First, let's celebrate the lives of two great Montgomery "prophets" who returned to God this summer. Both passed away around Father's Day, notable since both lived lives that improved conditions for children and families in our community. Paul Molloy was an alcoholic, or as he bluntly described himself, a "street drunk". He was a welleducated, successful attorney blessed with a loving family, until at forty, he became addicted, and his successful professional and family life collapsed. His story is tragically commonplace.

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'School Year' Resolutions

n 1582, Pope Gregory XIII introduced a new calendar — what we now call the Gregorian calendar — to replace the one Julius Caesar introduced in 46 B.C. Caesar's calendar underestimated the solar year by 11 minutes, and over the cen-

turies it fell out of synch with the seasons. Pope Gregory's calendar has held up these 440 years. We can count on the calendar and the seasons lining up as they should. As critical and accurate as the Gregorian calendar is, I think for most of us it is less in synch with our rhythm of life than what we may call the "school calendar."

As we get older and finish our educations, we don't think as much about being dependent on school cycles, but much of our lives are still impacted by school beginning in the fall and ending in the spring. Many of you reading this probably have children or grandchildren back in school or getting ready to go

Parish's Efforts to Engage Young People with Special Needs in the Synodal Process is Highlighted on Vatican Website

When asked to reflect on how they gather, serve, and receive Jesus Christ in church as part of the Synod on Synodality, the six students in St. Francis of Assisi's Special Needs Catechesis class openly shared their experiences. Thanks to the efforts of their director of religious education, the students' reflections moved through the highest echelons of the Catholic Church, now serving as a best practice on how local parishes can better engage with people with special needs.

The turn of events occurred when Director of Religious Education Susan Anderson sought to use resources provided in February by the archdiocesan Office for Deaf and Disabilities Ministry to engage the students in the global conversations being held as part of the synod. Using questions based on three themes – Communion, Participation and Mission -- the students spoke about, drew, or shared photos of their faith experiences during their regularly scheduled online classes last spring.

"The goal was pastoral in that it allowed our

Well Read Mom Kicks off the Year of the Giver

ell Read Mom, an international woman's book club focused on helping all women to read more and read better, is preparing to launch its "Year of the Giver". The booklist includes titles from Tolstoy, Bronte, and others. It invites women to consider the proposed books through the lens of St. Therese of Lisieux, arcs, and narratives, considering when she stated, "If a little flower could speak, it seems to me that it would tell us quite simply all that God has done for it, without hid-

ing any of its gifts. It would not, under the pretext of humility, say that it was not pretty, or that it had not a sweet scent, that the sun had withered its petals, or the storm bruised its stem, if it knew that such were not the case." In doing so, participants will be challenged to look at various characters, story how each aspect of the story speaks to God as the Giver of everything. Well Read Mom uses a method of accompaniment to inspire partici-

pants to contemplate what the story suggests about their own experience. How does one's own life "tell of what God has done, without hiding any of its gifts"? The group can then become a place to share these insights.

According to the organization's website, by gathering in small groups to discuss the texts, "We hope to deepen the awareness of meaning hidden in each woman's daily life, elevate the cultural conversation, and revitalize reading literature from books."



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
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Our Parish Times in Rome



Little Convent in the Big City: A New Children's Series by the Franciscan Sisters of the Renewal

Thanks to the witness of our wonderful pastors, the children in our schools and parishes have some familiarity with the priesthood. However, the same cannot be said for religious sisters. Despite our vibrant faith communities, many Catholic

kids today don't know about convents, habits, and most importantly, the amazing love for Christ that religious sisters share with the world.

The Franciscan Sisters of the Renewal are seeking to address this problem by publishing Little Convent in the Big City, a series of children's books that demonstrate both what the daily life of a sister looks like, as well as the amazing graces and miracles that they see. The first book in the series, *The Unsolvable Problem*, introduces readers to Sr. Mary Andy and her sisters as they confront a big dilemma while hosting a community picnic for the Fourth of July, which is based on a real experience of the CFR sisters. The story reveals how the sisters



rely on Jesus for every problem, big and small. It tells Sr. Mary Andy's story while also weaving in details of the religious sister's life, from taking care of the convent to gathering in the chapel for prayer, Adoration, and the Sacraments. Each page is a reflection of the Franciscan Sisters of the Renewal's commit-

ment to serving Christ in the poor. The Little Convent in the Big City books are written by Mother Clare Matthiass, CFR

are written by Mother Clare Matthiass, CFR and illustrated by acclaimed Catholic illustrator, Michael Corsini. Mother Clare and the other Sisters of the Renewal hope that the books will tell Catholic kids loud and clear, that there are still religious sisters in the world and that it is a beautiful and joyous vocation.

group to reflect on our experiences of Church and to share in the worldwide consultation process in preparation for the Synod of Bishops," Anderson said.

"There was also the catechetical goal of helping our group understand more fully our connection to the wider Church, including our communion with our local Archbishop, Cardinal Gregory, and with the Bishop of Rome, Pope Francis."

The students' participation in responding to the adapted synodal questions dovetailed with the parish's synodal listening sessions for adults. During four online gatherings last winter, parishioners responded to questions developed by the Archdiocese of Washington to address the synodal themes.

To adapt the questions for students with special needs, Anderson and her four catechists introduced the synod process during the February class and previewed the questions for the first theme. Students were invited to reflect on those questions and bring their responses to the March class. At the next class, the students shared their responses and then introduced the questions for the next theme.

Julie Wilhelm, whose 23-year-old son Matt is in the Special Needs Catechesis class, used tools from the Picture Exchange Communication System, which assigns a picture to a word, to communicate his thoughts. By cutting and pasting these pictures on a piece of paper, Matt formed sentences in response to the synodal questions.

Wilhelm praised Anderson's approach to adapting the material for her son and his peers,

saying the experience made her feel like she and Matt were heard. "[Susan] is so open to how each of her

students can participate," Wilhelm said. "Whatever our kids can do,

she gets our kids and supports them."

After the students' synodal discussions concluded in May, Anderson compiled some of the resources her team used and the students' responses in a booklet for the archdiocese. When Cardinal Gregory celebrated one of the parish's 50th anniversary Masses at St. Francis on May 29, pastor Fr. John Dillon presented the compilation to him.

The archdiocesan staff submitted the document to the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, which, in turn, submitted the document to the Vatican. The document is now one of multiple tools represented on a web site featuring Vatican synodal resources; it can be viewed at www.synodresources.org/resources/.

Anderson said she was "very surprised" to learn the resource was chosen to be on the Vatican's synodal resource page, but believed it was picked for two reasons: it demonstrated engagement with a community that often sits on the margins and told a narrative of how the synod process could be integrated into existing ministry.

She said she hopes the synodal process demonstrated to the students and their families that they have an integral connection with the universal Church.

"Each of us, as baptized members of the Church, are part of the Body of Christ, called to spread the Good News," Anderson said. "I hope our students, families and catechists were affirmed in their understanding of this."

Endings and Beginning

S eptember – a time of endings and beginnings. For many of us, the end of a long, lazy summer - the end of popsicles, lightning bugs, and sand between our toes. Then there are the more significant endings-beginnings. My neighbor is preparing to take his only son to college on Friday. His son is spending every waking moment with his high school

friends - finding it hard to believe they won't be together like this ever again. His mom and dad are starting to realize the inevitability of the new life they begin as their boy steps out into a world that they do not know. The idea that they are no longer his guides - his safety net – after filling that role for every minute of the last eighteen years will hit all of them hard as they drive away from their boy. There will be tears.

Young mothers and fathers drive by the doors to the preschool wondering if, when the "first day" comes, they will have the courage to leave their little ones in the hands of strangers for as many as eight hours a day. They are excited for this new phase in their lives and their children's lives, but there will be tears on that first day – and not all of them will be the tears of little children.

Older boys and girls are shopping for school supplies, finishing up summer reading assignments, and wondering what the new school year will bring. Will they make new friends, and will their old friends still be friends? Will the teacher like them? Will the work be too hard? The nerves are starting to kick in for parents, too. Will the teacher recognize how smart their girl is, or will she let her sit silently

their child make a friend, or will he eat lunch alone? On that first day back to school, palms will be sweating and hearts will be beating just a little faster, and while they might be shed in private, there will be tears.

Somewhere a mother fights the tears, not wanting her son to

see, as he deploys to Somalia. Somewhere a daughter cries, holding her father's hand, as he begins his last journey. Somewhere a young couple heads to the hospital to welcome their first child, not realizing that in a few hours they will begin their real life – as a family.

Life is such a series of endings and beginnings that we don't really stop to think about how we handle them, and what they teach us – until we are older and have the time to look back.

It seems to me that God gives us these beginnings and endings, not to test us, but rather to teach us that every ending provides us with the opportunity to discover something new. The tragedies and losses reveal strength and fortitude that we didn't know we had. The happy miracles - a smooth adjustment to school for our children, a beautiful new baby, a great job, or a safe return home – they all remind us to be grateful for the gift of life itself. Our beginnings and endings prepare us, I think, for the moment when we will say goodbye to this life. There will be tears, but there will also be a perspective that allows us to end with grace, and to hold hope for what God has waiting for us. ОРТ

Along with her parents, Frances Paola DiCesare (Tamburello) and Giuseppe DiCesare, and sister Rose Josephine Moran (DiCesare), she immigrated to the United States in December 1928.

They established their residence in Baltimore City and cared for many family members during the Great Depression. Her father worked as a foreman in the shipbuilding yards, managing the construction of ships for the World War II effort.

Her mother insisted on the highest of academic and Catholic instruction and at great expense enrolled her daughters in the Institute of Notre Dame, later matriculating through to the College of Notre Dame of Maryland.

Catherine graduated in 1944 and immediately found work in Baltimore teaching at Dundalk High School. In 1947 she moved to Bethesda to begin an independent life and career. Fluent in at least four languages, she worked at the Italian Embassy while taking graduate level courses at Catholic University including instruction from Fr. Hartke in the Arts and Drama school. She then began working as a teacher at another school in Silver Spring.

Catherine's positive, confident, and entrepreneurial spirit created The Woodlawn School of Bethesda in 1950. Located on five acres across from the National Institutes of Health, the school attracted the children of highly educated parents who needed a full-time daycare and school for their youngsters. The inspired success of Woodlawn School derived from a commitment to 7 am to 6 pm childcare as well as a rigorous education.

Catherine worked tirelessly many long days and nights as teacher, principal, custodian, costume maker, camp director and owner/operator growing the school into a year-round venture. With the help of Blanche Drennan ("Miss Teadie"), The Woodlawn School Summer Camp launched with the addition of a large swimming pool, an event stage platform for plays and musicals as well as horseback riding events. A pioneer in childhood education, she was fondly known as "Miss Kitty." She worked continuously until retirement in 1990.

Catherine married John Joseph Francis Corrigan in 1964 at St. Jane Frances de Chantal. They met in late 1962 at the Army/Navy Club in Washington, DC. John was a veteran of the U.S Army and the U.S. Air Force.

In May of 1965, uncertain that she could have children at the age of 44, she adopted Michael. Eight months later in January 1966, she gave birth to John. In March

1967, Maria was adopted; in December 1968, Frances.

When Woodlawn School started it was grades k-8, but it became apparent to Miss Kitty that the greatest need was for the youngest children. She created two grades before kindergarten. Nursery and Prenursery. The entrance exam was going to the bathroom by yourself. By 1970 the school, located on five acres next to Avrlawn Park, went only to third grade. It was co-ed. The enrollment fluctuated between 150 and 190. In 1990 after 40 years of running the school, she retired and sold the land to Mitchell and Best. They built 20 houses on the land on what is now Trafton Place. An interesting note is that that was not the first location for the school, which was originally on Old Georgetown Road on the land now occupied by Congregation Beth El. In 1954, Miss Kitty swapped her land for Mr. Marx's land next to Ayrlawn.

Woodlawn School's approach was to make each child's time from 7am until 6pm productive and fun. It was daycare from 7-9, school from 9-3, and then afterschool from 3-6. In the summer it was camp. The school only closed for the Federal holidays. There were students who would come just when their own schools were closed for Christmas or the summer. Woodlawn closed after 40 years because Miss Kitty wanted to retire at age 70.

When they lived on the school grounds, the Corrigans were parishioners of St. Jane de Chantal and the children attended St. Jane's School after their early grades at Woodlawn. From 1968-1979, Woodlawn School was near maximum enrollment so the family moved to St. Raphael parish so that their house on the school's campus could be used for extra classrooms. The Corrigan boys went on to St Anselm's Abbey School and their sisters attended Immaculata Preparatory School, which closed in 1991.

Throughout her 100 years, Catherine radiated a positive warmth and a zest for life to all fortunate enough to meet her. Every person she met came away feeling uplifted and genuinely loved by her. Her laugh was loud and infectious and the life of the party. She hosted many parties and gatherings. Her generosity was boundless (especially with food) and inspired her children to act the same. But if you asked Catherine her greatest strengths, she would always point to the Blessed Mother, her patron saint, St. Anne de Beaupre and her beloved Padre Pio.



Avalon Group Takes First Trip to Rome

n June 2022, the men of The Avalon School sent a delegation to Assisi and Rome. Our group was led by Kevin Oriani, Avalon's Latin teacher, and Pro-Rome's guide, Brendan McGlone.

While in Rome, we resided at the top of Via delle Fornaci near the Janiculum Hill. It was a beautiful place for early risers to meet each morning's sunrise with the daily office and every evening in prayer for the next day's promising agenda.

Our students visited the Tomb of St. Peter, which is in the depths of St. Peter's Basilica in the Vatican Necropolis. From the Scavi beneath, we all climbed to the top of the Dome of St. Peter's Basilica, with a breathtaking view of Vatican City and Rome. Visits to the Colosseum, the Roman Forum and Palatine Hill, and to Anzio Beach provided historical perspectives through the centuries.

In Assisi, where God invited St Francis to "go and rebuild my church which, as you see, is falling down," we attended an evening Mass in the Church of Santa Maria Maggiore. There we encountered Blessed Carlo Acutis, who was just 15 when he died in Assisi of leukemia in 2006. He lies in repose, in a tomb with a glass window, in his preferred wardrobe of Nikes, jeans, and a sweater. Pope Francis called him "a witness for young people that true happiness is found when one puts God first;" and he is a profound witness for our fellow travelers of this generation.

We returned through Rome invigorated from our travels, with our adventures and time with the Saints reminding us that as we are surrounded by a crowd of witnesses, we can persevere in sharing our faith with our family and friends here in the Archdiocese of Washington.



A Lively OLOL Summer

hen the last day of school arrived June 13, the doors at Our Lady of Lourdes School did not close for the summer.

The doors were kept wide open for students to enjoy camp activities at the school throughout June, July, and August. A Long Summer Day Camp was offered to boys and girls entering 1st through 8th grade. The camp offered "fun-packed" days. The daily routine included a wide range of activities including arts and crafts, laser tag, flag football and of course afternoons filled with water activities and games. Water slides were a fixture on the sports field for those sweltering days of July and August!

The second camp offered at Lourdes was the Lifelong Scholars Camp, for students entering Pre-K through third grade. The camp was broken down into Science Week, Lego Town Week, and Animal Planet Week and incorporated the following into each weeks' activities: reading and math support and enrichment, STEM and project-based learning, phonics and writing skills, read alouds/literacy advancement, as well as small group work in language arts and math. In science week, students learned about famous scientists as well as about children inventors, performed experiments, and created new projects with a variety of tools. 

St. Bernadette School Celebrates 75 Years

n the 1940s, there was a farm along University Boulevard in Silver Spring that provided land for houses to pop up. Saint Bernadette was established as a mission church in the diocese of Baltimore in 1944 on one of the remaining parcels of land. Three years later, as the Archdiocese of Washington expanded into Montgomery County, Saint Bernadette's Parish consisted of 250 families. With this large number of dedicated, involved, and faithfilled followers, the pastor Father Kennedy decided that Four Corners needed a school, convent and additional facilities to provide for the ever-growing Catholic community.

The school opened to kindergarten, first, second and third graders on September 8, 1947, with four sisters from the



bouquets for the altar," Deorio said.

During one of its 50th Anniversary Masses on June 5, the parish community whose church once sat in the middle of a cornfield showed a different kind of bounty: a building filled with people of varying hues, singing, praying, and worshipping around the altar adorned with the Resurrection Cross – a sacred reflection of the joy felt by those in attendance.

In his Homily before the congregation, Fr. John Dillon – the sixth and current pastor of St. Francis of Assisi Parish – focused on the gifts of the Holy Spirit to celebrate the liturgy coinciding with Pentecost.

"The Holy Spirit remains with us and wants us to use our gifts," Fr. Dillon said. "These gifts help us to call us on our journey – they are meant to be shared."

Decreed on May 25, 1972, by Archbishop Patrick Cardinal O'Boyle, the new parish drew from the boundaries of St. Peter's in Olney, St. Martin's in Gaithersburg, and St. Mary's and St. Patrick's in Rockville. Founding pastor Fr. John Stack celebrated the parish's first Mass in the Redland Middle School gymnasium – next door to the future church – on June 4, 1972, amid basketball hoops and a picture of a gorilla, then the school's mascot. The present church building was dedicated on October 4, 1975.

Over the last half century, the parish's membership ballooned to as many as 1,700 families and has decreased to its current 1,400 families. Under the pastoral leader-

ship of Fr. Stack, Fr. Andre Bouchard, Fr. Donald P. Worch, Fr. Lee Fangmeyer, Fr. David W. Beaubien, and Fr. Dillon, the parish continues a twinning partnership with Conversion of St. Paul's Catholic Church in Léon, Haiti, for over 30 years, operates a robust Religious Education program, and offers diverse music styles at its five weekend Masses. Over the past decade, it has also revitalized ministry life with the establishment of a Joyful Greeter Ministry and a Communications Ministry.

In addition to the anniversary liturgy and Parish Festival on June 5, Cardinal Wilton D. Gregory commemorated the church's golden anniversary during a Mass held May 29. The parish festivities kicked off last fall at the Feast Day and Parish Picnic, continued with a tour of its Outdoor Prayer Spaces last spring and is culminating with a memorial tree fundraiser this fall.


Founding parishioner George Hicho, who lives in Bel Air, MD, joined St. Francis with his young family after moving to Mill Creek Town in 1965. A member of the parish's first Parish Council, Hicho said he recalls Fr. Stack putting parishioners in ministry roles that suited their strengths. "He said, 'We've got to keep this going to build this church for the people," Hicho said.

Hicho praised Fr. Dillon, who he said has done an "excellent job" helping the church transition to serving a more diverse demographic.

"To see new faces in the church, it's really encouraging," Hicho said. "My family was very proud to serve our Lord in that church."

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





Paul entered a local group home and was making progress when the home suddenly closed. Yet another barrier to recovery could have been overwhelming. With God's grace and Paul's persevering leadership, the residents stayed in the house and managed their own sobriety, establishing rules for sober living among themselves. This small group, living in a rented house in Silver Spring, was the humble beginning of the Oxford House Movement. With the help of a young priest from Holy Cross Parish, Fr. Joaquin Bazan, today

there are more than 3000 Oxford Houses in the United States and abroad providing opportunities for once ruined lives to be salvaged. Paul and his co-founders faced their personal crises and the collapse of the treatment system supporting them with courage and innovation and envisioned a new and effective way to recovery. Those benefiting from their vision reclaim their lives, and some, thankfully for Paul Molloy, their families.

The Old Testament tells us of a loving and wise God who sent humanity prophets during chaotic and challenging times. I believe Paul Molloy was a prophet and a true "Street Saint".

On Father's Day, Rex Smith

passed away. Rex had four children but is remembered for providing loving care for thousands of Montgomery County youths who were abandoned, abused or ran afoul of the law. About the same time Paul Molloy was passionately advocating to improve addiction treatment services, Rex was a young probation officer struggling with an ineffective juvenile justice system. Just as he was beginning his heroic reform efforts, his young wife died suddenly leaving him to raise his young sons by himself. Personally and professionally, Rex faced a life changing time. With renewed commitment, he chose to take action to improve care for the vulnerable youth for whom he

deeply cared. Too many teens were being placed in decrepit and underresourced reform schools without mental health and educational services needed to overcome their challenges. Most unacceptable to Rex was the lack of love and compassion provided for these children. A particularly unfair and ineffective practice of the time was to treat innocent and vulnerable abused and neglected children removed from their families, in the same place and manner as delinquent, often, violent children. Rex had a vision to make this situation better. With a few business and church volunteers, many of them Catholic including then County Executive James Gleason, Rex established an

Rex Smith's prophetic vision resulted in a vastly improved juvenile justice system comprised of caring homes with essential supportive services throughout our county and the State of Maryland. The organization has aptly renamed itself, **Hearts and Homes for Youth.**


Paul Molloy and Rex Smith faced what David Gergen describes as crucibles of life in his recent book. "Hearts Touched with Fire". Gergen defines a **crucible of life as a time in the life of an individual or institution when multiple difficult and complex challenges converge at the same time often leading to profound individual or structural change.**

As we kick off a new season, many parishes are facing unprecedented, multiple and complex challenges. Gergen's description of a crucible! Severely stretched finances, aging facilities, lower Mass participation and parish engagement, older and more diverse parish populations, struggling Catholic schools, inadequate vocations, lingering effects of the pandemic, and discomfort with Church hierarchy have converged to create moments of truth and faith for individual parishioners as well as parish structures. Even blessed with dedicated and capable clergy and parish staff, these crucibles will not resolve themselves.

The urgent question is, how will each of us as Catholics and our beloved parish community respond to the crucibles of today? With prophetic vision, inspired by the teachings and life of Jesus and the wisdom of the Holy Spirit, parishes can grow through this time of challenge. Yet, responding to God requires work and faithful participation. In the parable regarding false prophets (Matthew 7), Jesus tells us that the measure of our success will be as a vine that produces good fruit from new growth. Let's double down to help our parish measure up by producing the most delectable fruits. We will delve into this more specifically in future columns. Your emailed "prophesies" are welcome! OPT

Joshua: "I'm 24 years old and this pilgrimage experience will be something I'll remember for the rest of my life. From climbing Mount Sinai and visit the actual places where Jesus was, where all the stories in the Gospel took place, it fills your heart with the knowledge that this is truly the truth. I was able to go at a point in my life where I'm growing older and pondering my vocation more, so to be able to experience this pilgrimage with questions in my heart made it all the more fulfilling. My favorite churches were in the Garden of Gethsemane and St. Peter in Gallicantu, places where Jesus went through great prayer and contem-



plation. I was able to do my deepest prayers there."

Mark: "I was a chaperone on the pilgrimage and found it a blessing but a challenge in many ways. It's a different experience trying to serve on a pilgrimage than going yourself. I was definitely challenged on this trip and found being a chaperone the perfect experience for me to learn a lot about myself, my pride and need for humility and my patience and limits.

"One of my favorite visits was Mount Sinai: the challenge of reaching the top, its beautiful view, and the beautiful monastery at its base. I also liked the mosque at site of Jesus' ascension. But, being a fisherman, the Sea of Galilee was really moving.

"In the end I have much to be



thankful for. Leaving Egypt and entering Israel was a great experience as we could feel the joy of entering a more beautiful place, truly the Promised Land. I never dreamt I would ever visit the Holy Land in my lifetime. I'm grateful for the opportunity despite being challenged by my weaknesses in keeping an eye on the youth and

helping with their needs. Every evening I think I fell asleep at our chaperone and itineraries meeting as we planned for the next day. In the end I lost a lot of weight, came back exhausted, but will be blessed for it."



find the finger of God. If we can let the Greeks help us pray, can we let babies do the same? The church is full of stimuli – stained glass, statues, incense, music, bright vestments – all of which can distract us or help us pray, depending on how we decide to react. Can we decide the same with a baby's cries?

Babies gurgle. Who knows what they're saying? It might as well be Latin, or a charismatic speaking in tongues. But we can hear the tone of simple joy, and let it capture us and lift us. Noisy joy? Amen!

Babies shriek. Lemme go, gimme that! If they were more verbal and precise, would they be shrieking, "Lord, have mercy"? Who is ever far from that prayer? If I don't hurt, my neighbor does, and I sure hope God cares about it. We try to focus on the reading or the homily, but memories and plans and fears and troubles intrude. Grownups learn to respond with some self-control and discipline; but inside, maybe there's some fuss. Kyrie, eleison? Amen!

Babies sing, but not with the choir. That shouldn't bother anyone; most of the church sings off key or out of synch. We can't let that interrupt our tranquillity.

Babies are curious. Teach me, Lord, to approach you with awe and wonder, evernew. Amen!

Babies have their own schedules. They want to nurse, eat, strut, or leave when they say it's time. Adults want to follow their schedule – sing, sit, listen, stand, kneel, watch, pray, recall, reflect, meditate, contemplate, supplicate – on cue. But it never works perfectly. When adults pray the Our Father, someone is always a little ahead or a little behind or uses the wrong pronoun (thy, your). But we pray together, right? Amen!

Socrates, Gregorian chant, incense, stained glass, babies: it's all happy hungry noise. Amen?

Father Paul Lee Celebrates Ten Years as Pastor at the Shrine of St. Jude

um Spiro, Spero – While I breathe, I hope" ... This quote is the motto of St. Andrews, Scotland, and also copied from Fr. Paul D. Lee's Facebook page. Fr. Lee truly has lived by these words while serving as pastor for the past 10 years at the Shrine of St. Jude in Aspen Hill.

Reverent Paul D. Lee, STD, was born in Seoul, South Korea (the land of morning calm), on December 31, 1955, to Bernard and Susanna Lee and is part of a large family with four brothers, one sister, and many nieces and nephews.

He earned a BA degree in Philosophy at the Catholic College in Seoul and briefly taught high school before coming to the United States in 1979 to attend seminary. After graduating from Mount Saint Mary's Seminary, he was ordained a priest for the Archdiocese of Washington on May 28, 1983. Fr. Lee's first assignment as a parochial vicar was at the Shrine of St. Jude, where he served from 1983 to 1989. Fr. Lee then continued his theology study at the Pontifical University of St. Thomas Aquinas in Rome from 1990 to 1994, where he graduated summa cum laude with a Doctorate in Sacred Theology. From 1994 to


2002, Fr. Lee served as Chaplin of the Korean Community of Mercy, and from 2002 to 2010 he served as the parochial vicar at the Scared Heart parish in La Plata and was the pastor at both Our Lady of Victory and Epiphany parishes in Washington, DC. From 1994 until 2012, he served as the Director of the Office for Ecumenical and Interreligious Affairs and the Office for Continuing Education for Priests in the Archdiocese of Washington.

Fr. Lee hit the ground running 10 years ago when he arrived at the Shrine of St. Jude. His very first project was organizing a Parish Paint Day, where parishioners and St. Jude Regional Catholic School families were invited to paint the exterior of the school—over a hundred people responded to the call! This opening act had a two-fold purpose of first, gathering an extensive group of diverse parishioners into a single effort and, second, setting a precedent of renovation to our aging parish campus.

The Holy Spirit descended on Fr. Lee in his ministry of bridging the more than 60 nationalities at St. Jude, as St. Paul, his namesake, did traveling the known Roman world 2,000 years ago. Fr. Lee touts the strength of the St. Jude diversity in his inspirational homilies and lectures to invited theology gatherings. Over the years, Fr. Lee has established a robust Faith Formation and RCIA program, serving our diverse parishioners, and Masses for the Spanish and Filipino communities are regularly celebrated. At this past Easter Vigil Mass, Fr. Lee gave over 30 Easter greetings in different languages after his dual English and Spanish homily.

When the pandemic hit our growing immigrant community rather hard, Fr. Lee recognized the corporal works of mercy with a need to feed the hungry. He gathered concerned parishioners and quickly created a food pantry. The St. Stephen's Food Pantry at the Shrine

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of St. Jude, started just over two years ago, has become a model in responding to this need and feeds about 200 families a week.

Fr. Lee's spiritual ministry saw a robust growth of the Faith Formation with well over 1,000 children entering the faith thru baptism and advancing in First Communion and Confirmation. Other ministries under Fr. Lee's direction are: The That Man is You, which ministers to the men of the parish, and an Arimathean Ministry, which answers the call of another corporal works of mercy, to bury the dead.

Enrollment at our parish school (St. Jude Regional Catholic School) was in the decline prior to Fr. Lee's arrival. Under his leadership, the school is thriving and is now a Regional School at full capacity—a testament to Fr. Lee's strong belief and commitment to educating our children in a strong Catholic environment.

Fr. Lee's personal devotion and quest is to honor the Korean War veteran and Chaplin, Father Emil Kapaun. It is a St. Jude tradition that every September, Fr. Lee celebrates an outdoor Mass on the school parking lot using the hood of a military Jeep as an altar to honor Fr. Kapaun in the same way that Chaplin Kapaun celebrated Mass to troops in the field.

Fr. Lee's renovations to the infrastructure

at the Shrine have been nonstop and include a new parish office, new school roof, a solar energy source with panels throughout the campus buildings, newly renovated St. Clare chapel, renovated rectory, renovated parish kitchen, renovated parish hall ante room, renovated breezeway, renovated the Madigan Hall with a parishioner donated new basketball floor, and he acquired new tables and chairs for the community hall. After celebrating the big 60th anniversary of the Shrine in 2016, Fr. Lee undertook the full renovation of the church sanctuary, a threemonth project that included a new sound system and lighting. Other outside projects included the major replacement of the entire parking lot while improving the landscape with new tree plantings and giving a new coat of paint to our buildings, especially to the landmark bell tower.



Reviving our Eucharistic Faith

his year marks the beginning of the Eucharistic Revival called for by our nation's bishops. We at St. John Neumann parish are beginning our efforts to take part in this revival, and one aspect of that is ongoing formation and catechesis. During his summer assigned to our parish, seminarian Taylor Colwell gave a series of faith formation talks on the mystery of the Holy Eucharist.

The series of talks was entitled "Reviving Our Eucharistic Faith" and featured three different facets of what we believe about the Eucharist and how it impacts our lives as Christians. They took place on three consecutive Thursday evenings: July 14th, 21st, and 28th, and featured a strong turnout of parishioners.

The first of these three talks discussed "Hidden Manna: The Eucharist in the Bible." It examined some of the most important images and types from the Old Testament, particularly the Exodus from Egypt, and saw how these were fulfilled by Christ in the Eucharist. We were reminded of Christ as the New Passover Lamb and the Eucharist as the New Passover Meal as well as new Manna from heaven.

The second talk was entitled "Sacrament of Unity: The Eucharist in the Church." It explained how the Eucharist makes the Church, that is, how the celebration of the Eucharist lies at the origins of the Church, holds the Church in being, and gives

the Church her mission.

The third talk was entitled "Sacrament of Charity: The Eucharist in the Christian Life." This final installment examined the central place of the Eucharist in our spiritual lives. We heard how the Eucharist impacts each area of the spiritual life and also received practical suggestions for enabling the sacrament we receive to bear greater fruit in our lives.

Strong fundraising support allowed the school to acquire \$200k in technology equipment and upgrades to enhance the curriculum and support the teachers this school year.

The 65th Anniversary will be celebrated in fun ways throughout the year including a parent reception on the first day of school, a schoolwide student party on the 65th day, a dress like the '50s-day and alumni recognition at the school gala.

Mary Randles, the Director of Admissions and Development, is entering her 28th year at Saint Peters. She says that while the school has grown and seen various changes over the years, the sense of community has remained the same. "The teachers, students, and parents, form a close, supportive group, with many friendships lasting well beyond eighth grade. We are now, more than ever, committed to helping our students find their place in the world, spiritually and academically. I'm looking forward to celebrating all the things that make Saint Peter's School a special place for both returning and new families. It's connecting with people that brings me the most joy."

This past week I had several hours of chaplain's office time or campus roaming, a few Masses, a few visits to residences, or short counsel sessions, some trail walking, a bocce game, a funeral and luncheon, a few Masses, and an anointing call. Fr. Virginus has had his happy busy times too this week. It is a pleasant community here. Three interesting projects this week were a 100th birthday party, a resident artist showing a work that will be given to St. Hugh's parish and attending a music performance. During the year, our parish also helps bring in concerts to Riderwood Chapel. We have had social outreach projects too and

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third of six children that grew up in a devout Catholic family of modest means. He served as an altar boy in his home parish, but identifies his faith formation in the Neocatechumenal Way, a charism focused on helping teens and adults rediscover the meaning and gifts of one's Baptism through small faith communities and mission service.

"The small community is formed in the parish," Fr. Okulewicz recently said. "That's why I try to connect the Word of God to daily problems of life. It's something that has to be applied in real life."

His journey to become a priest has been equally real. Describing himself as "an unhappy, cynical teen," Fr. Okulewicz nevertheless found solace in his Neocatechumenal community and acceptance in his youth group, which was led by a priest, Fr. Andrzej Kolodziejczyk.

It was during a retreat with his youth group during the elevation of the Eucharist at Mass when he recalls hearing a voice asking, 'What it would be like to be on the other side of the altar?' He felt an immediate peace and calm, waiting for the answer.

"That was opening my life to the idea of a vocation," he said. "When I didn't know where to go, God showed me the way. Becoming a priest wasn't in the picture, but I followed his voice."

After more vocational discernment, Fr. Okulewicz entered a lottery at the age of 20 and was placed at the Archdiocesan Missionary Seminary Redemptoris Mater in Hyattsville, MD. There, he received his spiritual formation while completing his academic education at the Catholic University of America. During his 12 years in priestly formation, Fr. Okulewicz earned a bachelor's degree of philosophy in 2016, a bachelor's degree in sacred theology in 2022, and a master's degree of divinity the same year.

Shortly after celebrating the ordination with nine other men in his priestly class this past June, Fr. Okulewicz traveled to Egypt and the Holy Land for a catechetical and vocational pilgrimage attended by 8,000 young people formed in the Neocatechumenal Way. His address is now Derwood, MD, where he will learn how to be a parish priest and soon begin celebrating a new Spanish Mass at St. Francis of Assisi Parish this fall.

Marianna Konieczny, who frequently attends Mass at St. Francis of Assisi Parish and is herself a Polish native, has invited Fr. Okulewicz into her home on two church feast days and senses a very special priest.

"He is an extremely good listener, and this is very important," Konieczny said. "He looks in your eyes in Confession and he is looking in my eyes like Christ. That is what the people need."

FDA Finalizes Historic Rule Enabling Access to Over-the-Counter Hearing Aids

More Affordable Hearing Aids Could Be in Stores as Soon as Mid-October

he U.S. Food and Drug Administration issued a final rule to improve access to hearing aids which may in turn lower costs for millions of Americans. This action establishes a new category of over-the-counter (OTC) hearing aids, enabling consumers with perceived mild to moderate hearing impairment to purchase hearing aids directly from stores or online retailers without the need for a medical exam, prescription or a fitting adjustment by an audiologist.

The rule is expected to lower the cost of hearings aids, furthering the Biden-Harris Administration's goal of expanding access to high-quality health care and lowering health care costs for the American public. It is designed to assure the safety and effectiveness of OTC hearing aids, while fostering innovation and competition in the hearing aid technology marketplace.

Today's action follows President Biden's Executive Order on Promoting Competition in the American Economy, which called for the FDA to take steps to allow

Midlife cholesterol and blood sugar levels may be risk factors for Alzheimer's disease

bnormal cholesterol and glucose (or blood sugar) levels as early as age 35 may be associated with Alzheimer's disease risk later in life. These findings, published in Alzheimer's & Dementia, suggest that people with normal cholesterol and glucose measurements in early through middle adulthood may be less likely to develop Alzheimer's as older adults. The study was led by NIA-funded researchers at the Boston University School of Medicine

In previous studies, researchers have explored whether known risk



factors for cardiovascular disease — including diabetes, obesity, and high cholesterol — are also associated with an increased likelihood of developing Alzheimer's. While several of these studies suggest a relationship, these associations had only been measured in adults 55 years old and older. In this study, the research team examined the association of Alzheimer's with cardiovascular risk factors at different stages of adulthood; early (35-50), middle (51-60), and late (61-70). Their findings showed that measurements of these factors in early to middle adulthood were associated with Alzheimer's risk in older adulthood.

The researchers used health data from participants in the



Bishops' Pro-Life Chairman Responds to Executive Order Facilitating Abortion

WASHINGTON - On August 3, the President of the United States signed an executive order facilitating abortion, the second such action from President Biden in response to the United States Supreme Court's decision in Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization, which overturned Roe v. Wade and Planned Parenthood v. Casey. Archbishop William E. Lori of Baltimore, chairman of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' Committee on Pro-Life Activities, issued the following statement in response:

"Even preceding the Dobbs decision, my brother bishops and I have implored the nation to stand with

moms in need, and work together to protect and support women and children. Continued promotion of abortion takes lives and irreparably harms vulnerable pregnant mothers, their families, and society. It is the wrong direction to take at a moment when we should be working to support women and to build up a culture of life. I continue to call on the President and all our elected officials to increase support and care to mothers and babies. rather than facilitate the destruction of defenseless, voiceless human beings. Blessed Virgin Mary, patroness of our nation, intercede for us as we advocate to protect human life and work toward solutions that will help every mother and child flourish."

hearing aids to be sold over the counter and set a swift 120-day deadline for action, which the FDA met. In 2017, Congress passed bipartisan legislation requiring the FDA to create a category of OTC hearing aids, but it was not fully implemented until now. Consumers could see OTC hearing aids available in traditional retail and drug stores as soon as mid-October when the rule takes effect.

"Today's action by the FDA represents a significant milestone in making hearing aids more cost-effective and accessible," said Health and Human Services Secretary Xavier Becerra.

Close to 30 million adults in the U.S. could benefit from hearing aid use. Individuals with permanent hearing impairment can use hearing aids to help make speech and sounds louder, improving the ability to communicate effectively with others. Many hearing aids can be expensive. The final rule aims to stimulate competition and facilitate the sale of safe and effective OTC hearing aids in traditional retail stores or online nationwide, providing consumers with perceived mild to moderate hearing loss with

improved access to devices that meet their needs and are less expensive than current options.

"Hearing loss is a critical public health issue that affects the ability of millions of Americans to effectively communicate in their daily social interactions," said FDA Commissioner Robert M. Califf, M.D. "Establishing this new regulatory category will allow people with perceived mild to moderate hearing loss to have convenient access to an array of safe, effective and affordable hearing aids from their neighborhood store or online."

The OTC category established in this final rule applies to certain airconduction hearing aids intended for people 18 years of age and older who have perceived mild to moderate hearing impairment. Hearing aids that do not meet the requirements for the OTC category (for example, because they are intended for severe hearing impairment or users younger than age 18) are prescription devices.

The FDA finalized the rule after receiving and reviewing more than 1,000 public comments on the proposed rule issued on Oct. 20, 2021. Comments submitted by consumers, professional associations, hearing aid manufacturers, public health organizations and advocacy groups, members of Congress, state agencies, and other stakeholders are

lesterol, and triglyceride levels as well as their blood pressure, body mass index, and smoking status. In later years, participants were also given cognitive health exams and were followed for possible signs of dementia.

After examining the study data, researchers determined that the impact of glucose and cholesterol levels on Alzheimer's risk begins much earlier in life than previously thought. They found that lower HDL (known as good cholesterol) and higher triglyceride (a type of fat found in the blood) levels measured in blood in early adulthood and high blood glucose levels in middle adulthood contributed to future risk of developing Alzheimer's. These

summarized in the final rule, along with the FDA's respective respons-

es. In response to public comments and to assure the safety and effectiveness of OTC hearing aids, the final rule incorporates several changes from the proposed rule, including lowering the maximum sound output to reduce the risk to hearing from over-amplification of sound, revising the insertion depth limit in the ear canal, requiring that all OTC hearing aids have a user-adjustable volume control, and simplifying the phrasing throughout the required device labeling to ensure it is easily understood. The final rule also includes performance specifications and device design requirements specific to OTC hearing aids.

Furthermore, today's action correspondingly amends existing rules that apply to prescription hearing aids for consistency with the new OTC category, it repeals the conditions for sale for hearing aids, and it includes provisions that address some of the effects of the FDA OTC hearing aid regulations on state regulation of hearing aids.

The effective date for the final rule is 60 days following publication in the Federal Register. орт

results underscore cardiovascular risk factors, such as high cholesterol and glucose levels, as risk factors for the disease. The findings also support the idea that managing cholesterol and glucose levels early in adulthood may lower the risk. 


he Supreme Court's decision this summer to overturn Roe v. Wade, and thus to do away with federal protection of abortion as a fundamental right, came as a shock to many. The decision, Dobbs v. Jackson, has provoked responses from joy and relief to outrage and even violence. But it is also becoming clear that many Americans are unaware of exactly what Roe, along with the important 1992 decision Planned Parenthood v. Casey, actually held, and thus are uncertain about what the consequences of Dobbs for abortion law in the United States will be.

On August 27, 2022, the John Paul II Institute is hosting a panel discussion of the Dobbs decision to help Catholics to "read the signs of the times and interpret them in the light of the Gospel" (Gaudium et spes, 3-4). Featured scholars will shed light on the significance of this landmark decision for American law and culture, in view of the Church's understanding of the dignity of every human person and the sanctity of human life. Talks will present and interpret the history of abortion jurisprudence in the United States and will also look ahead to new opportunities and challenges for the pro-life movement.

Persecution of Church in Nicaragua Intensifies

Pope, U.S. Bishops Respond

N icaraguan police on August 19 detained a bishop and seven other priests and off, in an escalation of tensions between the country's government and the Catholic Church, CNN reported. Police entered the headquarters of the Matagalpa diocese and arrested Bishop Rolando Álvarez and the others, authorities said in a statement published on social media.

After "Dobbs," Congress Must Come Together to Protect Life and Promote the Common Good

ASHINGTON - Since the ciliation framework. release of the Supreme Court's decision in Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization, Congress has been taking up legislative proposals that are harmful to the common good. The U.S. House of Representatives has passed, and the Senate may soon consider, a series of such bills, including the Women's Health Protection Act, the Respect for Marriage Act, and the Right to Contraception Act, and is advancing appropriations bills that exclude longstanding provisions prohibiting federal taxpayer funding for abortion and protecting the conscience rights of healthcare providers.

Meanwhile, Congress has taken no action since *Dobbs* on any of the following measures, which the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) has previously endorsed and continues to support, and which would help to build up a culture of life: the Pregnant Workers Fairness Act; an expanded child tax credit, including for pregnant moms; the Adoption Tax Credit Refundability Act; the PFAS Action Act; and a federal paid family leave policy. On a positive note, it is encouraging that there is meaningful consideration of needed investments in care for our common home in a possible recon-

In light of this situation, Archbishop William E. Lori of Baltimore, chairman of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' (USCCB) Committee on Pro-Life Activities, Cardinal Timothy M. Dolan of New York, chairman of the USCCB's Committee for Religious Liberty, Archbishop Salvatore J. Cordileone of San Francisco, chairman of the USCCB's Committee

"This begins with the recognition that every human life is an inestimable gift from God with an inalienable right to life deserving of full legal protection. We must also recognize that the family – founded upon the love and mutual self-gift of husband and wife - is the first

on Laity, Marriage, Family Life & Youth, and Archbishop Paul S. Coakley of Oklahoma City, chairman of the USCCB's Committee on Domestic Justice and Human Development, issued the following statement:

"The Dobbs decision presents a historic opportunity to reshape society for the better. The injustice of abortion has loosened its grip on our nation's Constitution. We call building block of society, and that raising children is both a great gift and a lifelong responsibility.

"The health, safety, and support of the family should be the focus of all good policymaking. A principled commitment to being pro-life entails a commitment both to protecting all human life, especially the most vulnerable, and to advancing policies that help families to flourish. As we accompany every family

ple as means to ends, and would strip rights of conscientious objection from those who oppose these hallmarks of the throwaway culture. Instead, we ask all our elected officials to take action to reach consensus and pass an expanded child tax credit, a refundable adoption tax credit, the Pregnant Workers Fairness Act, a federal paid family leave policy, further supports for the health and wellbeing of pregnant and parenting women, assistance with nutrition and affordable housing, environmental restrictions on chemicals that cause birth defects, and provisions to assist low-income families. These are building blocks of our vision for Standing with Moms in Need.

"Care for creation is also integral to care for human life, and we encourage continued efforts to advance proposals that will protect our common home and promote the well-being of human life and the environment for years to come. For more on this point, see the USCCB's letter on the new framework for environmental investment currently before Congress.

"Families and individuals, civil society, businesses, non-profits, and religious groups, government officials at all levels - and especially members of Congress - should ask themselves how they are supporting families at this moment, particularly around welcoming new life and raising children through adulthood.

"Catholic social teaching shows the way to a better place – a society marked by justice, mutual support, civility, friendship, mercy, and love - than where Congress is now leading. We pray that Congress will rise to meet this generational moment."
