I've said before that all I learned about God I learned during Advent. Yes, that's a bit of an oversimplification, but not much of one. I believe this is the greatest time of the year for families to teach children about God. They are so excited about Santa

Claus coming, as they should be, and this time of waiting provides a wonderful opportunity to remind them and ourselves that it's about Jesus.

I was blessed to grow up in a loving, faith-filled home with parents who took full advantage of that opportunity to teach lifelong lessons to my brothers and sisters and me. For example, an Advent wreath was an integral part of our preparation. The kids (13 of us!) used to vie to be the one selected to light the candle and say the prayer for that night.

At the beginning of Advent, we would pick names and try to do something nice for the person whose name we chose, like make up their bed or pick up their clothes. To deny certain groups access to a safe haven based on their religion or country of origin



is contrary to the principles of fairness and compassion that have been the foundation of our nation's character. Upholding these principles does not conflict with maintaining the safety of our nation, which has always been a paramount priority of the U.S. refugee resettlement process.

Maryland is home to the national headquarters of Catholic Relief Services, which has a rich history of serving potential refugees in their native land, and firsthand knowledge of the brutal oppression that innocent families

## St. John's Celebrates 100th Anniversary of Corps of Cadets

n Nov. 6, St. John's College High School welcomed more than 1,000 alumni, parents, students, faculty, staff and friends of the school to celebrate 100 years of the Corps of Cadets leadership program at The Cadet Corps Centennial: A Celebration of Leadership. This historic event, the largest gathering of the St. John's community in school history, was held at the JW Marriott in Washington, DC, and emceed by St. John's parent Major Garrett (P '13, '15, '18), chief White House correspondent with CBS News and correspondent at large with the National Journal.

This black-tie gala celebration hon-

ored those who founded the Corps of Cadets, the alumni who carried on the tradition and the students and faculty who keep it alive today. St. John's was one of only 100 schools across the country chosen to establish a military program under the National Defense Act of 1916, as well as the first private school to participate in Washington, DC, and one of only four Catholic schools among the initial participants.

From its inception, the Corps of Cadets has been recognized as an outstanding military unit, receiving

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

# Mother and Teacher - Catholic social teaching guides J&A Council

ince our beginning in 2005, the Justice and Advocacy Council of Montgomery County has advocated for public policy issues impacting the lives of the poor and vulnerable in the County. In our advocacy work, we address issues in view of Catholic moral and social teaching.

No political party adequately reflects a Catholic perspective. Thus, we may agree with the position of one party on some issues and with another party on others. And there are some issues we promote which aren't embraced by either party.

We seek the wisdom of Catholic social teaching to guide us on the positions we support and oppose. As stated by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB), "The Church's social teaching is a rich treasure of wisdom about building a just society and living lives of holiness amidst the challenges of modern

society." It is grounded in Scripture and in the teaching of the popes, Church councils and bishops' conferences.

Catholic social teaching "has its own profound unity" (Compendium of the Social Doctrine of the Church, n .3) and reflects an integrated understanding of life.

The Church understands the teaching as a unified "body of doctrine" that needs to be considered as a whole (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, n. 2422).

However, not a few Catholics embrace the approach attributed to the irrepressible William F. Buckley when he reflected on Pope John XXIII's 1961 encyclical Mater et magistra (Mother and Teacher). In the consummate statement reflecting "pick and choose" Catholicism, he wrote "Mother yes, Teacher no." He was willing to consider the Church as "Mother," but not follow her social teaching when he disagreed with it. However, a better way is to ask the Holy Spirit to help us understand the teaching and to grow in our acceptance of it. The integrated view is beautifully developed by Pope Francis in his recent encyclical Laudate Si (see, for example, paragraphs 158 and 233).

Catholic social teaching has been summarized by the USCCB into seven major principles. At the heart of the teaching is (1) **the life and dignity of the human person**. This core principle reflects

the Catholic belief that human life is sacred from womb to tomb and that the dignity of the person "is the foundation of a moral vision for society." All rests on this great principle and the J&A Council strives to be faithful to it.

Also at the core of the social teaching is the

belief that humans are social beings and how we organize our society is important. Public policy positions must respect (2) marriage and the family, promote community, and encourage participation in society. In addition, all people (3) enjoy rights and have duties and responsibilities to each other, our families and the larger society. The J&A Council advocates for policies which build community and promote the common good.

Catholic social teaching also calls us to put the needs of the poor and vulnerable first, known as the (4) "option for the poor and vulnerable." How we treat those on the margins of society is a moral question for us as Catholics. We also believe that (5) work should have dignity and that workers have rights. This the reason for our ongoing advocacy for the social safety net, for adequate appropriations for families providing home care for family members with special needs, and for just wages for taxi drivers.

All of these principles reflect the importance of (6) **solidarity**. We see ourselves not as autonomous

individuals but as persons who are part of a community seeking to live together in support of one another. As the teaching nicely states, "we are our brothers and sisters keepers." And finally, as have been reinforced by Pope Francis in his recent encyclical *Laudate Si*, we are called to (7) **care for God's creation**, with stewardship for creation and protection of our little part of the planet here in Montgomery County.

These are the principles that guide our efforts in the Justice and Advocacy Council. In our individualistic "me first" society marked by consumerism and materialism, acceptance of the principles often goes against the grain and what we are lead to believe is impor-

tant. But hopefully, we grow in our understanding and acceptance of the principles of Catholic social teaching as it is an invitation from God to participate in his life and love as we promote the values of his kingdom in the world around us.

# **Did You Get Your Steps In Today?**

he steps-per-day phenomenon has been the motivation to get many a couch potato up and moving, myself included. Personal fitness trackers are all the rage and are seen on the wrists of people everywhere, young and old. I don't have a fitness tracker, but I do track my steps using an app on my smart phone. Some nights, when I am about to take my dog out for the last time before bed. I check it and see that I haven't reached even my minimal goal for the day so instead of a quick turn about the front yard, I walk him further down the block and back. I am not in competition with anyone, as some of my colleagues are, but still I feel the urge to make my steps-per-day goal. With New Year's Eve just around the corner, the inevitable list of New Year's resolutions will be made with all earnestness and optimism. I've already given this some thought with regards to my stepsper-day, with the hopes of increasing my fitness goals for 2016.

What about those of us who have become couch potatoes in our faith? Is there a tracker we can strap on our wrists to remind us of spending time with God in reflection and prayer? Can we motivate ourselves with a similar step program to help



us achieve spiritual goals? As we are just at the start of Advent, let's explore some of the steps we can take to help us better prepare for the coming of the Christmas solemnities.

Step One: Decorate for Advent First. Be sure your Christmas decorations and preparations include an Advent wreath and an Advent calendar. A simple wreath of evergreen and four candle holders is all it takes to anchor your kitchen or dining room table. Add a short Advent prayer before Grace at dinnertime. Hang the Advent calendar on the fridge or near the family

bulletin board so that, along with sports practices and music lessons, the reminder that Christ is coming will be visible to all. Opening the little doors each day increases our anticipation as we "wait" with eager expectation.

Step Two: Make a List and Check it Twice. Giving and receiving Christmas gifts is fun and exciting. Remember those, however, who are less fortunate than many of us. Find a way to make someone else's Christmas better. Adopt a needy family and add them to your Christmas shopping list. When you are doing your shopping for the big holiday meal, shop for another family and deliver it to a food pantry. Pack up your family and spend a few hours at a shelter, serving meals or just talking to some of those being served there. In a high school admissions essay I recently read, I was moved by the student's words that the homeless don't just want food or shelter or warm clothing; they also want companionship and someone to talk to.

Step Three: Schedule Time for Reflection. Christmas parties, family get-togethers, and office luncheons bring us closer together and reconnect us to those we love and care about. When putting all of


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# St. Jude Prepares for 60th Anniversary Celebration



those holiday events on your family calendar, be sure to schedule time with the baby Jesus. Take the time to visit with him in Adoration, receive the Sacraments, and attend Mass more frequently. Each year at our 8th grade overnight retreat, our students attend Adoration for an hour. It was suggested by our retreat leader one year, and some of us were skeptical that we could get 8th graders, away from school and parents, to sit or kneel quietly for an hour in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament. The retreat leader said, "Trust me, this will happen, and you will be moved by this." She

was right, and the 8th graders always count it among their favorite parts of the retreat experience.

Step Four: The Reason for the Season. In today's rushed and materialistic world, this one is becoming more and more challenging. Deck the halls and light the Christmas tree but don't forget to put out a nativity scene or crèche. The image of the baby Jesus in the manger with the three kings coming to pay homage is a powerful one, a reminder of the humble beginnings of the son of God. With Black Friday and Cyber Monday thankfully behind us, there are still great online resources-for learning and growing in our faith during this Advent season. Bishop Robert Barron, recently ordained Auxiliary Bishop of the Archdiocese of Los

Angeles and the founder of Word on Fire Catholic Ministries, has extensive writings, lectures, and homilies on the Advent season. In one of his reflections on Advent, he quotes the French spiritual writer Simone Weil, who said that "the core of the Christian life is waiting, watching, expecting. We cannot save ourselves, but we can look with rapt attention to the one who can. In this sense, we are, permanently, an Advent people.'

Personal health and fitness is important to living a long and healthy life. Prayer and practicing one's faith ensures an everlasting relationship with God. Continue wearing your personal fitness tracker, but also, set some steps-per-day

goals to grow closer in your faith as we prepare for the coming of the baby Jesus.



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# Lay Leadership at Work: That Man Is You

hat started in 2012 as the vision of a handful of men from St. Raphael Church in Rockville, led by longtime parishioner Dick Jasinski, culminated in the launch of a bold new men's group based on a program called That Man is You (TMIY). With endorsement from Pastor Rev. Jim Meyers and Adult Faith Formation (AFF) director Suzanne Nelson, Dick organized a core team of approximately 20 men and 14 small group leaders. His leadership and persistence made this program a reality. He rallied the right people to support the program and encouraged men throughout the parish and beyond to participate. The meeting time of this men's group has become a unique trademark and stands apart from many parish adult

faith formation activities. To avoid disrupting family and work commitments, the men meet Saturday mornings at 6 AM and conclude by 7:45 AM, barely missed by their families.

With 26 weekly meetings over the Fall and Spring averaging 80 to

90 participants, the Holy Spirit is clearly hard at work developing a group of men representing the heart and soul of the parish in carrying out its Christian mission. In the course of the last three years, men at St. Raphael have successively considered the three most important relationships in a man's life: his relationship with God, his relationship with his spouse and his relationship with his children. To Dick's credit and despite the early wake-up call on Saturday, as 2015 draws to a close, over 130 men are actively registered and meet regularly to study and deepen their faith and bring back the teachings from the program to their families and communities.

Created in 2004 by a lay Catholic ministry called Paradisus Dei, TMIY became the perfect foundation for building a vibrant men's fellowship group at St. Raphael. The structure of the weekly meetings includes a light breakfast and socializing followed by a video containing the weekly teaching. Afterwards, the men meet in small groups and discuss the video and apply the lessons to their everyday life. The TMIY program was selected, in part, because the subject matter of the material was wellformed, relevant, and compelling to the men.

TMIY has made a difference in the lives of the participants because it honestly addresses the pressures and temptations men face in our modern culture, especially those relating to their roles as husbands and fathers. Keith Gilmore, a participant for the last three years may have stated it the best: "For years, I've tried to figure out how to be a better father, husband, and, in general a better person. TMIY has given me the structure to achieve my goals. The great thing about this program is you don't have to be at any level of holiness to attend! Everyone, regardless of where they are in their faith journey is welcomed. Whether you are eighteen or ninety-nine, married or single, TMIY will help you achieve your goals. The camaraderie I found with the men has truly been a blessing in my life."

Leadership is said to be about giving "voice to a vision." It works best if the "voice" consists of those who will be involved, and is composed of the right mix of "passion, purpose and people." TMIY, as applied at St. Raphael, is an example of the right mix; it is an example of what makes AFF valuable and flourishing in the church. Kudos to you!

This is an example of how Mercy's new leadership envisions working together to bring a hands-on approach to their involvement in the school community. Other examples worth noting are that the pastor and associate priests have committed to teaching religion classes in the school, and the pastor can be seen strolling through the hallways with his Boxer, Roo, chatting with students on a daily basis. With this kind of presence in the school, they hope to bring the school and parish communities together for the benefit of the entire community.

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### **A Cancer–Fighting Pioneer in Our Midst**

lot of excitement has been generated lately about the research and treatment of cancer with a novel approach that individualizes therapy to each patient, instead of following a set regimen for the general type of cancer a patient has contracted. This new approach was made possible when the science of genomics was developed, enabling researchers to "map" a body's genome, that is identify the ingredients of an

organism, all of its DNA, including all of its genes, and use this information to deal with it in specific and individualized ways.

According to Dr. Jean Claude Zenklusen of the National Cancer Institute, part of the National Institutes of Health in Bethesda: "One may liken cancer therapy in the past to a bunch of tipsy Irishmen throwing darts in a pub. That was much like the way medicine was targeted at a cancer in the past—throwing a variety of therapies, like darts, at a given condition, somehow hoping to score a successful bulls-eye with one of them on the

cancer itself. Now we take a far more sober approach by zeroing in on the target more clearly, knowing what it's made of and what therapies work best to destroy the organism with minimal interference to the healthy organisms surrounding it." The old dreaded choice of cancer treatments, "cut, burn or poison," is rapidly becoming a thing of the past.

Dr. Zenklusen is the director of the Genome Atlas Program Office at the National Cancer

Institute. He and his team work with a similar team at the National Human Genome Research Institute, also part of the NIH, to assimilate from researchers worldwide the countless gene sequences (over 132,000 were collected through 2014) of more and more types of cancers. So far, they have mapped the genomic changes of the tumors of 33 different types of cancer, including breast, stomach, lung, bladder, skin, colon, liver, cervical and prostate.

Dr. Zenklusen lives in Kensington and is also a parishioner at St. Elizabeth. He and his wife, Ana, have two sons, Matias, 16, and Francisco, 12. Known to friends and fellow parishioners simply as "JC," Dr. Zenklusen was born in Switzerland and educated at the Universities of Buenos Aires and Texas before coming to his present position at NCI.

When he first moved to Kensington, it was the numerous recommendations of his colleagues at NCI that steered him to St. Elizabeth's. "We were hooked from the first mass we attended – the warmth and inclusiveness of the parish made us feel at

## Recent Synod of Bishops in Rome

ecember 8, 2015: Pope Francis will open the Holy Year of Mercy, the same day on which we celebrate the 50th anniversary of the close of Vatican II. It is during this Year of Mercy the pope will likely release the Synod's conclusions in a document of his own.

Distinguished journalist and Vatican observer Rocco Palmo was invited by St. Elizabeth pastor, Msgr. Jack Macfarlane, to personally share his witness of the recent bishops' synod in

Rome. Parishioners gathered in the church on Nov. 12 to listen to this savvy young man share his insights. One of global Catholicism's most prominent chroniclers, Palmo has held court as the "Church Whisperer" since 2004, when his blog "Whispers in the Loggia" was launched. His byline has appeared on the British Catholic weekly The Tablet, The New York Times, Associated Press, Washington Post, Reuters, Los Angeles Times, BBC, NBC, CNN and NPR and other mainstream print and broadcast media worldwide.

Rocco spoke in an engaging and informative way of his own observations and thoughts of the recent actions and writings of our current pope, who without doubt holds fascination for Catholics and non-Catholics alike, a breath of fresh air for so many longing to truly be able to see the actions of Jesus in this Church that we love.

In both the pope's recent visit here and his presence at the Synod, the focus was on the family – in all its many facets. Pope Francis has indicated that one of his primary concerns is keeping families together and moving forward on their journey of



faith and love. In the Synod's closing homily (which can be accessed at the following link: http://w2.vatican.va/content/ francesco/en/speeches/2015/ october/documents/papa-francesco\_20151024\_sinodo-conclusione-lavori.html) the pope adds a footnote that Rocco says is almost a mini-catechism in itself, as it uses an acrostic on the word 'famiglia' ('family' in English), its final 'a' being: 'Aiming to love unconditionally all families, particularly those experienc-

ing difficulties, since no family should feel alone or excluded from the Church's loving embrace, and the real scandal is a fear of love and of showing that love concretely.' The entire acrostic is a remarkably effective means of communication.

Rocco noted that over the past 500 years, the Church had been moving toward maximizing the power of the papacy. Then along came Vatican II, which attempted a reversal of that route, with synods gathering to become listening posts for what was going on in the universal Church. He explained that each pope, himself a human being, has his own strengths and weaknesses when it comes to guiding the Church. Thus any given papacy is going to focus on areas that speak to that individual's strengths. With Pope Francis, it seems clear that his strengths lie in his ability to identify with the less fortunate and not to see himself as someone who is above it all. And he's determined to 'say it like it is' and address head-on what he sees as deficiencies - such as the way some of the clergy continue to mire themselves in clericalism rather than



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### **Stephen Ministry Workshop Fruitful at St. Bart's**

n October 31, from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m., St. Bartholomew Parish hosted an introductory workshop for local parishes and congregations about the Stephen Ministry. Stephen Ministry is a Christian ministry to individuals experiencing personal or spiritual difficulties. Within a parish, rigorously trained Stephen ministers help expand pastoral care by providing confidential, one-onone compassionate care and support to people hurting from death of a loved one, divorce or separation, hospitalization, terminal illness, job loss, or any other personal crisis. St. Bart's Parish has had a Stephen

Ministry for several years.

The workshop, which filled the Parish Hall, featured speakers experienced with Stephen Ministry who were able to use with examples from their own ministry in their presentations. Although the workshop had a pronounced interdenominational spirit, there was a special emphasis on increasing Catholic participation in this special ministry—now largely found in Protestant congregations. The goal of the workshop was for participants to go home with practical ministry skills and an excellent understanding of how they can organize the members of their parish or congregation for a

caring Stephen Ministry.

Deacon Julio Blanco-Eccleston of St. Bart's told OPT:

"We were really blessed by the Lord, as such a good attendance to the Workshop showed. How pleased the Lord must have been as 160 Christians from 28 different *Congregations – 8 of them from the* Roman Catholic tradition - registered for the Workshop. And all of them mingled, sat together, eager to listen to the Presenter about "How to care in a distinctively Christian Way...", after having listened to an Introduction to what Stephen Ministry is all about, as so masterly presented on caring, ministering to our neighbors experiencing grief.

"It was indeed a very fruitful workshop, as I can say all the participants left fully aware of how a Stephen Ministry can bring lifechanging benefits to your Parish. Can we imagine a Parish were progressively each one puts into practice the Lord's commandment – Love one another as I have loved you? Because St. Stephen Ministry, that's what it is all about, loving one another."

# Remembering Cubby LaHood and Building upon Her Gifts

t. John the Evangelist Parish lost an exceptional parishioner when Cubby LaHood passed away on September 21st. Cubby and Dan LaHood founded St. Joseph's House in 1983 with the mission of serving school-aged children with multiple and severe disabilities and their families. St. Joseph's House is located in St. John the Evangelist Parish, and the work of the LaHood family has raised our parish-

ioners' awareness of and comfort with these special children. The following passages, adapted from a eulogy by Cece Cooley, capture Cubby's impact on children and families in our area.

"I was the parent of a St. Joseph's House child from 1985 until 2001, when my daughter Caitlin died at the age of 17. I had the good fortune of meeting Cubby and Dan in 1985 when my

daughter was 18 months old. We had searched for suitable childcare, but her needs were so great that most care providers were unqualified or scared to death. When I met Cubby I was young, just 30, afraid, isolated, angry at God and in deep denial. St. Joseph's House was the lifeboat, the community that gave us hope, taught us that each life is indeed a gift and that we could weather any storm. Cubby helped me gain acceptance of the

struggle ahead and do it with love. In the warm embrace of St. Joseph's, my fear abated. I had new friends and I stopped blaming God.



he St. Martin's Pantry has been active for as long as 23 years, and Chuck Smith has been working there for 17 of those years. Smith is now the food pantry coordinator and has been for 15 years. He devotes about 20 to 30 hours every week to the food pantry. St. Martin's Pantry receives about two to three tons of nonper-

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ishable items and about one to two tons of perishable items each week. They have a once-a-week distribution, and they serve about 230 families every week. They served over 12,000 bags in the 2015 fiscal year. Each year, St. Martin's School students hold a Thanksgiving and Lent food drive to support the pantry.

Monday, November 23, was the annual Thanksgiving distribution. This year, 403 people came to St. Martin's Pantry to be served. Over the past three years, over four hundred people have come to our Thanksgiving distribution.

St. Martin's also has an annual coat drive in which they have provided 83 families with about four coats per family. St. Martin School students also help out by collecting mittens and by knitting hats and scarves to keep people warm.


We have many volunteers helping serve in the pantry and for the coat drive, and they are a big part of our parish because they show that we are a very helpful, hardworking parish.




#### That Man Is You!



## **Packing for Bethlehem**

any blessing filled activities are available at St. Andrew's this Advent as we make the journey to Bethlehem. Among them are: serving a holiday lunch to those helped by the Missionaries of Charity, filling and delivering Christmas stockings to residents of local nursing homes, fulfilling a child's Christmas wish through the Angel Giving Tree, giving Snack Packs to the homeless and a "Walk to Bethlehem". More about the Snack Packs and "Walk to Bethlehem" follows.

The homeless are an increasingly common sight at busy intersections in Montgomery County. Instead of ignoring them or giving cash, parishioners are interacting with the local homeless population in a novel way. They are handing out Snack Packs for the Homeless: quart size packages containing a selection of non-perishable snacks balanced among the five food groups (carbohydrates, proteins, dairy products, fruits and vegetables, fats and sugars). Also included are print-outs containing information on resources available in Montgomery County (food, shelter, clothing, medical and legal services, etc.) and a Sacred Heart of Jesus holy card.

Over four hundred packages have been taken by parishioners, to be kept in purses, back packs or cars, ready to be given to a homeless person. Feedback has been positive and the packages have been gratefully received.

The journey each Snack Pack makes into the hands of a person in need begins with parish and student volunteers who purchase the supplies. Faith formation students and families assemble the packages which are available after Masses. The suggested donation is three dollars and proceeds are used to buy supplies for additional packages.

The five thousand mile "Walk to Bethlehem" is another opportunity for the parish and school to prepare for the coming of the Christ Child. A wellness project, sponsored by the One-in-Christ/Health Ministry, participants submit prayerful miles (one mile or 20 minutes of activity equals one mile) each week from November 29 to December 25 to help nurture their body and soul and to help keep Christ in Christmas.

All are welcome to join these outreach efforts.



cameras and exhorted us to treat others as we would have them treat us, more poignantly he added, treat the children of others as we would have our children treated. That notable expansion of the second great commandment particularly struck me. I hope you are inspired by your own preparations during Advent.

This issue of OPT is the annual "older parishioner" edition (forgive my political correctness!). You'll find articles focusing on activities, services, and opportunities for older residents. Seems appropriate to begin by celebrating this year's winner of the Catholic Business Network's Business Person of the Year, Jack Fitzgerald, patriarch of the Fitzgerald Automotive family, who at 80 is still contributing mightily to his business, parish, and community. Jack and his equally active and generous sister Dottie are legends in the auto sales industry for innovation and extreme customer orientation. While selling cars is Jack's business, his passion is keeping children safe in the cars he sells. Jack has kept thousands of children safe through his child safety seat check campaign. For decades Fitzgerald Automotive, has offered free safety seat checks to anyone, who attends the often scheduled events. Hundreds of improperly installed seats have been discovered and corrected resulting in fewer injured children. What a great legacy; what a great role model for local businesses; and what a blessing to our community Jack Fitzgerald is.

We remember and celebrate the life of Msgr. Richard Burton who died in November. Msgr. Burton was a long time, beloved pastor at St Raphael's in Rockville. Msgr. Tom Duffy, retired pastor of Blessed Sacrament and founder of St Raphael's Parish, remembered his friend as leading the parish from its country church roots to the active and diverse faith community it is today.

Continuing the theme of "older parishioners", on December third, Montgomery County Executive Leggett convened a major Senior Summit to discuss current and future issues facing the County's growing older population. This was the second time the County Executive brought together several hundred policy makers and concerned residents in an effort to better understand the needs and hopes of older people and better coordinate our community's responses. The vision of those who attended is clear; Montgomery County will be a Community for a Lifetime, a place for older adults to live safe, healthy and vital lives. A few words with huge implications for our County in the future. (Learn more about the Senior Summit at montgomerycountymd.gov/seniorsummit.) This vision, with slight modification, can become a goal for every Catholic community; our Parish will be a Spiritual Home for a Lifetime, a place for older adults to live safe, healthy and vital lives while joyfully maturing in the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

What then might the components of a parish based Spiritual Home for a Lifetime include? Several of our parishes have active ministries for seniors already in place. Perhaps, though, given the changing nature of older people, it may be useful to revisit the work of these ministries. A new direction identified during the recent Senior Summit is the shift from the perception that older people are in large measure frail and in need of significant services, to a new sentiment in which more and more older people wish to remain actively in their communities. Our challenge is to remove perceptual and actual barriers and enable older people to continue to live and contribute for as long as they choose.

Here are a few ideas to consider in your parish community that may help maintain older parishioners as vital, healthy, safe and spiritually at home.

- · Create an intergenerational older parishioner ministry to imagine, plan and implement activities and service for older people.
- Conduct a simple survey of older parishioners every few years to better understand their hopes and needs. Report to findings to the full parish community.
- Consider a parish communication and outreach center for older parishioners to learn about local activities and services and especially to learn how to use emerging social media and technology in everyday life( on line banking, medical care, shopping).
- Sponsor forums and discussion groups for seniors on relevant topics.
- Establish a volunteer bank to help with transportation needs, meals for the homebound and other forms of assistance (tax preparation, understanding medical bills, employment assistance, housing issues, and chore services).
- Establish health and fitness programs which may include hiking, dancing, weight-lifting, etc. This is a perfect area for intergenerational fellowship.
- Promote parish volunteer activities which engage older parishioners with their passions to serve.
- And of course liturgies and scripture groups to enable people to joyfully grow in the words and works of the Lord.

taking on 'the smell of their sheep.' He wants to again put forth the elements of Vatican II, which sought to get away from concentrating power exclusively in the papacy.

Rocco outlined several of the areas that are dear to Francis, which he believes will be addressed in the pope's own document on this synod, including effective communication with the faithful in what their sacramental status is if they are divorced; good, solid, standardized marriage preparation (we prepare a man to be ordained with 6-8 years, and yet prepare a couple for a lifetime of marriage with anywhere from several hours to 3-4 weeks); truly listening to what it is that the layperson's lived experience is and what they need from their Church.

Will there be specific answers to questions like this? We don't yet know. But, we can be encouraged by the questions being asked, out in the open, and a Church leader who seems to be taking a hard line in getting the tough questions answered and having merciful responses in place, while at the same time holding the clergy responsible for being a part of the solution.

# Resurrection, St. John Engage in Joint Faith-Sharing Program

embers of Resurrection Church in Burtonsville and St. John the Baptist Catholic Community in Silver Spring are involved in a joint faith-sharing program that began in September and continues until March.

The six-month program was organized by L.J. Milone, director of Faith Formation at St John's, and Deacon David Suley, director of Adult Faith Enrichment at Resurrection. The theme of the six-session program is "Journeying with Pope Francis," with specific topics for each session.

The first three sessions have been very well-received, with between 35 to 50 participants, according to attendees.

The location of the presentations rotates between the St. John the Baptist gym and the Resurrection Parish Life Center. They are held from 3:00 to 4:30 p.m. on Saturdays to allow attendance at 5:00 p.m.

The first session was Sept. 19 and focused on Pope Francis's encyclical on the environment, "Laudato Si." The main presenter was Fr. Ladislas

Orsy, SJ, a professor of canon law at Georgetown University. He has written hundreds of journal articles and nine books, and was present at Vatican II.

The Oct. 24 session was a discussion of Pope Francis and Catholic social teaching. The main presenter was Dr. Patricia Fosarelli, associate dean of the Ecumenical Institute of Theology at St. Mary's Seminary and University, Baltimore.

That was followed Nov. 14 by a session on "Pope Francis and Mission, Evangelization, and Discipleship." The discussion was led by Fr. Frank DeSiano, CSP, who is president of the Paulist Evangelization Ministries and has served as a consultant to the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' Committee on Evangelization.

The next session will be Jan. 23 (at Resurrection) and will focus on Pope Francis and the mission of mercy and joy. The main presenter will be Milone, M.A., the faith formation director at St. John. His specialty is with the mystics and masters of Christian contemplation, especially Meister Eckhart, Francis of Assisi, and the Desert Fathers and Mothers.

The Feb 27 session (at St. John the

Baptist) will have the theme "Pope Francis and the Church Outside the Walls. Leading the program will be Deacon Suley, M.A., D.Min., who is permanently assigned to the Archdiocese of Anchorage but on loan to Resurrection, where he coordinates adult faith enrichment programs. Each summer he serves in remote missions in Alaska.

The final session is March 19 (at Resurrection) with the theme, "Pope Francis, Non-judgment, and the Hard Truth of the Faith." Susan Timoney, S.T.D., executive director of Evangelization and Family Life at the Archdiocese of Washington, will lead the program. Her specialty is Catholic spirituality and parish life.

"By co-sponsoring this speaker series, we obtained a double win," says Jim David, one of the participants from Resurrection. "We got to meet new people, and we were able to attract high-caliber speakers who were very knowledgeable and provided us with new perspectives on the teachings of Pope Francis. Each presentation has stimulated active participation by those in attendance."



and friends are speaking out. I've become heartsick and frustrated by people asking, "Why don't the Muslims speak out against the violence?"

The facts are that the terrorists are primarily killing Muslims and imams and Muslim organizations have been crying out in protest for years. The problem is that the media caters to controversy, Islamophobia is growing, and we have not been effective advocates for our Muslim sisters and brothers. I encourage you to forward the document linked above to your network of leaders and concerned individuals.

It is also important that we be able to address the alleged threat posed by Syrian refugees entering our community. It is shameful that some politicians are catering to fear and prejudice rather than providing the facts and encouraging us to live according to the fundamental values of our faith and nation.

The facts are that Syrian refugees are literally fleeing for their lives and those approved for entry to the United States have gone through a rigorous series of examinations for a period of 18 to 24 months. Most are multi-generational families with only about 2 percent being single males of combat age. Here is information from the White House Task Force on New Americans addressing this subject, and an article separating truth from fiction regarding Syrian refugees and addressing our responsibility.

Our Faith Forum ended with a unanimous show of hands in favor of thanking our county executive and County Council for welcoming refugees and pledging to step up our efforts within faith communities to be welcoming and supportive. We had representatives from the agencies in Montgomery County responsible for receiving Syrian refugees and assimilating the 1,000 children fleeing violence in Latin America. Here is the county refugee resource sheet with contact information to help you act upon that for which we prayed on Tuesday.

In addition you may wish to call and encourage others to call your senators and representatives at 202-224-3121 and say something like: "I believe that our country should always be a place of refuge for those fleeing war, torture, and other atrocities. Please work to ensure that our country welcomes Syrian and other refugees and please increase funding to support refugees."

I have talked with my colleague, Jennifer Gray, who is responsible for interfaith outreach in Gov. Hogan's Office of Community Initiatives, reporting on our Faith Forum. She was impressed and expressed interest in having the governor meet with us. I sent her information related to the vetting process for refugees entering the United States and materials related to President Obama's phone conference with governors. I said we would welcome a meeting with the governor, assuming he has learned about the vetting process and is interested in working with us in welcoming Syrian refugees. You may rest assured that County Executive Ike Leggett and County Council President George Leventhal are supportive of efforts to welcome refugees and immigrants.

In these days of shock and sorrow, fear and prejudice, let us seek the presence of the Divine within and among us. Let us pray for the wisdom and the courage to lead our people along a path of justice and peace.

I thank all who were present on Tuesday and look forward to the guidance and engagement of everyone as together we seek to create the Beloved Community in Montgomery County.

the War Department's highest ranking year after year at their annual inspection. Originally called the Royal Officers' Training Corps of St. John's College, inspectors from the War Department recommended that the Corps of Cadets be recognized as a Junior Reserved Officers Training Corps (JROTC) in 1946. The program was mandatory for all St. John's students for more than 75 years. In 1991, the school made the decision to become coeducational and to make the Cadet Corps program elective. Today, approximately 25 percent of the student body participates in the program.

The centennial celebration began

with the induction of 35 cadet colonels into the Cadet Colonel Society, a new St. John's tradition. The cadet colonel is the highest-ranking student position in the Cadet Corps, and the young men and women chosen for that role serve as leaders for the entire student body. From now on, each cadet colonel will be inducted into the society at graduation.

St. John's also honored four alumni with the President's Medal, the school's highest honor. It is awarded to distinguished alumni and friends of the school who have given extraordinary service to St. John's or to the world community. The 2015 honorees include VADM Manson Brown '74 (Ret.), Msgr. John Enzler '65, Gen. Stanley

McChrystal '72 (Ret.) and John Veihmeyer '73.

At the end of the program, St. John's President Jeff Mancabelli shared the school's master plan to transform its arts, academic and athletic facilities. He then introduced Kevin Plank '90, founder and CEO of Under Armour, who spoke about his own St. John's experience. Plank also announced a \$16 million gift to St. John's from The Cupid Foundation, his private foundation. This is the leadership gift in a capital campaign to support athletics, academics and entrepreneurship initiatives. It is the largest in the school's history and one of the most generous grants ever made to a Catholic high school.

St. John's is currently build-

ing the first phase of its campus master plan, which includes a new 15,000-square-foot performing arts wing and new student center. The Cupid Foundation grant will launch the second phase of the school's master plan that primarily supports capital projects, including new state-of-the-art athletic facilities, unrivaled in the area. In addition, the gift will establish the Entrepreneurial Center for Innovation and Leadership, linking the American spirit of entrepreneurship to core Lasallian traditions of leadership and service. Funds will also enhance several academic programs and provide additional tuition assistance for students who might not otherwise have access to a St. John's education.

"The most important aspect of this gift is the tuition assistance that we will provide to students who might not otherwise be able to afford the St. John's experience," said Plank. "I am committed to investing in education, entrepreneurship and promoting physical fitness in Baltimore and Washington, DC. Providing great facilities, academics and programming to current and future students at St. John's is just one very important part of that commitment."

Other key leadership donors to the campus master plan include: Tom '65 and Karen Frana, Cap '61 and Christina Mona, Lou '52 and Ann Donatelli, Tom '84 and Karen Gletner, John '65 and Kari Hughett and the Donohoe Companies.



# A Walk with St Junipero Serra

Ithough I grew up on the East Coast of the US, I have deep roots on the West and was delighted to attend the Mass of Canonization of Saint Junipero Serra. An ancestor who was a "leather jacket soldier", Juan Jose Dominguez, was a member of the Portola Expedition and accompanied the Franciscan Friars on the trip from San Diego to Monterey.

Fr Serra wanted the Mission to be a day's walk apart and, as a child, I imagined the Friars walking a whole day and then plopping on the ground saying, "Whew, we're tired. Let's build a mission here." Fr Serra himself directed the building of the first nine missions. IT was left to others to construct the remaining twelve. While the original churches fell into disrepair over time, most were restored and today are active parishes, I was fortunate to visit Mission Dolores in San Francisco the day of eighth-grade graduation.

Other missions that I have seen are St Charles Borromeo at Carmel, the headquarters of Fr Serra, and St Juan Capistrano. I was at the

latter in late March and there was still great excitement about the return of the famed "Swallows of Capistrano" who fly to the mission each year on the Feast of St Joseph.

The trail used by Fr Serra and his companions was most likely an old Indian trail and runs along the Pacific Coast. It is still a pilgrimage route similar to El Camino de Santiago de Campostela in Spain. At 71, I don't expect to make that journey, but at the Mass of Canonization, I prayed that my grandchildren will.

Cubby and Dan opened their hearts and home to the many St. Joseph's families seeking comfort, help, and respite 50 weeks a yearschool days, snow days, sick days, holidays, birthdays, and weekends. Wheelchairs, walkers, feeding tubes, seizures, medications, and tantrums were as much a part of a day's work as parties, outings, bowling, swimming, crafts, movies, musicals, and fundraisers. She helped me turn my tragedy into a celebration of life, not by talking, but by her actions and her example.

I followed her lead to love and acceptance.

Cubby shared her world, her home, her family and faith with the lucky ones who were fortunate to know her. She encouraged all families to include their non-disabled siblings and others in volunteering. She signed many community service forms joyfully. She was rarely too busy to console or advise, taking calls all times of day. Cubby understood the "big picture" and patiently waited for the rest of us to get it."

During the comments at Cubby's Vigil, her daughter Mary Frances provided a glimpse into Cubby's last days.

"It was the day before she died

that she said, 'I have nothing to do today.' This was a statement that spoke volumes of my mom's constantly and happily busy schedulebut I now realize that she meant, or at least I think she meant-that her work here was done. Her work will never be complete; we will all be her arms, legs, and voice-and I know that she's one busy lady in heaven."

ticipate in an hour long session one day a week after school. There is an upper and lower grade group. Each group focuses on a different topic. This year, the lower-grade children are learning about circuitry and the upper-grade children are learning about robotics and programming. A professor from George Washington University starts each lesson and then students from Montgomery County Community College take over the instruction and work directly with the children.

Ms. Damiano has been pleased with the response from the student body noting that they've added a summer session for children whose schedules kept them from participating during the school year. This past year the summer session topic was 3D Printing. She sees that the program has more girls participating this year than in the past. Fourth-grader Stephanie Muoka is one of this year's participants. Stephanie says that STEM is fun because "I like technology and I learn interesting techniques. I signed up to explore and learn."

Ms. Draper enrolled her daughter for a similar reason observing that third-grader Evelyn has "always been interested in and very good at math and science, so I thought that this program would be a great way to introduce her to additional computer skills and engineering skills to foster these interests." Ms. Damiano says that the best thing about the program is "watching the kids work collaboratively on something they've never done before - the look on their faces when they make the robot go."

and helping kids overcome their reticence to embrace a sometimes difficult subject. She loved seeing kids bloom when they finally understood a complex concept. She loved when a student would tell her, "maybe math isn't so bad after all." She loved the kids who already had the math instinct and she loved pushing them to achieve even more. She loved helping her colleagues develop strategies for teaching math in their own classrooms.

Erin loved the spring play. She loved producing musicals most of all and she had a definite fondness for Disney. She encouraged, cajoled and badgered kids into learning their lines and dance steps. She helped her colleagues become stage directors, scenery makers, prop and costuming experts. She loved working with our music teachers to find the "right" show for the current class of students. She loved the matinee, she loved opening night and she loved closing night. Every show was a little different, but Erin was always the same - leading the rest of us to learn how to do it all and have the show be spectacular year after year.

As this school year progresses, we are faced with difficult dilemmas. We have welcomed a new math teacher, we have figured out how to orchestrate a new Christmas show; we have many school liturgies ahead to plan. We are figuring out ways to close these looming gaps between what was and what has to be now. We will continue to do it. After all, Erin's legacy of love requires us to love, too.

And so life goes on as it always does - but we are different. We grieve and we thank God for our faith and for the promises Jesus has assured us are ours. Erin is in heaven, rejoicing and glorying in the love of the Father. We know this, but we are left here. So we hold tight to the promises Jesus made on the Mount of the Beatitudes.

All of our words are inadequate to truly encompass a life's accomplishments and the love expressed in it, but we have tried in this tribute. At St John the Baptist School we will still mourn, we will still offer comfort to one another, we will still hold tight to our faith and we will still love. 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### St. John's Makes Rockville Ice Arena Its Home Rink

eginning with the 2015-2016 season, the St. John's College High School ice hockey program has entered into a long-term lease agreement with the Rockville Ice Arena in Rockville that gives the Cadets a rink to call their own. This agreement grants SJC ice hockey preferred ice time for games and practices at one of the premier arenas in the DC metro area. St. John's will also have branding rights to one of the arena's three ice rinks, including a lighted sign at the facility's entrance identifying Rockville Ice Arena as the home of St. John's ice hockey.

The ice and boards now display St. John's logo and school colors, scarlet and grey, giving the feel of a true home rink. This summer, a new scoreboard was mounted to the rink's ceiling proudly displaying the names of St. John's and UnderArmour, which was founded by St. John's alumnus Kevin Plank. Players now have a sense of home-ice advantage and fans have even more pride when cheering on the Cadets.

St. John's has also started a campaign to raise funds to construct two new locker rooms for St. John's exclusive use at the arena. These locker rooms will give the Cadets a

private team space and provide each player with their own locker for the first time.

St. John's ice hockey program began as a club-level sport in 2002 and it now boasts a robust varsity program, as well as JV boys' and girls' ice hockey teams.

"Our hockey team's relocation to this dedicated arena is an exciting move," said St. John's Athletic Director Brian Griffin. "It provides us with a real home to develop our hockey team, build strong momentum as an entire program and get better every day, both on and off the




# William B. Whitaker President Washington Jesuit Academy 2015 Catholic Community Leader
