

n Saturday, April 29, I drove to the abortuary and entered at the south end of the office complex, got my crucifix out of the car and walked a short distance to the sidewalk in front of the facility. After completing the third decade I saw a family of geese strolling in the parking lot heading toward the south entrance; I didn't know they were on a mission.

Three decades later the car headed out of the north exit and onto the highway. As they left, I raised my crucifix and blew a kiss at the car as if to say, "Thank you for not aborting your baby.'

The car drove south, made a U-turn and drove back toward the north. As it went by the driver rolled down the window and gave us a big wave.

We all rejoiced at how someone in heaven sent the geese family to meet the car as it drove in to save a baby from abortion.

2023 Maryland Legislative Session – Good News and Bad News

he Maryland General Assembly legislative session ended in April. Results were mixed. Here's a brief recap.

Broadening Options and Opportunities for Students Today (BOOST)

Boost provides a limited number of scholarships to non-public schools for K-12 students of needy families. The Maryland Catholic Conference reports that in the final budget negotiations between the House and Senate, senators restored the two million dollars that the House had cut from the Boost scholarship program.

The House also added a provision to phase out the program by not permitting new families to take advantage of the program, but the Senate prevailed by keeping it open to new families. This was a big win for low-income families who wish to enroll their children in nonpublic schools.

To provide context, Maryland will put an extra \$900 million into funding the state's public schools, for a total of nearly \$8.8 billion for next school year.

MCC Executive Director, Jenny Kraska, wrote, "You did it! The

While they enjoyed the refreshments, they conversed with the sisters: two Dominican Sisters of Our Lady of Fatima, Sr. Mariana de Jesús and Sr. Providencia (who are serving at St. Martin of Tours), and two Servants of the Lord and the Virgin of Matará, Sr. Immaculate Heart and Sr. Aurora.

The tea was an opportunity provided by the Saint. At the end of the afternoon, everyone went into the church, where the Blessed Sacrament was exposed and adored for a short time, ending with Benediction.

The goal of giving the girls a chance to get to know some sisters seemed to be achieved, judging by the smiles all around and the comments such as this from Anna Cummings, "I had been hoping to have a chance this year to sit and talk with some sisters, and the tea fulfilled that. Thank you!"

Relic of Blessed Carlo Acutis Helps Bring Eucharistic Devotion to Young People

G arlo Acutis is a saint for our times. He was an Italian teenager who died from leukemia at the age of 15 in 2006. During his short life on Earth, he fostered an intense Eucharistic devotion. As he said, "The Eucharist is my highway to Heaven". Merging his devotion with his millennial talents and interests, he created an online database that cataloged every recorded Eucharistic miracle.

According to a press release issued by the United

States Conference of Catholic Bishops last Spring, "Blessed Carlo Acutis... offered his sufferings for the Church and for the Holy Father, and Pope Francis has called him a role model for young people. He was beatified in 2020 and is one of the intercessors for the national Eucharistic Revival, a multi-year initiative by the bishops of the United States to reinvigorate devotion in the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist."

We're looking forward to more faith-filled and celebratory events as the school year winds down.



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
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

opposition from Marylanders.

Laura Bogley, President of Maryland Right to Life, said MDRTL worked diligently to provide robust opposition to this flawed legislation through lobbying, expert witness testimony, and a massive grassroots campaign of emails and phone calls which resulted in 19,469 messages of opposition being sent to legislators over the course of the session. Maryland Right to Life thanked its supporters for defeating the bill. Ms. Bogley continued, "We wish to thank our allies in this endeavor including strategic opposition partners, respected physicians, the faith community, and member advocates across the state. Your voice was

instrumental in protecting vulnerable citizens including the disabled, poor, and elderly from this extreme legislation which would have put them at risk of suicide or even involuntary euthanasia."

Coercive Abuse Against Mothers Prevention Act

This bill was designed to protect women from being coerced into having abortions and would have helped women escape sex-trafficking. Statistics show that violence of varying degrees, even murder, is perpetrated against 65% of pregnant women who resist the pressure to have an abortion.

The bill strengthens the idea of choice for women, which makes one think this bill can't be controversial since both pro-abortion and pro-life legislators would be working to support women in difficult situations and it would swiftly be approved by the Legislature and signed into law by the Governor.

The bill would greatly reduce the number of abortions and the revenue abortion generates. Democrat legislators who are pro-abortion control the Legislature and they prevented a vote on the bill.

HB 705/SB798 Declaration of Rights – Right to Reproductive Liberty

Ms. Bogley's comments about this bill were: "Democrat lawmakers made it their top priority to pass this bill to create a fundamental right to abortion in the Constitution of the State of Maryland. The law will implement a ballot question in the November 2024 General Election, asking voters by a simple majority to amend the state Constitution. While 'reproductive freedom' is not defined in the state statute, there is no question that such an amendment would all but prohibit legislative restrictions on abortion, including prohibitions on late term and partial birth abortions. The bill will establish a monopoly of the abortion industry over women's reproductive health and limit women's access to lifesaving alternatives, including pregnancy resource centers.

"Beginning now, it will take the full strength of a united pro-life community in Maryland to raise public awareness and get out the vote to oppose this deadly amendment."

It is not too soon to start praying that this ballot question is defeated. The struggle continues.



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
Dancing the Night Away at the 2023 Father Daughter Dance

my parents and my family, but it also came from seeing the priests at my home parish, Our Lady of Lourdes. I watched them serve our community and our school, which was no small task. The school was huge during the baby boom. I had 140 classmates in eighth grade -73boys in one classroom and 67 girls in the other.

We were visited, encouraged, watched over, and assisted by so many priests during that time. I know their example influenced my eventual decision to become a parish priest and do what I could to help others experience what I did growing up in a vibrant parish. Over the last 50 years, I have also spent a good deal of time ministering in archdiocesan jobs, including the CYO from 1979-1990, development from 1995 through 2011, and Catholic Charities these last 12 years. I have also been blessed to serve in several Montgomery County parishes, including St. Jane de Chantal, Little Flower, Our Lady of Mercy, Blessed Sacrament (on the border with D.C.), and St. Bartholomew's.

All those parishes were great gifts. It wasn't so much the rectories or the beautiful churches, though I appreciated those. I was inspired much more by the people living such faithful lives in those parishes – and many other parishes I have visited and where I have friends.

Community

Watching young people grow up, and watching parents raise those young people. Watching the dedication of those taking care of their own parents as they age. Watching people handle with grace and faith the most joyous times and most difficult times. To be a part of those moments and a part of these parish families is a gift I will always treasure.

It's fitting that *Our Parish Times* is all about transitions. We're celebrating First Communions in all our parishes. Confirmation is taking place either this spring or early next fall. Graduations from preschools to PhDs. Marriages, which were smaller and more difficult during the pandemic, are taking place again in big numbers. Funerals are also growing more frequent in my life as longtime friends are called home to the Lord.

These transitions are part of life itself, and parishes shine when we are asked to help people take a step forward on their sacramental journeys through Baptism, First Communion, Confirmation, Marriage, or Funerals. Those sacramental occasions bring us together in prayer and celebration of faith. They remind us that we try to live our lives as best we can and to be active in the Church, and then when God calls, we will be ready to go to our eternal home with him.

In addition to celebrating 50 years of priesthood, I have my own transition this year: On July 1, I will step down as president and CEO of Catholic Charities. I will be succeeded by a wonderful new

leader, Jim Malloy, who grew up in St. Bernadette's and St. John the Baptist parishes in Silver Spring. I will continue to help Catholic Charities while also taking on a new role as chaplain at St. John's College High School beginning in August. And I will still be active in many other ways as well, continuing to do all I can as a priest as I start a new chapter in service of the Lord.

Thank you to all at the parishes I have served and indeed all the parishes in Montgomery County for being such great supporters of CYO, Catholic Charities, and all of us priests who serve you as best we can. We are blessed in our assignments to serve you, and we hope you are blessed through the commitment and ministry of so many priests who do their best every day to bring God into your life.

Thanks for praying for me as I celebrate 50 years as a priest. And thank you for being such a strong inspiration in all I am called to do.







shared, reflecting on her last year of undergraduate work.

Working with Students for Life and engaging with so many classmates that did not share her pro-life convictions provided Julie with a key insight into what it really means to support the pro-life cause, "There were weeks that were really hard where I had to deal with a lot hate and negativity from pro-choice students. It made me realize that being pro-life is of course about the unborn and their mothers, but it also has to be about ministering to those who support abortion and desiring their conversion. Ultimately I want them to get to Heaven too."

It wasn't until Julie called Angela Castano, who has recently started her own career at Centro Tepeyac, that the Executive Director position presented itself. Angela, a friend of Julie's sister, shared her experience of doing on the ground, person to person pro-life work. "As Angela told me more about the work of Centro Tepeyac, I knew that this was what I wanted to do," Julie said.

Julie's work at the center will begin in earnest in a few weeks, after she graduates from the University of Scranton, but she was able to attend the recent Centro Tepeyac gala, visit the center, and meet the board. She already has goals for what she would like to accomplish, but knows that the first step is to observe and listen. "I'm excited to try to expand to more women, especially outside of the immediate Silver Spring area. I would also love to be able to offer more in house services, rather than referrals, but really, I just want to get the word out to more people about the incredible work that we do and hopefully expand our network of support."

As she gets started on this new chapter, Julie feels the support from the board, her parents, and also the saints who she knows will accompany her in this task. "St. Josemaría Escrivá has been particularly instrumental for me, especially in helping to see that all the tasks in daily life are sacred and have meaning. I know that the daily work of the center may be mundane sometimes, but it still has value to God and can be done with joy." **McGANN** Con't from page 1

all common sense. However, what does love look like in the ordinary lives of mothers and children?

On long nights, after the dishes are done and the baby is in bed, you can feel the love as a mother sits at the kitchen table plodding through homework with a child who cries, "I don't get it!". It's the gentle reassurance that comes with, "You don't get it *yet*, but we'll keep working, and you will get it".

You can see mothers' love in their hands. Love is in her hands folded gently over tiny hands as they say bedtime prayers, hands that wipe noses and tears, hands that clap furiously after that first soccer goal

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or that first band concert (difficult as it might have been to hear). Love is there when a mother smoothes her teenage son's hair out of his eyes. She straightens his tie and briefly places both hands on his lapels before she sends him off to put on his cap and gown.

Those same hands held her baby girl the day she came into the world. On that day the love the mother had felt from the moment she knew she was pregnant came alive. She prayed for the grace she would need to do this most important job, not knowing how much she would need that grace over the years.

Hands that brush fevered brows and clean skinned knees; hands that point to the peas that need to be picked up; hands that braid hair, and hold back despite wanting to fix things; hands that wring in worry when a teenager goes wrong; and hands that clench when a teacher or a coach underestimates or dismisses her child's efforts - these are the hands of a mother's love.

You can hear love in the painful truth that only a mother can give her child. You can hear it in the simplest things - in the word "now", and in the lullaby sung to a restless baby.

If you listen closely, you can hear love in a mother's prayers. She prays that her girl will make a friend, that her boy will be kinder to his siblings, that her grown son will get the job he so desperately needs, and she prays that her sons and daughters and their spouses will do a good job raising her grandchildren. She prays for the grace to keep her mouth shut when she thinks they could do better.

She prays for the strength to manage whatever comes her way - to be a good mother. Even as she prays, she knows deep down that, whatever happens, she'll handle what she's given. She'll do it with more prayer, and with the love that drives her to keep mothering until God decides she's done.





an you think of a more fun way to learn about robots than through Legos? The Avalon School is proud to initiate its first robotics club training for local competition.

Recently, Avalon was awarded a Student Support and Academic (SSAE) Grant to provide further academic enrichment, and the school was able to purchase Lego robotic kits for five groups of four to six students.


ighty-six student scientists spent their spring designing, conducting, and analyzing experiments. Led by parent volunteer Mrs. McAndrew-Benavides, a new science fair model was introduced at Saint Peter's this year.

In March, students had the opportunity to sign-up for the voluntary activity and choose their project topics. Students could work individually or with a partner. Bride (Isaiah 62:5) and Jesus's declaration that He is the Bridegroom (Mark 2:19 & Luke 5:34).

Deacon Martin examined John 2. Jesus's choice of performing His first public miracle at the wedding feast at Cana is significant because wedding feasts signified the arrival of the messianic age throughout the Old Testament (Amos 9:13-14, Joel 4:18, & Isaiah 25:6-8). Furthermore, it was customary for the bridegroom to provide wine at the wedding. So, Christ's transformation of water into wine revealed that He was both the Messiah and the Divine Bridegroom.

John 4 describes the exchange between Jesus and the Samaritan woman. Deacon Martin recounted that the meeting place of a well was notable because the patriarchs met their wives at wells (Genesis 24:10-61, 29:1-30, & Exodus 2:15-22). He mentioned that the woman represents the Samaritan people; she had five husbands, and the Samaritans worshiped five false gods (2 Kings 17:24,29).

Deacon Martin transitioned to Holy Week and parallels between the anointing of Christ and the Song of Songs. The perfumed oil, nard, is only mentioned in the Song of Songs in the Old Testament. The nard anointed the Bridegroom in Song of Songs 1:12. As the woman poured the nard over Christ, she announced that He was the Bridegroom and ushered in "The Week of the Bridegroom," the

Byzantine tradition's name for Holy Week.

The climax of salvation history is when Jesus lays down His life as a sacrifice for His Bride. On the marriage bed of the Cross, Christ consummated His marriage with the Church. This moment of union ushered in new life and formed the family of God. Traditionally, the Church was born out of Christ's pierced side "as Eve was formed from the sleeping Adam's side" (CCC 766).

Deacon Martin's reflection served as an invitation for sincere contemplation and a reminder that we each made for perfect union with God.

O n March 19, the parish received a note from Fr. Lee Fangmeyer, the pastor of Mother Seton Parish in Germantown, that he had been appointed as Administrator of St. Paul while our pastor is on leave. He wrote, "I am joining you in praying for your pastor, Monsignor Filardi, as he takes some personal time for himself. May the Lord shower him with blessings and restore him as he needs. This decision of Msgr. Filardi is a sign to each of us. Recognizing the need and accepting help is commendable. May we all be so humble."

Filling in for a pastor is daunting, but Fr. Fangmeyer and two other priests came for-

ward promptly to help out.

Fr. Rick Gancayco generally celebrates the Mass for the parish Sunday through Wednesday. He had already been helping out for some months. He grew up in Damascus, in a large, ambitious, and disciplined Filipino family. Many parishioners knew his father, a pediatrician here. Fr. Rick served as pastor of St. Martin's in Gaithersburg, but he was also a missionary and a military chaplain for some years, and his sermons reflect those highly focused experiences. He says what he's going to say, then says it, then says what he said – with clear titles and effective mnemonic devices – in three minutes. It is common to hear people say after Mass on Sunday or during the week that they remember everything he said, and then prove it in 30 smiling seconds. Time is a serious factor to Fr. Gancayco; doctors kept predicting he would likely die last year. He's living on borrowed time, but Whoever keeps loaning him time seems to be generous.

Fr. Ray Fecteau, a retired priest of the archdiocese, celebrates Mass for the parish Thursday to Saturday. He was the founding pastor of Our Lady of the Visitation in Darnestown, and he helped to establish Mary of Nazareth School there. He was chaplain for the law enforcement officers of the county, so he was already acquainted with a large portion of the parishioners at St. Paul. He lights up when he says he knew Fr. Walter Norris, the wry dry iconoclastic pastor then pastoremeritus at St. Paul for 30 years.

Two Bible Study Programs: Get a Grip

The most powerful piece of literature in the history of the world, the book that lays out the mysteries of Christianity, is the Bible. So you should read it, right? Good luck.

When people plunge in on their own, planning to read right through, they generally do pretty well in Genesis and Exodus, then get lost and discouraged in the desert sands of Leviticus. Jeff Cavins, a nationally renowned scholar and speaker, offers a way through. He powerwalks through a coherent chronology using just 14 books (the Bible is a collection of 73 different short "books" of various kinds), presenting a rich overview, an outline that the rest of books can fit into. He sketches the history of the world (!) in eight half-hour talks, from creation to salvation. This program is entitled "Unlocking the Mystery of the Bible."

Phil Raum has been running the program for the parish (with thanks to Cindy Mengle and Matt Curley). It's flexible; Cavins's approach will orient beginners, but it can also

enrich anyone's understanding. During Lent, Matt Curley launched another discussion. He kick-started conversations of an ongoing television series, *The Chosen*, which is an ambitious presentation of the Gospel. It's not complete; the plan is for seven seasons, eight episodes each; three seasons are done and available, and the fourth is in production now. It's a national phenomenon, claiming 108 million viewers and counting.

The show is historical fiction, with no pretense of scholarly accuracy; it is entrancing and inspiring. It's a rich narrative about the men and women who were chosen to follow Jesus in his ministry, with complex characters based on the bare bones of the Gospels. Judas, for example, is a wide-eyed salesman, skilled and successful and ambitious, who finds the Lord's casual approach to financial planning and security a little unnerving; Judas knows he needs training in the ministry, but he thinks he can offer some really good ideas about money. Mary and Mary Magdalen are extraordinarily attractive characters, modest and quiet but deeply wise: that's nice, but can they seize an audience? Actually, yes, emphatically yes – but see for yourself.

The parish discussion in Lent was about season one; more are coming later this year, says Matt Curley. The parish is using the Catholic commentary on *The Chosen* found on the "Formed" website (formed. org – sign up for free through the parish; see the bulletin for more details).


"Beyond Justification" Bishop Mark J. Seitz of El Paso Urges Representatives to Oppose Sweeping Immigration Bill

ASHINGTON the U.S. House of Representatives prepares to vote on H.R. 2, the Secure the Border Act of 2023, Bishop Mark J. Seitz of El Paso, chairman of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' (USCCB) Committee on Migration, sent a letter urging members of Congress to oppose the bill and "to support the drafting of bipartisan legislation that is more in keeping with our nation's rich tradition of welcome.'

Bishop Seitz expressed concern that the bill would fundamentally weaken the decades-long commitment to humanitarian protection that the United States has demonstrated. He cited provisions that "would endanger unaccompanied children and inflict harm on other vulnerable persons, decimate access to asylum, mandate damaging detention and removal practices, restrict access to legal employment, limit - and potentially eliminate - federal partnerships with faithbased and other nongovernmental organizations (NGOs), undermine the rule of law, and more."

"We do not question the good intentions of lawmakers who seek to enact legislation that would secure our nation's borders. Indeed, we join in the call to enact effective and humane border management as part of a framework of comprehensive immigration reforms," he wrote before adding, moreover, that the bishops "do not discount the challenges at our border with Mexico, nor the right of nations to maintain their borders."

"However," Bishop Seitz continued, quoting Pope John Paul II,

"our faith also compels us to be 'vigilant advocate[s], defending against any unjust restriction [on] the natural right of individual persons to move freely within their own nation and from one nation to another' and to call attention 'to the rights of migrants and their families and to respect for their human dignity, even in cases of non-legal immigration."

While acknowledging that there may be several provisions within H.R. 2 that members support, Bishop Seitz stated that "passage, on the whole, is beyond justification" because of the harmful measures it contains.

She also fretted about her "saucy boys" who "almost master me" and anxiously sought advice from a friend about her daughter Anna Maria's stubborn will and bad temper, declaring that her daughter "despite all my endeavors is past my management." But she deeply loved her children and called them "her little darlings."

2. Not only did she outlive two of her children, but her own life came into peril during the birth of her son Richard.

Academy of the Holy Cross Students Put Catholic Social Teaching into Practice at St. Francis

n April 25, eight students and two staff members at The Academy of the Holy Cross traded in their school uniforms, backpacks, and laptops for work clothes, gardening gloves, and shovels, as they beautified the grounds of St. Francis of Assisi Parish as part of their All School Day of Service.

The eight ninth graders joined Media Specialist Sarah Chase and Theology teacher Patricia Petruzzelli in spreading mulch in the parish's Outdoor Stations of the Cross, deadheading daffodils in the Outdoor Stations and throughout the grounds, and watering 12 trees that had been planted last fall. The cleanup work - typically done as a parishwide project - offered a way to show the students how we can engage with one another, said parish Director of Social Concerns and Adult Faith Formation Tony Bosnick.

"It really reinforces the basic things we learn in Religious

Education, Youth Ministry, and the Rite of Christian Initiation for Christian Adults – that we're on a journey and we walk with one another," Bosnick said. "Also, that we are a part of a local and global community, and this is one way to engage with that community." The suburban parish was one of 26 sites throughout the District of Columbia and Maryland where students, staff, and administrators at the 155-year-old school engaged in acts of service at sites ranging from the Anacostia Community Boathouse to Habitat for Humanity Restores to Interfaith Works. Coordinated over seven months, the service day aims to expose students and staff to the needs of communities around them, said Maika Walker, the school's Director of Social Justice.

"Our mission we are called to by Jesus is to love God and people," Walker said. "We hope the Day of Service allows them to remember they are created to serve God, help others, and see that serving with their friends is fun."

Indeed, the students seemed to be enthusiastic about nearly every task that was given them. Following their steady work in the Outdoor Stations, the group ate lunch in the Youth Room, taking the time to pose next to a larger-than-life cutout of Pope Francis, whose papal encyclical, "Laudato si," inspired their care for God's creation.

"It was really nice to have the students here – they are hard workers, as are the adult volunteers," Bosnick said.

Just Haiti Coffee Has Brewed More Than a Cup of Good Java for Social Justice-Minded Parishioners

n the 36-year relationship between St. Francis of Assisi Parish and Conversion of St. Paul's Parish in Léon, Haiti, one strong tie has formed amid nearly 8,000 pounds of roasted coffee beans.

That's the amount of coffee St. Francis of Assisi Parish has sold over the past decade on behalf of Just Haiti, Inc., a Washington DC-based nonprofit dedicated to a business model allowing wealth generated through Haitian resource development or the sale of Haitian goods being kept by Haitian producers. In April, St. Francis marked 10 years of selling the 'fair trade plus' coffee to its parishioners, an occasion that led Haiti Ministry Coordinator Dan Cardile to reflect on the partnership's impact.

"The profits are made because all the [post-harvest] work is done by wealthier people so poor people can get it," Cardile said.

The parish in Derwood is one of a handful of Catholic churches in the DC area selling the coffee, whose origins lie in shade-loving coffee plants in Haiti. Working with six grower associations throughout Haiti – one of which is Leon's, representing 33 farming families – Just Haiti picks up dried coffee beans once or twice a year from the airport in Port au Prince. Each shipment containing 7,000-10,000 pounds of coffee beans is transported to

St. Francis Pastor Creates "Welcoming Space" for His Flocks over 25 Years in the Priesthood

relative latecomer to the priesthood, Fr. John J. Dillon had spent years teaching high-minded Latin to undergraduate and graduate students, along with many seminarians, at The Catholic University of America. But as he reflects on his 25th anniversary as an archdiocesan priest, the Pittsb urgh-area native has realized the home-based practices of learning, listening, and leaning on God have formed his ministry more than his college dissertation subject ever could.

Since his ordination at the age of 48, Fr. John has served at five archdiocesan parishes in Maryland: as parochial vicar at St. John Regis in Hollywood and Little Flower in Bethesda, as parish administrator and pastor at St. Joseph in Pomfret, and as pastor at St. Mark's in Hyattsville and St. Francis of Assisi in Derwood. He has ministered to diverse congregations -- from farming families to undocumented immigrants to suburban households -- all, with the kindness, compassion, quiet leadership, and humble piety that have characterized his priesthood.

"The church is a family – sometimes, in families, things happen," Fr. John recently said. "But we need to learn how to forgive and be reconciled and not hold grudges."

Born in Pittsburgh on December 2, 1949, Fr. John is the eldest of four children born to Kate, a secretary, and John, an attorney and judge on the Butler County (PA)

> Court of Common Pleas. His roots in Butler date back to the early 20th century on one side and to the American Revolution on the other.

A product of a Catholic grade school and a public high school, he first considered a vocation to the priesthood in junior high but his parents suggested he wait. In high school, he discovered a talent for Latin, leading him to study classical languages at Villanova University where he graduated in 1971. After briefly attending the University of Missouri at Columbia, he began discerning the priesthood, moving to Washington DC in September 1972 to become a Capuchin friar and priest.

The times intervened. In 1975, on the advice of a mentor, Fr. Robert McCreary, Fr. John joined the Mother of God Community, where he lived for 20 years; during that time, he earned his doctorate degree from Catholic University in 1982 and began teaching there. But after experiencing discomfort in the community, he opted to "stick with the church" and, this time, applied for and was accepted into the seminary in 1996.

Since then-Cardinal James Hickey accepted his earlier coursework at the Washington Theological Coalition, he finished at the Theological College in Washington DC and was ordained a priest on May 23, 1998, at St. Matthew's Cathedral.

Fr. John's quarter of a century as a priest in the Archdiocese of Washington has

Baltimore, where an outfit roasts and packages it. A member of the parish Haiti Committee then picks up the parish's order and transports it to Derwood. A team of dedicated volunteers then sells the coffee on the first weekend of the month after Masses for \$10 a bag.

Once the product is sold, the profits go to Just Haiti Inc. The organization, in turn, wires money to the presidents of the grower associations. According to the Just Haiti website, each grower received 64 percent of the price of a bag of coffee in 2012.

Cardile said he hoped St. Francis' model of monthly sales of the fair trade plus coffee - which allows growers to reap not only the cost of their beans, but the additional sale profits above that – would be adopted by other churches. While acknowledging former pastor Fr.

It is open on weekdays from mid-September through May from 3:30 p.m to 4:30 p.m. Our Lady of the Visitation Parish (OLVP) supports The Lord's Table by providing volunteers on the fifth Thursday of any month that has five school aged students are accom-Thursdays (usually three or four times per year). There are many volunteer opportunities available for this wonderful ministry, including prepping, cooking, preparing salads, cutting desserts, serving the guests, and general cleaning. Recipes and ingredients are all provided by The Lord's Table and there is a kitchen manager onsite to help guide volunteers and answer any questions.

Cooks are generally needed from 1 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. and servers from 3:00 p.m. to 5:00 pm. Some volunteers often stay a bit beyond their assigned times, when possible, to help with other tasks like plating meals or cleaning up.

The Lord's Table Soup Kitchen strictly follows health guidelines established by Montgomery County and provides a very safe environment for both volunteers and guests. The Lord's Table is an approved Montgomery County Public Schools volunteer organization. High school and middle schoolers may help serve as long as middle panied by an adult. Students can receive Student Service-Learning hours for serving and cleaning-up.

Volunteers for this ministry are rewarded with the knowledge that they have provided a healthy, nutritious meal to fellow human beings, and the guests are always very appreciative of the volunteers' efforts.

Holy Cross Cropbox Dedication Launches Partnership to Feed the Hungry

n Thursday, May 11 under beautiful morning sunshine, The Academy of the Holy Cross hosted a dedication ceremony of the newly installed Cropbox - a reformatted shipping container that will grow fresh produce hydroponically, that will be donated to area food pantries through the John S. Mulholland Family Foundation. The project is through the vision and generosity of Leah Durant of Leah V. Durant and Associates and Family. Durant is also the founder of the Center for Urban Sustainability Projects (CUSP).

Durant partnered with Brian Mulholland of the John S. Mulholland Family Foundation to find a Catholic school in the area to house the Cropbox, learn the technology and manage the growing, and harvesting the produce. Mulholland contacted Holy Cross President Katy Prebble, who jumped at the opportunity. The project is a combination of social justice and environmental science education—faculty members Maika Walker, director of social justice; Linda Ruszkowski, director of campus ministry; and Alison Simon, chair of the science department have all received specialized training from Nancy and Lawrence Durant, hydroponic horticultural technicians. Students will also be trained to grow and care for the plants and the Cropbox environment while learning about environmental sustainability and feeding the hungry.

During the dedication event, Prebble, Mulholland and Durant addressed the entire Holy Cross school community along with special guests gathered for the occasion. They offered words of gratitude for the partnership and vision that brought the project to life. The dedication included a blessing by Rev. Scott Hahn, a member of the Mulholland Family Foundation board and a ribbon cutting.

The first harvest of produce has recently taken place and provided to the Mulholland Family Foundation to be distributed to food pantries. Volunteers from Holy Cross will maintain the project through the summer months and into the fall when students will be trained.

was summoned, the physician thought he might have to sacrifice his grandchild in order to save his daughter." Eventually, a safe delivery ensued.

3. Her sons served in the Navy Her eldest William joined the U.S. Navy in 1817 and started his service on the USS Independence. He served 17 years. Richard was the captain's clerk on the USS Cyane. For nearly a year he was on duty off the coast of Africa before he contracted a fever and died in 1823. He was buried at sea. and served at sea. Each year, the Seton Shrine hosts the Sea Services Pilgrimage, and Mother Seton is the Patroness of the Sea Services. Learn more about William's service in the short film, "Son of a Saint."

4. She was constantly worried

about her sons' faith. She wrote many letters to her

Richard and William when they were young men, and worried about William while he served in the Navy on a ship without access to the Eucharist. She once wrote, "I must answer for my children in judgment, whatever faith I lead them to." After her conversion, she delighted in her three daughters' ready acceptance of the faith, but feared for her sons, whose friends mocked the Church. Listen to this episode in Friends & Followers to learn more about her son William, or listen to this episode to learn about Richard.

5. She wrote a book of advice for one of her daughters.

As Mother Seton was nearing death, a large concern was to prepare her daughter Catherine to face life without her mother. (Her two other daughters were already deceased). In a "Little Red Book," Mother Seton wrote advice and spirituality to help Catherine navigate the world without her mother. This "Little Red Book" will be on display in the new museum this Fall, along with her daughters' hair locks.

6. Her own daughter went on to become a mother of a religious order.

Catherine joined the Sisters of Mercy and received the habit on April 6, 1847, and was given the name "Sister Mary Catherine". In her later years in the order, she was referred to as "Mother." Years earlier, in in 1812, Mother Seton's eldest daughter Anna Maria took vows to become a Sister of Charity, as she was dying.

7. She lost her own mother at a young age.

Mother Seton's blended family actually began when she was three years old and her mother died. One year later, her little sister also passed away. Her father remarried but her stepmother did not accept young Elizabeth and often sent her away to live with relatives.

8. She once wrote, "I will be the mother of many daughters..."

"I am at peace in the midst of fifty children," she wrote in the years following her opening of St. Joseph's Academy. "I am as a Mother encompassed by many children of different dispositions... bound to love, instruct, and provide for the happiness of all, to give the example of cheerfulness." In addition to the school children, Mother Seton's religious order grew to include many young women before her death and continued to expand long after throughout North America.

9. She struggled early during her conversion with her relationship with the Blessed Mother.

Mother Seton yearned for a mother, but she struggled initially

with developing a devotion to the Blessed Mother during her conversion. Learn more about how she accepted the Church's teachings on the Blessed Mother in this threeminute video.

10. She was a grandma!

Though she didn't live to see her grandchildren, her eldest son William had nine children, seven of whom survived to adulthood. One of them, Robert Seton, was ordained to the priesthood in Rome in 1865 after being educated at Mount St. Mary's College in Emmitsburg. He was private chamberlain to Pope Piux IX and was dean of all the monsignori in the United States. He later served as a priest in the Diocese of Newark, N.J., and was a trustee of Seton Hall University. In 1903, Pope Leo XIII appointed Robert as Archbishop of the titular See of Heliopolis in Phoenicia.
