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## St. Bartholomew's 8:00 p.m. Sunday Mass

Popular Option for Montgomery County Catholics

t. Bartholomew Parish's 8:00 p.m. Sunday evening Mass was started over a year ago, but has grown into a popular Sunday Mass option for Montgomery County residents, especially for young families with busy weekend schedules and college students or recent graduates, who may be accustomed to having Masses available at later hours. It is the last Sunday Mass in Montgomery County.

The 8:00 p.m. Mass was started by Fr. Joe Sileo, former Pastor of St. Bart's, in Lent of 2012. Msgr. John Enzler, President of Catholic Charities and resident at St. Bartholomew Parish, typically celebrates the 8:00 p.m. Mass. Msgr. Enzler told OPT, "The Church has to find ways to say "Yes," to be more welcoming and hospitable and accommodating. We need to say 'You're welcome here and we want you." Msgr. Enzler com-

## St. Mary's 'History Day' Event & Book Signing Announced

Parish to hold free history day event in bonor of bicentennial year

eptember 21, 2013, St. Mary's Catholic Church will hold a History Day as part of its Bicentennial Celebration Year.

This free event, which will take place from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., will include docent-conducted tours of the grave sites of the literary legend F. Scott Fitzgerald and his family with both the original pioneer St. Mary's Church and the first post Vatican II Catholic Church in Montgomery County, Md. The second half of the event will include a boxed lunch and two speaker

presentations by St. Mary's Pastor, Monsignor Robert Amey, and parish historian, Roger Langley.

Langley wrote a new history book of St. Mary's Church and its role in the community throughout the past two hundred years. Langley said, "My goal was to tell the whole story, the good and the bad, our successes and failures and to place this parish history within the context of the history of Rockville, Montgomery County, and the United States." The history book will be available for purchase and to be signed by Langley on History Day and throughout the remainder of the year's celebrations.

History Day is one of many events, both social and spiritual, being held to celebrate St. Mary's 200th Anniversary.

Founded in 1813, historic St. Mary's Church led the way for Catholics in Montgomery County. Today, the church's organizations and ministries include the Catholic Youth Organization, a Social Concerns Ministry, St. Mary's Sodality, Religious Education (CCD), Youth Ministry and the Knights of Columbus. The parish is also home to St. Mary's Parish School, which educates students in pre-kindergarten through eighth grade.

The original church, built in 1817, now known as Our Lady's Chapel, was designated a Pilgrim Church of the Millennium for the Jubilee Year 2000 and again for the Year of Faith in 2013. The cemetery adjacent to the chapel is the final resting place of literary legend F. Scott Fitzgerald and his wife Zelda.


ees typical in recent weeks.



## Holy Redeemer's 10th Annual Vacation Bible School Is a "Blast"

his summer, Holy Redeemer Parish hosted its largest Vacation Bible School ever, June 24 – 28. Two hundred children from preschool through 5th grade learned about their Catholic faith all while having a "K4J Summertime Blast" that focused on Jesus in the Eucharist. Sixty middle-schoolers, 30 high schoolers, and 25 adults taught the children to love the Eucharist and bring Christ to the world, even at their young age.

Every morning began with highenergy songs, followed by a skit that taught about the saint, scripture verse, and catechism clip of the day. Then the daily schedule was packed, with children rotating through Missionaries in Motion (catechism), song, craft, snack, games, and snack stations. Older children made prayer journals to use for their personal prayer, while younger children made prayer booklets that included all the prayers every Catholic child should know. Children of all ages asked Mary to bring their intentions to her Son Jesus by leaving written prayers at the foot of Mary's statue in front of the school. On the last day, children attended a special VBS Mass with their families, and then returned to the school for a party including songs performed by the children for their parents, pizza, snow cones, and carnival games run by the middle-schoolers.

Holy Redeemer's program runs from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., with children bringing a lunch from home. This schedule makes HR's program a popular choice for families who have early morning swim team practices or enjoy "sleeping in" when school's out. Many parents find that VBS truly is a week for the entire family: Children from 4 years old through rising highschool seniors participated this year, including several special-needs students. While most volunteers are moms, this year's staff included dads, college students, and a grand-

## **Changes Coming for Children's Religious Education**

eginning at Kindergarten and concluding with eighth grade, St. John's offers weekly grade- specific classes taught by teams of volunteer catechists. The purpose of these sessions is to supply each student with an increasing understanding of the basic tenets of our faith.

#### **Sunday Classes**

In the past, St. John's has offered Faith Formation Classes for children in grades 1-8 on Tuesday and Wednesday evenings, and Kindergarten classes on Sunday mornings. 

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## St. John's Hears the Cry of the Poor

or the last 14 years, the families of St. John the Baptist School have shared their bounty with families served by the Itman Food Bank in Mullens, West Virginia. Families contribute new and gently used children's clothes, toiletries, linens, and housewares as well as other miscellaneous needed items. SJB alumni and current students are always on hand to load the rental truck that will make the trek to

Despite its name, the food bank is much more than a pantry. Situated in the basement of a large hall, half of the space is dedicated to sorting food along with donated personal hygiene items. The other half stores housewares, linens, children's and infant's clothing, toys, books, diapers and wipes.

The drive to Mullens is a beautiful one. But the beauty of the landscape – the tall trees, majestic mountains, and babbling brooks belie the poverty of the people who live in Wyoming County the poorest in West Virginia and indeed one of the poorest in our country.

Just six hours from our nation's capital, people live in substandard housing -- many without ade-

quate sanitation and most without proper nutrition.

The Itman Food Bank is run by Kathy and Arne Simonse, formerly of Takoma Park, who 'retired' in 2000 to live and work with the poor of Appalachia. Itman is run entirely by volunteers. Thirtyfive local West Virginians spend time organizing the donations that arrive from many places. The Itman Food Pantry in Mullens is the only one of its kind in that county. It is open only on the third Friday of each month, serving well over 700 families and

the clients are ever increasing. By this year's end over 15,000 people will have received help.

In the mountains there are no soup kitchens, no sandwich wagons and only a few social services. The people of the mountains have only the Itman Food Bank and its monthly distribution day.

In spite of their poverty, the people are full of faith and hope, ready to share the little they have. They are always grateful. And we are blessed to be able to help.

in the county. If you doubt, take a drive north along New Hampshire Ave. from the Beltway. After driving a few miles, you're likely to feel as if you have toured the world having passed mosques, churches, temples, synagogues and other places of worship. The stretch is aptly dubbed "the highway to heaven" and dramatically illustrates the wealth of religious diversity which is part of the fabric of Montgomery County, and it's not limited to New Hampshire Ave.

No boring county demographics, though many are quite surprising; however it's important that we know that among the County's one million people, there is no majority culture or race. Among faith communities, Christians still hold an edge, however, the number of Jews, Muslims, Hindus and others is significant and growing rapidly. This is not "our mother's county" anymore and we are certainly not in Kansas! During this year, I'd like to reflect on the blessings and opportunities that diverse faith communities bring to the county and especially our Catholic communities. Greater knowledge about diverse faith traditions will lead to more accurate understanding of principles and foundations of different faith traditions, improve communication and, with the guidance of the Holy Spirit, lead to greater spiritual solidarity toward our shared mission to create a more God-centered world. At a minimum, by understanding other various faiths better, we will

dispel from our minds and our children's minds some of the damaging stereotypes that have led to much suffering throughout history.

Thus the relevance of Father Abraham. Remember the story of Abraham from childhood? For me, the climax occurred when God tested Abraham by asking him to sacrifice his son, Isaac. I was relieved when the angel came just in the nick of time to spare young Isaac! After years of homilies and conversations with Jewish and Muslim friends, I learned of Abraham's great importance as the father of monotheism and as patriarch to the three largest religions in the world today, Christianity, Judaism, and Islam. It is ironic that even as these three great religions share the same DNA, their faithful barely understand the shared spiritual heritage bestowed upon them. So how is it that Abraham's multitude of descendants evolved so divisively? Why is it difficult for us, the chosen children of God, Yahweh, and Allah, to seek understanding and appreciation for each other? Why is it important that they do so? What examples exist here in our county of interfaith understanding, ecumenical worship, shared social missions, and other faith inspired collegial activity? What can local parish communities do to promote improved understanding?

I hope you will join me during the coming year to explore and reflect upon these important questions. A group of us have embarked upon an activity we are calling "The Abraham Project" here in Montgomery County. The project will serve as a resource to assist interested faith communities in offering seminars to provide information to members who wish to learn more about other faiths; offer opportunities for interfaith dialogue at the parish and congregation levels and generally promote understanding and cooperation among local diverse faith communities. If you have an interest in this activity, please email me.

In closing I suggest a few resources which will be useful in understanding other faiths. First, two interesting and understandable books: How Do You Spell God?, by Rabbi Marc Gellman and Monsignor Thomas Hartman (lots of laughs and basic information); and Bruce Feeler's, Abraham. If your parish community is interested in a guest speaker on this subject, I recommend Rev. Mansfield Kaseman, former Executive Director of Rockville Community Ministries and currently Liaison for Faith Communities for the Montgomery County government. He can be reached at 240 777 2503 or Mansfield.Kaseman@montgomerycountymd.gov.

I write this on the last day of the month of Ramadan, an important Muslim religious commemoration; in a few weeks, our Jewish neighbors will be commemorating the High Holy Days. Shortly afterwards, Christians will begin the period of Advent. These holy periods are appropriate times and Montgomery County is the perfect place to seek to understand and appreciate kindred spirits.

## **US Catholic Educators Participate in ADL Mission to Israel**

June 26 - July 4, 2013

The El Al flight from Tel Aviv to JFK is 12 hours long, a bit lengthy even on an airline that offers every comfort and is famous for its inflight service. 20 Catholic educators are scattered throughout the plane. We have just completed the Anti-Defamation League's Bearing Witness Advanced program. This program, funded by the May and Samuel Rudin Family Foundation, is designed to give Catholic school educators the education and resources needed to teach others about the connections between Judaism and Catholicism, the Jewish connection to Israel, modern Israeli politics including the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, and current theory in Holocaust studies

On the plane, some of us catch up on the sleep that was hard to come by throughout this jam-packed, eventful trip in which we visited a vast and varied amount of historical and religious sites and met with prestigious speakers representing the complicated aspects of Israeli political and religious life. Many of us excitedly discuss new ideas and new initiatives.

Together, we visited historical Jewish, Christian, and Muslim sites, attended a Shabbat dinner and a Western Wall visit hosted by the "Shabbat of a Lifetime" program, met a Holocaust survivor at Yad Vashem Holocaust Museum, visited an Arab-Jewish Community Center, met with Naomi Tsur,



eral parishes in Prince George's and Montgomery counties, we were able to help 646 people receive a wide range of dental services.

I've never seen so many people happy to get root canals.

For two days, the gym at the high school was a 50-chair dental office. More than 200 dental professionals performed everything from routine cleanings to fillings to root canals and teeth pulls. Another 200 volunteers helped with check-in, patient assistance, set-up and clean-up. Many of our patients had not seen a dentist in years, lacking dental insurance or the means to afford the care.

Holding an event like this truly opens your eyes to the need around us. People started waiting outside at 5 pm the night before the clinic even started. When we opened the doors at 6 am, hundreds were waiting. They came with sleeping bags and sweatshirts, prepared to wait as long as it took. Sadly, we were unable to see hundreds more who came too late in the day. There are always limits to our capabilities, even if our hearts are limitless.

It's an excellent example of faith. The many problems of our world are well-documented daily. The awful ways people can treat each other often dominate our attention. But it's the quiet work of Christ day after day, by volunteers and professionals alike, that most deeply reflects the good in our world.

For me, faith is not simply stating belief. It is walking forward to try and tackle a problem you know is too big to be tackled by you alone. It's trusting that if you do your part, no matter how small or insignificant it seems, then the rest of the pieces will fall into place.

Though we're still tallying the numbers, approximately \$700,000 in dental care was performed. When I step back from this event, I see a perfect example of the potential of community. Together, hundreds came to give of themselves, their talents and their time, to express their love for their neighbor.

I met some incredible people on my visit to the site. One young woman was in recovery from addiction, but her front teeth had been destroyed from years of drug abuse. This held her back from truly moving on with her life. Our clinic was able to fit her up with new front teeth - she literally got her smile back.

And one of our volunteers worked a full day the first day of the clinic, then showed up to receive dental work herself on the second. She needed several painful teeth extracted, but it was more important to her to serve, than to be served.

It was so special to see the transformations taking place, not just in the smiles of those served, but in their whole attitude. Amazing how different your perspective on life is when a longtime pain is suddenly gone, or a heavy burden suddenly lifted. This is what we strive to do each and every day at Catholic Charities - heal those wounds, physical and spiritual; lift those burdens; and witness Christ to those who feel alone. We do all we can, then place our faith in God to help us with the rest.

Deputy Mayor of Jerusalem, visited the Papal Nuncio to the Holy See, Archbishop Guiseppe Lazzarotto, heard testimony from an Israel National Police Officer who is a survivor of attempted murder by a terrorist, toured the Golan Heights and the security fence, ate with settlers in the West Bank, and much, much more.

We were also afforded the special privilege of meeting with Abraham Foxman, National Director of the Anti-Defamation League, who connected powerfully with us when relaying his early history as a child in hiding during the Holocaust, brought up as a Catholic by his nanny. This meeting and the tearful embraces which ended it was living, undeniable proof of the enduring connection which has existed for years between the ADL and the Catholic Church.

Another highlight was our meeting with Yossi Klein Halevi, author of At the Garden of Eden: A Jew's Search for God with Christians and Muslims in the Holy Land (Harper Collins, 2002) and the upcoming Like Dreamers (Harper Collins,

Oct. 2013). Mr. Halevi provided a fascinating overview of the current state of Israel, but what stuck with us was his sharing of his personal struggles to deal with the escalation of violence in the land that he loves, and the near-constant evolution of his point of view. His words were wise and generous.

After these incredible eight days, many of us feel reborn, as if we have entered a new phase of life. We are filled with a new enthusiasm and are bursting with plans to bear the fruits of all that we have learned. We discuss new pedagogies, plans for interfaith groups, presentations to students and staff, and booking guest speakers at our schools. We have found a new land and a new life.

Tucked away in our luggage are the treasures we bring with us souvenirs and gifts for family members, our notes and musings that we will pore over when we get home, talismans, medals, books to consult, and other trinkets and keepsakes to remind us of our new spiritual home. Our cameras are loaded with hundreds of photos. We hope to keep the light of our memory glowing, to repay the ADL's investment in our education, and to one day return to Israel.

## **Welcome Father Jacob!**

ur new associate pastor at St. Elizabeth is Father Jacob George - a priest with a very different background than the young, fresh-out-of-the-seminary, or nearly so, archdiocesan priest. He's been ordained for 18 years. And he has even already been a pastor. The big difference is he didn't start out as a priest in the Roman Rite. There are, believe it or not, 22 different rites in the Catholic Church in concordance with Rome, and the one to which Fr. Jacob is ordained is the Syro-Malankara Catholic Archi-Episcopal Church - a rite that was a product of the missionary work of the apostle St. Thomas, who traveled in the pioneer years of Christendom eastward to Syria and beyond. The Malankaras are a community in South Asia - India and its immediate surrounding countries.

Fr. Jacob, one of eight children, was born in Athirumkal, Pathanamthitta Diocese, Kerala, India, on April 3, 1971. He was ordained April 4, 1997, at St. Mary's Cathedral in the Major-Archdiocese of Trivandrum, on the far western coast of India near its southern tip, Fr. Jacob served nine years in his home diocese, before being sent to the United States to be the fourth pastor of the Catholic Mission of the Malankara Church in the Archdiocese of Washington separate in language (West Syriac) and liturgy, from our rite, even though fully subject to our pontiff in Rome. He remains incardinated in his home diocese.

Strange as it may sound, Fr. Jacob came to the U.S. as a missionary. He was sent specifically to minister to Malankara Catholics here in the Washington area. Current immigration laws in the U.S., while restrictive to many, are very permissive toward those with training in professions deemed highly in demand here. Indians have taken advantage of this in large numbers, sending nurses, doctors, and, especially in this age, IT specialists. If you Google the Syro-Malankara Catholic Exarchate Web site, you will find not only a vibrant church



in India, but a great many communities here in the United States. Most parishes are small in membership and enormous in geographic area, but the Indian immigrants to faith communities of this rite remain loyal despite their scattered

Fr. Jacob arrived in the United States in June 2006, to take over his new parish. His parish church was the St. Anne's chapel used for weekday Masses by St. Mary's parish in Landover Hills, which, at the inception of his pastorate, was given "on loan" for his community to celebrate Sunday Mass. Fr. Jacob, who was the mission's fourth pastor, had a primary mission to continue growing the community, which at the beginning of his pastorate, had six registered families and had grown 29 months later, at the end of his pastorate, to 30 registered families. This he accomplished by logging thousands of miles in his car, his parish stretching from as far south as Richmond, Virginia, and north to Baltimore, Maryland, one parish covering four of our dioceses. As his parish grew, a CCD program was begun, and

eventually it provided faith training up to the 10th grade. And, with the parish's growth, the chapel-on-loan was turned over permanently to the Malankara community. With a church of their own, they were able to fully equip the sanctuary to make it a truly Malankara church in décor, sacramentals and vestments. Father Jacob built a cohesive parish by regular visits to the parish's disparate families, praying with them and showing a pastor's touch by hands-on ministry, despite the enormous distances separating his flock.

After five years as pastor of the Malankar community (the term length determined by his bishop in India, who regularly supplies this small community with their pastors), Fr. Jacob was given the opportunity to remain in our archdiocese and attend Loyola University to attain a master's degree in psychology and pastoral counseling. Since his term with the Indian community had ended, he was allowed to take an assignment as parochial vicar at St. Mary of the Mills, in Laurel, where he served for the past two and a half years. (Because Fr. Jacob remains incardinated to his diocese in India, for his tenure here in our archdiocese he cannot be named a pastor in a parish of our archdiocese, but can serve as an associate.) With the departure of our recent associate, Fr. Harry Stokes, to Little Flower parish, Fr. Jacob was assigned here to St. Elizabeth in July, where he continues to serve in the Roman rite, at the pleasure of the Archbishops of Washington and Trivandrum.

Although still a recent arrival, Fr. Jacob has had time enough to get a good sense of our parish. "You are a wonderful Catholic community, so welcoming, and very rich in a multinational, multiethnic heritage. I know I will enjoy my stay here."


## **Our Lady of Lourdes Eighth Grade** Will Visit the Supreme Court Again!

## **Service Campers Help Former Prisoners** Return Home, Spread Gospel of Kindness

total of 84 high school and middle school youngsters helped former prisoners return to home, prepared food for the homeless, preached a gospel of "kindness" to more than 400 people, and took part in numerous other service projects during three Summer Work Camps at Resurrection Parish.

Other activities focused on helping children undergoing cancer treatment, tornado and bombing victims, and victims of domestic violence, as well as projects related to worship, the parish Haiti project, pet adoption, and environmental cleanup.

At the first camp from June 24-28, two dozen high-schoolers pursued their activities under the theme "Combine Prayer With Action," taken from the gospels of Matthew and Luke.

Then at two camps from July 8-12 and July 15-19, a total of 60 middle-schoolers pursued the theme of "Be an Advocate for the Voiceless," taken from Proverbs

The camps were conducted under the direction of Helene Stever, Director of Religious Education/ Youth Ministry, and Adult Leaders Cat Halpin and Monica Lopez. The middle school camps included 10 high school Core Team Leaders as



bling and delivering 84 bags of basic necessities for the "Welcome Home" program.

The work campers heard a brief presentation from "Welcome bags with words of hope, peace and encouragement for the men and women transitioning home from incarceration. The students filled the bags with items such as soap, notebooks, gift cards and other hygiene products --all a big need for the individuals returning home from prison.

Liz Laird, a Catholic Charities "Welcome Home" reentry coordinator at a center in Rockville, said of the program: "Focusing on the story of God's redeeming work that

transformed Saul, a persecutor of the early church, into the Apostle Paul," the re-entry program staff shared with students "the power of a second chance for men and Home" staff, then decorated canvas women leaving incarceration. By putting together these hygiene kits and decorating them with words of hope and encouragement, students are reminding ex-offenders that they, too, have a second chance."

In another project, the work campers assembled some 1,300 "healthy breakfast" bags for the Catholic Charities "Cup of Joe" project and delivered them to a men's shelter for the homeless on New York Avenue in Washington.

basic breakfast food (fresh fruit, juice boxes, instant coffee packets, granola bars and peanut butter crackers) at five emergency shelters, which host more than 1,000 men and women each night in the Washington area.

The cards were distributed to parishioners, residents at the Riderwood seniors community, bus driver for the work camp social, firemen, police officers, teachers, librarians, staff at Liberty Grove Methodist Church, staff at Learning Tree Day Care, and staff at Benjamin Banneker Elementary School and at Greencastle Elementary

Stained 14 wooden crosses that are used during Lent for Stations of the Cross.

Made 30 "Adopt a Pet" take-home bags filled with handmade chew toys, biscuit treats and encouragement cards, as well as cage cards for pets to be adopted. All were donated to the Montgomery County Humane Society.

Tie-dyed 30 t-shirts for donation to children at the House of Ruth Domestic Violence Center.

Tie-dyed an additional 30 t-shirts for donation to children undergoing chemo treatment for cancer.

Cleaned up the Resurrection courtyard gardens and prepared ground for native species planting this fall.

Made 84 encouragement cards, hope bracelets and a \$250 donation to the Boston One Fund to assist victims and families in the April bombings at the Boston Marethon

Made 84 encouragement cards, hope bracelets and a \$250 donation to the Catholic Charity Archdiocese of Oklahoma City relief efforts for tornado victims.

Made 200 rosaries and an \$800 donation to the Camp Claudine Youth Camp in Haiti.






## **Father Mark Knestout Appointed Pastor at St. Bartholomew Parish**





Almost 15,000 Active in U.S.

he number of permanent deacons in the United States continues to increase, according to a national survey released by the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops. The Georgetown University-based Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate (CARA) conducted the survey of 193 of the

195 U.S. dioceses in April. This marks the seventh CARA survey of the permanent diaconate, an ancient ministry reinstituted by the Second Vatican Council.

The bishops began to ordain permanent deacons for the United States in the early seventies. The



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## **Montgomery County Transportation Improvements Funded**

ontgomery County will be receiving \$628 million in State transportation investments and an additional \$400 million for construction of the Purple Line that will benefit both Montgomery and Prince George's Maryland's 2013 counties. Transportation Act, announced August 5, includes funding for the following projects:

- Purple Line, a 16-mile light rail line that runs east-west inside the Capital Beltway between Bethesda and New Carrollton, will receive \$280 million in new funding for right-of-way acquisition and final design and an additional \$400 million in new construction funding. The Purple Line will be built as a public-private partnership under HB 560
- Corridor Cities Transitway, a 15-mile bus rapid transit system extending from the Shady Grove Metro Station to the COMSAT

facility just south of Clarksburg, will receive \$100 million in new funding for right-of-way acquisition and final design for the Phase I portion extending to the Metropolitan Grove MARC Station in Gaithersburg.

- I-270/Watkins Mill Road Interchange will include improvements to I-270 from north of MD 124 to south of Middlebrook Road and bicycle and pedestrian improvements along Watkins Mill Road. The project will receive \$125 million in new funding for con-
- Ride On Bus will receive \$85 million in new funding, increasing the State's subsidy by 50 percent to fully fund the State's fair share of the bus service.
- MD 97 Relocation Near Brookeville will receive \$25 million in new construction funding to build a two-lane MD 97 highway from south of Brookeville to north

of Brookeville, relieving traffic congestion and improving safety in the historic town center.

- US 29 Interchanges Design at Musgrove Road and Fairland Road will receive \$7 million in new funding for design of two interchanges that will accommodate projected traffic growth along this key northsouth route, reduce congestion and improve highway safety.
- MD 124 Widening (Phase 2) will receive \$3 million in new funding for design to widen this route to a six-lane divided highway from Midcounty Highway to south of Airpark Road. The third phase, widening MD 124 to Warfield Road, is not funded.
- MD 28/MD 198 Corridor Transportation Improvement Study will receive \$3 million in new planning funds to evaluate possible roadway improvements in the corridor from MD 97 to I-95.

## HHS releases 2013 Alzheimer's disease plan update



.S. Department of Health and Human Services released the National Plan to Address Alzheimer's Disease: 2013 Update, a follow-up to the initial plan released in May 2012. The update reflects our national progress towards accomplishing the goals set a year ago, as well as new and action steps.

Highlights over the past year

■ Multiple new Alzheimer's research projects were funded in 2012, including two major new clinical trials, genetics sequencing, and development of innovative new cellular models for Alzheimer's.

- The Health Resources and Services Administration issued grants that helped provide training to more than 10,000 health care providers on topics from dementia diagnosis to effective behavior management for people with dementia and their caregivers.
- HHS launched the widely praised website, www.alzheimers. gov to increase public awareness and connect people with a diagnosis and their caregivers with important resources. The site had more than 200,000 visits in the first ten
- The update plan also identifies additional action steps that HHS and its partners will take. These include:
- A unified Alzheimer's disease training curriculum for primary care providers will be developed to help deliver high-quality dementia care. Researchers will investigate avoidable hospitalization and emergency department use among those with Alzheimer's disease and the best interventions for reducing them.
- Detection of elder abuse and neglect will be expanded through aging networks and program providers who work with the Alzheimer's population. Demonstration grants will be awarded to help promote legal services groups that assist families and communities impacted by Alzheimer's.
- An expanded Dementia Capability Toolkit will be developed for state and local health networks to better help them provide dementia services in their communities.



This year's pilgrimage was based on the theme of Faith, given by Pope Benedict XVI to the year. The Pilgrimage



## Our Lady of Grace in Honor of Fr. Plans



for it. This gap pushes wages down – half of the jobs in this country pay less than \$27,000. Over 46 million people live in poverty, 16 million of them children," he wrote.

He noted that individuals, the Church, businesses, government and community organizations all share the responsibility to create jobs that allow workers to support themselves and their families.

"Ethical and moral business leaders know that it is wrong to chase profits and success at the expense of workers' dignity," he wrote. "They know they have a vocation to build the kind of solidarity that honors the worker and the least among us. They remember that the economy is 'for people."

Bishop Blaire cited the importance of unions in helping workers participate in company decisions that affect them and noted that the rise in income inequality has paralleled the decline of unions in the United States. He urged unions to continually improve themselves and focus on issues including "raising the minimum wage, stopping wage theft," and "standing up for Continued on page 30

## A Very Busy Summer!

hen the final bell rings on schools. SFIS has be using this that last day of school, students and teachers all heave a sigh of relief that another year has successfully come to an end. However, faculty and staff often take the "quiet" summer months to attend professional development opportunities to enhance their work with students in the classroom. Many members of the SFIS faculty and staff took full advantage of many training opportunities this summer. In June, a group of teachers attended a follow-up training in Responsive Classroom Techniques. In July a group of teachers attended a workshop on Developmental Designs while another group traveled to Chicago to attend a 3-day seminar on Instructional Differentiation. In August, 30 members of SFIS faculty and staff attended their first intensive training in Responsive Classroom techniques.

What is Responsive Classroom? According to the website and trainers, Responsive Classroom (or RC) is an approach to teaching and learning that fosters safe, challenging and joyful classrooms and

approach for several years, and this new school year of 2013-14 will be the first year that all faculty and administration have been trained in this model. This approach was developed by classroom teachers, and consists of bringing together social and academic learning throughout the school day. RC uses teaching practices that are based on the foundations of developmental, cultural and individual development. RC promotes an awareness that social and academic learning go hand in hand and the central belief that all children want to and CAN learn.

Gone are the days of straight lined desks and long lectures (the way many of us were taught in elementary school!). RC promotes academic learning that smoothly incorporates into social learning. Students are given specific goals and expectations and then those expectations are modeled by the teacher and practiced by the students before they are expected to do anything on their own. For example, a middle school teacher may discuss with his/her class behavior expectations during an up-coming large group assembly. The students usually know what is expected of them behavior-wise, so discussing the expectations comes naturally. The teacher would then model what some positive behaviors might look like - eyes on the speaker, hands quiet, paying attention to the speaker, etc. Next, the students would practice these behaviors while the teacher or another student pretends to be the speaker. Discussion might include questions like "What if the speaker is boring?" or "What do I do if my classmates try to get me to do something wrong?" By actively anticipating different scenarios, students are more prepared and more likely to be successful in having the desired behaviors. By achieving these positive behaviors, students have a more positive learning experience. This positive experience is the basis of excellent learning in the classroom and throughout the school building. The whole RC approach is driven by guiding principles that include the recognition by educators that:

■ The social curriculum is as important as the academic curricu-

- HOW children learn is as important as WHAT they learn: process and content go hand in hand
- The greatest cognitive growth occurs through social interaction
- To be successful academically and socially, children need to learn and practice specific social skills like cooperation, assertion, responsibility, empathy and self-control
- Knowing the children we teach (individually, culturally, and developmentally) is as important as what

we teach

- Knowing the families of the children we teach is as important as knowing the children we teach
- How we, the adults of the school, work together is as important as our individual competence lasting change begins with the adult community

These guiding principles will be the focus of teachers, staff and administration of SFIS this year!


## **Learning Opportunities Continue** throughout the Summer at SFIS


## A Farewell, Welcome and Congratulations


St. Francis youth group participates in two service work camps each summer-Catholic HEART work camp (CHWC) and Encounter the Gospel of Life (Encounter).

## **Exciting Summer at The Academy of the Holy Cross**

ummer has been a busy season at The Academy of the Holy Cross! On campus, students participated in enrichment courses, sports camps, and a summer stock performance of Disney's "Beauty and the Beast." Administration and faculty made preparations for the inauguration of AHC's new 1-to-1 iPad Program. Off campus, groups traveled to Indiana Virginia, and France. Additionally, the Academy welcomed new president Kathleen Ryan Prebble (see full article elsewhere in this edition) and new Athletic Director Lisa Schrader.

Summer at the Academy included a week of enrichment courses such as College Essay Writing, Public Speaking, and High School Placement Test (HSPT) Prep. A new course, "College Application Academy," offered senior students the opportunity to complete the college application process – from filling out the "Common Application," to writing and editing their personal statement and résumé, to conducting mock interviews with college admissions counselors.

During the Academy's Summer Sports Camps, athletes of all levels could hone their sports skills. Camps included Basketball, Field Hockey, Soccer, Poms and Cheer, Lacrosse, Softball, and Volleyball. Counselors of the camps were made up of coaches and varsity players from AHC's athletic program.

The Academy's Summer Stock staged Disney's "Beauty and the Beast" for their performance this year. Summer Stock allows young performers to be onstage with professional and semi-professional actors. Ryan claims that the first time he seriously considered the idea of becoming a priest happened when he was in high school during mass when a Capuchin brother gave his vocation story. When asked why he wants to be a priest, Ryan believes and hopes that this might be the will of God for him. He claims that being a priest will

other of God School and St. John Neumann parish grieves the loss of Genevieve Ann Jurkowski who was an example of humility, peace and graceful suffering.

An experienced educator, Ann came to teach at Mother of God School, later becoming principal. Comments from former students include: "the perfect teacher. She understood us." "A saint! Patient, forgiving." "She showed the light of Christ. She was a holy woman."

Teachers remember her as a wise, prayerful mother to many, peaceful and gracious. "Mrs. J." cared about each staff member, each student and each family and was present and

available to everyone, while caring for her husband, children and grandchildren.

As principal she prayed about a yearly theme and while on vacation she and her husband Hank would buy a symbolic object (a lighthouse, a ship, a lantern) for each classroom to use as a focus for the teachers and students and she would remind us of them often. At each assembly she would weave the theme into the prayers.

At each Mass, Ann reminded the students that just as Mary carried Jesus within her so were *they* living tabernacles. Afterwards they left with a sacrifice of silence knowing that special privilege of having Jesus within them. Even the youngest children responded to this by silently walking out with their hands over their hearts. She introduced a picture of Our Lady, Mother of the Eucharist to the school which stills inspires everyone.

When Mrs. Jurkowski became gravely ill with cancer, the school prayed for her each day. Our 7th and 8th graders were in Kindergarten and First Grade when she was principal so most of the students didn't know who she was. After Mass the week before she died I told them about how much she loved the school and how we could honor her by remembering her words. We sang a song that she loved: "Lord, prepare me to be a sanctuary... In thanksgiving I'll be a living sanctuary for you."

Mother of God School "seeks to prepare students who... go forth bearing Christ to the world..."

This was Ann's deepest desire. She lived this. Her life's work will resonate for generations in the hundreds of students she taught as well as in her own 18 grandchildren.

## Faith Quest: A Summer Adventure



was entitled: Notacje: Wladyslaw Zachariasiewicz. "Chcialem polaczyc Polakow na calym swiecie (I wanted to link together Polish people throughout the world)."

Walter was born in Krakow, Poland, and graduated from the Jagiellonian University. As a student, he was elected President of the Student Democratic Association and the International Student Fellowship. During World War II, he was arrested and deported to a gulag by Soviet Russians. After

his release, he served with General Anders' Polish Army that fought on the side of the Allies against Nazi-Germany.

After he immigrated to the United States in 1948, he worked as executive director of the Polish-American Relief Committee, director of operations in the Democratic National Committee, and Assistant Postmaster General. He became a leader in Polish American organizations. He worked for a free Poland and authored, "The Independence Ethos of American Polonia." Pope John Paul II named him to the Board of Directors of the John Paul II Foundation.

Walter continues to be active in many organizations, including the Washington Chapter of the Friends of the John Paul II Foundation.

In addition to archives of his interviews in Poland, there is the Walter Zachariasiewicz Collection (AFC/2001/001/14573), Veterans History Project, American Folklife Center, at the Library of Congress.

## **50th Anniversary of the March on Washington**

March led to advances in civil rights for minority racial groups

More effort needed for non-violence, dialogue among races

Need to address poverty, joblessness, voting rights, racial inequality

■he 50th anniversary of the August 28, 1963 March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom calls people to address poverty, racism and class inequality, said the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' Committee on Cultural Diversity.

The committee, which is chaired by Bishop Daniel Flores of Brownsville, Texas, issued its statement August 13, as the nation prepares to commemorate the event at which Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. gave his "I Have a Dream" speech on the National Mall.

"We join our voices to those who call for and foster continued dialogue and non-violence among people of different races and cultures, and who work tirelessly for the transformative, constructive actions that are always the fruit of such authentic dialogue," the bishops said. "We rejoice in the advances

that have occurred over the past 50 years, and sadly acknowledge that much today remains to be accomplished. However, we must always view the task that remains from the perspective of the continued call to hope and in the light of faith."

The bishops cited both Dr. King, who said "We must accept finite disappointment, but never lose infinite hope," and Pope Francis, who in his first encyclical, Lumen Fidei, declared that "Faith teaches us to see that every man and woman represents a blessing for me, that the light of God's face shines on me through the faces of my brothers and sisters."

The bishops urged solidarity to meet the goals of the 1963 march.

"We join the call for positive action that seeks to end poverty, increase jobs, eliminate racial and class inequality, ensure voting rights, and that provides fair and just opportunities for all," they said.





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## **Saint Peter's Goes Wireless**

t the end of last school year, the St. Peter's Technology Committee determined that the school was ready to expand its wireless system and use of technology in real-life applications. Throughout the summer, the Committee researched appropriate tablets that would be most effectively used in the school's environment, and the maintenance crew pulled wires and installed access points.

After much deliberation, the Committee decided that Apple iPads would best serve both our students and teachers. Many of the teachers had already used their personal iPads in the classroom, so the need for professional development would not be as great. Thirtyone iPads were purchased, along with protective covers and keyboards. A generous parent provided the resources to purchase several e-Readers for the library.

The school bought a new science program for the middle school that features on-line textbooks and other resources the students can link into during class and at home. Apple has collaborated with the company to provide engaging apps that support the curriculum. Although the new iPads will be shared throughout the school, it is expected that they will

be most often used in the middle school science classes for this year.

The Archdiocese of Washington Catholic Schools Office engaged a new on-line standardized testing company, Scantron, last year. Now the students are tested three times throughout the year and this makes it difficult to use the school's computer room for other subjects and projects. With the new iPad mobile lab, one class can be testing in their classroom, while another class can be in the computer room. As the teachers and students become more proficient using the tablets, it is expected that the school will purchase more mobile labs in the
