fter a two-year hiatus due to COVID, the annual yard sale at St. Patrick's is finally back! U.S. Bishops Call for Progress in Nuclear Disarmament

Weapons Review Conference in New York concluded on August 26 without consensus on a final document. Bishop David J. Malloy of Rockford, chairman of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' (USCCB) Committee on International Justice and Peace, expressed lament at the failure of international agreement upon the conclusion of the conference.

"At the beginning of the

Treaty on the Non- recently concluded Nuclear Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Proliferation Treaty (NPT) Review Conference, Pope Francis delivered his message to the distinguished delegates imploring them to 'move with determination from a perspective of competition to one of cooperation,' reminding all that 'international peace and stability cannot be based on a false sense of security, on the threat of mutual destruction or total annihilation...'

"Article VI of the NPT commits states-parties to 'pursue nego-



tiations in good faith on effective measures relating to cessation of the nuclear arms race at an early date and to nuclear disarmament.' We lament the failure of the statesparties after four long weeks of negotiation to reach consensus on a final document. We advocate for the acceleration and strengthening of the implementation of the NPT and call on all states-parties to recommit to dialogue and demonstrate progress toward the elimination of nuclear weapons everywhere.

"No corner of our world is untouched by growing hostilities and war. Compounded by asymmetrical warfare, cyber technologies, and the intertwined nature of our world we are one miscalculation away from catastrophe. Fundamentally it is the enmity found in the human heart that is at the root of such conflict and hostility to which the Church proclaims Christ Jesus as the remedy to humankind. We pray that all nations will work to foster trust over suspicion and to bring about immediate and measurable progress towards disarmament and lasting peace."





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

Get out the Vote: Resources for Catholic Voters

arly in his papacy, Pope ■ Francis addressed the need for Catholics to engage in civic life, stating, "We need to participate for the common good. Sometimes we hear: a good Catholic is not interested in politics. This is not true: good Catholics immerse themselves in politics by offering the best of themselves so that the leader can govern." One of the simplest ways that a Catholic can participate in politics is by voting. However, discerning who to vote for can be a difficult task, particularly in today's fraught political environment. Thankfully, local Catholics have many resources to aid in the discernment process before they head to the polls in the coming weeks.

Maryland residents will have the opportunity to vote for Governor, state senators and delegates, a US Senator, and US Representatives on Tuesday, November 8. With many high-profile elections, now is the time to begin educating yourself about the candidates. The Maryland Catholic Conference offers helpful resources to learn about the various candidates and provides survey information regarding where they stand on issues related to Catholic Social Teaching. Voters can see to what extent candidates agree with providing poverty assistance, restricting funding for abortion, addressing environmental concerns, increasing education assistance, and banning physician assisted suicide. The Maryland



Catholic Conference also provides statements from mostf candidates responding to the question, "why should Maryland Catholics vote for you to represent them?". Visit www.mdcatholic.org/elections to see all available candidate respons-

Before voting, also consider reading materials from the USCCB regarding faithful citizenship, which provides helpful direction about how to vote in good conscience. Resources can be found at hwww.usccb.org/offices/justicepeace-human-development/forming-consciences-faithful-citizen-

Finally, one of the most important steps a Catholic should take before voting is prayer, both for one's own wisdom and prudence at the polls, but also for politicians and for our local, state, and national communities. The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops invites all Catholics to pray a novena for faithful citizenship. The prayers are introduced with a beautiful reminder and expression of hope, stating that "Prayer is one of the first steps in acting for justice in our world. This novena, rooted in the biblical tradition and the Church's social teaching, is intended to promote justice and peace in our neighborhoods, our country, and our world." The novena can be found at www. usccb.org/prayers/novena-faithfulcitizenship.

come back to church on Sunday as soon as you are able. We are still not where we were before the pandemic, but we parishes are hopeful this fall will be a great time to recommit to regular Sunday attendance. After all, the Mass is the "source and summit" of the Christian life.

I would also ask you to take time to think about what you are doing to help you and your family feel a part of the bigger effort to build God's kingdom. Community has been critical from the earliest days of the Church, and it remains so today.

I realize we will never get back to the way things were in my youth, but I dream of a time and think about how much good we could do for the kingdom and for our own spiritual growth if we all said we wanted to be more than a nominal Catholic, to build on our Sunday worship and get involved in helping our brothers and sisters in Christ, our parish, and our community.

Two suggestions. First, I always encourage people to start with their parishes. This is the time of year when many parishes have held or will hold ministry fairs. These are great opportunities to learn about available possibilities and talk with those already involved. Your parish is usually close to you, and you probably already know people there. You could get involved in something regular, like teaching Religious Formation classes, or occasional events like food donations, coat drives and other activities helping those in need.

Second, we at Catholic Charities can really use more help, and we are beginning to once again ramp up our volunteer program. We lost many volunteers during the first couple years of the pandemic, through no fault of their own. We had to shut down programs for the safety of all involved. We pray those days are over and that COVID-19 will not become a big problem for us this fall, enabling faith-filled people to get involved again doing something bigger for the Church.

I admit that I am a dreamer at times, but I would love to find 5,000 more volunteers. These can be oncea-month events like signing up to serve meals, or they can be seasonal like the things we do during the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays. Some of these can even be done remotely by Zoom, if that is more comfortable.

To find out more and consider being part of our efforts, visit our website, www.catholicharitiesdc.org, and click on "Volunteer" in the upper right corner. We need all forms of help and resources – people, time, talent and donations. And remember to check your parish, too.

I realize everybody's situation is different, but we would all do well to reflect on the big picture, which is seeing the Church as the hub of much of what we do in our daily lives. We grow closer to each other, build a community around our shared commitment to Jesus, and meet Jesus in a very special way – not just in those we serve but also in the community that serves together.


If life is getting to you, and you

he Practical Life lessons in our classrooms allow children to, as the name suggests, practice life. They button, pour, spoon, polish, and wash. They learn to care for their environment by crumbing, window washing, and taking care of plants. Lessons in Grace and Courtesy provide a framework for interacting with others in a kind, yet confident way.

The purpose of these lessons is to build a child's confidence in his/her ability to go through life without needing to ask for help from others. If we give them opportunities to give it a go and try something on their own, we are also demonstrating our confidence in them. Our students are elated when we ask them if they want to window wash or dust. They feel capable and excited that we see them the way they want to be seen. By giving them the practice they need for these life skills, they start to view themselves not as someone in constant need of support, but as someone who is capable of completing tasks on their own.

In these lessons, we also work to develop a strong sense of community and connectedness. The more they invest in the environment, interactions, and activities; the

elderly, especially frail and isolated older people; and those who live in the shadows of life, vulnerable people who suffer and live outside the blessings of mainstream human life. Rightly, Catholic communities act to love and protect those in life's dawn and those in life's dusk. Those in the shadows are often forgotten.

There are thousands in our Catholic communities with developmental differences. Autism, developmental delays, and physical challenges are part of their humanity. Yet, whether in school, at work,

in the neighborhood or in parishes, they are absent or invisible. Too often, these valuable people of God are living in the shadows of the blessed communities in which the rest of us are full participants. As Christ's communities, can we do more to welcome each of them with love and respect into our lives and parish activities? In judgement, might Christ ask, are these beloved people of Mine part of your ministries, sacraments, sports, education, social lives, and fellowship?

In response, Potomac Community Resources (PCR) was established in 1994 by clergy and parents at Our Lady of Mercy Parish. Through PCR, hundreds of people with developmental or physical differences are ought from the shadows and fully welcomed into parish life. On October 29th, PCR will celebrate those they include and love at its annual Patricia Sullivan Dinner. It's open to all. I hope you will attend, or at least support its inclusive activities (www.pcr-inc.org). At the dinner, PCR will honor one of its founders, Msgr. John Enzler, for his 28 years of support and leadership for PCR. This wonderful priest is a gift of example and dedication to love and respect for every human life. The Leadership Award will be presented to Daniel Verner. Daniel has used his role as business leader at the Marriott Corporation and in the community to promote full inclusion of people with challenges in every aspect of community life. Two visionary and loving women will be honored as PCR's Outstanding Adult Volunteers, Angie Frick and Amanda Herndon, both I'm blessed to know as friends. They recognized that adult women with developmental differences have unique needs often left in the shadows. For years, Angie and Amanda have helped women grow and participate more fully in community life. Jack Sullivan and Molly Tyson will be honored for their roles as Outstanding Youth Volunteers. These two busy young people have included love for others in their regular routines. Doing good requires efficiency and Cordia Partners, honored by PCR as the Outstanding Community Partner, has provided business support to PCR for years.

Deep in the shadows of life are those addicted to drugs and other substances. In the Gospels, Jesus demonstrated courageous love for people misunderstood and unloved. Pope Francis said drug addiction is a contemporary form of slavery and a wound in our society. September is the month dedicated to ending addiction through action and information. Locally, our community solemnly remembers the scores of local people, most young, who have died from drug overdoses. Every one of us knows someone or a family who suffers with this illness. The faith community plays a vital role in addressing substance use and mental health disorders as studies show that individuals and their families struggling with these issues often first turn to their place of worship for help. Speaking openly about the fact that these are brain disorders, not character flaws, and demonstrating support and concern for affected individuals and their families goes a long way towards destigmatizing the problem and educating parish communities.

To help bring more people from the shadows and escape the chains of addiction, and to prevent addiction, Montgomery County has initiated a special education and outreach activity called **Montgomery Goes Purple**. You can learn more about this and resources for those struggling with addiction or the loss of a loved one at https://montgomerygoespurple.org/. Christ came into the world to release the imprisoned. Are Catholic communities doing all we can to help Him?

Finally, a prayerful word about our brothers and sisters who live in the shadows of hunger and disease in Haiti. Unless we are intentional about the daily suffering among Haitians, they are likely to sink deeper into the shadows just off our shores. Some parishes have ministries which seek to ease the suffering of the people of Haiti. Might your parish be willing to team up with one of these and increase their impact? In His healing and love for human life, Jesus searched in the shadows of Galilee feared by the faithful of His day. This is the ministry He expects from authentic Christian communities. Jesus notified us that at last judgement, God will ask, what have we done for these, the least of our brothers and sisters?







St. Jude Sacristy was completely gutted during this past July through August for the new well-designed functional room. The Sacristy now has a separate secure area for storing the sacred vessels such as chalices, cruets, ciborium, patens, etc. A central, well-lit, glass-enclosed vestment room was built where there are no longer multiple coat racks located in and outside the Sacristy. The new Sacristy features a clergy meditation sitting area next to a Liturgy of the Word library. Previously, the sacred Word and other liturgy books were stored in multiple cabinets and book shelves. Ideally, clergy and lectors can now easily find the appropriate readings. There is a new floor to ceiling

glass-enclosed cabinet for storing hosts, microphones, holy linens, pyxes and other sacred altar supplies, including a glass-door small refrigerator for the water and wine offering. Finally, the new Sacristy received new lighting, a fresh coat of paint, new floor, water fountain, new vestment hangers, and a new bulletin/marker board. Censers, charcoal, candles, lighters, and other miscellaneous supplies were moved to the altar-server changing

The new St. Jude Sacristy gives our clergy an efficient area of preparation for celebrating holy Mass.





Youth Ministry Rebuild Has Promising Start at St. Francis of Assisi Parish

fter experiencing some fits and starts over the past year, the rebuilding of Youth Ministry at St. Francis of Assisi Parish has gained some momentum this fall with the arrival of a parochial vicar with a penchant for youth ministry and a solid core of adult volunteers and staff members.

Ten months after parishioners gathered to re-envision how the next version of Youth Ministry would look like at the suburban parish, the adults in the room agreed that having a safe space where tweens and teens can gather with their like-minded peers, process their worlds, and grow in their relationship with God are important aspects of the environment they are trying to build.

Having been part of a youth group in his native Poland throughout his teenage years convinced

the parish's new parochial vicar, Fr. Grzegorz Okulewicz, of the importance for all teenagers to have a sanctuary where they can vent about what they are encountering in their lives.

"[Teens], themselves, can be con-

fused about what they're called to believe and what they are called not to believe," Fr. G recently said. "Since they cannot voice or identify their faith, a youth group with

Communications Ministry's Video Capabilities Allow for Hybrid Get to Know You Session with Fr. G

hen St. Francis of Assisi Pastor Fr. John Dillon informed his staff this summer that the parish would soon welcome its first long-term parochial vicar since 2019, the question for the parish's Communications Ministry became how to introduce Fr. Grzegorz Okulewicz to the parish. Mass attendance was still down and COVID cases were waning, but still cropping up.

After brainstorming with the ministry's volunteer video producers, Communications Coordinator Melissa Egan proposed to Fr. John a hybrid interview in the church that could be watched live, but would be simultaneously filmed to be edited and posted on the parish's YouTube Channel

And, thus, the "Getting to Know Fr. G" event was born.

Alexander Scaltrito, a video/ multimedia producer, took the lead on the video production of the "Getting to Know Fr. G" event. In thinking through the format, he said the Communications Ministry members felt an interview with the parish's new parochial vicar

could give a deeper look into his personality. Filming it and posting it to YouTube also felt like a smart way to extend the video's reach.

"St. Francis is blessed to have the resources to do this, both with equipment and staff and volunteers," Scaltrito said. "We've reached so many more people who weren't able to attend the event in person. And that helps us spread the message with even more people about who Fr. G is and what our parish is about."

Using camera equipment purchased in the summer of 2020 to record virtual Masses during the pandemic and three of the video producers' own devices, the Communications Ministry held a technical run-through on August 13 with Fr. John and Fr. G to determine the best camera angles and perspectives. On August 27, the four cameras rolled, as Egan interviewed Fr. G on his lifelong faith formation in the Neocatechumenal Way, a charism of the Holy Spirit; the impact of youth ministry in his spiritual growth; and his culture shock upon arriving in 2010 at the Archdiocesan Missionary Seminary of Redemptoris Mater in Hyattsville, MD, to study to be

an archdiocesan priest. All this occurred in front of an audience of

Passing of Trees on Parish Grounds Creates Way to Replace Plantings and Memorialize Loved Ones

s St. Francis of Assisi Parish winds up its celebration of its Golden Anniversary this fall, 50 parishioners hope to leave a lasting mark of beauty on the parish's grounds while honoring their family members and loved ones who have passed on to God.


The parish is closing its 50th anniversary celebration with a Memorial Tree Planting and Beautification project that will replace several trees on the parish grounds that are dying or are in various stages of decay with 12 hardwood trees. This summer, the parish invited its members to make a memorial donation of \$200 that has gone into a general fund for the preparation of the ground and soil, purchase, installation and maintenance of four Maples, four American Sycamores,

and four Red Oak trees. The names of donors or those being memorialized will be added to a memorial display to be hung in the Gathering Space.

Over the past few years, Director of Social Concerns Tony Bosnick began noticing some of the parish's ornamental trees getting blown over or bent during windstorms. Bosnick said the idea for the project originated with an archdiocesan Care for Creation Committee, which promoted the use of hardwoods on parish grounds, both for their 100-year-plus life spans and transcendental beauty.

As the parish's 50th anniversary in 2022 approached, it seemed like a good time to replace the trees with specimens that were longer lasting. All told, the project costs \$12,000 and has been largely covered by contributions from parishioners, Bosnick said. "It will be a long-term beautification project that will just get more beautiful as the years pass," Bosnick said.

On September 21, crews from Rock Creek Landscaping, which is executing the project for the parish, began planting the trees, seven of which will be planted around the circular grass entryway to the church. Of the other five trees, three will replace as many ornamental trees, one will replace a dying hardwood tree, and one will be planted near the

parish's lower parking lot.

When parishioners George and Barbara Beall decided to take part in the project, the couple not only wanted to pay tribute to their 35-year-old daughter, Barbara, who died in August 2004 of breast cancer – they also wanted to honor the way the church ministered to their family.

"Fr. Lee [Fangmeyer] went out of his way to minister to us," Barbara said. "I remember visiting her once at Suburban Hospital and hearing laughter coming from her room. It was Barbara, Fr. Lee, and her colleague from [the National Institutes of Health] – and they were hysterical."

Parishioner Lita Silva also thought the project was a wonderful way to pay tribute to her parents, Rod and Gaby O'Connor, who grew and tended a garden full of dogwood trees, azaleas, Bradford pear trees, pine trees, and Blue Spruces in the south of her native Chile. "It's important to maintain the parish grounds," Silva said. "But to turn it into a wonderful memorial to those we love is a beautiful twist."

Pastor Fr. John Dillon will have a formal Blessing of the Trees after the 11:15 am Mass on Sunday, October 16, in front of the church.

2023 Social Security COLA

he Social Security Administration (SSA) will announce the official 2023 COLA (Cost of Living Adjustment) in October 2022.

The Senior Citizens League, an advocacy group, released a report Sept. 13 predicting the Social Security COLA for 2023 will be 8.7%. If that proves accurate when the Social Security Administration announces its official COLA in mid-October, it would raise the current average annual benefit of \$1,656 by \$144.10. It would also mark the largest adjustment seen in four decades.

Inflation in July, August, and September 2022 will determine the



COLA that Social Security and SSI beneficiaries will receive next year. The COLA takes effect in December, and the updated benefits are paid out starting in January 2023.

The Social Security COLA is based on the Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical

Workers (CPI-W), a slightly different measurement than the CPI-U. The COLA is calculated by using the average rate of inflation in the third quarter of the year. When those figures come out, the data for July, August and September will be added together and divided by three to get the average. The 2022 number will then be compared with the third quarter average of 2021 to determine the percentage of change for 2023.

Senior Resources

September's CPI numbers are expected to be announced on Oct. 13.

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
Saint Bernadette School to Honor Rosanne Weber

rescuer's canonization. Rosie said she was particularly moved by the impact on a whole family; the man's granddaughter was there too.

Rosie said that the bishop asked them what the faith that they professed meant to them: "What will you do?" She talked about her growth in faith, from the Atrium program on up. Her intention is to continue her growth in faith, and in knowledge of her faith. But also, she talked about evangelization; she would like to show people the Word of God. "This is how it changed me," she says, "and it may change you."

Michael Jordan, who was confirmed at St. Paul last year, reflected on the sacrament, and like Rosie he spoke about a steady growth. He is still learning, still struck by the

Lord's call for his followers to be in unity. His father was a Baptist minister, and Michael is not dismissive of his roots; but he thinks he is where he belongs.

Bishop Dorsonville is from Bogota, Colombia. He was ordained there and served in two parishes and as chaplain at the National University. He studied at Catholic University in Washington, and served in parishes here. He went back and forth between Colombia and Washington for a decade, then served as assistant pastor in two parishes here. He also taught business ethics, pastoral counseling, and catechesis; and he worked with Catholic Charities and the Spanish Catholic Center. He was consecrated as a bishop in 2015, and has been serving as the USCCB Chairman for the Migrant and Refugee Services Committee.

Sister Parish in Haiti Says Thanks!

otre Dame de la Visitation in Haiti celebrated their summer Bible Camp thanks to a generous series of gifts from their sister parish in Darnestown, Md. 

St. Pio Relic Enthroned at Our Lady Queen of Poland

n Sunday, September 18, parishioners gathered at Our Lady Queen of Poland Parish in Silver Spring, to view the relic of St. Pio of Pietrelcina, also called "Padre Pio." He was known for exhibiting stigmata, a term used by Catholics for inexplicable wounds on the forehead, hands, wrists, and feet, and said to be identical to those suffered by Jesus Christ during his crucifixion.

OLQP Pastor Fr. Jerzy Frydrych, SChr, celebrated the Holy Mass. SK Franklin Morton, District Warden and past GK of the Knights of Columbus St. Maximilian Kolbe Council 16634, led the procession as parishioners Mr. and Mrs. Bisk carried the Reliquary and the Certificate of Authentication to the altar.

The St. Pio relic that was solemnly enthroned at OLQP Parish is a First Class Relic, containing a piece of material that adhered to the side wound (stigma) of St. Pio. Fr. Frydrych noted that, "The relic of the saint is a great gift from God's Providence to our parish. Let us give thanks to God, Who is rich in His mercy, that our parish may be under the special protection of the saint, the Stigmatic of San Giovanni Rotondo."

Fr. Pio (1887-1968) was born Francesco Forgione in Pietrelcina, Italy. He joined the Franciscan Capuchin Order and was ordained in 1910. Miracles have been attributed to his intercession. He was canonized in 2002 by Pope St. John Paul II. His feast day is September 23, and on Sunday, our parish began a novena to "Sw. Ojciec Pio."

St. Pio during his lifetime would tell his listeners that, "There, in heaven, I will be to you even more helpful, and you must pray, trust, and not fall in spirit, because prayer is oxygen to the soul!"

At OLQP, St. Pio joins the relics of St. John Paul II, St. Maximilian Kolbe, St. Sr. Faustina, Bl. Fr. Jerzy Popieluszko, and the Blessed Martyrs Fr. Michal Tomaszek and Fr. Zbigniew Strzalkowski.

uring the month of August, we commemorate several important dates and events. Thus, on Sunday, August 14, 2022, at Our Lady Queen of Poland Parish, Silver Spring, MD, Pastor Fr. With the help of several parents during the School Clean-Up Day, the benches were installed in a semi-circle outside of the breezeway, creating a new space where classes can gather for reading, music, snack time, and more. Future plans for the space, being developed by the school's Green Team, include planting a ground cover with stepping stones and some larger landscaping in lieu

and a weird little package of slippery blocky fruit things and yesanother-cup-please. You can aim for a Patriotic Theme: red vegetables in your "Siesta" eggs, and blueberries in your pancakes. The old pattern persists, but without the old confidence and tranquility. Questions hover in the air: can we have all that without sugar or saturated fat or any fat at all or preservatives or dairy or gluten or meat or caffeine? One clean napkin coming right up. One day, perhaps, Middle Eastern and Asian and African and Latino parishioners will transform this thing, providing a global variety of healthy food to supplement the old standard – but not just yet.

The breakfast is provided by the Men's Club. For decades, St. Paul's has had two nearly identical groups, the Knights of Columbus and the Men's Club. The Knights:

the right adult leaders can help to clarify that for them. They can help form their identity as people and believers."

Eight tweens and teens gathered August 28 - the day before Montgomery County Public Schools reopened their doors for the new school year - for a Welcome Back Pizza Party in the Parish Center. When the middle schooland high school-aged students reconvened on Sunday, September 11, their ranks had nearly tripled to 21 kids, with nearly an even split between middle schoolers and high

For Andrew Einsmann, one of the core adult volunteers and the parent of a sixth grader, the sight of children gathering for Youth Group in the Parish Center was a welcome scene. He had volunteered with Youth Ministry from 2007 to 2010, during the tenure of former Youth Minister Sue Lea, and has kept tabs on young people who were teens then and are now young adults.

He said he felt buoyed by the attendance of a large middle schoolaged contingent, since kids who get involved early have time to grow into leaders as they approach high

"When parents are in the background and the kids are teaching themselves, that's when you see amazing stuff," Einsmann said. "The younger kids now have role models that are closer to their age."

For now, the Youth Ministry, coordinated by Youth Minister Travis Tomon, plans to gather every two weeks as a group. While the gatherings thus far have been in-person affairs with food and ice breakers, religious formation, a game, songs and prayer, future activities may also include movie nights, sports-oriented community outings, service to the poor, Holy Hour, Confession, retreats and music.

As his son navigates middle school, Einsmann hinted that he hopes he will have a peer group with whom to be as comfortable reading the Bible as playing Roblox, an online game popular among tweens. "My hope is the kids who leave our parish will have a strong enough faith to defend their faith when they go out into the world and remain faithful for the rest of their lives," he said. "It's hard for parents to do that alone."

ever received by most Social Security beneficiaries alive today," said Mary Johnson, the Senior Citizens League's Social Security and Medicare policy analyst. "There were only three other times since the start of automatic adjustments that it was higher (1979-

The Senior Citizens League and other senior advocacy groups have often criticized the formula for calculating the Social Security COLA because it doesn't account for increases in the Medicare Part B premium, which is 14.5% higher this year than in 2021. This often leads to Social Security checks falling short of the actual inflation rate for seniors. **OPT**


St. Michael the Archangel Knights of **Columbus Installs New Officers**
