Father John named a 2012 Washingtonian of the Year

atholic Charities President and CEO Msgr. John Enzler has been named a Washingtonian of the Year for 2012 by Washingtonian Magazine. Msgr. Enzler is being recognized for his more than 40 years of experience as a priest, leader and advocate serving the needs of the most vulnerable in our community, and more specifically, for his work in starting many ministries where the need was unmet.

Msgr. Enzler took over as President and CEO of Catholic Charities in July 2011 and has placed special emphasis on engaging the community, growing the volunteer base and strengthening Catholic Charities infrastructure, stressing its good works in serving our neighbors in need and that we serve everyone, not just Catholics serving Catholics. Under his leadership, Catholic Charities has seen significant increases in fundraising from a wide range of sources, as well as greater community visibility.

'We're just getting started in how much good the community and Catholic Charities can accomplish together," said Msgr. Enzler. "As a DC native, this is a great honor. And it reflects all the staff, volunteers and especially clients at Catholic Charities who bring the courage and hard work to make miracles happen."

Monsignor Enzler was ordained a priest for the Archdiocese of Washington in 1973 and was named Monsignor by Pope John Paul II in 1985. In his priestly ministry, he has served at a number of parishes throughout the Archdiocese, including St. Jane de Chantal, Church of the Little Flower in Bethesda, and St. Bartholomew, and as pastor of three parishes, Mt. Calvary in Forestville, Our Lady of Mercy in Potomac and most recently at the Shrine of the Most Blessed Sacrament in Washington, DC.

Msgr. Enzler isn't Catholic Charities first honoree. In 2007, Luis "Lucho" Vasquez was named a Washington of the Year for his work in starting several programs for the homeless. Today he serves as the Division Director for Housing and Support Services for Catholic Charities.
