accommodate even more young men to discern God's call to the priesthood," said Monsignor Robert Panke, rector of the Blessed John Paul II Seminary and the Director of Formation for seminarians of the archdiocese.

Currently 81 men are studying for the priesthood in the Archdiocese of Washington, including 40 in college and pre-theology studies.

The nucleus of the new library will be the Haydock collection. Father Kenneth Haydock, a priest in the Archdiocese of Seattle, recently donated his personal library, numbering approximately 10,000 volumes of theology and philosophy, to the seminary. The Catholic University of America's Department of Library and Information Science will be involved in organizing the library.

Blessed John Paul II Seminary is an institution of the Archdiocese of Washington established to prepare college-age men and young adults for entrance into major seminary and eventual ordination to the Catholic priesthood. The seminary is located near The Catholic University of America at 145 Taylor St. N.E. in Washington, D.C.

With the expansion, the seminary will now have space for 50 men who attend classes at The Catholic University of America while receiving their priestly formation at the seminary. Those pursuing an undergraduate degree enroll in a normal schedule of classes with a major in philosophy while those who already hold an undergraduate degree undertake a special non-degree program for two years with an emphasis in philosophy and ancient languages. Before ordination, they will complete an additional four years of theology studies.

Bishops to Remember Fallen Migrants at U.S.-Mexico Border

Highlight Human Consequences of Broken Immigration System

Immigration reform needed to end suffering, redeem the nation

he U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) Committee on Migration, joined by bishops on the border, will travel to Nogales, Arizona, March 30-April 1 to tour the U.S.-Mexico border and celebrate Mass on behalf of the close to 6,000 migrants who have died in the U.S. desert since 1998.

The purpose of the trip is to highlight the human suffering caused by a broken immigration system, an aspect of the national immigration debate which is often ignored.

"What we fail to remember in this debate is the human aspect of immigration — that immigration is primarily about human beings, not economic or social issues," said Bishop Eusebio Elizondo, auxil-

n Friday, February 21, The Academy of the Holy Cross community raised over \$1,000 for the Project Sol Center in Sao Paulo, Brazil. The center is operated by the Academy's sponsoring order, the Congregation of the Sisters of the Holy Cross, and provides a safe haven for children ages 6-18 who live in the poorest section of the city.

Eleventh grade students at the Academy, who are International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma Candidates, coordinated the fundraising project. Several weeks prior to the event, the students gave a presentation at an all-school assembly to help educate the community about the conditions in Sao Paulo, the work of the Sisters there, and what the Academy can do to help. They called the fundraiser "Project Sol Sister." The fundraiser included an out-of-uniform "tag" day and bagel breakfast. Students were encouraged to wear the colors of the Brazilian flag (green, yellow and blue) on the tag day. Ize's Deli donated dozens of bagels for the event. "Hey Soul Sister" by Train played from speakers as students arrived in their tag day wear.

Sao Paulo has a critically poor

section of the city where people live in shanty housing known as favelas. Favelas have no plumbing, sanitation or electricity and usually are areas of high crime and drug trafficking. The Center offers athletic programs, classes in the fine and performing arts, and peacemaking to the impoverished children of this community.

As Diploma Candidates, the IB students are required to complete 150 hours of "Creativity, Action,

Service" (CAS). CAS involves students in a range of activities alongside their academic studies and enhances the students' personal and interpersonal development through experiential learning and journeys of self-discovery. CAS is one element of the IB Diploma Core, which also includes the Theory of Knowledge course and an extended essay, written on a topic of global significance.

iary bishop of Seattle and chairman of the USCCB Committee on Migration. "Those who have died - and those deported each day have the same value and innate God-given dignity as all persons, yet we ignore their suffering and their deaths."

The trip follows the example of Pope Francis, who, in his first trip outside of Rome, traveled to the Italian island of Lampedusa to remember African migrants who died attempting to reach Europe. During that trip, Pope Francis spoke about the "globalization of indifference" toward migrants and decried the "throwaway culture" that disposes of human beings in the pursuit of wealth.

"The U.S.-Mexico border is our Lampedusa," Bishop Elizondo said. "Migrants in this hemisphere try to reach it, but often die in the attempt."

Bishop Elizondo continued: "We exhibit our own indifference when we minimize or ignore this suffering and death, as if these people are not worth our attention. It degrades us as a nation."

"Hopefully by highlighting the harsh impact the system has on our fellow human beings, our elected officials will be moved to reform it," Bishop Elizondo said.

give alms. Many Christians try to emphasize their relationship with the Lord through a more focused prayer-life throughout the 40 days. By long tradition, others give something up or maybe do something extra as a way of reminding themselves of the importance of God in their life. And still others find a way to share their resources with those less fortunate by donating to various causes.

There's a reason Jesus built his ministry around service and compassion. There's a reason Pope Francis has made service a central focal point of his papacy. Service is a conduit to making that connection to each other that reminds us we are all God's children and we all have the Lord within us.

We need that interaction, to step away from our walls and our distractions, and be reminded that we all are called to give back as part of our faith. Lent is the annual reminder to us to keep it simple, and think of others before ourselves.

Every year, I give up watching television. The biggest sacrifice for me is missing out on many beloved sporting events - the Masters, March Madness, Opening Day of baseball. Is this a huge sacrifice? Of course not! But it reminds me daily during Lent to refocus, to dedicate that extra time to prayer or service, and to be mindful of how I can be doing more.

Of course, Pope Francis recently reminded us service should never be limited to just one time of year: "In order to make sure that no one lacks bread, water, clothing, housing, work, health," concluded the Pope, "we must all recognize that we are children of the Father who is in heaven, and then brothers and sisters, and we behave accordingly."

Lent isn't supposed to be about picking up good habits. It's a season to remind us that service and love for your brothers and sisters requires constant dedication - we can always do more, Pope Francis urges us.

This area has so many opportunities to give back - we are very blessed as a community. At Catholic Charities, I see everyday how volunteers make the difference and I see how volunteers walk away with a cup overflowing.

I've been thinking a lot about our clients recently, especially that young man I started this column talking about. The healing power of service and of giving back is one of the greatest gifts Christ gave to us.

This Lent, join me in committing to give just a little more than you were prepared to offer. Let's see how it heals our community and how it heals us

Church of the Resurrection Holds First Ecumenical Service

he Church of the Resurrection held its first-ever ecumenical service Sunday, January 19, with six ministers from five congregations and four different denominations in the Colesville area of Silver Spring participating.

The "Service of Christian Unity" included readings, prayers, blessings, hymns, a sermon, an affirmation of faith, and a sharing of the sign of peace, but not the celebration of the Eucharist.

St. Stephen Lutheran Church; and Deacon John Cermak of St. John's.

In his sermon, Fr. Brault said the service was "an opportunity to reflect on the bond we have with Jesus Christ."

Noting that 2014 marks the 50th anniversary of the Second Vatican Council's "Decree on Ecumenism" issued Nov. 21, 1964, Fr. Brault said "there can be no ecumenism without a change of heart."

He also said the ecumenical service was "an extension of our charity" and a reflection of "the love that radiated from the Upper Room."

Between the Scripture reading, the words of Psalm 133 were read, with the participants responding: "Unity, unity, Lord, we pray for unity.'

Joe Weisgerber Honored for Many, Many Years of Church Service

oe Weisgerber has served his church, his country and his volunteer fire department for almost his entire adult life - and at age 89 he's not stopping yet.

A member of Resurrection Church and a Riderwood resident since 2000, he has received many honors over the years for his unceasing work, but none that he cherishes more than the "Manifesting the Kingdom" award he received from the Washington Archdiocese



on Jan. 5.

"That one made me very, very proud. I've received over 50 awards, but never got one that got to me like this," he said of the award presented by Cardinal Donald Wuerl at ceremonies attended by more than 1,000 people at the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception.

He was among some 200 recipients of the award in the archdiocese this year for "those who have served the church in an exceptional manner revealing the presence of Jesus Christ."

Weisgerber, who started in his service to the church as an altar boy more than 75 years ago at St. Aloysius Catholic Church on Capitol Hill, continues his work today as head usher for the Catholic community at Riderwood and as an assistant to staff at the Resurrection main office, helping to count collec-

tions, among other tasks.

Not only that, he's still an active member of the Hillendale Volunteer Fire Department, where he has served for 61 YEARS. "But I quit climbing the ladder and riding in the front seat at age 70," he laughs.

His service to country included

a combined 40 years in the U.S. Navy as a fighter pilot and intelligence officer on active duty and in the Reserves, from which he did not retire until age

In his early years in the Navy during World War II, he flew the famous gull-winged Corsair off the aircraft carrier Ranger and other carriers. He says he flew in a "Hot Shots" squadron that was a forerunner to formation of the famous Navy "Blue Angels" aerial team.

After his active duty Navy service, Weisgerber worked for the Veterans Administration for several

years, then went on to a 40-year career at the General Services Administration (GSA) - working in Washington, New York and Philadelphia.

Even when working in other cities, he kept his home in the Washington area, living in the Oak View and Wheaton areas of Silver Spring before moving to Riderwood. Over the years, he helped to establish St. Camillus Parish and St. Andrew's Parish, where he was president of the Parish Council and head usher. Meanwhile, he and his wife (now deceased) were raising a family of six children.

At Riderwood, he was one of the first to move in. For the first four years, Catholics living there car-pooled to Resurrection and later had a shuttle bus to attend Mass. Weisgerber says Fr. Bob Keffer (now retired) later started saying mass in the cafeteria, before an interdenominational chapel was

Weisgerber helped in the planning of the chapel in 2004 and later in coordination of it use by members of all faiths, including an estimated 800 Catholics among the 2,700 current residents. "We have eight or nine groups or denominations using the chapel, and never have had an argument with any of the other religions," he proudly

Resurrection Group Makes Annual Trip to Haiti in 'Twinning' Mission





to him and principal, Susan Malloy, our son succeeded at Victory and later The Heights high school. What a faith-filled gift of opportunity from Fr. Foley, and a gift to the people of St Patrick's he will be.

Congratulations to Cardinal Wuerl, recipient of the 2014 Patricia Sullivan Award for Outstanding Service. This award is given annually by Potomac Community Resources to an individual who has led the community to be more loving and inclusive of people with special needs. Since arriving in Washington, he has worked to increase inclusion and participation in every aspect of parish and community life. The impact of his leadership is seen through enhanced Catholic programs including: a greater role for the Archdiocese Office for Special Needs Ministries; expansion of the Joseph P. Kennedy Institute, Catholic Coalition for Special Education and the work of PCR. He has supported new initiatives including Rosario Communities which builds homes for people with intellectual challenges on available parish properties, Upper Montgomery County Community Resources, Inc. and similar programs in Southern Maryland parishes. Cardinal Wuerl has made a significant difference in the lives of hundreds of people with physical and intellectual challenges. He is a most worthy recipient of this important and cherished award.

We have begun our Lenten journey. Each year I'm especially inspired by the Ash Wednesday Gospel, Chapter 6 of St Matthew. In this reading, Christ teaches we should give alms to the poor; giving out of love and not for public or personal recognition. His prophetic message was unpopular in His time as it often is today. His lesson is a good one for Lenten reflection.

Lent is a period of atonement. In this, our Jewish brothers and sisters are fortunate that they have only one day for atonement, Yom Kippur; Lent is six weeks! Traditionally, Lent is a time of sacrifice; abstinence from some of our favorite foods or activities. In reflecting on the Ash Wednesday Gospel, Christ instructs in another way to atone by urging Christians to engage in unheralded acts of love and kindness for the Lord's sake. So, rather than giving up our daily cup of Starbucks, dessert, or whatever, adding deliberate acts of kindness and love each day during Lent can enhance our observance of this important spiritual period. What if each of the 300 000 Catholics who reside in Montgomery County added an act of kindness or love each day for six weeks! Shopping, traffic, email, family and civic life, sports, working conditions among other activities would be transformed and a bit more holy, if only for Lent. Seems like a wonderful way to memorialize and honor the suffering of Christ whose life's mission was to spread love and kindness among humanity.

Here's a practical activity that's available to our schools and parishes


for your consideration. Operation Rice Bowl is a partnership of Catholic parishes and Catholic Relief Services, the international aid agency of the US Catholic Church. Through this annual Lenten project, an Operation Rice Bowl Kit can be obtained from the parish school or religious education office. The kit includes a box for collecting money for the needy and an inspirational teaching and prayer package for Lenten reflection. Each day, participants identify a specific savings from their allowances, household expenses, or other resources and prayfully place them in the Rice Bowl Box. Critical to the project is the reflection of the individual, students, or family on the condition of the poor and our Christian obligation to assist them. In Gospel spirit, the boxes are returned anonymously to the parish and the funds raised divided between the needs of the world's poor in places such as Haiti and our local poor such as a soup kitchen. A clear and simple way to live the Lenten Gospel.

Jews have a similar tradition. Their box is called a **Tzedakah** box into which Jewish families place loose change, Tikun Olam, for the purpose of repairing the world. Many Jewish homes keep a Tzedakah box, often created and decorated by the children, year round. Perhaps your family or group would like to construct its own "charity and kindness box" for year round use.

Wishing you a loving Lent and joyous Easter!





Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults and Teens

■ach year, during the Easter Vigil, parishes welcome new members into full communion with the Catholic Church through the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (R.C.I.A.). Eight adults are preparing, through R.C.I.A., to be received into the Catholic Church at St. Andrew Apostle this April.

Over the past two years the parish's R.C.I.A. program has been reorganized, moving from didactic lectures to seminar format discussions led by a core group of six catechists. Additional catechists contribute periodically, giving participants an opportunity to interact with Catholics of different ages and life situations.

Therese Errigo leads the R.C.I.A. program. She also serves as President of Immaculate Conception Chapter of the Lay Fraternities of St. Dominic. Included on the team are Deacon Chris Alar and Brother John Luth, both from the Marians of the Immaculate Conception. Deacon Chris is a transitional deacon and a popular speaker. Originally from Connecticut, Brother Luth has lived overseas in England and Saudi Arabia. Tom Kreitzberg, Rose Folsom and Steve Monette round out the core team. Tom is a parishioner, father of two and author of a Catholic blog known for its penetrating and often amusing theological insights and commentary. Rose, another Lay Dominican, is completing a book on the virtues. Stephen Monette, a former seminarian and now father of five, enjoys sharing his expan-

sive knowledge of the faith garnered partly from the years he lived in Rome. The group meets weekly. One of the catechists leads a discussion on the assigned topic, choosing materials (handouts, videos, music, PowerPoint presentations, etc.) that complement the readings. The meetings are relaxed and provide a welcoming atmosphere in which the group can share experiences. Faith sharing by both instructors and participants is an important part of the weekly meetings. The instructors are frank with the struggles and joys they have encountered in their own faith journey.

Each year the group is different. This year's group is particularly enriched by their span of age and by diversity.

In addition to R.C.I.A., St. Andrew Apostle has a program designed especially for teens.

Modeled after R.C.I.A., the Rite

of Christian Initiation for Teens (R.C.I.T.) is for any high school teen who has not been baptized or has not received the Sacraments of first Eucharist or first Reconciliation. R.C.I.T. teaches the fundamentals of the Catholic faith so that candidates who wish to become Catholic are baptized or make a Profession of Faith at the Easter Vigil and enter into full communion with the Church. This is the first year the program has been offered at St. Andrew Apostle and six teens are currently enrolled. Directed by Josh Moldiz, our Youth Minister, they meet weekly for prayer and catechesis. Along with two retreats, the teens also attend Youth Ministry meetings where the emphasis is on parish involvement, service and building a relationship with the parish community. Josh feels that this is key to the program's success, benefitting both the R.C.I.T. and the Youth Ministry. "The Church becomes more tangible to them. The idea of being brothers and sisters in Christ becomes more of a reality. They pray for each other. They pull for each other".

The adults, teens and their instructors continue the journey of faith through Lent and joyfully anticipate this year's Easter Vigil.




"Walking the Walk" in the 41st March for Life

n Wednesday, January 22, the morning of the 41st March for Life, Rev. Msgr. 
Christian faith and to the Sanctity

Critically important came, Pope Francis's text and announcement from the Vatican to marchers of support for an anti-abortion march in the nation's capital. The statement read, "I join the March for Life in Washington with my prayers. May God help us respect all life, especially the most vulnerable."

The marchers with their banners walked in solidarity up Washington DC Constitution Avenue past Capitol Hill and on to the Supreme Court building to affirm the "Sanctity of Life.

As true Pro-Life believers, the marchers were there to show their resolve about Pro-life and the protection of unborn children and to protest the Supreme Court's 1973 decision (Roe vs. Wade) that declared a constitutional right to abortion





St. Elizabeth School has its own team, the Lego Tryhards. On Sunday, January 12, 2014, the Tryhards participated in the Shady Continued on page 34







County Executive Speaks to SFIS Students about Civil Rights

his past August our nation celebrated the 50th anniversary of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s "I have a dream" speech. In that famous oration Dr. King spoke of a world that looks remarkably like the community of Saint Francis International School. In the days leading up to the Martin Luther King Jr. holiday, Montgomery County Executive Isiah Leggett came to SFIS to speak the 8th grade American History class about the struggle for Civil Rights in the United States and his opportunities to meet Dr. King.

Ike Leggett now lives in Montgomery County, but he discussed his roots in Louisiana to illustrate the struggles of segregation that many African Americans faced prior to the Civil Rights Movement. Mr. Leggett provided three elements to achieving success to the students. He mentioned education and its importance in gaining the knowledge to make sound choices. He then discussed the power of hard work and persistence and finally concluded with the impact a person's moral and ethical foundation can make. Mr. Leggett warned that, without this final piece, the other two components could achieve evil, instead of good.

The eighth graders gained some wisdom from Mr. Leggett, listening to him speak about his experiences and journey through life. "What struck me the most was how he was talking about all of that hard work to get where he was," eighth grader Kristen Marshall recalled. His role in the Civil Rights Movement simply inspired some other students, like Wesley Dankwa. "People were very oppressed. Some people didn't maintain hope, but there were also a lot that believed this would someday end. Their children would have a better world through their work, as would their children's children."

dred students in their neat uniforms, shuffling books and papers on their way to class. But if you walk by the Science Lab Room 10, use caution. Step around the broken glass, and do not disturb any fingerprints

on the door handle. Put on your green lab goggles and be prepared to get your hands dirty. This is a crime scene.

The eighth grade science class trained this year to be Crime Scene Investigators. They learned how to make careful observations, identify fingerprint patterns, analyze ink chromatography, compare fibers using microscopes and burn tests, and simulate DNA fingerprinting.

Said SJE eighth grader, Colleen Hathway: "I liked

taking and studying our fingerprints in the Crime Scene Investigation unit in science. I found it interesting that the scars on my fingers affected what my fingerprints look like."

After passing a practical test, each student became a SJE CSI Agent, and earned a badge. They were teamed up with partners to solve a crime scene, set up in their laboratory.

"Science is about asking questions and attempting to find answers through observation and experimentation," said Mrs. Shannon Garvey, SJE Science Teacher. "This handson experience gave the students an opportunity to do just that."



Liturgical Music Around the World

JN Director of Music & Liturgy and organist, MaryLu Hartsell, joined us in 1997. She moved to Maryland from her home in West Virginia after 25 years of ministering music in six different churches throughout that tri-state area. Turns out this journey to Maryland was one of her shorter trips to share her life of music... music we enjoy every weekend and at many parish events.

Since joining us, MaryLu and most of her SJN choir members have almost filled up their passports with International Customs stamps from Italy, Vatican City, Ireland and along the footsteps of St. Paul in Greece and Turkey. Choir trips have also been to the lands of John Neumann in Germany, the Czech Republic and Austria and most recently the choir participated in liturgies in the churches of Spain.

Prior to the Spain trip, in a concert just for us, MaryLu and the Adult

Choir gave the parish a glimpse of the music they were taking overseas. "We've been blessed to bring our music to many of the world's churches" says MaryLu. "What makes it interesting is that our own SJN organ has the unique ability to ready us for the instruments we encounter all over Europe."

The SJN instrument is a specially-design Allen Organ called the Heritage. It's really four organs in one. "Thanks to today's technology," said MaryLu, "we can change the voicing and tuning to sound like the four types of organs indigenous to other countries and other periods in time. We have American Classic, English Cathedral, German Baroque and French Romantic—all at my fingertips. We can actually hear the music as it was conceived originally by its composer.

Reports have it that many times MaryLu has performed on an organ far away from home with members of that congregation commenting on how thrilling it was to hear her music as they had never heard their church's instrument sound so wonderful. "We enjoy preparing nice surprises for the parishes in our travels," recalls MaryLu. "They are so welcoming and appreciative."

MaryLu could not be called the proverbial "church mouse" since she has volunteered her time and talents to accompany and co-direct the Gaithersburg Chorus and the Montgomery Village Interfaith Choir for almost 15 years. She recently accompanied Hazzan (Cantor) Kim Komrad at the installation of Rabbi Charles Arian, Gaithersburg's Kehilat Shalom Synagogue.

Fr. Thomas LaHood worked with MaryLu for several years at SJN: "Mary Lu is a wonderful musician, a great organist. She knows and loves music, knows and loves the church and she brings both together beautifully here at SJN." We're always happy to have her back home.

Social Justice/Outreach Director at Resurrection, and parishioner Darlene Newman, who both have made several trips to Haiti, also went this year, as well as parishioners Chris Alex and Paul Meola.

The was Father Hahn's first Haiti trip, although not the first time the Resurrection pastor has made the trip--Retired Pastor Bob Keffer having gone one year.

This year, the group visited four different locations "where we checked on already established projects and/or explored new locations to promote sustainability projects," Sister Rita said.

After helping build two churches and a school in outlying villages back in 2005 and later, as well as helping set up some freshwater systems, the Haiti mission moved in a "new direction" in 2011 to help other parish schools in the Gros Morne area and to assist in small-scale economic projects like food growing and raising small animals such as pigs, goats and chickens.

Resurrection provides both financial support for the projects, as well as some physical assistance. Over

the years, more than a dozen other parishioners have made the annual trip to help out.

Sister Rita noted that about \$9,000 was raised at the annual Winterfest in 2013 "by several dedicated women from our parish who had spent many months knitting, crocheting and sewing beautiful crafts and articles of clothing in support of our projects dealing with clean water, medical assistance and education in Haiti."

Similar to the Heifer International project, a nonprofit group working to eradicate poverty and hunger through community development, Resurrection parishioners "support our Alternative Gift Giving Project that provides, among other things, livestock to families struggling for a sustainable lifestyle," Sister Rita said.


While in Haiti, the Resurrection group stayed at the convent at Our Lady of the Light and worked with Pastor Wilner Donecia (S.M.M) and Sisters Pat Dillon and Jackie Picard (R.J.M) at the various sites they visited—meeting and interacting with many of the children and adults served by that parish.

The Resurrection group learned that one project, the "Hens for Haiti" program to bring fresh eggs to local residents, has undergone some changes because of problems in providing food (the high cost of corn) and water (problems with a well) for the chickens. As a result, the first batch of chickens has been sold, as the project works to grow its own corn and drill a new well, and then procure a new brood of chickens, Meola said.

Among the other sites they visited were a trade school that teaches carpentry and sewing, a pre-school for young children, and a house for the homeless called "Bon Samaritan Kay Pov."

At various places, the group saw flourishing evidence of the success of an animal donation program started by Resurrection and the R.J.M. sisters a few years ago—with an abundance of goats and pigs for proud Haitian owners.







Grove Qualifier for FIRST Lego League. In addition to building and programming Lego robots to conquer an obstacle course, each team must come up with an innovative solution to a problem. The theme for this year's tournament is "Nature's Fury".

The competition provided a hands-on, interactive robotics challenge in a competitive atmosphere. The Tryhards first had to focus on team building, problem solving, creativity, and analytical thinking to develop solutions to a problem commonly facing the world today (in this case, a tornado). The teams do their own research, talk to professionals, and develop compelling presentations that address the challenges presented. At FLL competitions, the teams are evaluated on their robot's performance, their presentation, teamwork and robot design.

During the first judging session the Tryhards gave a presentation with their "Scooper 2000", a transferring device attached to a plow to facilitate more-efficient cleanup and disposal of debris after a tornado. Declan McHugh explained the various types of tornadoes, as A. J. Lacaze, Peter Coene, Joey Sanchez and Ciaran McAndrews demonstrated the effects of a tornado on their model house, tree, and car. Matthew Mussleman and Dominic Gagliardi explained how

the Scooper 2000 could pick up debris with shovels on a wheel that would load it onto a conveyer belt. Sarkis Pakhchanian ended the presentation by detailing how they had shared their idea with local landscaper Thomas Evers.

For their second round of judging, the Tryhards demonstrated how their handmade robot, "The Dominator" could race through an obstacle course, performing assigned missions as they ran the circuit. In the first heat the Tryhards robot perfectly accomplished six maneuvers out of 20 on their mission board's obstacle course.

The robot performed all of these tasks as programmed, the team scoring 267 points out of 616 on the first try. The Tryhards were so pleased by their robot's performance that, in between the first and second heat, they attempted to

add a program to navigate another portion of the course and increase their point score. Unfortunately, they were unsuccessful. However, between the second and third heats, they did successfully add a program to allow the robot to dislodge a branch from a tree and then set their vehicle back on its previous mission. Unfortunately, when the robot did return to the earlier mission, it had an accident and caused unintended damage. Despite these setbacks, the Tryhards still finished in 7th out of 23 teams in the robot

tion to reviewing basics such as polishing resumes, role playing for interviews, networking, and crafting the 1-minute "elevator speech," Job Seekers hosts special events such as LinkedIn workshops and our most recent topic, "Assessing Where You Are on the Career Road Map" (see photo).

During these three years, the Job Seekers Support Group has become a community in the deepest sense of the word. The ongoing support among group members is perhaps best expressed by Paula, one of our job seekers who recently became a successful "job finder." After stop-

ping by in February with apologies for needing to leave early, Paula e-mailed: "Though I only got to see everyone briefly, at least I touched 'home' for a few minutes."

This sense of "home" is felt by many. Mercy, a bilingual educator, affirmed her intention to continue with the group even after finding work, because she "feels that the group is part of my family now." For Mercy, that family feeling is not only virtual but also literal: her husband, Manuel (fully employed), accompanies her to meetings and even participates when Mercy is away.

All are welcome to join our Job Seekers "family," which usually gathers together on the first Monday of every month at 7:30 p.m. in the Commons area at St. Elizabeth Church in Rockville. eacon Frank Bendel and his wife Isabel both serve the Church by teaching. He is the coordinator of the RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults) program at Mother Seton Parish and she teaches ESOL (English for Speakers of Other Languages) through Spanish Catholic Charities.

They have been married for 37 years, and have been blessed with five children and (so far) three grandchildren. They met in Isabel's hometown, Buenos Aires, Argentina, where they both worked at the American embassy. Thanks to Frank's career, they have lived in Connecticut, Georgia, Oklahoma. RideOn, Metrobus free for seniors during certain hours

id you know that seniors 65 and older ride free on Ride On and some Metro buses in Montgomery County from 9:30 am to 3:00 pm, Monday through Friday, and pay half the usual fare most other times? To do so, seniors must have a valid senior SmarTrip card or Medicare card and photo ID.

In addition, seniors pay just half the usual Metrorail fare when using a senior SmarTrip card. This convenient electronic card makes travel on transit in the region seamless and now saves you money. With SmarTrip, travelers can pay for Metrorail, Metrobus, Ride On and parking at Metro stations - all with the convenient touch of a card. SmarTrip users can check balances and add money to the card on buses as well as at Metro stations. SmarTrip is a permanent, rechargeable fare card. It's plastic like a credit card and is embedded with



a special computer chip that keeps track of the value of the card.

To purchase the card, seniors need to show a valid government issued photo ID with proof of age at the locations listed below and most public libraries located in Montgomery County. The Senior SmarTrip card costs \$2.

NIH adds substantial set of genetic, health information to online database

Information on older adults is largest ever resource for researchers

esearchers will now have access to genetic data linked to medical information on a diverse group of more than 78,000 people, enabling investigations into many diseases and conditions. The data, from one of the nation's largest and most diverse genomics projects—Genetic Epidemiology Research on Aging (GERA)have just been made available to qualified researchers through the database of Genotypes and Phenotypes (dbGaP), an online genetics database of the National Institutes of Health.

The GERA cohort—average age 63—was developed collaboratively by Kaiser Permanente and the University of California, San Francisco (UCSF). The addition of the data to dbGaP was made possible with \$24.9 million in support from the National Institute on Aging (NIA) and the National Institute of Mental Health. "I look forward to new insights that such a unique resource might offer for better health with age," said NIA Director Richard J. Hodes, M.D.

"Data from this immense and ethnically diverse population will be a tremendous resource for science," said NIH Director Francis S. Collins, M.D., Ph.D. "It offers the opportunity to identify potential genetic risks and influences on a broad range of health conditions, particularly those related to

aging."

The GERA cohort is part of the Research Program on Genes, Environment, and Health (RPGEH), which includes more than 430,000 adult members of the Kaiser Permanente Northern California system. Data from this larger cohort include electronic medical records, behavioral and demographic information from surveys, and saliva samples from 200,000 participants obtained with informed consent for genomic and other analyses.

In addition to diseases and conditions traditionally associated with aging, such as cardiovascular disease, cancer and osteoarthritis, researchers can explore the potential genetic underpinnings of a variety of diseases that affect people in adulthood, including depression, insomnia, diabetes, certain eye diseases and many others representing a variety of disease domains. Researchers will also be able to use the database to confirm or disprove other studies that use data from relatively small numbers of people, as well as to increase the size and power of their samples by adding participants from GERA to meta-analyses. The large cohort will also serve as a reference source of controls that researchers can compare to individuals with different conditions that they have studied.


