Sisters of Notre Dame de Namur Mark 175th Year in U.S.

Events commemorating the anniversary to be held in Washington and across the country

sisters of Notre Dame de Namur are marking the congregation's 175th year of service in the USA with events across the country. In Washington, a special prayer service and reception will take place at Trinity University on Saturday, October 24.

It was in 1873, at the request of Ellen Sherman, wife of General Sherman, that Sisters of Notre Dame first came to DC (then part of the Archdiocese of Baltimore) to staff an industrial school for young girls. They also taught parochial-school classes and, in 1876, opened Notre Dame Academy, K Street. By 1897, they were establishing the first Catholic college for women – now Trinity Washington University.


From Trinity, many Sisters taught religious education classes in nearby parishes, which soon were building schools and applying for SNDs to staff them. The years to follow would find Sisters at St. Aloysius, St. Martin,

ope Francis's visit to Washington was every bit as exciting, joyful and substantive as I could have hoped. His visit has given us volumes of wisdom upon which to pray and

Some Relief for Montgomery County Cab Drivers

s St. John XXIII said in his 1961 encyclical Mater et Magistra (Mother and Teacher, no.20): "It [the State] has also the duty to protect the rights of all its people, and particularly of its weaker members, the workers, women and children. It can never be right for the State to shirk its obligation of working actively for the betterment of the condition of the workingman." This past summer, Montgomery County took action to better the condition of taxicab drivers, and the Church, through its Justice and Advocacy Council of Montgomery County, supported their efforts.

In Montgomery County, we

expect taxis to be promptly available, rain or shine, 24/7, at the click of a mouse or last minute phone call. Even if we own cars, we often need taxis to shop, get to doctor's appointments, the Metro,

or the airport. For our seniors and handicapped, taxi service is not just a convenience, it is essential to living independently here in the County. Taxi service gets our attention only when we hear about Uber or Lyft or think the response was too slow. We expect drivers to know how to get us where we want to go as if they've lived here

all their lives, yet their accents and complexions make clear that mostly, they come here from far, far away. Beyond that fact, we know little of their lives.

According to documents submitted to the County Council, taxi drivers are not employees of the cab company; they are independent contractors who typically do not own their cabs but rent them from the cab company on extended leases, at rates of \$110 day, each day, six days a week. The cab company covers maintenance costs on the car and provides dispatch services. The drivers pay for gas, \$50 or more per day. The drivers also pay the cab company for insurance (\$7500/ year), for processing customer payments by credit card (7.85% per charge), and for toll charges (\$25 per EzPass charge).

Of course, as independent con-

tractors, they pay their own Federal taxes (some 14% of their earnings) and are responsible for the cost of their own health insurance that can cost the driver several hundred dollars a month, even with Federal subsidies. They have no pension plans. They report commonly working 60 or more hours a week to earn what often amounts to minimum wage or less. In fact, the Washington Post reported one long-time driver testified that, after expenses, a driver working 50 hours a week may take home as little as \$200 a week. They have little leverage to negotiate better terms with the cab companies.



The Goal is Heaven, Not Harvard

he Holy Redeemer School faculty and staff were graced with a wonderful spiritual retreat on Friday, August 28, 2015, during their in-service week. The retreat was given by Fr. Samuel Plummer, parochial vicar of Holy Redeemer Catholic Church. Fr. Plummer's talks were centered on the idea that the goal of a Catholic school teacher should be to get the students to heaven, not to Harvard, or even to high school. He offered that perhaps the mission statement of a Catholic school should simply be "Help the kids get to heaven."

Fr. Plummer told his vocation story and how his job in a publishing company in Charlotte, North Carolina, eventually led him to

reevaluate his career path. When tasked with trying to find a more efficient way to organize a group of fifteen employees, he realized that each employee had a different idea of what the mission was. Once the

> mission was clearly identified to each employee, the group worked much more efficiently towards its goal. He used this example as a metaphor for how we must work at having a real relationship with the Lord to achieve our goal of getting to heaven.

> In order for Catholic school teachers to work efficiently towards the goal of getting kids to heaven, Fr. Plummer suggested that we must first know how to get there ourselves

and he gave some very concrete examples of how to do this: go to Mass every Sunday, spend time with the Lord in Adoration, go to Confession, spend at least thirty minutes a day in prayer, and read the Bible, something he acknowledged that Catholics traditionally haven't spent enough time doing.

Fr. Plummer recounted a conversation he had had with some college-age students from the Holy Redeemer parish and school. They were still active and engaged in their faith, still practicing their religion. The students were asked what had helped them remain close to their faith during their college years when many young people fall away from the Church. Their response was that one teacher had made such an impact on them. She was identi-

y mother is not Catholic but she knew how important faith was to my dad, so we attended 12 years of Catholic school and were very involved in the church as a family. She supported us fully but never felt moved to convert to Catholicism.

Why is this important?

I share this with you because, although I did not see the Pope in person, I witnessed something much more important. I saw the effect he had on those outside the Catholic faith.

My mother's visit from Florida coincided with that of the Pope's

here in Washington. No one in our family had tickets to an event or lined the parade route, but we had pledged to Walk with Francis and were thrilled he was on American

Initially, we tuned in to coverage because we knew so many that were making the trek to the city for a glimpse of Pope Francis, we hoped the camera would catch a familiar face.

We never left the house on Wednesday and the television was tuned to the days' events continuously. Mom and I were riveted by the Pope's joy, evident though being beamed through satellite into our living room. We were fascinated by his willingness to walk among the people. And most importantly, we were engrossed in his words.

So much love and common sense were woven into his message, it was relatable to every man, woman and child.

Only when we watched the Mass itself at the Basilica did I realize how much mom had absorbed in all those years raising us. She was still familiar with the rhythm of the Mass and what came next but this time she was listening and hearing the words of the sermon.

We did see a great number of people in the crowds that we

knew. A St. Mary's mother, Mary Cardoza, was interviewed for the Today Show and was eloquent as she spoke of the Pope's inspirational message. Her daughter Luisa was featured on WTOP and reminded us that even the littlest of hearts embraces this Pope. Another of our students, Kevin Hrozencik, appeared in a CBS News segment

on Papal Selfies which our social savvy media Pontiff tolerated graciously throughout his stay.

But what I saw firsthand was a woman who had not stepped foot in a church in decades, moved by this remarkable man and his ideology.

At the airport on Thursday, my mother watched the Congressional Address with hundreds of others waiting to depart. People stopped in the concourse to listen for a minute before hurrying off to their gates. And when it was over, the entire airport—employees and travelers alike--erupted in applause.

She couldn't wait to share this rare occurrence with me once she arrived home. When was the last time Americans gathered around the television to watch something other than a tragedy? When was the last time that our nation drew together as one regardless of race or religion and was inspired?

That is what this Pope is capable of. He lifts us up not only in faith but also by the way he lives his life. His humility and benevolence



moment to have gone on and on, I am mostly overflowing with excitement about what did happen and energy about what is to come.

I still feel the excitement of being able to meet Pope Francis personally, to look into the eyes of this man who is the kind of priest I try to be every day. I feel the excitement of introducing him to some of our staff and clients. Inside St. Patrick's Church, he blessed about 250 of our clients from all of our different programs. There were those who were hungry, those with disabilities or suffering from mental illness, those from our Spanish Catholic Center, those with new jobs and a fresh start in their lives, and many more. They were lifted up in a way that is hard to imagine if you were not present.

Then, as we came out the doors of our offices, Pope Francis did what he does best and what he calls the church to do – go out into the streets and be among people. In yet another beautiful moment, he went almost immediately to a group of children near the front. He blessed a lunch that had been prepared for 300 of our homeless clients (wishing them "buon appetito!") and then spent time in the crowd greeting our staff and clients. I saw a big smile on his face, and some people told me that as tired as he must have been, he looked as animated and relaxed as at any time during his three days in Washington.

As I watched the pope, I was reminded again in the most personal of ways what Jesus did, reaching out and touching those in need and being fully present to all he encountered. I thought of Jesus in the early part of his ministry and how a large crowd gathered at a house in Capernaum when it became known he was there, all wanting to be healed, touched and affected by him. I felt in the presence of one just like Jesus, and it was a true joy to watch Pope Francis touch the heads, hands and hearts of so many of our people.

That includes me. I am a strong believer in hands-on ministry, in being present to all who come our way, and in trying my best to always say "yes." Pope Francis touched my heart by his "yes" to Catholic Charities and all those who are part of our team – a "yes" that came from one so powerful in position yet so humble in attitude. He filled us with faith, hope and love. He brought us the very gift of Jesus.

I'm on the top of the world. I feel blessed beyond measure that Pope Francis came to our agency and so deeply touched the lives of those who are served by and who serve Catholic Charities. It went by quickly, but just as a wedding is the beginning of a new life, I pray that the pope's visit will be much more than a memorable event. May we all use this historic occasion as an opportunity to grow in holiness and continue our walk with Francis. In so doing, we will surely walk with Jesus and see him ever more clearly in each other.



St. Francis Xavier, St. Stephen, St. Martin of Tours (Gaithersburg), St. James (Mt. Rainier), St. Jerome (Hyattsville), Little Flower (Great Mills), St. Camillus (Silver Spring), and St. Joseph (Beltsville).

In 1955, SNDs opened Holy Spirit School for children with special needs, which evolved into the Lt. Joseph P. Kennedy, Jr. Institute. Adults, too, benefited from GED and job-skill courses offered at the Notre Dame Education Center. In 1978, Sisters at Trinity College launched the Education for Parish Service (EPS) program, which served adult Catholics from parishes across the archdiocese for 33 years.

Starting in Cincinnati

The first group of eight Sisters of Notre Dame de Namur came to this country in 1840 from Belgium, at the invitation of Cincinnati's Bishop John Purcell. He wanted the Sisters' help to build a strong Catholic school system in his young diocese and across the country.

Within a few years, the Ohio Sisters had started 17 Notre Dame schools around Cincinnati, eight in Dayton, five in Columbus, and they were teaching in another dozen schools in the state. As their reputation as Catholic educators spread, the Sisters were soon asked to establish schools in Illinois, Massachusetts and all along the eastern seaboard.

Over the course of the congregation's 175 years in this country, the Sisters have taught in more than 200 schools in 22 states, shaping the lives of millions of students, from pre-school to university and adult education. Sisters of Notre Dame de Namur have also built more than 100 schools including Notre Dame de Namur University in Belmont, California; Emmanuel College in Boston, and Trinity College (now Trinity Washington University) in Washington DC.

the special needs of Catholics who have disabilities and their families, and also to learn what else needs to be done.

This unprecedented project has been commissioned and is supported by a small group of organizations that work to include and serve persons with disabilities, including Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of Washington, DC, the National Catholic Partnership on Disability, and Potomac Community Resources, Inc.

"Asking Catholic parishes and dioceses across the United States what they are doing to reach out, include and serve individuals with developmental differences is a practical way to respond to the call by Pope Francis that we pay attention to people who are marginalized in society. This project will encourage the creation of new ministries and programs that will benefit people with disabilities and their families, and enrich the life of the Church in America. It is a wonderful way to celebrate the Holy Father's historic visit to our country," said Monsignor John J. Enzler, President & CEO of Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of Washington and Chairman of Potomac Community Resources, Inc.

Community

The project will be rolled out in three phases: first, a survey will be conducted of a random sample of 5,000 Catholic parishes across the United States; second, a survey will be sent to disability ministry leaders of all American dioceses; and third, special reports will be produced by CARA that will analyze the findings, identify current practices, and recommend ways to address unmet needs.

The project will take approximately ten months to complete. The National Catholic Partnership on Disability will share the findings with parishes and dioceses across the country and with the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, whom they advise on disability-related issues. The findings and recommendations will draw attention to the needs and desires of persons with disabilities and their families and form the basis of new ministries and programs to serve their needs.







The workshop will be held at St Bartholomew Catholic Church, 6900 River Rd., Bethesda, on Saturday, October 31, from 9:00am to 1:00pm Check-in begins at 8:30am.

The Stephen Ministry is a Christian ministry to individuals experiencing personal or spiritual difficulties. Within a parish, rigorously trained Stephen ministers help expand pastoral care by providing confidential, one-on-one compassionate care and support to people hurting from death of a loved one, divorce or separation, hospitalization, terminal illness, job loss, or any other personal crisis.

"The needs for care in our congregation and community were much more than our pastor could handle alone," says Deacon Julio Blanco-Eccleston, who oversees St. Bartholomew's Stephen Ministry.

"So we established this ministry of love and compassion at St Bartholomew's and began training carefully selected parishioners to provide individual, quality Christian care."

Over the past three years, some 30 members of St. Bartholomew's have undertaken 50 hours of training and been commissioned as Stephen ministers. Another three recently began training.

The half-day workshop at St. Bartholomew's consists of three sessions: "Ministering to Those Experiencing Grief;" an introduction to the Stephen Series system of lay caring ministry; and "How to Care in a Distinctively Christian

Fr. Knestout sent invitations to pastors of approximately 1500 Christian parishes and congregations in the Washington area in early September. A special emphasis for the workshop, however, is to increase Catholic participation in this special ministry-now largely found in Protestant congregations, although it is in about 1000 Catholic parishes. In the Washington archdiocese, Catholic parishes with Stephen ministries include St. Bartholomew, St. Rose of Lima, St. John the Baptist, and St. Andrew Apostle.

"Fr. Knestout and I encourage congregations of all Christian denominations to attend," says Deacon Julio. "Participants will go home an excellent understanding of how they can organize the members of their parish or congregation for

Influenza is a contagious illness that can be severe and life-threatening, especially for older adults. One reason that flu can be severe for seniors is the immune system weakens with age, which makes it harder to fight disease. The flu can also make existing health problems worse and is especially dangerous for people with chronic health conditions, like heart disease and diabetes, which often affect older adults. People with these conditions are more likely to develop complications from the flu that can result in hospitalization and even death.

The flu hits older adults the hardest, yet the **Flu + You** survey found that many seniors underestimate the seriousness of the flu and are largely unaware of their vaccine

options. "I turned 65 last year, and even though I still feel healthy and active, I know people my age are more susceptible to the flu and its complications," said Light. "If you're 65 or older like me, talk to your health care provider about your flu vaccine options, and get vaccinated early before it's too late."

This year, **Flu + You** will also unveil results from a survey conducted to highlight flu awareness among people aged 65 years and older. The survey, fielded before the start of this flu season, included more than 1,000 Americans 65 years of age and older and found:

- Only 13 percent of seniors are extremely confident in their knowledge of possible flu complications.
- About one third are unaware that someone with chronic health conditions, like heart disease or diabetes, would be at risk for complications from the flu.

- More than half (57 percent) are unaware there is a flu shot specifically for their age group.
- Most seniors (88 percent) take a proactive approach to their health; however, about as many are not confident in their knowledge of the flu and where to get flu information

"Adults 65 and over typically account for roughly half of flurelated hospitalizations and almost all flu-related deaths, so the low awareness among seniors about the seriousness of the flu is concerning," said Kathleen Cameron, MPH, Senior Director, National Council on Aging. "In our survey, 82 percent of seniors said they are not extremely confident in where to find information about the fluand that is what we are here for, to provide the further education and resources needed when it comes to the flu."

According to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the single best way to prevent the flu is to get an annual vaccination, which is recommended for everyone age six months and older, with rare exception. Older adults have flu vaccine options, including the regular flu shot and a higherdose vaccine developed specifically to address the age-related weakening of the immune system. Flu vaccination is a Medicare benefit with no co-pay. Both options are widely available at a doctor's office or local pharmacy.

Senior SmarTrip Card

he bright yellow Senior SmarTrip card for citizens age 65 and older - available at most libraries - enables seniors to get the discounted fare on Metrobus and Metrorail. A SmarTrip card is easy to use and faster than a farecard. Just touch it to the target on a faregate or farebox. Reduced fare will automatically be deducted. SmarTrip eliminates the need to carry cash, coins, and transfers. You don't lose the value of a registered SmarTrip card if the card is lost or damaged. For a \$2 replacement fee, you'll get a new card with the value of the lost card at the time you notify Metro.

To purchase the card, seniors need to show a valid government issued photo ID with proof of age at Metro sales offices, commuter stores, and some public libraries located in Montgomery County. The Senior SmarTrip card costs \$2. The \$2 fee for the Senior SmarTrip card is the cost of the card. This card has no monetary value. To add value, you must load value using a blue Passes/Farecards machine at any Metrorail station or a bus farebox that accepts SmarTrip.

• I am 65 years of age. How do I get reduced fares on Metro?
A valid driver's license, non-driver's ID, or passport must be shown to purchase the \$2 Senior SmarTrip card, which can be used for both Metrobus and Metrorail.

• What's the advantage of using a Senior SmarTrip Card?
With a registered SmarTrip




card, there are no more worries about demagnetized and damaged paper cards or lost cards. A lost or stolen Senior SmarTrip card can be replaced with its remaining Metro value at the time it was reported lost or stolen for a \$2 replacement fee. Call 1-888-SMARTRIP (1-888-762-7874) to report a lost or stolen card.

• Can I purchase the new Senior SmarTrip card online?

No, you must appear in person to present valid identification verifying that you are age 65 or older.

• Where can I buy a Senior SmarTrip card?

Reduced fare SmarTrip cards for senior citizens are not sold in vending machines located in Metro stations nor are parking fees reduced. Senior SmarTrip cards are available for \$2 at Metro sales offices, regional commuter stores and public libraries located in Montgomery County. If you'd like further assistance to find out where you can buy a Senior SmarTrip card at a location near you, see Metro Sales Locations or call the SmarTrip Regional Customer Service Center at 1-888-762-OPT

J&A advocacy efforts on behalf of the drivers included inviting five cabdrivers and a Union Representative to a meeting to tell us about their working conditions and what needed changed in order to earn a fair wage. We agreed to support their efforts. As evidence of our support, Cathy Couch, Co-Chair of our J&A attended the public hearing at the Council Building in March and demonstrated support of the Cab Driver's Bill of Rights.

As a result of the work of the cab drivers, the Union and advocacy groups including the Justice and Advocacy Council, the County Council amended the laws (Mont. Co. Code §53-14 and 54-14) governing taxi service in the County.

The new provisions of the laws will generate revenue for increased services to the handicapped, seniors and low income riders by surcharges on trips by Uber and Lift and will limit to a single year the term of agreements between drivers and cab companies. It will also bar automatic renewal of those agreements, require cab owners to use a standardized lease developed by the County, require mediation of disputes, and direct the County to set maximum rates for leases and other charges to drivers, so that, in the words of the law, owners will receive a fair and reasonable return on their investment while providing drivers an opportunity to earn a fair and reasonable income. The law encourages the development of a driver-owned cooperative, and earmarks 50 new licenses to the co-op. These changes promise to give drivers a fair return from their fares. The J&A is pleased to have had a role in bringing about these changes. OPT



pounds of food from the warehouse to shelves, seeing the staff interact with clients who face food poverty every day, was transformational to many on the trip. "Thanks, you all did a week's worth of work in a day," said St. Francis House Program Director David Rittenberg. Being blessed to have full cupboards and refrigerators at home in Maryland made us all realize the problem of hunger in our own country.

"As parents and parishioners," Kelly Maltagliati stressed that she and the other adults who were on the trip "enjoyed seeing the kids we've seen grow up in Resurrection parish develop into such caring, respectful young people."

Other highlights of the trip included salmon fishing in Hope, Alaska, a visit to Talkeetna and St. Bernard's Mission Parish, and spectacular views of 21,000-foot high Denali, the highest U.S. peak. We learned that St. Bernard's, home to just 20 families, is so remote

Father Jerzy was born in Suwalki, in northeastern Poland. He entered the Seminary in Poznan, Poland, in 1978. This was in the same year that Cardinal Karol Wojtyla from Krakow, Poland, became Pope John Paul II.

His Order is the Society of Christ, founded by Cardinal Hlond in 1932 for the purpose of ministering to the Polish diaspora throughout the world. Rev. Frydrych was ordained a priest in 1985.

In 1987, he came to North

America. He first served in parishes in Canada, in Ontario and in Saskatchewan. In the United States, he was pastor and supervised the building of a new church in Houston, Texas, before becoming pastor in a parish in San Francisco, California. He most recently served as pastor of St. Maximilian Kolbe Parish near San Diego, CA, where he also celebrated the 30th anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood earlier this year. One of his favorite quotes is from Romans 5:5, "...And hope does not disappoint..." or, in Polish, "Nadzieja zawiesc nie moze."





actions to end abortion, genocide, euthanasia, and other challenges to the dignity of life are more difficult. Yet our action is essential.

Each year, hundreds of babies are born in local hospitals requiring urgent care in Neonatal Intensive Care Units. The children are those who were born prematurely, some by weeks, others months ahead of their time. Some children were diagnosed in utero with severe disabilities. Many babies make a brief stopover in the NICU to be monitored or add a few ounces to their weight. Some leave in the arms of angels in route to their heavenly Father. Others remain in the caring and professional hands of medical teams for months as they perform heroic medical interventions to save children's lives. Many graduate the NICU in full health and a bright future. Others graduate with serious physical and/or mental challenges with an arduous journey

ahead. St Paul might characterize the struggle by these babies as a race for life with the early months being a sprint and the rest of lives, a challenging marathon.

Cubby and her husband Dan La Hood acted to help with the marathon. In 1983 the Silver Spring couple, St John Evangelist parish, was inspired to give up their current life and dedicate themselves and fully to providing care to seriously disabled children. Their goal was simply to provide a loving setting for children and support and assistance to the children's parents in order that they could work or have a respite from the sometimes overwhelming needs of their beloved children. The La Hoods created St Joseph's House in 1988 and since have loved and cared for hundreds of children. After their own severely disabled child was born and died days later, the La Hood's responded to another call, to create a program to support parents who have received, like they had, a prenatal diagnosis of likely serious disability for their child. They

established Isaiah's Promise in 1995. At Isaiah's Promise, stunned, frightened, angry and grieved parents find understanding, love and information to prepare for their own marathons. Cubby and Dan exemplify the action to which Pope Francis calls us.

As I write this, I join hundreds of others in mourning the death of Cubby on September 21 and in prayer that more of us will emulate her life and take our places in the marathon to assist children with disabilities achieve the joy, opportunity, inclusion and love which God intends for them. I've written of a few "street saints" in previous columns. Cubby's now one of them. Learn more about Cubby and Dan La Hood and their work at www. saintjosephshouse.net/.

To honor Cubby and in response to Pope Francis's call and the Bishop's designation of October at Respect for Life month, let's reflect on "hands on" actions individuals and parishes might consider to respect and dignify the lives of people with significant physical and emotional challenges and how we might assist them in their mara-

Establish a parish **Opportunities** and Inclusion Ministry to promote parish activities that assist people with disabilities to live inclusionary lives of dignity, freedom and personal opportunity.

Provide opportunities in every form of parish spiritual and liturgical life for full inclusion of those with special needs.

No one can feel secure in life without reliable and affordable housing. What more can parishes do to provide housing for people with special needs? Can parishes provide a house or property? Learn more by researching Rosario Communities, Victory Housing, or the Joseph P Kennedy Institute.

We all are strengthened by a warm and supportive network of friends. Can parishes do more to promote social well-being for people with special needs, often isolated by physical or intellectual challenges? Consider PCR, Inc.; Upper County Community

Resources, Best Buddies as models.

More than 70% of people with disabilities are unemployed. Most want to work and can work with job training and workplace accommodation. What more can parishes do to promote meaningful employ**ment**? Could they establish parish employment opportunity committees to scour the community for jobs? Could each parish pledge to hire at least one individual with significant disabilities?


Life-long education is important in the marathon. Can more be done to welcome unique learners into our Catholic schools and religious education programs? Are there parish volunteer readers, mentors or discussion group leaders?

Finally, can parishes find more love in their hearts to support the parents and caregivers of people with special needs? This is critical. As much as the caregivers love, they tire and need your help as repite.

helped assemble 300 "breakfast-togo bags" to be sent to a local shelter for distribution. Clients of the shelters exit the shelters around 7am and through this program are able to start the day with a filling meal.

Typical breakfast bags include fruit cups, raisins, juice boxes, granola bars, pop tarts, and peanut butter crackers. The breakfast bags were donated to Chase Partners Shelter on Gude Dive (near the school) so students were able to have an impact in their direct community. These bags provided about 2 weeks of breakfasts for the clients of the shelter.

Monica Ludwig, Director of Social Concerns for St Patrick's Church, was impressed with "the conscientiousness" and work ethic of these eighth-grade students in completing the project. She plans to coordinate the breakfast bags project on a monthly basis with other student groups at the parish. "It's a great way for people to participate in service. Any age can participate and be a part of something bigger," Ludwig commented.
